Reigle Named President of Bank

The board of directors of the Bank of Kewaskum named James D. Reigle as its president on Thursday, Nov. 7. He succeeds Burns R. Nelthorpe, who passed away recently. Reigle also serves as president of Regal Ware, Inc., a Kewaskum based cookware firm.

Founded in 1904, the Bank of Kewaskum was first headed by Adolph Rosenheimer who was succeeded by his son, M. W. Rosenheimer. The latter maintained the top post until February of 1966 when his son-in-law, Burns R. Nelthorpe, was made president. Rosenheimer continued his banking activities by serving as chairman of the board until his death in August, 1967.

The new bank president is a well known figure in the housewares industry. He has been ac-

tive in the cookware field since his graduation from Ohio university in 1949. He was made president of Regal Ware, Inc. in September of 1965 after serving as assistant general manager and secretary prior to his appointment as vice-president in 1962.

James D. Reigle has also been active in community affairs. He served as president of Kewaskum's village board of trustees for more than three terms from 1955 to 1962. He is a member of the Robert G. Romaine Post of the American Legion, the Kiwanis Club of Kewaskum and the local school board.

His other memberships include being a director of the National Housewares Manufacturing association and a board membership with the Bank of Kewaskum.

School Bus, Truck Collide in Fiery Crash, Injuring 2

FIRE TRUCKS, AMBULANCE RUSH TO SCENE NEAR HERE

The drivers of both vehicles were injured in a fiery crash between a Kewaskum school bus and panel truck at 4:17 p. m. Wednesday where Sandy Ridge rd. crosses CTH H one mile south of Kewaskum and about ¼ mile east of Hwy. 45. Both vehicles burst into flames following the crash.

According to authorities, the school bus, owned by Baumann Bus Service, Campbellsport, and driven by Mrs. Theresa Oelhafen, R. 1, Allenton, apparently stopped for the intersection and then pulled out from the stop sign in the path of the approaching panel truck, which was westbound on CTH H. The truck, owned by Brinks, Inc. of Milwaukee, was driven by John A. Kump, 3818 W. Walnut st., Milwaukee. Kump said he saw the bus pulling out from the intersection but was unable to stop in time to avoid the crash.

The truck struck the bus in the right front side; puncturing the gas tank and causing gasoline to leak out. Gasoline also seeped out of the carburetor of the truck and both vehicles caught fire. The truck stayed on the highway at the intersection but the bus left the road on the right side and continued on into a field before being halted. Grass in the trail of the truck also caught fire from the leaking gasoline.

The Brink truck services banks in the area, carrying cancelled checks and other non-negotiable bonds. The impact of the crash caused automatic locks on the doors to lock and set off the alarm on the truck. Kump, who was apparently in a semi-conscious state, was locked in the

truck.

The Kewaskum fire department and ambulance were summoned and rushed to the scene. When firemen arrived, Roger Schmitt, a member of the department, who was passing near the scene in his truck, already had most of the flames extinguished with a hand extinguisher but the truck motor was still burning and firemen finished the job. Luckily Schmitt and others in the area reached the scene as soon as they did as gas was seeping from the carburetor and the entire truck might have burst into flames in moments with Kump trapped inside.

Firemen had to use crow bars to bend open the door and break the strong lock before they could remove the driver. Kump was placed in the ambulance and immediately rushed to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend. The bus driver, Mrs. Oelhafen, also was taken to the hospital in the ambulance. Fortunately there was only one passenger left in the bus which transports pupils to and from Kewaskum schools. The passenger was not injured.

Kump was reported to have suffered a fractured left leg, head and neck lacerations and other injuries. Mrs. Oelhafen incurred an injury to her right eye. She and her passenger escaped the bus, which had burst into flames, through a rear door.

The front end of the truck was badly smashed and the right front side of the bus was damaged.

ACCIDENT IN VILLAGE




We must all preserve and conserve," said the speaker.

Four Indians Selected on All-Conference Football Team

2 Juniors, 2 Seniors Named; 7 Receive Honorable Mention

Coaches were widely split in their selections to the Scenic Moraine all-conference football teams and as a result three offensive guards, four running backs and five linebackers were named.

Kewaskum, which placed fifth in the standings with a 3-4 record, had four players selected to berths on the all-conference squad, three on the offensive team and one on the defensive team. Named on the offensive team were Tackle Leon Schultz, Guard Leo Gundrum and Halfback Jerry Engeleiter, and Halfback Perry Koth was selected on the defensive team.

This is the first time Kewaskum placed two juniors on the all-conference team, namely Schultz and Gundrum. Engeleiter and Koth are seniors.

Seven Kewaskum players also received honorable mention on the all-conference selections. On offense Koth was also selected as a halfback and Steve Schaefer as center. On defense Schultz and Gundrum were also named. Schultz as a tackle and Gundrum as linebacker. Other Indians selected included End Steve Stern, a junior, Guard Russ Gavin, also a junior, and Bob Fellenz, defensive halfback, a senior.

Among Kewaskum's four players who were all-conference choices, Engeleiter carried the ball 78 times for 415 yards for an average of 5.2 yards per carry. He did not fumble the ball once all season. Schultz and Gundrum were both two way performers, playing on offense and defense. Besides making the offensive all-conference team, both received honorable mention on the defensive team. Koth made many big plays on offense, including two punt returns of 50 yards or better and he ran for 60 yards after catching a pass. On defense he usually covered the opposition's strongest receiver. He held Tom Rettler of Slinger to two catches for short yardage. Rettler was named as an end on the all-conference squad.

Koth also held a 6-2 sophomore end Tom Breitzman of Campbellsport to one reception.

North Fond du Lac, runner-up to champion Grafton, had six players named to seven positions to set the pace on the all-conference teams. Grafton settled for five positions. Pewaukee, which finished two games behind the champion, filled five berths. Then came Kewaskum with four positions, Slinger three, Germantown one, Random Lake one and Campbellsport one.

With two juniors selected on the all-conference team and four juniors receiving honorable mention, all of whom will be back next year, prospects are bright. All told there were 13 juniors and one sophomore who were lettermen on this year's varsity squad and will be returning next

season. Among the junior group, six started on defense all season and five started on offense, one played three complete games at linebacker, and seven others went in as starters in some games. Sophomore Mike Doherty also started two games at quarterback and saw considerable action in other games and Junior Lee Rammer wound up as starting quarterback.

Besides the above, seven more juniors who did not have enough playing time to qualify for varsity letters and played mostly on the JV team, will also be back, making a total of 20 juniors and one sophomore who will be returning next year. These seven juniors include Greg Arndt, Clarence Klemm, Dave Schaub, Bob Schuppel, Glen Staehler, Jim Tessar and Brian Sekeres.

The Indian varsity squad selected Koth as the most valuable player on the team and Schultz and Engeleiter were named honorary co-captains for the season.
