Local Girl's Husband Research Associate At U. of Illinois

Dr. David E. Koeppe, the son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Woodrow W. Hanselman, Kewaskum, recently began work as a visiting research associate in the department of agronomy at the University of Illinois, Urbana.

Dr. Koeppe received his Ph. D. degree in botany from the University of Oklahoma in August 1968. He holds a Bachelor of Science degree from Wisconsin State University-Oshkosh (1962) and a Master of Natural Science degree from the University of Oklahoma (1965). While a graduate student at the University of Oklahoma Dr. Koeppe was elected to full membership in the Society of the Sigma Xi, a national research honorary fraternity, and was granted the Phi Sigma award for meritorious graduate school achievement in the biological sciences. The Phi Sigma award is given by the president of the university to one graduate student each year in the biological sciences upon faculty committee recommendation.

Dr. Koeppe's present research involves plant energy relations; or more specifically, the mitochondrial reactions of corn seedlings. Following this temporary appointment he plans to teach and continue research at the university level, having previously taught high school biology and chemistry in Wisconsin at Waupun and West Allis Nathan Hale.

Mrs. Koeppe, the former Eileen Hanselman of Kewaskum, is presently teaching junior high school vocal music at Tuscola, Ill.

Harry J. Schaefer, Former Fire Chief, Business Man, Dies

Harry J. Schaefer, 69, of Kewaskum, former fire chief and businessman here, passed away Saturday, Nov. 16, at the Veterans' hospital at Wood, Wis. where he had resided for seven years.

Mr. Schaefer was in partnership with his brother, Carl, in the operation of the Ford garage business in Kewaskum from 1921 to 1955. He was very active in civic affairs. He was a former chief of the Kewaskum fire department, serving in this capacity for a period of 31 years. Harry was a member of Robert G. Romaine Post 384, American Legion, the Modern Woodmen of America West Bend Masonic Lodge 138, Veterans World War I Barracks and a member of Peace United Church of Christ, Kewaskum. He served his country during World War I.

Mr. Schaefer was born Sept. 23, 1899, in Kewaskum, a son of the late Charles and Katie (Knoebel) Schaefer. He is survived by one brother, Carl F. of Kewaskum, two sisters, Corrine (Mrs. L. T. Ogenorth) of Kewaskum and Mrs. Miriam Becker of Beaver Dam two sisters-in-law, a brother-in-law, nieces and nephews, and other relatives. A brother, Walter, predeceased him in 1964.

Funeral services were held at Miller's Funeral home at 1:30 p. m. Tuesday with the Rev. Donald Schowalter officiating. Interment was in Peace church cemetery. Six officers of the Kewaskum fire department served as pallbearers and military graveside rites were conducted under the auspices of the Robert G. Romaine post, American Legion, Kewaskum. 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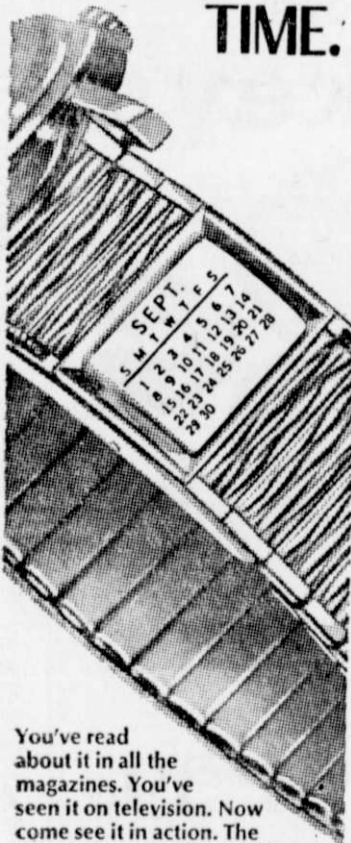

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County Allocation For Vet Housing Loans Totals \$13,975

Allocation of \$13,975.00 to Washington county for second mortgage housing loans under the Wisconsin veterans benefits program was announced this week by Leroy Schaefer, Washington county veterans service officer.

State housing loan funds are allocated each four months by the Department of Veterans Affairs, with each county receiving a share based on the part of the total state veterans population living within the county. The county allocation made a year ago was 288% larger than this year's and the housing loan allocation made two years ago was 438% greater than the present allocation.

Housing loan funds have reached the lowest point in the history of the program, and in much of the state the veterans loan program has been at a standstill for many months. Although demand for veterans loans continues to increase and the number of eligible veterans has doubled since the program started, no money has been added to the veterans trust funds since 1952.

By Nov. 1 veterans in 55 of the state's 72 counties were unable to secure housing loans because of shortage of funds. Included were veterans in Milwaukee county, which had never before exhausted its allocation.

Under the loan program up to \$4,000 can be loaned on a second mortgage basis to qualified state veterans at 2% interest for the purpose of constructing, buying or improving homes in which they will reside. The veteran is required to have 5% of the purchase price in his own funds. The balance of the cost is borrowed locally.

Veterans of all the nation's wars and unmarried widows of veterans are eligible. Further information can be obtained at the county veterans service office, located at the court house annex, West Bend.

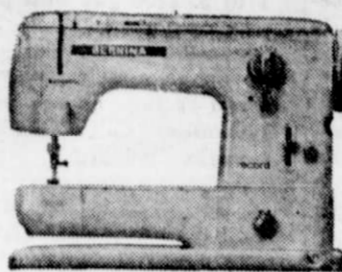

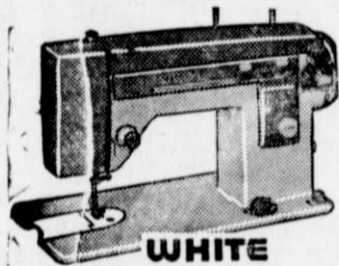
