Kiwanis Honors Outstanding Conservation Farmers



Walter Neumann and Harold Westerman of the Kewaskum area were honored as outstanding conservation farmers at the annual Kewaskum Kiwanis farm-city event held Monday night, Nov. 18, at the Hon-E-Kor Country club. The engraved Kiwanis plaques were presented to them by Richard Edwards, president of the Kiwanis. Roy Esser, chairman of the event, presented each of them with an enlarged aerial photograph of their farm, in color.

Also present to share in the success of these conservationists were their wives, Anita Neumann and son Roger, and Lillian Westerman and son Mike. Special guests were Elwyn Romaine and Norbert Dettmann, Washington County Soil and Water Conservation District supervisors, and John Oelhaufen, member of the Washington County Board.

Don Kurer, soil conservationist, showed the group colored aerial slides of conservation work applied on the Westerman and Neumann farms. He told of the unusual progress these men have made in putting conservation on their land. Since they became soil and water conservation district cooperators in 1966, they have developed a farm conservation plan and have applied nearly all of the conservation work which they had planned for their land. Ivan Kumrow, soil conservation technician, assisted them with this work.

Walter Neumann has applied 112 acres of contour strip cropping to keep the topsoil, water and fertilizer on the land, where it belongs for efficient crop production. He has constructed 900 feet of diversion terrace and 2,400 feet of grass waterway to safely dis-

pose of excess runoff water. Also 18,000 feet of tile drainage was installed to improve his wetland for crop production.

Harold Westerman said that he started conservation farming after a severe rainstorm when a crop, along with all of the topsoil, was washed off the hill in a particular field. Since then, he has applied 64 acres of contour strip cropping, 600 feet of grass waterway and 2,300 feet of tile drainage. He has constructed a stock watering pond and has an extensive area of wetland woods and marsh set aside for wildlife habitat.

To climax the evening, speaker Alton Block, general manager of the East Central Breeders' Association reminded those present, in a very interesting way, of their responsibility to our God, country and fellow men.

The auctions are held at Lomira weekly.

Belger will provide a weekly farm pickup where the pigs will be weighed and paid for on the farm.

The Kewaskum Elementary school and Holy Trinity Catholic school are displaying "Chief Kewaskum" in the schools. The children will be able to spot the home of a block parent in case of an emergency such as stray dogs, storms, bullies, child molesters, or in the case of sudden illness or injury.

Fr. Mayer, Army Chaplain, to Note 25th Anniversary

EVENT WILL BE OBSERVED AT HOLY TRINITY SUNDAY

Father William J. Mayer, a United States Army chaplain holding the rank of lieutenant colonel, and a native Kewaskumite, will celebrate the 25th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood at his home parish, Holy Trinity church in Kewaskum, on Sunday, Dec. 1.

Father Mayer will be the principal concelebrant at a Mass of concelebration and thanksgiving at the parish at 4 p. m. with a reception and refreshments to follow in the parish hall. Fr. Mayer arranged the Low Mass in the afternoon to avoid any possible interference with the parish schedule. Msgr. Schneider, if possible, will preach. All friends and parishioners are invited to join Fr. Mayer at his silver jubilee celebration.

Father Mayer, a son of the parish, offered his first Mass at Holy Trinity in December of 1943. He was recently assigned as deputy post chaplain at Fort Sill, Okla. for the present after returning from Germany where he served as a chaplain.

Father Mayer served as curate at St. Monica, Whitefish Bay, and also St. Anthony and St. Agnes parishes in Milwaukee before entering military service in June of 1956. Since that time he filled chaplaincies at Fort Jackson, S. C. until May of 1957 and in Germany until May of 1962. Returning to the United States, he was with the 5th Army Headquarters in Chicago until June of 1963. He served in Korea during the next year and again in Germany from September of 1964 until last month when he returned to the United States.

Father Mayer attended St. Francis seminary in Milwaukee and was ordained on Nov. 29, 1943. On his first tour of duty in Germany Fr. Mayer was stationed at Babbenhausen where he was affectionately known by residents and troops as the "Bishop of Babbenhausen."

Father Mayer, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Mayer of Kewaskum, is a brother of Carl Mayer, juvenile officer of the West Bend police department; Mrs. Robert (Alexia) Ours of Kewaskum and Mrs. Allen (Mary Jane) Hermans of Milwaukee.

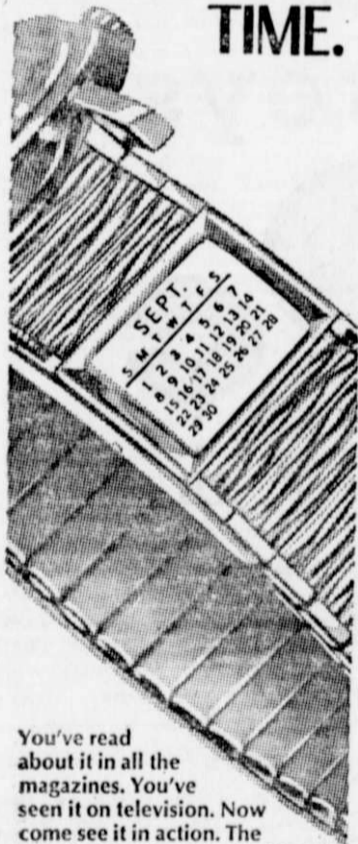
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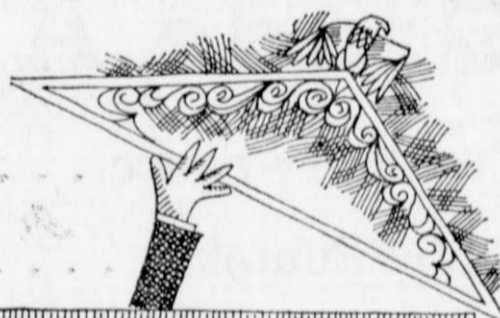

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Gov. Knowles Names Mrs. Feyrer Humane Officer for County

The Washington County Humane Society has announced with pride that one of its members, Mrs. Karen Feyrer of rural Hartford, has been granted a commission as Washington County Humane Agent by Governor Warren Knowles. Her appointment, according to Wis. Statute 58.07, dealing with humane societies, was recommended by law enforcement authorities throughout the county and Assemblyman Fred Schroeder who is an active member of the Washington County Humane Society.

The appointment of a woman as a humane officer is somewhat unusual but not unheard of in Wisconsin. Mrs. Feyrer is well-qualified for the position. She is a charter member of the Washington County Humane Society and twice-elected secretary of the organization. After attending Marquette University she married Donald Feyrer, an electrical engineer at Cutler Hammer in Milwaukee. They have two children, Matt and Rene. The entire family is interested in humane work. Recently Mrs. Feyrer appeared on TV channel 18 in connection with National Fire Prevention Week. She "starred" with her Dalmatian dog, sometimes called a "coach dog" who were mascots at fire stations in former times.

Mrs. Feyrer was instrumental in setting up the humane society's "shuttle service" which concerns itself with the care and transportation of unwanted animals to the Wis. Humane Society in Milwaukee. According to state law she will be empowered to investigate complaints of cruelty to animals many of which involve inadequate shelter, possible starvation, neglect and abuse. While the commission of humane agent is granted for life Mrs. Feyrer has stated that she accepts the office only as an agent of the Washington County Society. Mary Weddig Gives Blood on UW Campus

Mary Weddig, 1404 Parkview dr., Kewaskum, is among 2,132 students, faculty and staff members of the University of Wisconsin at Madison who gave a pint of blood during this fall's all-campus blood donation on the university's Madison campus.

The gifts of life were collected by the Red Cross Blood Center in Madison for distribution to 87 hospitals in 37 southern Wisconsin counties, including all Madison and university hospitals, and to the nation's armed forces wherever needed.

By the large donation of 2,132 pints the university in Madison continues to hold the blood donation championship of the state of Wisconsin.

Since 1950 when the blood donations were started on the university's Madison campus, two all-campus donations have been held each year—one in the fall and one in the spring—and over the past 18 years students, faculty and staff members of the university at Madison have donated more than 50,000 pints of blood to the hospitals and armed forces.

Flynn on Carrier at Vietnam

Marine Corporal David L. Flynn, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Flynn, 204 Main st., Kewaskum, is serving aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS Coral Sea off the coast of Vietnam.

The first aircraft carrier to launch air strikes over North Vietnam in 1965, Coral Sea is back, on its fourth consecutive deployment with the Seventh Fleet on "Yankee Station" in the Gulf of Tonkin.

Pilots from USS Coral Sea have damaged or destroyed important enemy installations in their daily air strikes over Vietnam.

During its deployment in the

Western Pacific the 4,200 crewmen aboard the carrier have visited ports in Hawaii, Japan and the Philippines.

Erickson Serving in Vietnam

Marine Lance Corporal Dennis J. Erickson, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond L. Erickson of R. 3, Campbellsport, is serving with Marine Air Support Squadron Two, a unit of the First Marine Aircraft Wing in Vietnam.

The wing has been awarded the Presidential Unit Citation for its combat achievements during the period of May 1965 to September 1967.

Air arm of the Third Marine Amphibious Force, the wing operates several hundred aircraft which includes fighter, attack, reconnaissance, helicopter and transport aircraft.

In addition to providing aviation support for the First and Third Marine Divisions, the First Marine Aircraft Wing support other American and Allied forces in the five northernmost provinces of South Vietnam.

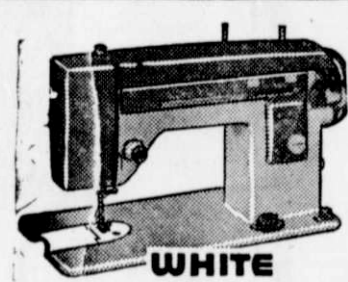

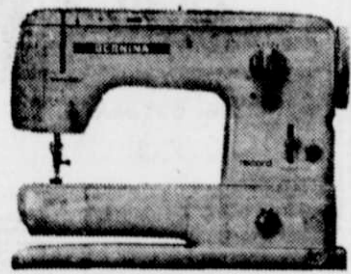

CARE's midwest office at 125 E. Wells st., Milwaukee says that for every hungry person overseas who receives CARE food, recipient foreign governments will help feed eight others. CARE seeks local help to provide 6-million food units at a dollar each, for programs to nourish 28-million needy in the coming year. Public contributions will give food to some 3.1-million; the other 24,800,000 are covered by partnership agreements whereby central and state governments overseas pay CARE's costs of distributing farm abundance given to CARE by the U.S.

The CARE envelopes allow individuals and local groups and organizations to help in any amount they choose; they are available now at the bank or are being

distributed by the bank through the mail.

Most of the food will be given to mal-nourished children, but adults will be helped primarily through food-for-work projects to build schools and community facilities. The general aim is to make hungry people capable of feeding themselves.

The CARE food is provided after domestic U.S. welfare needs are met first, and supplementary food is bought by CARE, part of it applied also to the partnership plans. Direct food relief areas include those of Nigeria-Biafra, war refugees in South Vietnam, famine victims in Haiti, and the neediest in Latin America, Africa and the Middle and Far East.
