Village Tax Rate Raised \$6.23 To \$36.23 Per \$1,000 Valuation

Budget of \$696,368 Approved by Board

The Kewaskum village board Monday night approved a budget of \$696,368.27 calling for a tax levy of \$492,377.57 and requiring a net tax rate of \$36.23 for \$1,000 assessed valuation. The new tax rate, based on the 1969 budget, is \$6.23 higher than this year's net rate of \$30 after applying state tax credit. The rate prior to the state tax credit this year was \$31.57.

The new village budget would have resulted in a net tax levy of \$37.77 per \$1,000 valuation, but a tax credit of \$1.53 based on refunds from the state sales tax somewhat cushioned the tax increase. Approval of the new budget followed a brief public hearing at which the new expenditures were approved and the budget adopted. No objections were raised.

Village Commissioner William Martin attributed the tax increase to various factors. The county tax apportionment is \$10,300 higher, calling for an increase of 80 cents per \$1,000 valuation; the school district levy increased \$19,000 requiring a \$1.46 hike and the vocational school levy increased \$22,000 necessitating an increase of \$1.70.

A \$2.24 boost in the village apportionment was attributed to the fact that 1967 returns from the state on shared income taxes were over-estimated at \$130,000 whereas a change in formula for payments of corporation taxes resulted in a cutback in this amount to \$91,000. To make up the deficit, the village was required to borrow money which must now be paid, Martin said.

238 DEER REGISTERED IN COUNTY DURING SEASON

During the deer hunting season which ended Sunday evening, a total of 238 deer were registered at the various checking points throughout Washington county, according to Armin Schwengel, district game manager.

The deer kill this year was below the number registered last year when a total of 254 were tallied in the county, with a lack of snow being a contributing factor.

Despite the decrease in number of deer by hunters, motorists were still reporting deer-car mishaps or near crashes due to the number of deer darting onto highways throughout the county.

Fund Drive for Swimming Pool Underway Here

EXPECTED COST OF POOL \$75,000, BUILDING \$150,000

The Kewaskum Kiwanis Foundation has announced it is conducting a fund raising program during the first two weeks of December.

Purpose of the drive is to complete the \$75,000 fund necessary to begin the construction of the Kewaskum Community Swimming Pool. A mailing will be made to every family in the district.

The pool committee expresses hope that everyone will find this cause worthy of support. A concerted joint effort will make it possible for all to enjoy a completed pool before the end of 1969.

The Kiwanis committee in charge reports they have achieved over 70 per cent of their goal of \$75,000 and are now counting on residents of the school district to raise the remaining funds.

The proposed pool will be of "Olympic" size, 42x75 feet. It will have 3,150 square feet of swimming and diving area. A large circular wading pool is also included with a depth of 18 inches. An outdoor sun deck with access from the pool deck will also be included, as will be a filtering system, locker rooms, etc.

The cost of the pool, deck, sun deck, wading pool, filter system, locker rooms, etc. is expected to be \$75,000. The additional funds required to provide the building which will cover the pool will be provided by the school district. This amount is expected to be approximately \$150,000. The expenditure to cover the pool has been authorized by the voters of the district upon receipt of the \$75,000.00 from the Kiwanis Foundation.

The pool will be attached to the Kewaskum High school enabling some existing facilities to be used. This will also provide an easily accessible facility for swimming classes during the day and adult and family nights.

It was the Kiwanis' initial intent to provide an outdoor pool but at the last school district electors' meeting, it was voted to complete the project by covering the pool with a suitable building. The school will operate the pool during the school year and in addition to daily use in the school program, there will be evening programs. The village will also conduct its summer recreation program at the pool, rather than in the Milwaukee River which has been the swimming beach.

The pool and filtering and pumping equipment are designed to meet state health department standards and the water will be pure, according to the committee.

Barns, Cattle, Hay, Machinery Lost in \$25,000 Farm Fire

An early morning fire Tuesday on the Joe Chesney farm in the town of Ashford, located about four miles southeast of Lomira, caused damage estimated at \$25,000 to \$50,000. Two barns, a machine shed, 17 head of cattle, poultry, 50 or more tons of hay and all farm implements were reported lost in the blaze.

Ronald Enderle, fire chief of Lomira, said that by the time firemen arrived at the scene the barn where the fire broke out was completely involved. He said Chesney apparently was awakened by the sound of timbers breaking due to the blaze in the center barn. Chesney managed to save 18 cows from another barn before firemen arrived.

Among the farm machinery lost were two tractors, but another was saved. Chesney could not enter the barn where the fire broke out due to the flames and heat.

Sparks from the blaze at various times threatened the farm home, the roof of the home being covered with flying embers at times. Fire fighters kept wetting down the home, a granary, small tool shed and another small outbuilding, all of which were saved.

Chief Enderle said the Brownsville fire department also responded to the alarm on a mutual paid pact. He said the Lomira department had 3,500 gallons of water available immediately and the supply was augmented by the 2,500 gallon tanker of the Brownsville department. The two departments pumped an additional 10,000 gallons of water on the blaze and never were endangered by a shortage of water. Firemen remained at the scene until about 7:30 a. m. Tuesday.

No one was injured fighting the fire despite the severity of the blaze.

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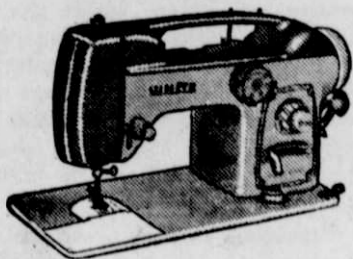

of buying the food is Colleen, Debra and Karen Frank, Patty and Lucy Schaub and Beth Faber. The music and drama festival is on Feb. 22.

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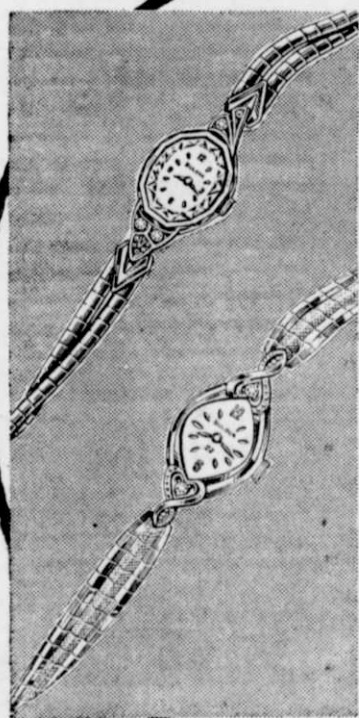

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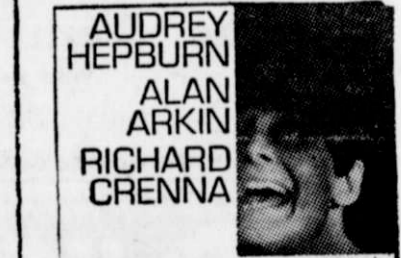

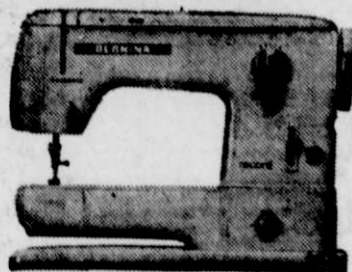
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
