





Board Approves **Budget, Sets Tax Rate at Meeting**

Regular Meeting December 2, 1968

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session at 8:00 p. m. in the Council Room of the Municipal Building. Trustee Herriges was absent and President Tessar was tardy.

In the absence of President Tessar, Trustee Wietor was selected as acting president for this meeting.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Kral, seconded by Trustee Perschbacher and duly carried.

The first order of business was the public hearing on the proposed budget for 1969. There were no appearances either for or against the budget as presented. The public hearing was declared closed.

RESOLUTION NO. 68-6 BE IT RESOLVED, by the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, that there be and hereby are levied the following taxes for the year ending December 31, 1968, upon all real and personal property according to the assessment roll of the current year:

STATE TAXES-\$3,576.88, at the rate of \$0.2744 per thousand. COUNTY TAXES - \$86,992.86, at the rate of \$6.6734 per thousand


