## Name Lyle Gibson College V-P for Academic Affairs

**FORMER INSTRUCTOR HERE APPOINTED IN CALIFORNIA**

Leo F. Cain, president of the California State College at Dominguez Hills, announced the appointment of the college's first Vice President for Academic Affairs. Dr. Lyle E. Gibson, a noted geographer and academic dean at the college since 1962, has assumed the responsibilities of the new vice presidential post. Dr. Gibson, former Kewaskum High school instructor and coach, is married to the former Charlotte Lay of Kewaskum.

Dr. Gibson received his Bachelor degree from Wisconsin State University in 1935, and his Master degree in geography from the University of Wisconsin in 1943. He earned his Ph. D. at the State University of Iowa in 1947.

The new vice president comes to his post with a wide range of teaching experience. Dr. Gibson was on the faculty at the State University of Iowa and San Francisco State College, where he rose from the rank of assistant professor to head of the geography department.

Like most active professional men, Vice President Gibson holds memberships and offices in many organizations including the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the Association of American Geographers, the Association of Pacific Coast Geographers, the Executive Committee of the California Council of Geography Teachers, the National Council for Geographic Education, and the Regional Science Association.

Dr. Gibson has written widely in his field. He has authored a number of journal publications and monographs which have been in the educational fields of geography, economic geography, and curriculum planning in geography. He is also the author of a textbook on Introductory Geography. More recently, Dr. Gibson served as editor of the "Report of the Geography Panel to the Statewide Social Sciences Study Committee," for the California State Department of Education.

Vice President Gibson resides in Palos Verdes with his wife, Charlotte. He is the father of a daughter, Janet, and a son, Lay, an assistant professor of geography at the University of Arizona.

(Continued from page 1) administrators are attempting to rotate the courses offered in the evening so that eventually every course will have been offered at night in at least one semester.

Tuition for full-time (8 or more credits) students is \$139.00 a semester; part-time students pay \$12.00 a credit. Second semester classes will begin on Feb. 3 with registration taking place on Jan. 28-30.

According to Paul Kegel, director of Student Affairs, a number of people have called to ask if there is a waiting list for second semester and to ask if "we're all filled up." The university wishes to assure interested persons that (1) there is no waiting list and never will there be one; (2) the university is not all filled up, and the University of Wisconsin has never turned away a qualified student. "We will always find room for a

qualified student," said Kegel. "By scheduling our classes from 7:00 a. m. to 10:00 p. m., we are able to accommodate many more students than our buildings were ever designed for."

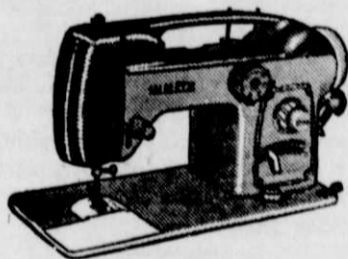

### Indians Squeeze By Pewaukee in S-M Opener, 54-53

Scenic Moraine teams opened conference play Friday with the Kewaskum Indians squeezing out a 54-53 victory at Pewaukee. It marked the first win of the young season for the Indians, who lost three non-conference games to three strong teams.

Perry Koth drove in for a lay-up shot with just 12 seconds left to play as Kewaskum beat Pewaukee to the wire in a see-saw game. The Indians were ahead at the quarter, 16-12, but fell behind at the intermission, 26-25, after a listless second period. Kewaskum won the contest in the third quarter, in which they outpointed the Pirates, 17-7, to take a 9-point 42-33 lead. But the Indians had to hang on for dear life in the final stanza to win as Pewaukee rallied for 20 points to the winners' 12.

Tremaine of the losers took scoring honors for the evening with 19 points, followed by Brandt with 11 and Brattebo with 10. Top scoring honors for the Indians were pretty evenly divided between Jim Foerster with 13 points, Perry Koth with 12 and Clark Eichstedt with 11.

Kewaskum almost lost the game from the free throw line, making only 8 while Pewaukee was sinking 15, a difference of 7.

Tonight (Friday) the Indians host strong Grafton, which with Slinger was selected as pre-season favorites. However, Grafton, lost to Slinger last Friday, 64-59.

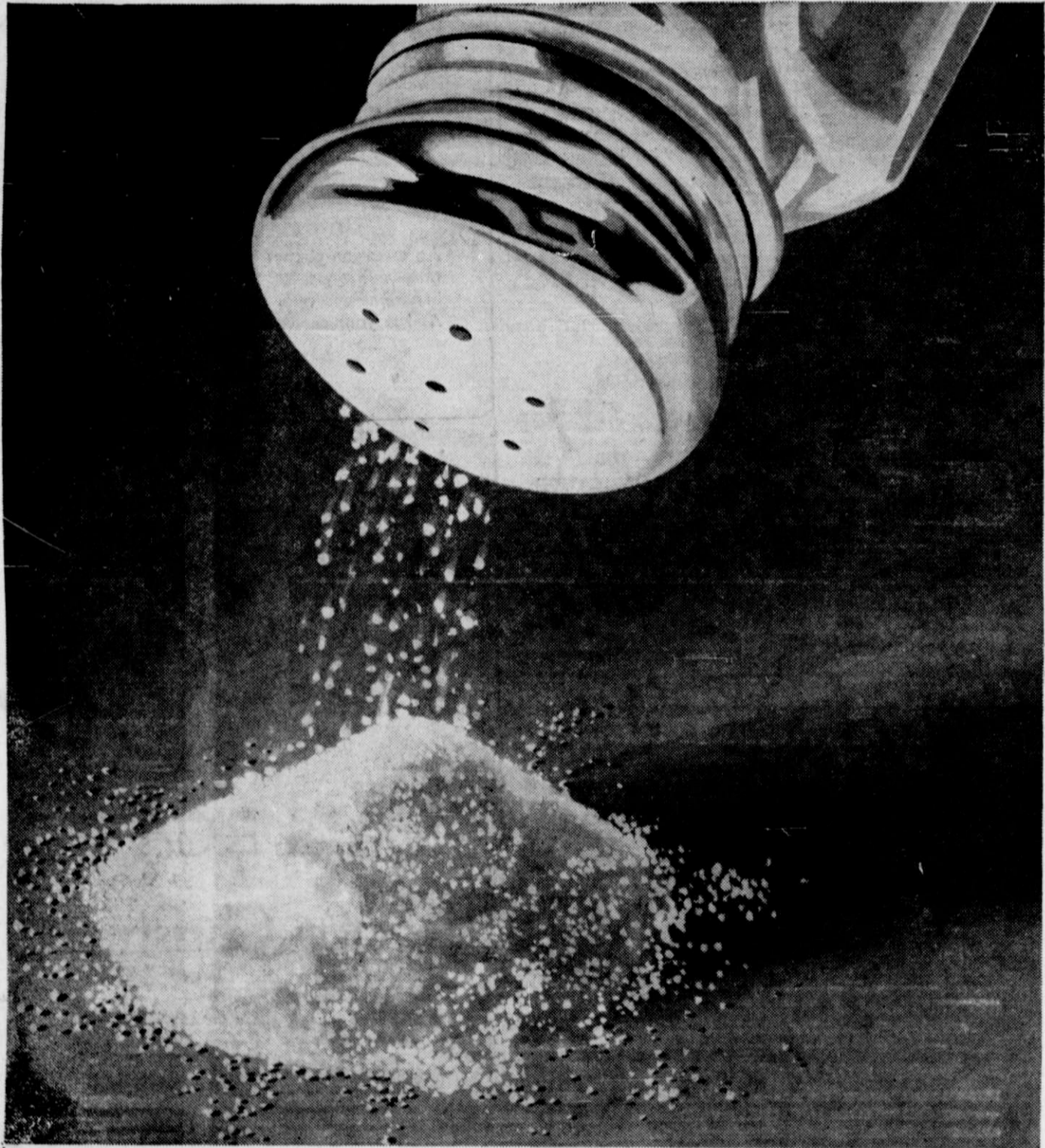
