# Kewaskum Took Its Name From Noble Potawatomi Indian Chief

The State Historical Society's publication, "Wisconsin Then and Now," in its December issue carried an interesting and informative article on how Kewaskum took its name from the Potawatomi Indian chief.

Based on a historical account by Carl Quickert published in 1923 in "The Story of Washington County," the article tells of a treaty with the Potawatomi Indians which was ratified on Feb. 21, 1835.

The treaty moved the Indians to reservations west of the Mississippi River and opened the Washington county area for settlement. It also resulted in many unhappy, homesick Indians wandering back to congregate in villages on the fringes of the new white settlements.

"One of these villages," the account states, "took root on a high hill with a deep depression on the top affording the Indians protec tion from rough winter winds

# Local News Items


