## Kewaskum Took Its Name From Noble Potawatomi Indian Chief

The State Historical Society's publication, "Wisconsin Then and Now," in its December issue carried an interesting and informative article on how Kewaskum took its name from the Potawatomi Indian chief.

Based on a historical account by Carl Quickert published in 1923 in "The Story of Washington County," the article tells of a treaty with the Potawatomi Indians which was ratified on Feb. 21, 1835.

The treaty moved the Indians to reservations west of the Mississippi River and opened the Washington county area for settlement. It also resulted in many unhappy, homesick Indians wandering back to congregate in villages on the fringes of the new white settlements.

"One of these villages," the account states, "took root on a high hill with a deep depression on the top affording the Indians protection from rough winter winds.

The white settlement at the base of this hill became the only one in all of Washington county to adopt an Indian name. It became in 1840, the village of Kewaskum."

Quickert's record of the history of the era related that Kewaskum "was the name of a noble chief of the Potawatomi, who with his community lived near the village that today bears his name. The name of 'Kewaskum' is interpreted as meaning 'the turner,' or a man who is able to turn fate whichever way he pleases. As a chief, he also was the medicine man or doctor of his tribe, and in sickness or distress his people confidently trusted in him and his supposed powers. He also stood on friendly and honorable terms with the settlers who reciprocated in righteousness and good feeling."

Chief Kewaskum died in 1857, over 111 years ago, and the controversy which surrounds his burial place typifies the lore that has been handed down about him. The grandparents of some of our present residents of this village were already living at that time.

The article in the Historical Society's publication also featured a photograph of Chief Kewaskum, reportedly the only one in existence. The Statesman has this photo in its files and has used it periodically throughout the years. It is the same photo

which appears above. The suit the chief wears in the above photograph, the article states, was given to him by the first Wisconsin state legislature to acknowledge his friendship and help.

An enlargement of the photograph also now hangs in the Washington County Historical Museum.

## Rodenkirch Boy Is First Baby of New Year Born in County

### KEWASKUM PARENTS TO RECEIVE HOST OF GIFTS

A baby boy born to a local couple, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas A. Rodenkirch, R. 2, Kewaskum, has been named the winner of the 1969 West Bend New Year's Baby Contest, although he wasn't born until Jan. 31. The bouncing baby weighed 10 pounds, 13 ounces.

Unusual compared to other years, not a single baby was born at either St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, or St. Joseph's hospital, Hartford, on either Jan. 1 or 2. There was one baby born to Washington county parents on New Year's day but the birth was not reported until Jan. 4, after the Rodenkirch baby had been declared the winner. Sara Neil Hildebrand, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Hildebrand, Jackson, was born at 3 a. m. Jan. 1 at Sheboygan Memorial hospital.

The Rodenkirch baby is the sixth child in the family. His name was not immediately selected. The boy was born at 9 a. m. by caesarean section at Milwaukee Lutheran hospital. Dr. R. G. Edwards is the family doctor but the specialist who delivered the baby was Dr. Wendt of Milwaukee.

Rodenkirch is a mechanic at Fairmont Foods, Kewaskum. His wife is the former Allyne Ramthun. Their other children are: Gale 16, Kim 14, Reed 13, Brad 12 and Blake 6. The Rodenkirch baby will receive a host of gifts from 16 merchants.

## Tank Truck Badly Damaged in Blaze Near Here Friday

An apparent electrical short which ignited fuel oil and gasoline fumes on a tank truck which was making a delivery at the Ray Schmidt residence on Hwy. 28 about 2½ miles west of Kewaskum Friday morning caused a serious fire.

Kewaskum firemen were called out at 9:15 a. m. and about 15 members of the department fought the blaze for approximately an hour and a half, using high expansion foam to bring the fire under control. The truck, a new vehicle, was almost totally damaged in the blaze.

After returning to the fire station, local firemen were called back to the scene at about 11:45 a. m. when the blaze flared up again on the under side of the truck. Firemen were able to put out the second fire with hand extinguishers.

The tank truck, owned by Schaezel Oil Co. of West Bend and Germantown, was driven by Jerry Goeden of West Bend. Goeden was not injured in the mishap, nor were any of the firemen.

It was reported that the truck carried approximately 800 gallons of fuel oil and about 200 gallons of gasoline. The damaged truck was left at the scene.

## Indians Hand Lomira 1st Loss, Also Beat Bells

The Kewaskum Indians bagged two more big victories the past week. Playing a non-conference game at Lomira last Friday, they dealt the previously unbeaten Lions their first loss of the season, 59-50, in an upset. Hosting rival Campbellsport Tuesday night in conference action, the Indians also drubbed the Bells, 60-49, to knock them out of a tie with Kewaskum. This win moved the Indians into a third place tie with Pewaukee.

The win at Lomira came as a surprise to the Lions, who were knocked out of the unbeaten ranks. Lomira had entered the game with a seven game winning streak. They were 7-0 overall for the season and sport a 5-0 record in the Tri-County conference, in which they are co-leaders.

Coach Walt Bade claimed that his Indians did nothing "special" against Lomira but they did ring up a decisive 9-point victory over the Tri-County leaders. Only Dave Burkholder, a guard, whom Bade calls the "quarterback" of the Lions club, managed to solve Kewaskum's defenses. He led all scorers with 21 points and played a fine floor game. And the Indians turned the trick without the services of their ace guard, Randy Koth, who was injured.

Both the Indians and Lions hit a cool 37 per cent of their shots, but Kewaskum, with a balanced team, took more shots (57) and made more baskets (21) to partially account for the outcome. Guard Lee Rammer, who filled in for the injured Koth, turned in a strong game for the winners. His contribution included 8 points, while Mark Eichstedt topped the Indians with 14 points. Foerster chipped in 12, and Eichstedt's sophomore brother, Clark, also scored 8.

In the contest with Campbellsport here Tuesday, the Bells mov-

ed into a 16-11 advantage in the first quarter but then hit a cold spell in the second and third periods, scoring only 11 points for 16 minutes of play. Kewaskum grabbed the advantage to go ahead 24-22 at halftime and 40-27 at the end of the third quarter. The Bells were given and made two free throws after the final horn had sounded to cut their deficit to 11 points in the final score.

"Our defense is really starting to hustle. It's now the strong part of our game," Coach Bade said. The Indians showed a well balanced defense, frequently breaking up plays and stealing the ball from the Bells. One player the Indians could not defend was the Bells' Chuck Boegel, the conference's top scorer. He hit from all angles and finished with 23 points to top the scorers.

Randy Koth, who did not start because of an injury, was pressed into service and led Kewaskum scorers with 14 points. He also stole the ball on numerous occasions. Coach Bade substituted freely and reserve Bob Fellenz played considerably and added 11 points to the winners' total.

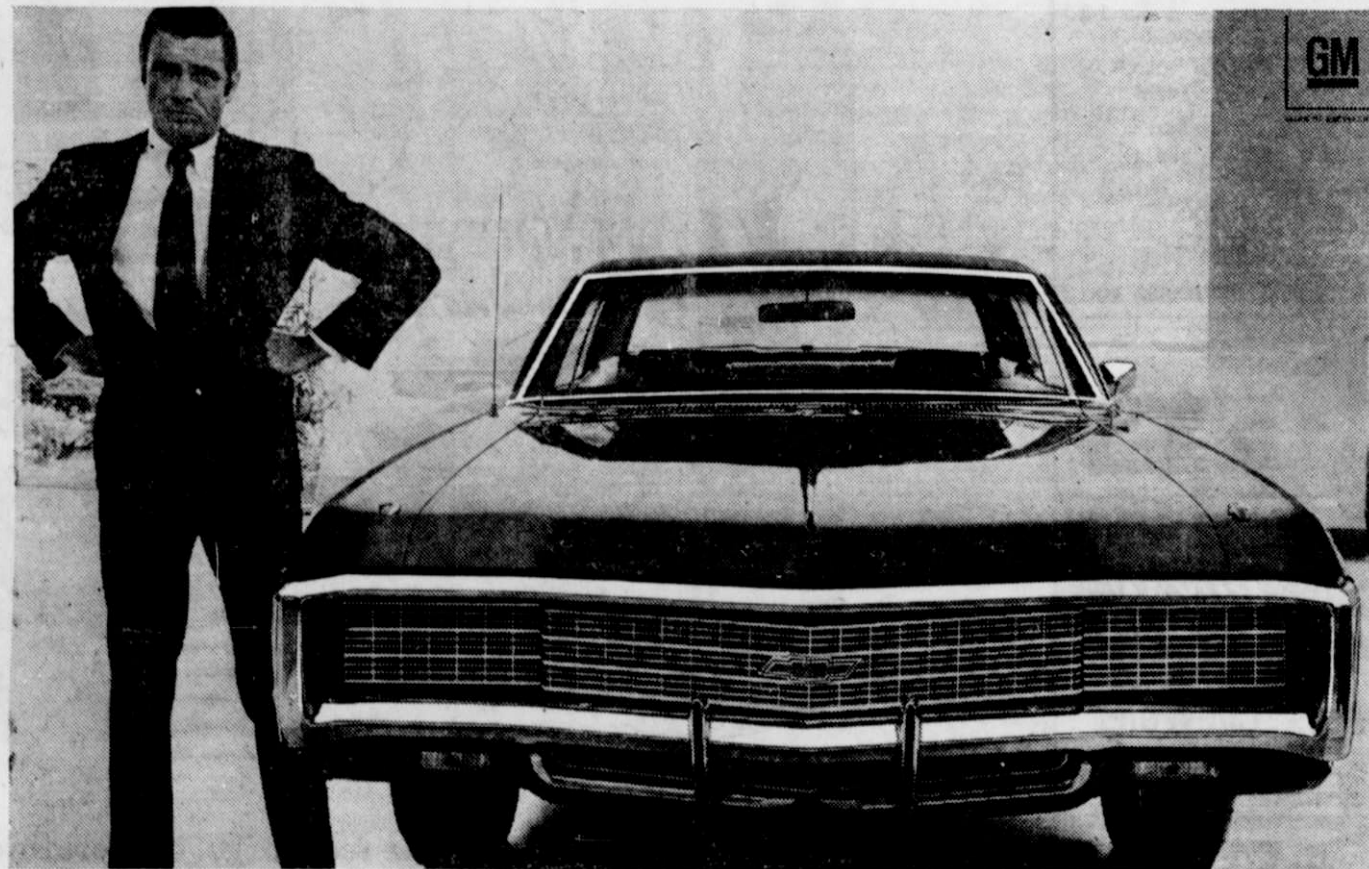
