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

JAN. 28 DEADLINE FOR CANDIDATES TO FILE NOMINATION PAPERS

The Washington county clerk's office has had many calls regarding the filing of nomination papers with local clerks for the forthcoming spring election. In accord with the new state law, chapter 8:10 (2) candidates for municipal offices, at the spring election, must file nomination papers on or before Jan. 28, 1969, with the local clerks.

This section also explains the number of signers required by the new law. For village and town offices, the number of signers is not less than 20 electors, and not more than 100 electors. The number of signers for city offices varies with the classification of cities, and should be checked by calling the city clerk.

Papers can be obtained from municipal clerks or newspaper publishers.
