Winners of the first annual awards for top newsmen of the year working for an Associated Press broadcast station in Wisconsin, for station of the year and for the best single story coverage of the year were announced in the Wisconsin Broadcast Log.

The winners for 1968 are: Dick Romaine, WHBL, Sheboygan—broadcast newsmen of the year; WFHR of Wisconsin Rapids—station of the year; Elliott Douck, WTMJ, Milwaukee—top single story coverage.

Romaine, the son of Elwyn M. Romaine of Kewaskum, has been news editor of WHBL at Sheboy-

Snow Emergency Ordinance to Be Enforced Here

The following ordinance will be enforced in the village with the next snow emergency:

ORDINANCE NO. 59-5

Ordinance Restricting Parking During Snow Emergency.

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 14.23 is hereby created to read as follows:

Section 14.23. PARKING DURING SNOW EMERGENCY. No person shall park on any public street or highway of the Village of Kewaskum during any snow emergency, between the hours of 1:00 a. m. and 6:00 a. m. except that vehicles may be parked on said streets during any snow emergency on the even numbered side of the street on those nights bearing an even calendar date during said hours from 1:00 a. m. to 6:00 a. m., and on the odd numbered side of the street on those nights bearing an odd calendar date during the period from 1:00 a. m. to 6:00 a. m., provided that vehicles may be parked on either side of the street for a period of time not longer than twenty minutes for actual loading or unloading of passengers or property, provided further that no other ordinances restricting parking as to place or time are violated thereby. A snow emergency shall be defined as any snow fall of one inch or more falling within any twenty-four hour period,

Train Strikes Car, 2 Youths Flee to Safety

A southbound freight train on the Chicago & North Western line struck a car which became stalled in snow on the railroad track at a crossing about 1½ miles north of Kewaskum last Wednesday evening.

The car was driven by Dean Martin, 20, of Kewaskum. His efforts and those of a passenger, Wayne Tolonen, also 20, of R. 2, Kewaskum, to free the vehicle failed and the two fled to safety as the freight approached and struck the rear of the Martin auto which extended onto the railroad tracks on a town road immediately west of CTH V, known as Kohn's crossing.

The mishap occurred about 6:30 p. m. Wednesday. The car was badly damaged but no one was injured in the accident. The auto was owned by Dean's father, Marvin A. Martin, of 1199 Kewaskum st.

It was reported that Martin was headed for the Tolonen home and became stalled in deep snow. A garageman who had been summoned pulled the vehicle out of the snowbank and Martin was attempting to back the auto onto CTH V when the rear wheels became stuck in snow along the railroad tracks. The youths leaped to safety before it was struck by the train.

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Iranian Exchange Student Speaker At Woman's Club

MISS SUDY REIGLE TELLS ABOUT CHILE

Miss Manzar Sahebjam Atabaki, 18-year-old AFS student from Tehran, Iran, was the guest speaker Saturday, Jan. 11, when the Kewaskum Woman's club met. Manzar was dressed in her native costume, an ornate floor length wrap, worn for special days and festivals.

After welcoming the group in her native language, Manzar spoke about her home and family and showed slides. Iran is one of the oldest countries in the world. The government is similar to the English system with two parliaments, the religion is predom-

antly Islam. Industry is of main importance, with rug making, oil, tea and dried fruits among the top.

Tehran, capitol of Iran, a city of 2½ million people, is Manzar's home. The city is modern and dress is similar to the United States. The school program is divided into two sections of six years each, is not co-educational and little of subjects is available. Group activities are encouraged among the boys and girls and no dating is allowed.

When questioned about her plans for college upon return, Manzar said she would not like to be a teacher as her mother had been one for many years and she thinks it is very hard work. What does she like best about the U.S.? "People are free and can do what they think is right for them." Manzar resides at the R. L. Edwards home.

Santiago, Chile, was the home of Sudy Reigle when she spent the summer as an exchange student in that country. Santiago is a city of three million people, divided into sections similar to suburbs. It is built low due to earthquakes prevalent in this area. Being near the mountains and sea was a new experience for Sudy and a very enjoyable summer. She introduced Ann Rita Reyes from Santiago, Chile, who will be spending the next three months in the Ronald Reigle home as an IFS student.

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Three Accidents Occur in Village

Three more traffic accidents on village streets the past week were reported by local police as a result of slippery roads and high snowbanks which obscure vision and make driving hazardous.

Friday at the intersection of school and Tower sts. Mrs. Caves, who was turning onto Tower st. stated that she did not notice the approaching Bartelt vehicle, northbound on the street, because of a high snow bank which obscured her vision. The left front of the Caves auto and left side of the Bartelt vehicle were damaged.

In a collision which occurred at 11:15 a. m. Saturday at the intersection of Western ave. and Forest ave., autos involved were operated by Mildred J. Peterson, 55, 328 Forest ave. and Sylvester F. McNamara, 43, 1305 Brooklane dr. Police reported that Mrs. Peterson was eastbound on South ave. and McNamara was southbound on Western ave. Because of the height of plowed snow banks on all sides they were unable to see one another. The Peterson car struck the McNamara car in the front and again in the back and then continued on into a snow drift. The left front of the Peterson auto and the right front, right side and left side of McNamara's vehicle were damaged.

EDITORIAL

Firemen Shovel Out Hydrants

Not only do Kewaskum volunteer firemen go out on call at all hours of the day and night in all kinds of weather to answer fire, rescue and ambulance calls. It seems they also have to volunteer to do their own shoveling out of fire hydrants for the protection and safety of our village residents.

Two weeks ago a notice appeared in this paper asking residents who have hydrants on or near their properties to remove the deep snow from around them to provide immediate access to them by firemen in case of fire or emergency. Some residents cooperated by cleaning the snow away well around the hydrants, others shoveled a small opening around them, but the majority ignored the plea and left the hydrants buried. In the event of a bad fire, these snowed-in hydrants could delay firemen five or ten minutes, which could mean the difference in your home burning down or being saved, and possibly save a life. Snow must be removed well around the hydrant so that the fire engine can drive right alongside it to connect up. Snow must also be removed deep enough to provide a clearing for hose couplings to be connected to the hydrant.

At 6:30 p. m. Tuesday the fire siren sounded, calling the firemen out to do their own shoveling out of the hydrants, which shouldn't be necessary. Equipped with shovels, the firemen split up into teams, and with the aid of two volunteer tractors with front end loaders and the village's Michigan front end loader, they covered the entire village and cleared away the snow, wherever necessary. Some of the hydrants were so completely buried under snow they were difficult to locate.

We read an item in a neighboring paper this week where two high school students, both Boy Scouts, rendered valuable assistance to the fire department by volunteering to shovel out hydrants. They shoveled out 27 hydrants at various points in the city, primarily in the hospital area. Not only does such a service render exceptional assistance to the fire department but also to the city where workers are over-taxed trying to clear streets and crosswalks and catch up with garbage and rubbish collections. Such is an opportunity for Boy Scouts or other volunteers to come forward and be of service.

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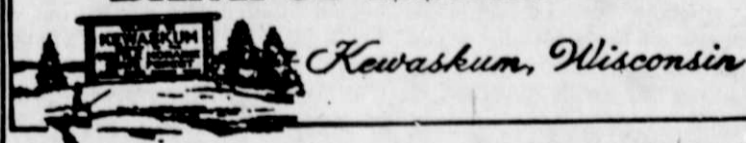
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Kewaskum Man, Two Others Promoted at Amity

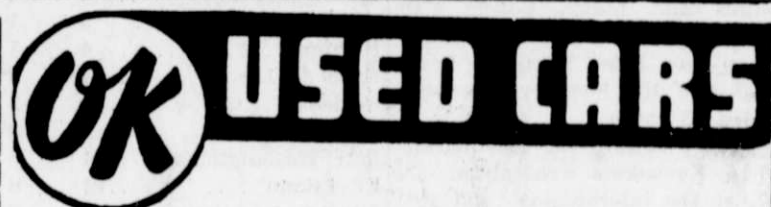
CANCELLED JR. WOMAN'S CLUB MEETING JAN. 23

The number of signers for city offices varies with the classification of cities, and should be checked by calling the city clerk.
