KVPD Named As Advertising Agency for Regal

Regal Ware, Inc., of Kewaskum, one of the nation's leaders in the cookware field, has named Klau-Van Pietersom-Dunlap, Inc., of Milwaukee, as its advertising and merchandising agency.

Founded in 1945 with 47 employees, Regal Ware was the first company to introduce Teflon cookware in sets. Today, it is the largest user of Teflon and stainless steel in the cookware industry. The firm manufactures more than 600 items in the cookware field.

In addition to its Wisconsin headquarters, the company has branch offices in New York, Los Angeles, and Chicago; manufacturing facilities in Wooster, Ohio, and a subsidiary, Regal Southern, Inc., in Flora, Miss.

Local Police Nab 2 Burglary Suspects, Loot

PAIR WANTED IN DOOR COUNTY SEIZED HERE

Chief of Police Roland Pledl was informed by teletype from Door county authorities at 3:18 p. m. Tuesday, Jan. 14, to pick up and hold two youths wanted for burglary in that county, who were reported to be living at a local hotel.

Upon investigating, local police found that the pair, Frank Vertz, 18, of R. 2, Forestville, and David Gigstead, also 18, of 339 Water st., Algoma, had apparently been warned and were aware of their impending apprehension. They had left the hotel about two days before, leaving all their loot and personal belongings behind.

Chief Pledl said the pair had a "room full of loot" which nearly filled a pickup truck when it was confiscated by local police. Items of loot included a television set, four radios, slide projectors, Polaroid camera, binoculars, tools, vises, and other articles. Police also confiscated their personal belongings.

The next morning, Wednesday, police received a complaint of two suspicious looking men at a village restaurant. They investigated and found the men were the ones they were looking for. The pair was apprehended at 11:30 a. m. and held in the county jail. Chief Pledl notified Sheriff Briden Hagen of Door county and the two were taken into custody later by Sheriff Hagen and a deputy from that county. The loot was also picked up by the Door county authorities.

The two were charged with burglarizing the ski lodge at Potawatomi State Park in Door county and destruction of property there, also several lake cottages in that county. Gigstead is also facing a parole violation charge. It was indicated that investigation by parole authorities provided information leading to the apprehension of the pair.

The two were returned to the Door county jail in Sturgeon Bay and charged with breaking and entering. All three members of the Kewaskum police force participated in the apprehension of the young men.

The two had been employed at industrial plants in West Bend and near Kewaskum since November.

Law Enforcement Program Attended By Local Police

A program in law enforcement training for full time law enforcement officers is being offered by Vocational, Technical and Adult Education District 10, in cooperation with the Washington County Police Chiefs association.

Officers Don Hlavaty and Dennis Scott of the Kewaskum Police Department are participating in the program.

A 13-week in-service training program for law enforcement personnel is being held at the West Bend police and fire building, which started on Wednesday evening, Jan. 22. Classes will meet in two sessions, one group from 7 p. m. to 10 p. m. on Wednesday evenings and another group meeting on Thursday mornings from 9 a. m. to 12 noon.

The first session was conducted by Lt. Joseph Maciejewski of the Cudahy Police Department. His topic was "The Police Image, and Police Public Relations." Lt. Maciejewski will also conduct the second session, "Police Community Relations," on Jan. 29 and 30. The third and fourth sessions will be conducted by George Huebsch of the Milwaukee Technical college, police science program. His topic will be "Police Report Writing." The fifth, sixth and seventh sessions will be conducted by Don H. Helberg of the Milwaukee Technical college. His topic will be "Psychology for the Police Officer." The next three sessions will be conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation on "Methods of Crowd Control and the Mechanics of Arrest." The Pirate's ace junior guard, Brian Brattebo, exploded for 17 points in the second half to lead Pewaukee's charge past Kewaskum. He had been held to three points in the first half. Clark Eichstedt, the Indians' splendid sophomore forward, kept them in the game for the first three quarters with his scoring. He copped scoring honors with 26 points and all but two of his points came

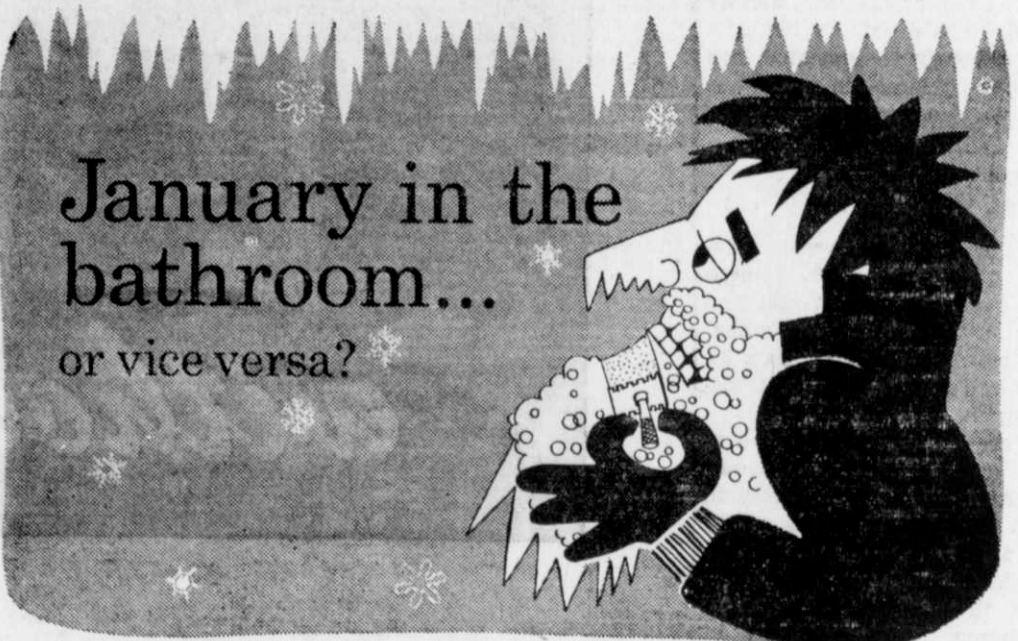
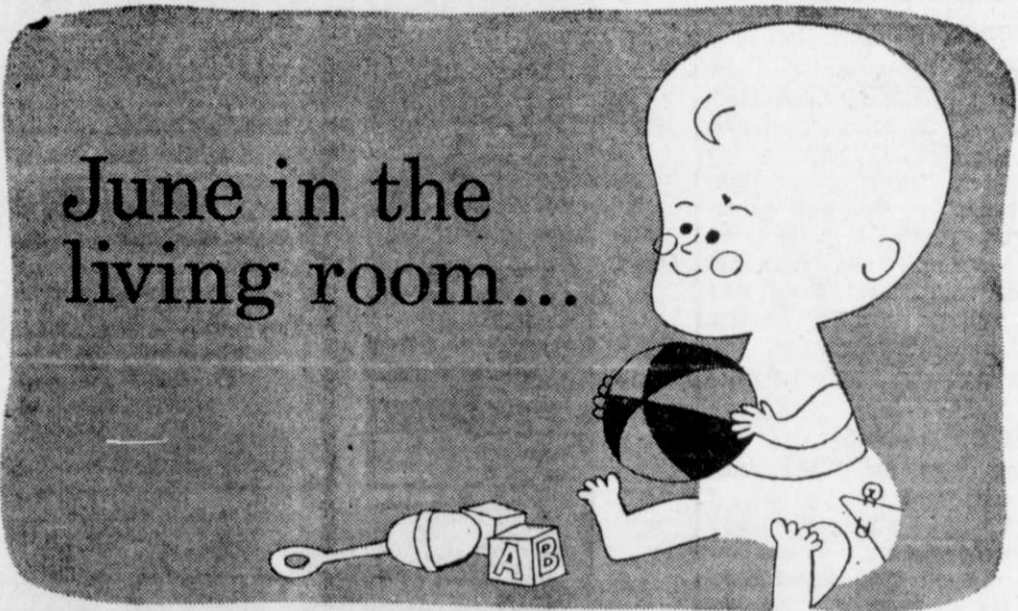
Mother, Baby Care Course to Be Held
