# Local Police Suspects, Loot

PAIR WANTED IN DOOR COUNTY SEIZED HERE

Chief of Police Roland Pledl was informed by teletype from Door county authorities at 3:18 from Jan. 31 to Feb. 2. p. m. Tuesday, Jan. 14, to pick up and hold two youths wanted for burglary in that county, who were reported to be living at a local! hotel.

Upon investigating, local police found that the pair, Frank Vertz, 18, of R. 2, Forestville, and David Gigstead, also 18, of 339 Water st., Algoma, had apparently been warned and were aware of their impending apprehension. They had left the hotel about two days before, leaving all their loot and personal belongings behind.

Chief Pledl said the pair had a room full of loot" which nearly filled a pickup truck when it was confiscated by local police. Items of loot included a television set. four radios, slide projectors, Polaroid camera, binoculars, tools, vises, and other articles. Police also confiscated their personal be-




