Miss Jorgensen Receives Degree



Ingrid Joan Jorgensen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jorgen A. Jorgensen, 1424 Roseland dr., Kewaskum, was one of the area residents among the 341 Wisconsin State University-Oshkosh students who graduated on Friday, Jan. 17, during midyear exercises.

Miss Jorgensen received a Bachelor of Science degree, with a double major in psychology and sociology in the School of Letters and Science. She is now attending graduate school at WSU-O, working for her Master of Science in guidance.

Of the total number of graduates, 21 received master's degrees from the graduate school and 320 received bachelor's degrees in a number of study areas.

Dr. Roger E. Guiles, president of the candidates, conferred degrees on university graduates presented by Dr. Everett G. Pyle, dean of the Graduate School; Dr. Robert P. Hungate, dean of the School of Business Administration; Dr. David L. Bowman, dean of the

School of Education, and Dr. Arthur H. Darken, dean of the School of Letters and Science.

Bachelor of Science candidates made up the largest group with 107 graduates.

Others who received degrees include 44 for the Bachelor of Business Administration, 13 Bachelor of Arts, 3 Bachelor of Science in Art, 82 Bachelor of Science in Secondary Education, 9 Bachelor of Art Education, 2 Bachelor of Music Education, 36 Bachelor of Science in Lower Elementary, 23 Bachelor of Science in Upper Elementary, and 1 Bachelor of Science in Special Education (mental retardation).

The 21 master's degrees included 12 Master of Science in Education Guidance, 3 Master of Science in Teaching Elementary Education, 1 Master of Science Teaching in English, 3 Master of Science in Teaching History, and 3 Master of Science in Teaching Music.

2 File Papers for President, 6 for Village Trustees

CONTESTS LOOM IN SPRING ELECTION

The deadline Tuesday, Jan. 28, for filing nomination papers for village offices in the spring election April 1 revealed that two interesting contests are in store locally for voters. A village president and three trustees are to be elected.

Two candidates filed for the president's office to succeed Wayland D. Tessar, veteran of three terms as president and also long service as a trustee who will not be a candidate for re-election because of business duties. Seeking to succeed him who filed papers are Earl DuBois, a newcomer in the field, and Carl Freehauf, an incumbent trustee whose term is expiring.

In addition to Freehauf the terms of Alfred Kral and Cyril Wietor, also incumbent trustees, are expiring. Both Kral and Wietor will seek re-election to the board. They will be opposed by four newcomers seeking election.

The complete slate of six candidates for the three trustee offices include Orval E. Behnke, Wallace Cudnohoske, William A. Edwards, Alfred Kral, Henry Timblin and Cyril Wietor. The term of office for each position is two years.

Candidate for president Freehauf will be completing his second term as trustee, Kral his third term and Wietor his sixth term. The three remaining village trustees hold over in office for another year. Three are elected each year.

Two Hurt When Car Strikes Abutment

Mary O. Filo, 37, of R. 1, West Bend, suffered a possible fractured back, lacerations above the left eye and ear and numerous abrasions, and a companion, James A. Weyer, 36, of Menomonee Falls suffered a possible neck injury and face lacerations when the former's westbound car went out of control on the Ridge rd. 250 feet east of Kettle View dr. about two miles southwest of Kewaskum. The mishap occurred at 9:01 p. m. Monday when she slowed for a stop sign and her vehicle skidded on the icy road and struck a bridge abutment. Both of the injured were removed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, in the Kewaskum firemen's ambulance.

Area Dairymen Elected at ADA District Meeting

Sam Stanchfeld, Fond du Lac, was re-elected chairman of the American Dairy Association District 5 committee at the area ADA annual meeting Jan. 17 in Fond du Lac.

Other posts went to Elmer Berg, Brownsville, vice chairman; Otto Kohlwey, Grafton, secretary, with Robert Bird, Brownsville, and Floyd Keuler, Mayville, being nominated to the state board of directors. Committeemen elected for three-year terms were Kohlwey, Stanchfeld and Leo Budde, Beaver Dam.

An income of \$1,080,000 was reported for 1968, a small gain over the previous year, and of the total \$662,000 was forwarded to the national ADA. An illustrated report by staff members outlined the planned and proposed advertising schedule of the national organization for 1969, plus a detailed explanation of Wisconsin ADA's new policy in promoting sales of the state's manufactured dairy products. The latter program involves cooperation with the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture and the cheese industry in the out-of-state cheese campaigns and the tourist-directed promotion on butter. Both state programs were begun the first of the year.

The speaker, Gordon Johnson of the Madison Newspapers, told the

dairymen that they should expect a good return on money they invest.

"One of the biggest problems today is the policy to conform. Retain your own individualism," he said.

Delegates elected for two-year terms were Don F. Indermuehle, Brownsville, John Horlamus, West Bend, and John J. Widmer, Theresa. Alternate is Paul Giebel, Eldorado. Committeemen and delegates met Jan. 28 at Fond du Lac to plan attendance at the ADA state annual meeting March 4-5 in Stevens Point.

25 YEARS AGO
Jan. 28, 1944

The village of Kewaskum is already \$7,000 over its quota in the war bond drive. Chairman Lehman Rosenheimer reports that \$38,000 has been subscribed, \$7,000 over the quota of \$31,000. With pledges amounting to \$445,635.00 in the county, 41% of the \$1,086,900.00 quota has been reached. The villages of Barton, Slinger, Jackson and Germantown and the towns of Addison, Barton and West Bend have also exceeded their quotas.

K. A. Honeck has purchased the 60 acre Clarence Bingen farm south of Kewaskum. Ed Brussels, R. 1, West Bend, sold his home on Fond du Lac ave. to Walter Engelman of near Beechwood. The home is occupied at present by the Clarence Buntjer family.

Mrs. Jacob Marion, 83, nee Catherine Kern, died at her home near St. Kilian.

This area has been enjoying unseasonably warm weather, well above freezing, the past week or two. The warmest Jan. 25 and 26 in the history of all weather records was recorded this week. Tuesday the temperature rose to 55 degrees and Wednesday it soared even higher when a record 60 degrees was recorded.

The Immanuel Lutheran church in the town of Scott, R. 1, Kewaskum, was completely destroyed in a disastrous fire which started shortly after church services Sunday, despite the efforts of fire departments from Random Lake, Boltonville, Beechwood and Batavia, which ran out of water. Rev. Gustave Kaniess, father of Rev. Gerhard Kaniess of Kewaskum, is pastor of the parish. The fire began in the roof and walls above the altar, probably caused by faulty wiring. The blaze caused almost \$40,000 damage, with insurance covering \$11,000 of the loss. Everything was lost but the benches and hymnals from the frame building, including an expensive organ. The cross on the steeple remained standing until last. The church was built and dedicated in 1885.

Ripple Speaks to Republican Women Of County on Taxes

SAYS 3/4 OF TAX DOLLAR IS SPENT ON PEOPLE UNDER 18

Three-fourths of Wisconsin's tax dollar is spent on people under 18 years of age, according to Donald T. Ripple, educational coordinator of the Wisconsin Taxpayers Alliance. He revealed this and many other enlightening facts when he spoke on the topic "Wisconsin Budget and Tax Facts" to the Washington County Federation of Republican Women on Tuesday, Jan. 21, at the Golden Knight Supper club, West Bend.

This large amount of the budget goes mainly for education of the state's young people, said Ripple. Approximately 20% is spent on the people over 65, while those between 18 and 65 benefit from the remainder. An interesting sidelight on where the taxpayers' money goes was pointed up by Ripple's illustration that it costs over \$5,000 per year to keep a boy at Wales School for Boys, while two boys can be sent to Harvard for the same amount.

Using charts, Ripple explained state operating expenditures, tax collection in Wisconsin, the executive budget, and property taxes. He also spoke of the 2.6 million dollar deficit in the state budget, and stated that the legislature has created agencies for which the taxpayers cannot pay. One of the larger recipients of funds is the Department of Social Services, said Ripple, and he then went on to point up some of the inequities in the state's welfare legislation.

Ripple further stressed personal involvement of each citizen on all levels of government. He said that each person can have a voice in how his money is spent by writing his assemblyman or congressman.

Since leaving West Bend to join the Wisconsin Taxpayers Alliance, Ripple has traveled some 26,000 miles throughout the state presenting these educational talks to schools and various organizations. Ripple was warmly greeted by many old friends upon his return to West Bend for this meeting.

Death of Mrs. Irwin Guldan

Mrs. Irwin Guldan, 59, nee Celesta Pesch, of 727 Main st., Kewaskum, a resident of this village for the past 24 years, passed away Friday, Jan. 24, at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, following a lingering illness of several years.

She was born Dec. 24, 1909, in the town of Auburn, Fond du Lac county, the daughter of the late William and Anna Rosbeck Pesch. Her marriage to Irwin Guldan took place at St. Matthias church in the town of Auburn on Sept. 18, 1928. Before coming to Kewaskum the couple lived in Lomira and the town of Auburn.

Surviving are her husband, two sons, Jerome of Monroe, N. Y. and Gerald of West Bend; one brother, Elroy Pesch, of R. 1, Kewaskum; two sisters, Mrs. Albert (Cecelia) Gross of R. 2, Campbellsport, and Mrs. Joseph (Lorraine) Hammes of West Bend; 11 grandchildren, two daughters-in-law, four sisters-in-law, two brothers-in-law, aunts, uncles, and cousins.

Mrs. Guldan was a member of the Ladies' Altar society of Holy Trinity parish.

Visitation was from 2 p. m. Sunday at Miller's Funeral home, where a rosary vigil was held at 8 p. m. Funeral services were held Monday at 9:30 a. m. at the funeral home and at 10 o'clock at Holy Trinity church. The Rev. Elroy, O.F.M. Cap., the Rev. John T. Budde and the Rev. Walter Morgan officiated. Burial was in St. Matthias parish cemetery, town of Auburn.

'An Indian Love Story'

The State Historical Society's publication, "Wisconsin Then and Now," in its December issue carried an interesting and informative article on how Kewaskum took its name from a noble Potawatomi Indian chief. The article, based on a historical account by Carl Quickert published in 1923 in "The Story of Washington County," was repeated in the Statesman at that time.

The January issue of the same publication carried another article entitled "An Indian Love Story" which was also taken from the historical account by Carl Quickert in "The Story of Washington County." The item, which tells the pathetic story of the love of an Indian maid who died of grief, reads as follows:

"As Washington county of today has a town which bears the name of an Indian chief (Kewaskum), so a township of the old county, of that portion which was sliced off to end the fuss about the county seat, was named after an Indian chief's daughter. . . . A pathetic story is told by an old settler of the life of that Indian maid. It was in the beginning of summer in 1845 when in the woods he met a young Indian and a pretty Indian girl. The former he had seen several times before. . . . He was not of the Potawatomi who lived in the country about, but belonged to the tribe of the Menominee who lived to the southwest, in Waukesha county. When he saw his white friend, he waved his hand at him to step closer. Pointing to himself, he said: 'Pewaukee'; and, pointing to the

girl, he said: 'Mequon.' He then pointed to a bevy of wild pigeons which in those days were abundant in the woods, and his lips again uttered the word 'Mequon.' The settler concluded from this that the girl's name was Mequon, and that the word meant 'wild pigeon.' . . . The settler learned that the girl was the only daughter of the old Potawatomi chief Waubekee whose tribe had their village on the western bank of the Pigeon creek and the Milwaukee river. . . . When the southeastern part of the territory of Wisconsin was divided into counties and towns, the old pioneers chose the name of Mequon for their town, in remembrance of that comely Indian maid. . . . In the fall of 1845 the old chief Waubekee broke up camp and with his people moved north into the town of Fredonia, where he stayed for a short time, and then moved farther north. The girl was seen several times later, but seemed to be in a very unhappy and run-down condition. She died shortly after the removal from Fredonia. Her lonely grave is said to be on the height skirting Elkhart lake. There is little doubt that Pewaukee and Mequon felt a strong attraction toward each other, that old Waubekee for some reason was opposed to a marriage, or had disposed otherwise of his daughter, and that she died of grief over her hopeless love. Pewaukee afterwards was never seen again."

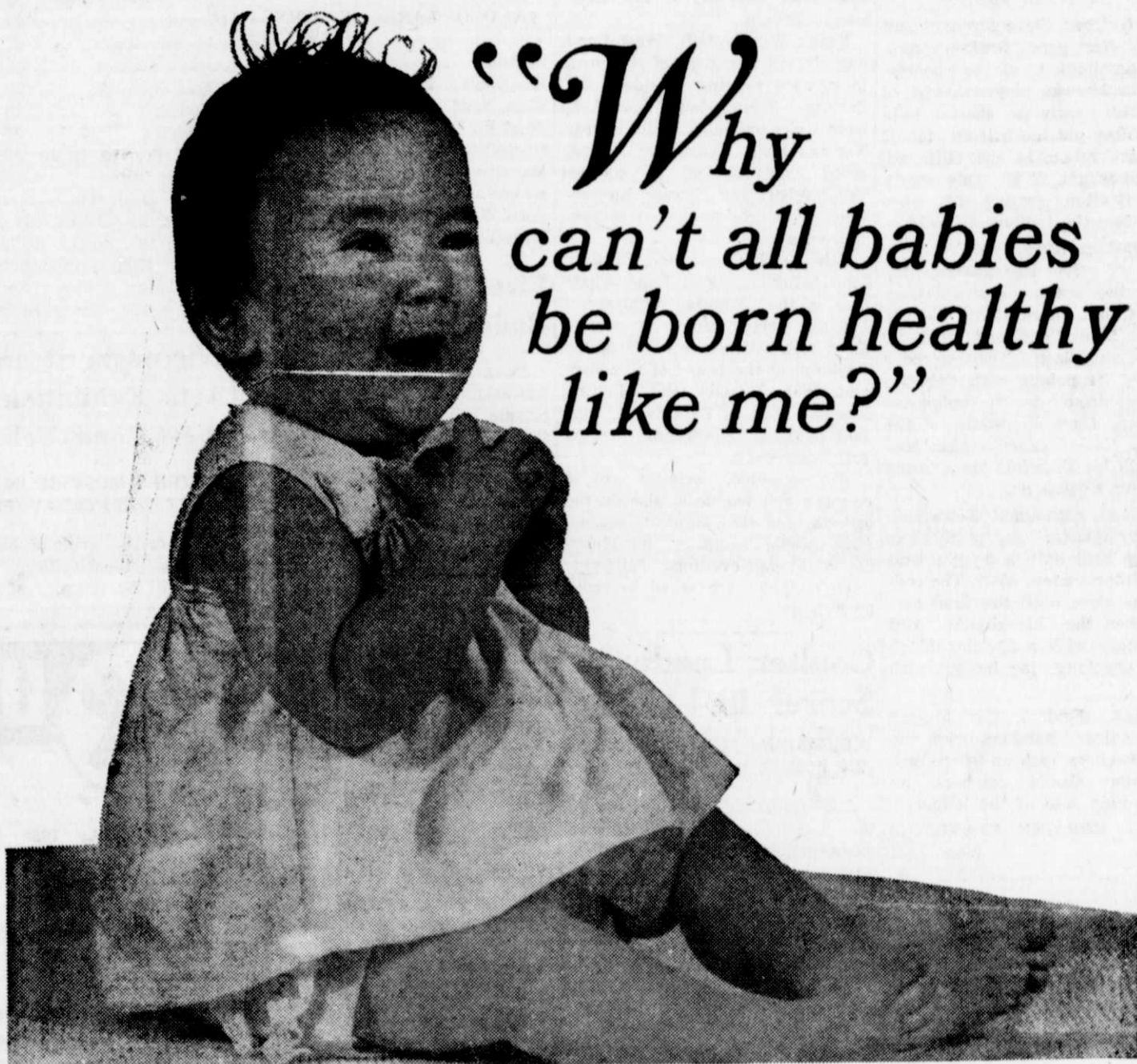
