Annual Round-up For Kindergarten Pupils Next Week

This year's annual "round-up" for the parents of either prospective kindergarten pupils or beginning first graders who have not attended kindergarten in the Kewaskum Community school district will be held during the day on Tuesday, Feb. 18, from 8:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m. in the Beechwood, Farmington and Wayne school offices. Those families whose children normally attend the Kewaskum Elementary school are to register on Wednesday, Feb. 19, or Thursday, Feb. 20, in the school office. Please register your child at the school he will attend. It is not necessary to bring the child while registering.

To be eligible for enrollment in kindergarten, children must have attained their fifth birthday prior to Sept. 1, 1969 and for first grade they must have attained their sixth birthday prior to Sept. 1, 1969. Evidence of date of birth, either a birth certificate or a baptismal certificate, must be brought to the office at the time of enrolling.

Parents will be asked to register their children for next year's term and to fill out the child's health record. If you know of any new families in this district that have children eligible for kindergarten or first grade, please pass this information on to them.

Richard E. Zarling, director of elementary education, would like to impress upon you the importance of registering your child on these dates for kindergarten or first grade due to the large increase in enrollment they are anticipating so that they may plan for them. Failure to register your child could result in problems later.

County Agent Maurice Hovland, and vocational agriculture instructors Don Jaworski and Roy Esser will do the teaching. Bulletins from the University of Wisconsin horticulture department will be available. The course is offered at

Hair Stylist Speaks at Senior Girls Tea



Proper hair care and hair piece demonstration was the program theme at the annual Senior Girls Tea. The Kewaskum Woman's club entertained the Kewaskum Community High school senior girls and their mothers Feb. 8 at Peace church. About 140 persons attended.

Jon Metula, West Bend hair stylist at Jon & Jan's Salon, was guest speaker. He showed various ways hair pieces could be added and the many effects they created. Girls from the audience as well as Sudy Reigle and Ann Rita Reyes modeled.

Metula answered questions as he worked and gave advice concerning proper hair care. Contrary to popular belief, teasing hair or back combing is not harmful if done properly. Back combing is started from the scalp and worked upward in 1/2" sections. Back brushing also gives the same effect, but somewhat softer.

Lemon juice and warm water was recommended for getting all the soap off the hair, thus keeping it from having an oily appearance. One-half cup mayonnaise rubbed on the hair and left for 10 minutes after washing, then

rinsed off, is an excellent conditioner and will leave the hair soft and shiny. Brushing hair stimulates the scalp and keeps it healthy. Nylon and boar bristle is the best combination for a brush.

Indians Give Slinger's Champs Scare But Lose

ALSO DEFEATED TUESDAY AT CAMPBELLSPORT, 92-79

The Kewaskum Indians had a costly week, losing two games, and dropping from a 3-way tie for third place into a 3-way tie for the fourth spot. Friday here before a roaring crowd which sensed an upset, the Indians gave unbeaten Slinger, which clinched its first championship, a real scare before succumbing, 69-59, and Tuesday at Campbellsport they were surprised by the Bells, whom they had defeated earlier here, 92-79.

The inspired Indians, playing before a packed house which included almost half Slinger followers, gave the Owls a close battle and played themselves quite a game. As Coach Bade lamented, "it's just a shame that they couldn't put the ball in the basket." The Indians—short on size compared to Slinger but long on desire—closed to within two points of the favored Owls at the end of three quarters, 48-46. Slinger used free throws to put the game out of reach in the last stanza, while Kewaskum missed many shots near the basket.

The Indians sort of "overloaded" on Slinger's 6-foot-3 Chuck Krentz, fourth high scorer in the conference, who managed only three points, his lowest output of the season, and 6-foot-4 teammate Rick Scherr, second high scorer, was limited to 14. But this gave Mark Monroe and Larry Gundrum a chance to score 19 and 16 points respectively. Jim Foerster, 6-foot-1 jumping jack center, led Kewaskum with 20 points for top honors. Kewaskum clicked on only 28 per cent of its shots the first half and 26 per cent the second half. A little better shooting would have provided the upset over the Owls. Perry Koth came through when needed and chipped in 16 points.

Indeed Slinger's 11th straight win was one of their toughest over the determined Indians. Kewaskum outpointed the Owls 15-6 in the third quarter to trim the deficit to 2 points. The Owls had to fight for every point they got. A scoring binge in the final minute and a half gave Slinger its 10-point margin. Coach Doug Potter of the Owls said that Kewaskum's zone defense hurt his team.

Campbellsport, which had slumped in midseason, continued to get back on the track with a big win over Kewaskum Tuesday in what the Bell coach said was by far their best game of the season. The same was not true of Kewaskum. The Bells have now won four of their last five games.

Chuck Boegel, the loop's top scorer, set the pace for the Bells with 34 points, followed by Sophomore Tom Breitzman with 26 and Ron Mott, a transfer from Lomira, with 17. This trio accounted for 77 points. Sophomore Clark Eichstedt scored 18 points and Perry Koth 17 for the losers.

Campbellsport won the contest in the first half, taking a big 23-13 lead at the quarter and 49-32 at halftime. The Indians narrowed the margin to 63-58 in the third quarter but were again outscored in the final stanza.

Tonight the Indians travel to North Fondy to tackle the third place Orioles.
