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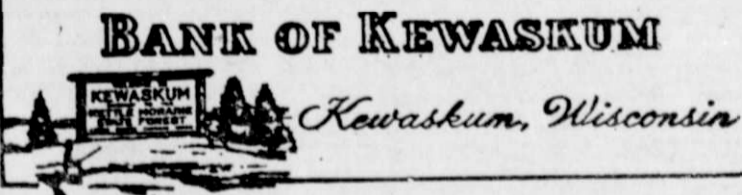
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**Offer Adult Driver Education Course**

An adult driver education course will begin on Wednesday, Feb. 26, from 7:30 to 9:30 p. m. at the West Bend Vocational-Technical school. These classes are open to persons who are 18 years of age or older.

The adult driver education course consists of 36 hours of classroom and simulated driving experience. An additional 6 hours will be spent behind-the-wheel on the road driving.

The classroom sessions will be on 12 Wednesday evenings (2-hour sessions) to study traffic rules and regulations and learn basic driving procedures. The last 8 weeks of the course, simulated driving experience, will be held on Monday evenings (1 1/2 hour sessions). The actual road driving consists of six one-hour driving sessions, one session a week. These driving sessions will be during the afternoon at the convenience of the student and instructor.

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### County Licensed 4,982 Dogs in 1968; Damages Reported

The total number of dogs licensed in 1968 in Washington county was 4,982, County Clerk Anton P. Staral reported this week.

The city of West Bend reported the greatest number of licensed dogs with 579, followed closely by the town of Richfield with 559. The village of Jackson reported the smallest number with 27 licensed. Total receipts from all districts in Washington County were \$6,382.00.

The State Department of Agriculture supplies the tags and collects 5% of the total collections. Any other expenses, such as receipt books and dog affidavits are paid from this fund. Dog damage claims are also paid out of this fund, and last year Washington county paid \$1,033.26 in claims. The largest claim paid was in the amount of \$100.05. Any injured or dead livestock must be viewed by the town board filing the claim for a resident. Any surplus in the fund over and above \$1,000.00 is refunded to the taxing district in proportion to their contribution. In 1968 a total of \$2,234.28 was refunded to districts.

#### FEB. 28 DEADLINE FOR DOG LICENSES

All dogs in Washington county, over 5 months of age, must be licensed by Feb. 28. After this date, if no license is obtained, owner's will be reported to the district attorney. State Statute 174.10 provides for a minimum penalty of \$50 for harboring an unlicensed dog. Officers may enter the premises of the owner to seize an unlicensed dog.

Your dog license may be obtained from your local treasurer.

Eggers, administrator of the Lutheran Home for the Aged, Wauwatosa, and president of the American Association of Homes for the Aged, will be the guest speaker. Open house for the public will be held on Mother's Day, May 11, from 1 to 4 p. m.

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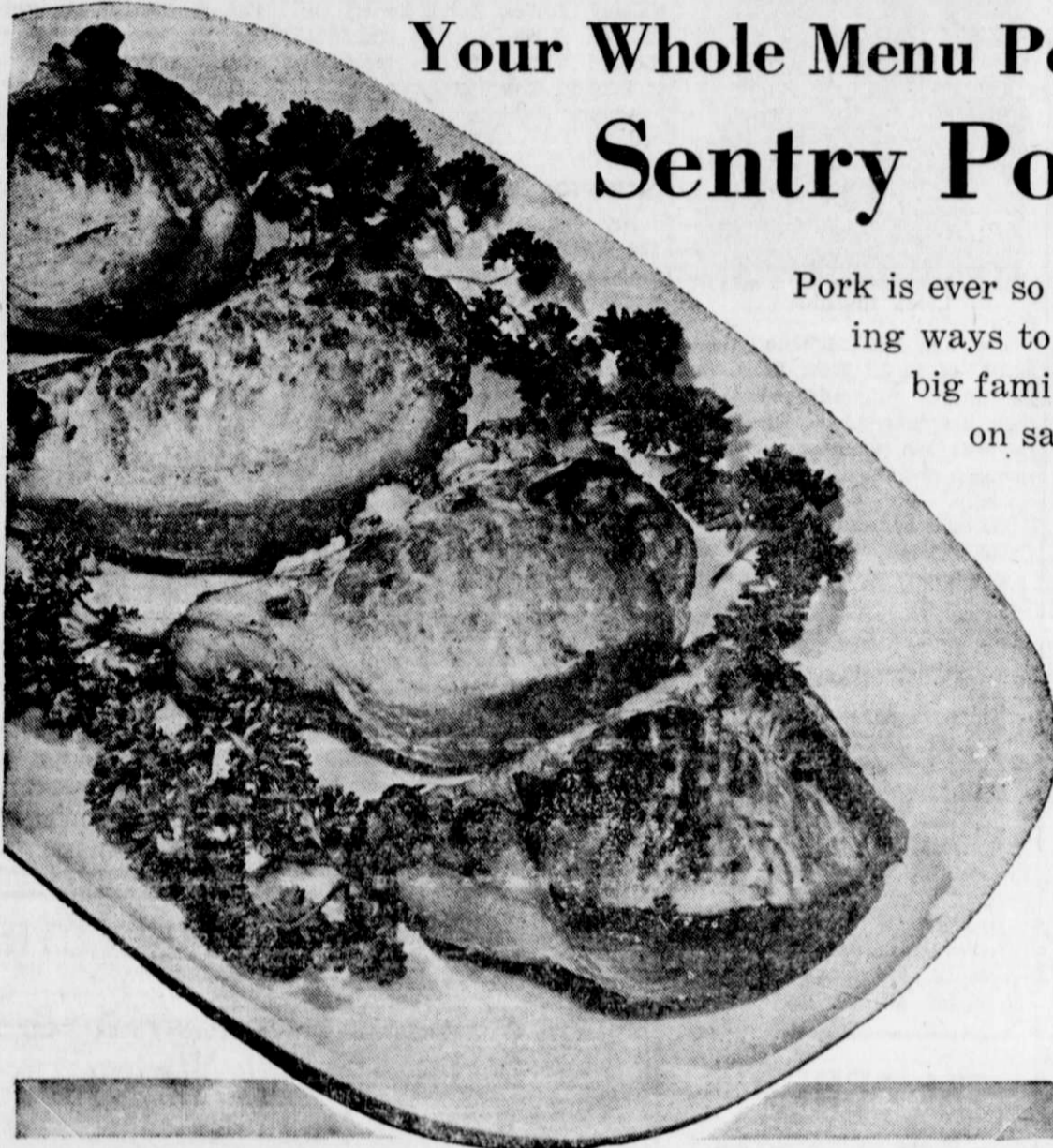

## Kewaskum Vo-ag Students Join in Activities for National FFA Week

**LOCAL CHAPTER HAS 88 MEMBERS**

Vocational agriculture students in Kewaskum High school are joining Future Farmers of America members throughout the nation in activities to focus attention on the importance of agriculture during National FFA WEEK, Feb. 15-22.

"FFA... an opportunity for youth" is this year's FFA Week theme. The message that these young agriculturists are trying to impart to the nation is simple. They seek to inform the public of the importance they place upon the vast opportunities in American agriculture. FFA members find excitement in their role as young partners in developing a more prosperous agriculture that will better serve America and an increasingly complex world.

Before an FFA member can conquer the battle of starvation halfway around the globe or even increase profitability of farming or ranching, he must first conquer himself. There is an urgent calling for FFA members to grasp the opportunities available in agriculture.

It is fortunate that the FFA provides a place to build, create, and enjoy the business of life. FFA provides an atmosphere for members to learn, to do, to earn, and to serve.

Members in the FFA is made up of students of vocational agriculture in high school. The organization's activities are designed to help develop rural leadership and good citizenship and to stimulate the students to better achievement in their study and work toward successful establishment in occupations and other agricultural occupations.

The Kewaskum FFA chapter has 88 members. Officers are: John Reysen, president; Larry Schultz, vice-president; Henry Schacht, secretary; Ken McKee, treasurer; Bob Eitta, reporter; and Chuck Muckerheide, sentinel.

The national FFA organization has approximately 450,000 mem-

bers, with 9,000 local chapters in the 50 states and Puerto Rico.

The week of George Washington's birthday is chosen each year for the observance of National FFA WEEK. Although usually recognized as a Revolutionary War general and our first president, Washington's first love was the farm. He was one of the first in the nation to practice contour planting, crop rotations, fertilization, and other soil conservation and improvement methods.

The Kewaskum FFA was started in 1951 under the direction of Dan Scheid who was followed by Orval Behnke as advisor and instructor. Bernard Murray guided the chapter for a short time and was followed by the present instructor, Roy Esser.

The Kewaskum chapter carries out the purposes of FFA with a full program of work. Some of the activities under community service include conducting a safety poster contest for the grade schools of the area. The chapter has carried on a swine testing program for the second year to afford swine breeders of the area an opportunity to have their breeding stock tested as to rate of gain, feed efficiency, and carcass quality. This is carried on at the Ivan Schultz farm, under the direction of Larry Schultz.

One of the more interesting programs under the farming programs committee is a group of ten Holstein steers that have been raised from calves and will be marketed at 1,000 pounds at ten to eleven months. Complete records will be available as to the profits of the program. The Holstein steer program should fit well into our present dairy operations. The program is in conjunction with the Rosenheimer and Mill Corn variety, fertilizer, and chemical plots were demonstrated with the cooperation of F. S. Mill and Cornland Fertilizer.

The programs of the chapter and the projects of the individual boys help to carry out the motto, "Learning To Do, Doing To Learn, Learning To Live, Living To Serve."

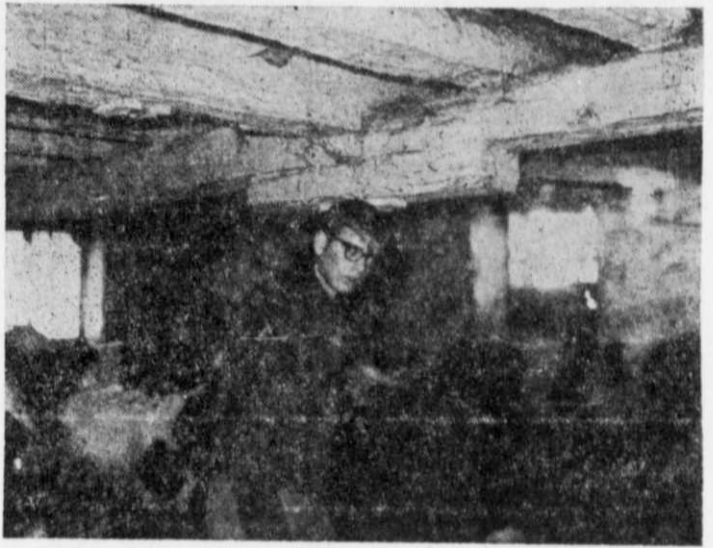

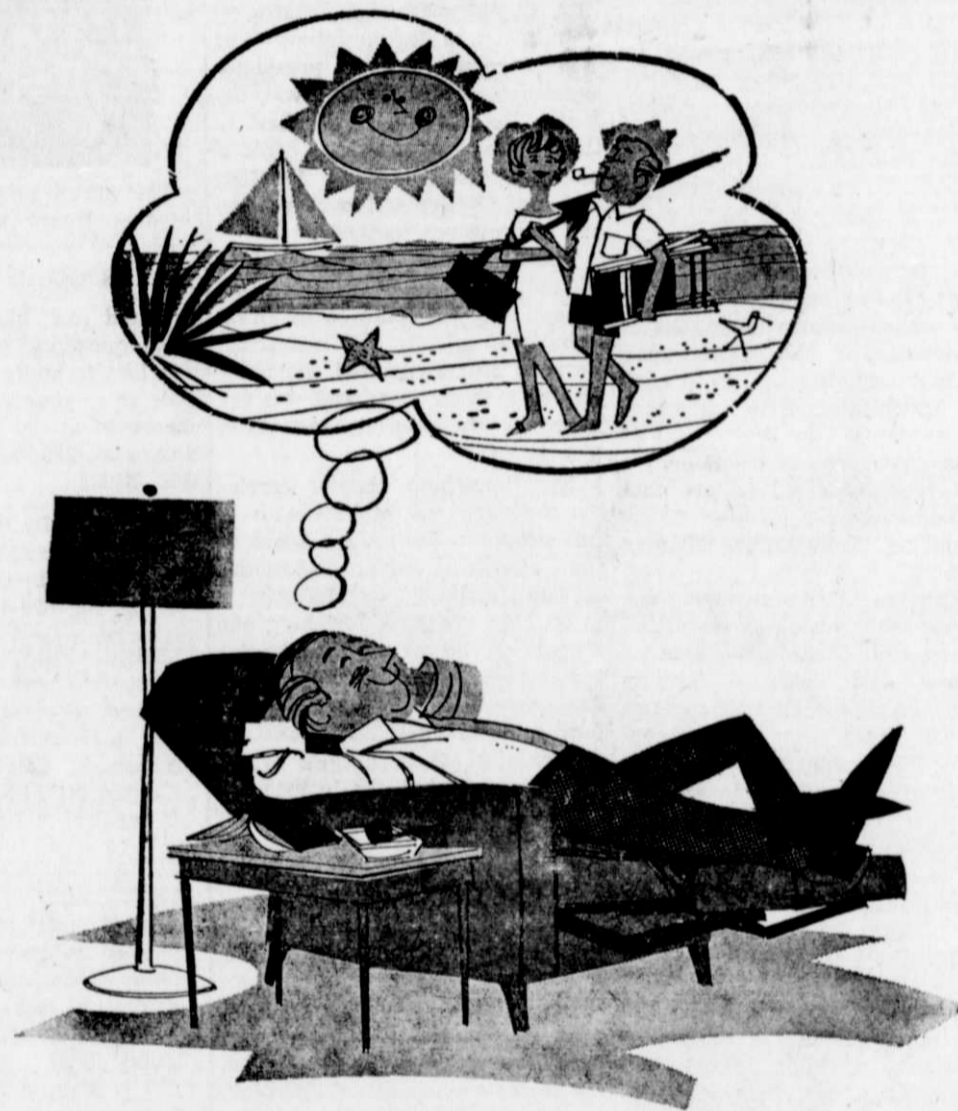
