Mrs. Peters said that perhaps during the coming year the council should try to add to its membership representatives from the county highway, zoning and sanitation committees and the county schools. Should problems in these fields arise the representatives would be available to advise the council.

Plans for a second annual spring clean-up and planting campaign were discussed. Maurice Hovland, county agent, said he would check the availability of trees and shrubs for planting.

A county-wide drive to pick up litter from roadsides was rejected in favor of letting each community decide what project it would prefer. Albert Schroeder, chairman, Town of Trenton, said his town planned to repeat the litter clean-up from town roads, which was so successful last spring. Richard Finch, Town of Trenton, asked if the council couldn't do something about a stricter enforcement of the unlicensed vehicle ordinance on private property. Rohde said he would check into the ordinance.

Mrs. Degnitz read a letter from Riveredge Foundation of Milwaukee thanking the council and Kewaskum Women's club for their donations. Riveredge Foundation also asked if the council would act as representatives for the foundation in the West Bend area.

A brief report on what had been done in conservation and beautification in the county was given by Hovland. His report was based on




