## 17 High School Students Inducted Into National Honor Society



Seventeen students of Kewaskum Community High school had the highest honor attainable conferred upon them recently when they were inducted into membership of the National Honor Society.

The 17 students, consisting of 10 girls and seven boys, three of whom are seniors and 14 who are juniors, were presented by faculty adviser Paul Schoenberger. He described the inductees as the school's finest students who

are the backbone of any educational institution.

The students are selected by a six-member faculty committee from recommendations from each faculty member on character, leadership, service and scholarship—B average or better.

As part of the induction each year, the school calls upon one of its alumni to speak at the ceremony. This year Aldwin Seefeldt, presently assistant district attorney of Washington county and

a practicing attorney in West Bend, spoke on the topic, "Demonstrate Intelligence."

## Plan to Organize Jaycee, Jaycette Chapter Here

MEETING TO BE HELD AT WIGWAM MARCH 12

The possibility of organizing a Jaycee and Jaycette chapter in Kewaskum will be aired at an open meeting which has been scheduled by the West Bend Jaycees and their Auxiliary for Wednesday, March 12, at 8 p. m. at the Wigwam, Kewaskum.

According to West Bend Jaycees, the meeting was set at the request of many village young men and women who have expressed an interest in forming a Jaycee and Jaycette unit here.

Alex Hernikl, extension chairman from West Bend, has reported that many young men, already contacted, will be present for the meeting.

At the briefing meeting, West Bend will explain various phases of their own operation, community and membership benefits resulting from Jaycee operations and Jaycee chapter and membership requirements. A question and answer period will close the session, which will last no longer than ninety minutes, after which refreshments will be served.

The Jaycees is an organization whose membership is open to all young men between the ages of 21 and 35 and the only Jaycette requirement is that the woman must be the wife of a Jaycee.

Purpose of the world-wide organization is the improvement of the communities in which chapters are located and personal development of its members; both objectives being accomplished through a wide variety of project activities.

Jaycee chapters are located in 6,100 communities in the United States and have a total membership of over 285,000. Internationally Jaycee chapters exist in over 81 countries and territories.

Jaycees in this country have their own headquarters in Tulsa, Oklahoma—a memorial of honor of World War II dead.

## Louis C. Heisler, Mrs. Anna Worm, Others Pass On

Louis Clem Heisler, 47, of Kewaskum died unexpectedly at his home on Tuesday evening, Feb. 25. He had operated Heisler's tavern at 137 Main st. for approximately the past 2½ years. Prior to that he had worked for his father, the late Louis J. Heisler, in the tavern business for seven years.

Deceased was born Jan. 21, 1922 in Milwaukee, a son of the late Louis J. and Agnes Brodzeller Heisler. He came to Kewaskum with his parents in 1924 at the age of two years. He was married to the former Elleen Backus of Kewaskum at Holy Trinity rectory on Nov. 13, 1948. They were the parents of two children.

Surviving are two sons, Steven and Stan Heisler, both of West Bend; a sister, Marcella (Mrs. William Harbeck) of Kewaskum; two brothers, Russell Heisler of West Bend and Franklin Heisler of Fond du Lac; two sisters-in-law, a brother-in-law, aunts, uncles, nieces, nephews and other relatives and friends. Another brother, Ralph, preceded him in death, being killed in an auto accident in 1935 at the age of 21 years.

He was a veteran of World War II, serving in the army air force, a member of Robert G. Romaine Post 384 of the American Legion of Kewaskum, Moose lodge 1398 of West Bend, and the Kettle Moraine Sportsmen's association of Kewaskum.

Funeral services were conducted at 10 a. m. Friday at Miller's Funeral home and at 10:30 o'clock at Holy Trinity church. The Rev. John T. Budde officiated and interment was in the family lot at St. Mary's parish cemetery at Lomira. The Robert G. Romaine American Legion Post conducted military services at the graveside.

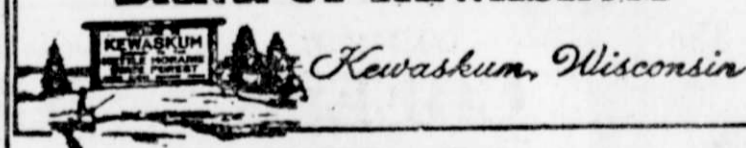

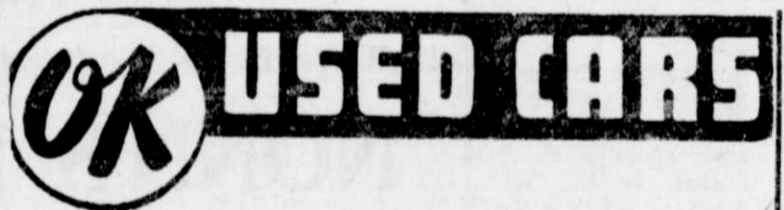

The Kewaskum Indians wound up their Scenic Moraine conference season here Friday evening with a 72-61 victory over lowly Germantown. The Indians finished the campaign with a 7-7 record, good for a fourth place tie with Pewaukee in the final standings.

Coach Walt Bade started five seniors against the last place Warhawks and two of them, Mark Eichstedt and Bob Fellenz, made major contributions. Eichstedt scored 12 points and took down 16 rebounds. Fellenz responded with 15 points in an unexpected starting role to lead the Indians. Senior Jim Foerster bowed out with 14 points and the Koth brothers, senior Perry and junior Randy contributed 12 and 10 points respectively. A 43-24 scoring edge in the second half decided the game in favor of Kewaskum. Ahead 20-16 at the quarter, the Indians faltered in the second period to fall behind, 37-29, at the intermission. When they had to, the Indians again poured it on in the final quarter, outscoring their opponents again, 22-14, to win by an 11-point margin.

Germantown had a big edge from the free throw line, making good on 29 shots, while Kewaskum scored on only 16 and this kept the visitors in the game.

In other games Friday, Slinger's unbeaten champions won their 14th straight game for an unblemished record, beating stubborn Pewaukee, 101-91; second place Grafton easily downed tail end Random Lake, 82-57, and third spot North Fondy bested Campbellsport, 74-68.

Tonight (Friday) the Indians enter WIAA district tournament competition at Cedar Grove. Kewaskum takes on Ozaukee in the first game of the meet at 7 p. m. In the second contest of the evening at 8:30 Cedar Grove faces Random Lake. Friday's winners will play for the district championship at 7:30 Saturday evening. The victor in this final game advances to regional competition.

Our next meeting will begin with a pot luck supper at the home of Mrs. Alan Schoofs on March 24.

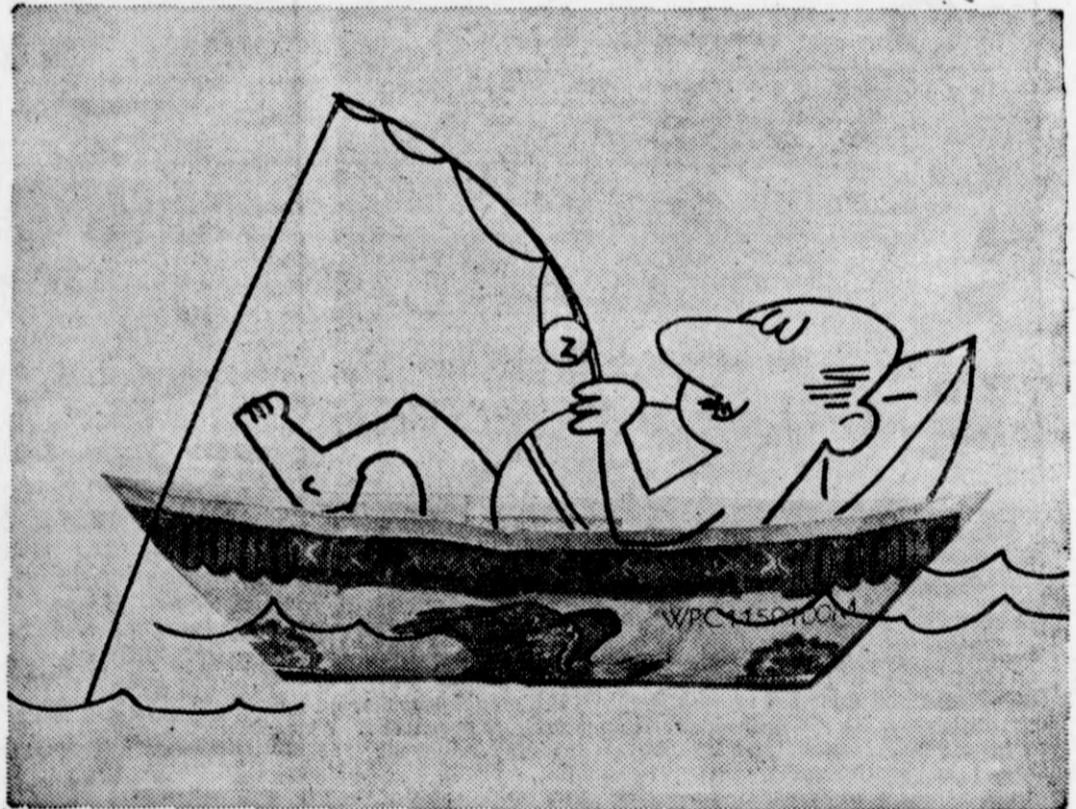
