Bishop Roman Atkielski of Milwaukee will administer the Sacrament of Confirmation to a class of 100 pupils and about 12 adults at an evening Mass at Holy Trinity church at 7 p. m. Tuesday, March 11.

On Sunday, March 9, at 2 p. m. there will be a confirmation practice at the church. Confirmants and their sponsors will meet in the church hall.

MEETING TO BE HELD AT WIGWAM MARCH 12

The possibility of organizing a Jaycee and Jaycette chapter in Kewaskum will be aired at an open meeting which has been scheduled by the West Bend Jaycees and their Auxiliary for Wednesday, March 12, at 8 p. m. at the Wigwam, Kewaskum.

According to West Bend Jaycees, the meeting was set at the request of many village young men and women who have expressed an interest in forming a Jaycee and Jaycette unit here.

Alex Hermikl, extension chairman from West Bend, has reported that many young men, already contacted, will be present for the meeting.

At the briefing meeting, West Bend will explain various phases of their own operation, community and membership benefits resulting from Jaycee operations and Jaycee chapter and membership requirements. A question and answer period will close the session, which will last no longer than ninety minutes, after which refreshments will be served.

The Jaycees is an organization whose membership is open to all young men between the ages of 21 and 35 and the only Jaycette requirement is that the woman must be the wife of a Jaycee.

Purpose of the world-wide organization is the improvement of the communities in which chapters are located and personal development of its members; both objectives being accomplished through a wide variety of project activities.

Jaycee chapters are located in 6100 communities in the United States and have a total membership of over 285,000. Internationally Jaycee chapters exist in over 81 countries and territories.

Jaycees in this country have their own headquarters in Tulsa, Oklahoma—a memorial of honor of World War II dead.

Theusch Has Highest Score in Math Test

In a recent mathematics contest sponsored annually by the Mathematics Association of America, Lee Theusch earned the highest score ever attained by a Kewaskum Community High school student. A senior, Lee is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Theusch, R. 1, Kewaskum.

Lee scored 96 in the test, which was taken by 58 selected sophomores, juniors and seniors. According to Edward Sleger, mathematics instructor, the previous high score attained in the test was 87.

Placing second in the test with a score of 86 was Jeff Schlieff, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roger Schlieff, R. 3, Campbellsport. Theusch and Schlieff will both advance to the state finals on March 29.

The test draws problems from algebra, geometry and logic and is designed to encourage and identify students with mathematical aptitude.

Vil. Board Raises Dance Permit Fee

SPECIFICATIONS FOR NEW POLICE CAR ARE APPROVED

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Tessar presiding and Board Members Yoost, Wietor, Freehauf, and Kral being present. Trustees Perschbacher and Herriges were tardy.

The minutes of the January 6th and January 27th meetings were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Freehauf, seconded by Trustee Wietor and duly carried.

Mr. Dennis Konkol, Forestry Manager of the Kettle Moraine Park, Northern area, met with the Board to discuss the memorandum of understanding for rules and fees to be charged for fighting

forest fires on state owned land. The Board advised Mr. Konkol that the memorandum would be submitted to the members of the Fire Department for recommendation.

Robert McMahon, village engineer, discussed with the Board proposed plans and cost estimates for a chlorinator for the sewage treatment plant as ordered by the State of Wisconsin.

Specifications for a new police car as presented by Chief Pledl were approved and the Commissioner was authorized to advertise for bids.

ORDINANCE NO. 69-2

An Ordinance Repealing Part of Chapter 11.11 of the Village Code of Ordinances pertaining to the Fee for a Dance Permit.

THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM do ordain as follows:

Section I of chapter 11.11 is hereby repealed and recreated as follows:

I. License Required:

No person shall hold or conduct any dance to which the general public is admitted without having obtained a license therefore as herein provided. Five days prior to the holding or conducting of such dance in which the public is admitted, application for such license shall be made to the village commissioner in writing and shall state the name of the person or persons desiring to hold or conduct such dance and the location of the place where such dance is to be held, and the day upon which the same is to be held, and shall be accompanied by the requisite fee. The license fee for each dance shall be Eighteen Dollars (\$18.00). Such license

when issued shall entitle such person or persons named therein to hold or conduct such dance at the place and on the day therein stated and until one o'clock a. m. the succeeding day. In the event that after issuance of such a license the proposed dance does not take place, the person or persons for whom it has been issued will be given a credit toward a future dance permit.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force upon passage and publication as required by law.

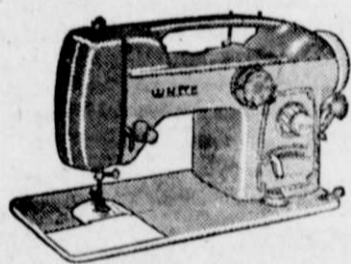

Cedar Grove Tips Indians in WIAA District Final

KEWASKUM TOPS OZAUKEE IN TOURNAMENT OPENER

The Kewaskum Indians of the scenic Moraine conference reached the finals in WIAA district tournament play at Cedar Grove over the weekend before losing to the host Rockets in the championship game. The Indians ran over weak Ozaukee in the tourney opener Friday evening, 75-41, but were eliminated from further competition by Cedar Grove Saturday evening, 64-44.

Lowly Ozaukee hardly allowed Kewaskum to work up a head of steam in the tournament opener Friday as the Indians won by a 34 point margin. In the second contest of the evening Cedar Grove clobbered Random Lake by an even larger margin, 80-36, as the two weak teams were eliminated from the meet.

Kewaskum coach Walt Bade used the lopsided game as an opportunity to juggle his lineup and he used 12 players in the rout. Indian starters played only about half the game. In fact, Bade inserted his full second unit in the second quarter and Kewaskum still outscored Ozaukee, 75-41.

The Indians took an 18-0 lead at the quarter, 37-20 at halftime, and were way ahead, 59-27, at the end of the third period. Jim Foerster scored 13 points to top the Indians' star attack, while Mark Eichstedt added 12, Butschlick and Clark Eichstedt 11 a piece. Buser paced Ozaukee with 10 points and Volesky added 9.

In the championship game Saturday Kewaskum was very cold and as a result Cedar Grove was able to pull out a 64-44 win. Thus the Indians ended their season in dreary fashion with a 9-11 overall season mark.

Kewaskum went off of the Rockets in the initial period, 14-13, but fell behind at the intermis-

sion, 31-25. The Indians grew colder in the second half, being outscored 21-10, and losing by 20 points.

In the other contest Nicolet meets Shorewood.

The local team held Fond du Lac pretty well in check during the first half, trailing by only five points at the quarter and nine points at halftime. But Kewaskum folded in the third period and the visitors took a commanding lead.

Mike Coulter, Mike Smith and Dennis Reha each scored 19 points to top the losers, followed by Bill Wuebben with 18, Hiram Justman with 14 and Al Koepke with 12. High scorer in the contest was Coggins of Fond du Lac with 41 points. Other high scorers for the winners were Dundercker with 35 points, Lechner 27, Johnson 22 and Hintz 10.

This Sunday night Kewaskum plays at Hartford at 8 o'clock. Hartford, which led the league most of the season, dropped to second place by losing to Menomonee Falls last weekend.

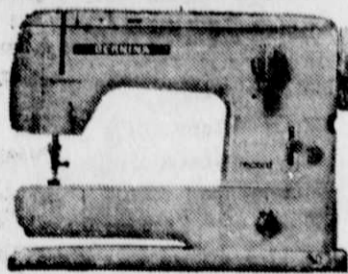
