of Chapter 11.11 of the Village by Trustee Herriges Code of Ordinances pertaining to the Fee for a Dance Permit. THE VILLAGE BOARD OF

THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM

Section I of chapter II.II is hereby repealed and recreated as follows:

I. License Required:

No person shall hold of conduct any dance to which the general public is admitted without having obtained a license therefore as herein provided. Five days prior to the holding or conducting of such dance in which the public is admitted, application for such license shall be made to the village commissioner in writing and shall state the name of the person or persons desiring to hold or conduct such dance and the location of the place where such dance is to be held, and the day upon which the same is to be held, and shall be accompanied by the requisite fee. 





Schedule Marriage **Preparation** Course For Engaged Couples Roman Foerster, R. 2, Kewaskum,

Ambulance Calls

SESSIONS TO BE HELD IN WEST BEND FOUR SUNDAYS

The Catholic Family Life program will present a marriage preparation course for engaged couples in this area on March 9, 16, 23 and 30 at 2:30 p.m. on Sunday afternoons.

Immaculate Conception parish at 1614 Monroe st. will serve as host to the young couples; the conferences will be given in the school hall at 415 Roosevelt dr. The engaged should attend as a couple unless this is impossible due to unusual circumstances. In such a case the party who can attend is urged to do so.

Registration is held before the opening session of each course and an offering of eight dollars (\$8.00) per couple is requested. The lack of funds, however, should keep no couple from attending the course. A manual on Catholic marriage will be given gratis to each couple when the course is completed. A certificate of attendance is given only to those who attend the full course. The certificate is to be shown to the parish priest when arrangements are made for the wedding. Any session that is missed may be made up at a subsequenet course in any area of the archdiocese. The course includes 8 talks divided into 4 sessions given by experienced and dedicated priests, married couples, and physicians on the following subjects:

"EVERYONE WANTS TO BE HAPPY," "MEN AND WOMEN ARE SO DIFFERENT," "MONEY ISN'T EVERYTHING BUT IT IS SOMETHING," "THE HABIT OF "THE IM COMMUNICATION," PORTANT THING ABOUT LIFE IS NOT SEX BUT LOVE," "THE DOCTOR LOOKS AT LIFE AND MARRIAGE," "THE CHURCH'S THEME SONG: LOVE IS GIV ING," "THE LITURGY OF MAR-RIAGE."

A special conference for the engaged is always offered on the final day of the course. This special conference for the "in-laws" is a separate session, held in the church hall, although it is given at the same time as the final conference for the engaged.




