Barn Leveled by Fire, Local Home Damaged in Blaze

A fire at the Northern Poultry Farm about two miles northeast of St. Michaels destroyed a large barn and equipment stored in the building Tuesday evening. The blaze broke out at about 6:35 p. m. A poultry building complex about 200 feet from the barn, the house and other buildings were undamaged.

The glow from the blaze was visible for miles around and resulted in fire calls to West Bend and Kewaskum with both departments leaving their stations. Kewaskum firemen went to the scene but left when Boltonville firemen, aided by fire fighters and a tanker from Fillmore were already at the fire. West Bend firemen responded to a call for "a fire north of the city" but found no fire. It was believed that department was summoned by a person believing there was a grass fire in the area.

Fire Chief Elmer Belger of Boltonville said the entire roof of the barn, about 36 by 90 feet in dimension, had already collapsed by the time they arrived. Firemen were summoned by Mrs. Art Schallie, wife of the manager of the poultry farm which is owned by a Chicago firm.

Six or seven nearby poultry buildings were not endangered by the blaze. A northwest wind blew flames and embers away from other buildings also.

A boat and folding type camper trailer and other miscellaneous farm equipment and other supplies stored in the barn were destroyed by the fire. No estimate of the loss could be given until representatives of the owners made an estimate. Schallie was away from home at the time of the fire. Cause of the blaze was undetermined.

Basement Fire Causes Damage at Korth Home

A burning sofa in the basement at the Gilbert "Bud" Korth home at 1156 Riverview dr., Kewaskum, resulted in a call to Kewaskum firemen at 5:20 a. m. last Saturday. The smoldering sofa caused the basement to be filled with smoke which also seeped into the upstairs living rooms.

It was reported that Miss Karen Brath, who was staying at the home while the Korths were on vacation, was aroused by smoke. She awakened the Korths' son, Jim, and daughter Jeanne. Jim attempted to put out the blaze with an extinguisher but was unable to get it out and Miss Brath summoned the fire department.

Fire Chief Armin Oppermann said he believed the fire started in the sofa. Firemen carried the burning sofa outside and extinguished the blaze. The sofa and a rug were damaged and the basement ceiling was charred. There was also much smoke damage throughout the house. Firemen used masks to enter the basement.

Twenty-one firemen responded and remained at the scene about an hour.

Jane Honeck on Dean's Honor List

Jane E. Honeck of R. 2, Kewaskum, a freshman was named to the Dean's Honor List for the first semester of the academic 1968-69 at Wisconsin State University-Eau Claire.

According to Dr. Richard E. Hibbard, vice-president for academic affairs, the Dean's Honor List consists of all students who have obtained a 3.2 or better average, earning during the semester at least eight hours of credit excluding repeated courses. A total of 1,301 students out of a total enrollment of 7,248 earned this honor. Letters of congratulations to the parents of these students have been mailed from the university.

The grade point average is based on 4.0 equals an all-A letter grade. In the first semester of 1968-69, 46 freshmen, 4 sophomores, 9 juniors and 3 seniors achieved a grade point of 4.0. According to Dr. Hibbard, this is a remarkable achievement for these students and for the university student body.

Mrs. Rose C. Harbeck, nee Rimmel, 89, of 1401 Parkview dr., Kewaskum, widow of the late Don Harbeck, former publisher of the Kewaskum Statesman, and mother of the present publisher, William J. Harbeck, passed away about 9 a. m. Sunday, March 9, at Hope Nursing Home, Lomira.

Mrs. Harbeck was born Feb. 26, 1880, in Kewaskum, a daughter of the late Nicholas and Margaret Harter Rimmel, and lived in Kewaskum most of her life. Her marriage to Don Harbeck took place on July 20, 1909, at Holy Trinity church with the late Rev. Philip J. Vogt officiating. Mr. Harbeck preceded her in death on Jan. 22, 1954.

Survivors include one daughter, Helen (Mrs. Frank Felix) and one son, William J. Friday, March 3, 1944

Ten Washington county men
were accepted for military service
at the Milwaukee induction cen-
ter, three of them from Kewas-
kum. They included Gilbert Korth
and Oliver Eichstedt of the village
and Victor Brodzeller, R. 2. Korth,
a member of the village basket-
ball team, was employed at the

Kewaskum Creamery Co. and
Eichstedt at the Kewaskum Al-
uminum Co. Korth was accepted
into the army and Eichstedt in
the marine corps.

Mr. and Mrs. George Reindl of
this village received a V-mail let-
ter from their son, Pvt. Roger
Reindl, informing them that he is
recovering in a hospital from a
bullet hole through the leg, suf-
fered in action against the enemy
on the fighting front in Italy. The
bullet tore through his leg at the
shin, breaking the leg. He writes
that he was saved by a miracle.
Pvt. Reindl was decorated for his
action against the enemy by being
awarded the coveted Purple Heart
medal. But he writes the Purple
Heart doesn't heal his leg any.
Reindl is the second known Ke-
waskum man to receive the Purple
Heart. The other was Seaman
Robert Romaine, who lost his life
in action with the navy. Pvt.
Reindl has been serving overseas
the past five months, being sta-
tioned in North Africa before be-
ing sent to the front in Italy. He
is with a communication unit and
was employed at the L. Rosenhei-
mer store before entering service.

Thursday.

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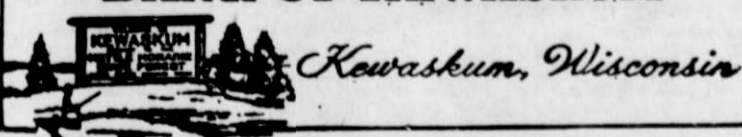


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Spielman Named Head of Cancer Drive in County

Gary Spielman, West Bend, has been named chairman of the Washington county unit of the American Cancer Society's 1969 educational and fund-raising crusade, which swings into action April 1.

The appointment was announced by Guido Schroeder, chairman of the Washington county unit, who said that Spielman had accepted the position because of "his deep concern for the urgency for cancer control and the need to combat this health enemy by education."

Named co-chairmen of corporate-business gifts for the county unit were T. J. Kenny, West Bend, and T. J. Buckley, Hartford. Harry Sheski, town of Barton, is president of the county unit.

Spielman, in accepting the position in this area, noted that the American Cancer Society had expanded its slogan for the crusade. "This year, the ACS says it this way: Help yourself with a checkup and others with a check."

Citing figures from a recent Cancer Society survey which revealed that 57 per cent of the public did not go for checkups regularly, Spielman pointed out the urgency for checkups is seen from the statistics that "while it is true today that one in three is saved from cancer, it is equally true today that one out of two could be saved. In 1968 about 100,000 persons died who might have been saved by earlier and

proper treatment."

The two strongest reasons for hope in beating back challenges by the disease, he stressed, were a knowledge of cancer's seven warning signals and regular physical examinations, including cancer tests at least once a year.

Spielman concluded by restating the 1969 Crusade slogan, adding that "checkups help you, a check will help research help others as well as you."

Home Decorating Topic at Woman's Club Meeting

"Small Rooms Made Larger" was the topic chosen for discussion by Todd Heil of West Bend. Heil spoke at the March 8 meeting of the Kewaskum Woman's club at which guests from the Campbellsport and Kewaskum Jr. Woman's club were present.

Due to the present trend in home construction toward smaller rooms and lower ceilings it is desirable to be aware of ways in which a room can be made to appear larger. Heil offered ten suggestions.

1. Make shell (wall, ceiling and floor) one color, especially neutral.
2. Oversized patterns "heroics" and splashy prints.
3. Mirrors, especially an entire wall, as reflection increases light and size.
4. Topial wall paper, slascapes, landscapes, selves and arches.
5. Distraction of the eye by use of bright colors elsewhere. A decorative object may also be used to draw the eye away from an unattractive point.
6. Oversized furniture used sparingly so

as not to interrupt a total wall effect, and undersized furniture used generously of a light color tone. 7. Vertical striping will heighten ceiling. Floor to ceiling drapes. Dark area rugs pull the eye downward as do bright ones which contrast with the floor. 8. Horizontal stripes to widen a room. Big squares in a rug or floor of long hallway adds width. 9. Slip cover and upholster furniture the same as wall behind to give oneness effect. 10. Paint opposite wall of a narrow room a different hue of the same color. This will bring it closer and shorten it.

At the business meeting a citation from the General Federation of Women's Clubs and the Sears Roebuck Co. was presented for effective community effort from 1966-1968. April 11 and 12 are the dates for the Governor's Conference on Youth. The club will again sponsor a student from the high school.
