Boy, Aged 5, Dies As Fire Destroys Rural Eden Home

VICTIM IS NEPHEW OF LOCAL RESIDENT

Tragedy struck the home of the Leander Schmidt family located northeast of Eden early Tuesday morning when a fire gutted the house and a 5-year-old son of the Schmidts, Donald Ralph, suffocated from the resulting smoke.

Frank H. Decker, Fond du Lac county coroner, said that Schmidt reported hearing the space heater go poof between 2 and 2:30 a. m. in the kitchen. He got up and the kitchen was ablaze. Schmidt woke his wife and began getting the children out. He took five children out but was unable to reach the small boy because of flames and smoke.

Having no telephone, the Schmidts, in bedclothes and without shoes, drove to the neighboring farm of Alex J. Kraus where the Mt. Calvary fire department was called. After dropping off the children Schmidt and Kraus drove back to the house but were unable to enter it. When firemen arrived fireman LeRoy Schneider donned a face mask and broke into the front bedroom. The front door was locked.

Young Donald was found on the floor next to his bed. He was not burned. Fire Chief Max Atkinson and two other firemen applied mouth to mouth resuscitation on the boy hoping to revive him. This was continued until he was taken to St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac, where the child was pronounced dead on arrival at 3:38 a. m.

Kraus drove the family to the hospital and the elder Schmidt was treated as an outpatient for burns on the face and shoulder. His 13-year-old daughter suffered slight burns, but other members of the family escaped injury.

The Schmidt family is now staying with Mrs. Schmidt's brother, Math. Schickert, and family in Kewaskum. The Schmidts have five other children and the Schickerts have six children.

Having lost all their belongings in the fire, the Schmidt family is in need of clothing, bedding, food and furniture. They are looking for a trailer home in the Campbellsport area. Several neighbors have offered the family clothing. Donations may be brought to the Schickert residence at 1176 Western ave. in Kewaskum or taken to St. Michael's church at Dotyville.

Family members include a 4-month-old boy, 1½-year old girl, 4-year-old boy, 10-year-old boy, and 13-year-old girl, Mr. Schmidt, 34 waist, and Mrs. Schmidt, size 20½.

Funeral services for Donald were held Thursday at 10:30 a. m. at Twohig Funeral home, Campbellsport. A Mass of the Angels was held at St. Michael's church, Dotyville, at 11 a. m. with the Rev. Joseph A. Sipek officiating. Burial was in the church cemetery.

Donald was born Feb. 1, 1964. He is survived by his parents, two sisters, Veronica and Mary Ann; three brothers, Peter, Jerome and David; his paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Emil Schmidt, of rural Allenton, and his maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. George Hoffmann of Sheboygan.

JUDICIAL, REFERENDUM BALLOTS TO BE CAST

Lively contests loom for the office of village president and the three trustee offices in the Spring Election next Tuesday, April 1. Polls at the municipal building will be open from 9 a. m. to 8 p. m.

Incumbent village trustee Carl Freehauf is moving up and seeking the president's office. He will be opposed by Earl Du Bois, a newcomer. They are candidates to succeed Wayland D. Tassar, incumbent president, who will not seek re-election.

Six candidates are also in the running for three trustee seats on the village board. While Freehauf is seeking the office of president, the other two incumbent trustees, Alfred Kral and Cyril Wieter, are candidates for re-election. They will be opposed by four new office seekers, Orval E. Behnke, Wallace Cudnohoske, William A. Edwards and Henry T. Timblin. The three remaining trustees on the board hold over in office for another year.

Voters will also cast ballots for the judicial candidates for the state supreme court, E. Harold Hallows and his opponent, Clair H. Voss, and the state superintendent of schools contest with William C. Kahl facing opposition from Donald P. Schmitz.

Ballots will also be marked by voters on five state referenda resolutions.

In area townships, there will be no contests for offices in the town of Kewaskum and the town of Wayne but in the town of Auburn there will be opposition for town chairman and two supervisor offices. Candidates in these townships are as follows:

Town of Kewaskum—Chairman, Alfred C. Johnson (to succeed Ed Campbell who is not a candidate); Supervisor No. 1—Arnold Amerling; Supervisor No. 2, Jerome Herriges; Clerk, Alfred H. Seefeldt; Treasurer, William Bruhn; Assessor, Earl Eitta (to succeed John Heisdorf who is not a candidate).

Town of Wayne — Chairman, John Oelhafen; Supervisor, Elmer Boettcher; Supervisor, Leo Zehren; Clerk, Paul C. Moritz; Treasurer, Raymond Kudek; Assessor, Arnold Hawig, Jr.

Town of Auburn — Chairman, Gottlieb Kelln and Roger Schleif (incumbent); Supervisors—Henry M. Ketter and Hilary Hoepner (incumbents) and Kenneth Jandre; Clerk, Camilla Butzke; Treasurer, Elmer A. Krueger; Assessor, Norbert Gatzke.

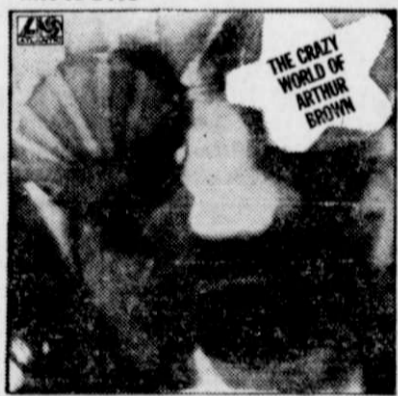

**Facsimile Ballot Notice of Spring Election
Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin**

OFFICE OF VILLAGE CLERK

Public Notice is hereby given to the qualified electors of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, that an election to be held in and for the said Village of Kewaskum, on the First Tuesday in April next being the 1st day of said month, A.D. 1969 officers as follows are to be chosen.

The names of the candidates for whom nomination papers have been filed as required by law, are listed below, each opposite the proper office to which nominated.

INFORMATION TO VOTERS

The following instructions are given for the information and guidance of voters:

(a) A voter, upon entering the polling place and giving his name and residence, will receive a ballot from the ballot clerk which must have endorsed thereon the names or initials of both ballot clerks, and no other ballot can be used. Upon receiving the ballot, the voter must retire alone to a booth or compartment and prepare the same for voting. A ballot clerk may inform the voter as to the proper manner of marking a ballot, but he must not advise or indicate in any manner whom to vote for.

(b) To vote for a person whose name is printed on the ballot, make a cross (X) or mark in the square after the name of the person for whom you desire to vote. To vote for a person whose name is not printed on the ballot, write the name in the blank space provided for the purpose.

(c) The ballot should not be marked in any other manner. If the ballot be spoiled, it must be returned to the ballot clerk, who must issue another in its stead, but not more than three in all shall be

issued to any one voter. Five minutes' time is allowed in booth to mark ballot. Unofficial ballots or memorandum to assist voter in marking his ballot can be taken into the booth and may be used to copy from, The ballot must not be shown so that any person can see how it has been marked by the voter.

(d) After it is marked, it should be folded so that the inside cannot be seen but so that the printed endorsement and signatures of the ballot clerks on the outside may be seen. Then the voter should pass out of the booth or compartment, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the box, and pass out of the polling place.

(e) A voter, who declares to the presiding officer that he is unable to read, or that by reason of physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot, can have assistance of one or two election officers, not of the same political party, in marking same, to be chosen by the voter; and if he declares to be totally blind, may be assisted by any person chosen by him from among the legal voters of the village. The presiding officer may administer an oath in his discretion, as to such person's disability.

(f) Any qualified elector who is absent, or expects to be absent from the village in which he is a qualified elector, or who, because of sickness or physical disability cannot appear at the polling place on election day, may vote at such election by means of an absent voter's ballot to be secured upon application to the Village Clerk, not more than sixty days and no less than three days, or by personal application, not later than the close of office hours on the day prior to such election.

(g) The following is a sample of the official ballot:

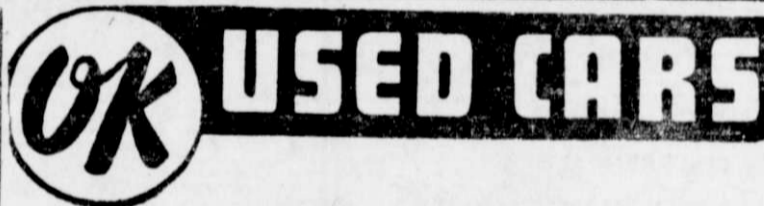
