CONGRESSMAN, SENATORS REPLY TO LOCAL PETITION

In a recent petition started by Mrs. John Kudek, 529 Keller st., and signed by 270 persons, village residents petitioned for city mail delivery in Kewaskum. Copies of the petition were sent to Congressman William A. Steiger, U. S. Senator Gaylord Nelson and State Senator William Proxmire.

Mrs. Kudek received replies from our congressman and both senators stating that certain standards must be met before city mail delivery may be established, the basic requisite of which is a population of 2,500 or more to be served in the area qualifying for the service. A reply to Congressman Steiger from Edward V. Dorsey, acting assistant postmaster general, stated his study disclosed that the total population of Kewaskum is approximately 2,010 at present, which is substantially less than the 2,500 minimum. A number of other requirements are essential for establishment of city delivery service.

In his request for mail delivery service in Kewaskum to Acting Assistant Postmaster General Dorsey, Cong. Steiger received the following reply.

Dear Congressman:

This is in further reference to your letter of February 28, in behalf of the residents of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, who are requesting the establishment of city mail delivery service in their community.

There are certain standards that must be met before city delivery may be established. A listing of the requirements is enclosed as information. The 2,500 or more population to be served in the area qualifying and proposed for the service is one of the basic requisites. Our study disclosed that the total population of Kewaskum is approximately 2,010 which is substantially less than the 2,500 minimum.

mum. As the population requirement is not met, we are unable to favorably consider establishing city delivery service in Kewaskum at this time.

In view of your interest in this matter, we regret the circumstances that prelude a more favorable response.

The listing of requirements for

establishments of city delivery service which Dorsey enclosed with his letter to Cong. Steiger follows:

The requirements for establishment of city delivery service have their basis in Federal law and postal regulations. Door delivery service may be inaugurated in a community when all the following statutory and administrative conditions, essential to an efficient and economical mail delivery service, are met:

1. Postal revenue of \$10,000 for the preceding fiscal year.
2. Population of 2,500 or more within the area to be served.
3. The post office is of the first or second class.
4. Fifty percent of the building lots in the area to be served improved with houses or business places.
5. The area's average lot frontages do not exceed 75 feet and the average set-back distances do not exceed 50 feet.
6. Streets paved or otherwise improved to permit travel of post office vehicles at all times without damage or delay.
7. Continuous public sidewalks in sections of the city where traffic hazards or extreme weather conditions prevent use of the street by a foot carrier.
8. Street signs; proper numbers on individual homes and business places.
9. Mail receptacles or door slots.
10. Satisfactory walks of any material, including gravel and cinders, passable throughout the year, between the street or side-

walk and the front entrance of the dwellings.

Mrs. Kudek has asked that we thank all residents who signed the petition and would like to express her appreciation to Congressman Steiger and Senators Nelson and Proxmire for their interest and prompt action in the matter.

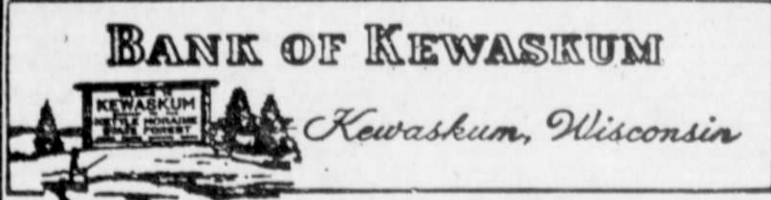

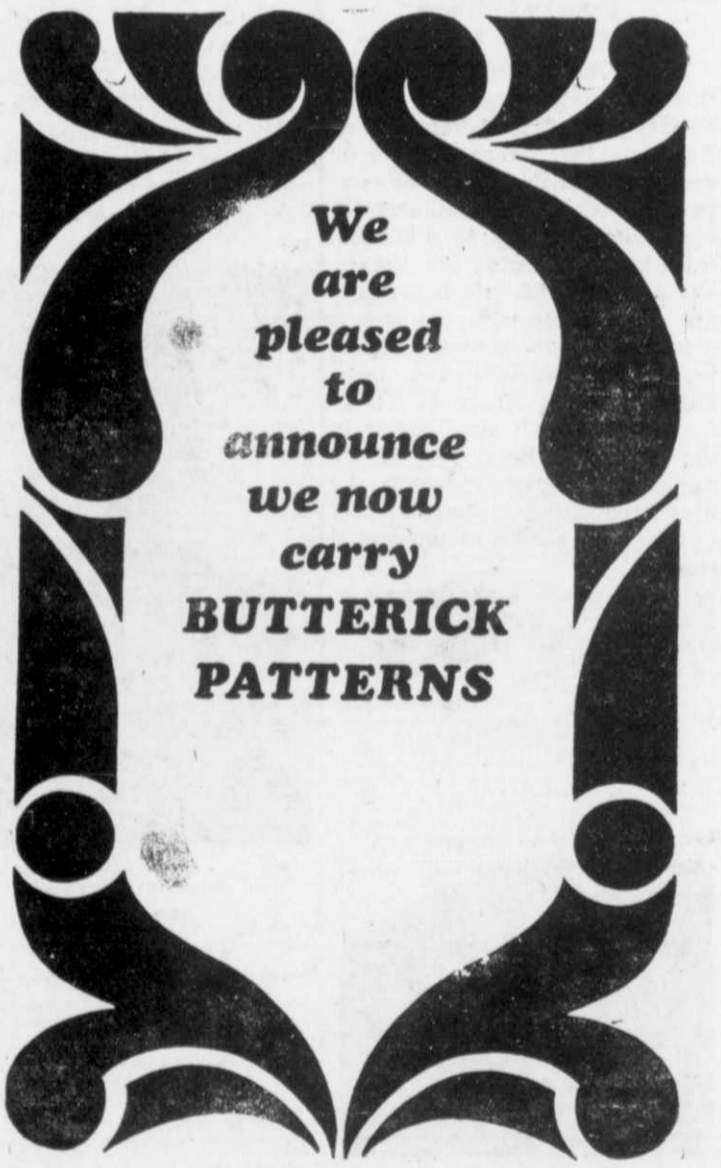

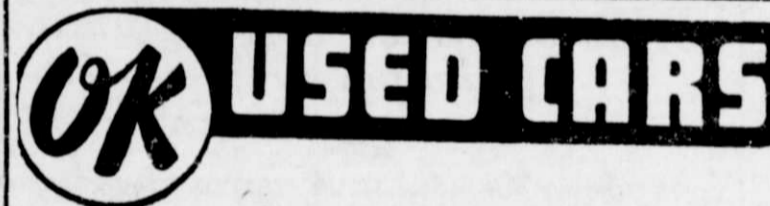

A Big Brother program in Washington county is being planned with an organizational meeting scheduled for 8 p. m. on Tuesday, April 15, at Silverbrook school in West Bend. Established and respected in many other cities throughout the nation, it is felt that such a program is needed in this area.

The Big Brother program is a unique child welfare service predicated on the belief that boys who are deprived of the wholesome relationship with a father or with some other adult male, usually have difficulty with their own "male role."

A few statistics which will serve to portray the critical need for a Big Brother program in Washington county follow:

1. The chance of a fatherless boy dropping out of school is four times as great as that of the boy living with both parents.
2. The boy from a broken home is six times as likely to appear in juvenile court.

3. Washington county has approximately 550 young men between the ages of 5 and 17 who might profit from this unique service. The above figure does not include the many boys who have fathers in the home, who are unwilling to provide constructive guidance.

A drive is currently under way with the assistance of the Jaycees, KC's and the Washington County Mental Health Association to establish the Big Brother program in this area.

James Boullion, executive director of the Dane county Big Brothers of Madison will attend the session to discuss the program and help establish it in this area.
