For the past three months Ana lived with the Ronald Reigle family in Kewaskum as the second part of the International Fellowship Program. Suellen Reigle, daughter of the Reigles, was Kewaskum's I.F.P. student to Chile for three months during the summer of 1968. This is a direct exchange program and is set up primarily for the student to learn the customs, culture and language of the country visited.

Ana's father owns a furniture factory in Santiago and her moth-

er devotes full time to being a housewife. She has one brother and one sister.

Ana stated that when she returns to Santiago, the school year will have started. The term runs from March 20 to Dec. 15. She will be a senior at Liceo Santiago Catholic High school.

About 90% of the people of Chile are Catholic and most of the private schools are taught by French nuns.

While staying in Kewaskum, Ana made many friends and commented "that Kewaskum was a very wonderful town and the people were very warm and friendly." She enjoyed the snow but did not like our cold weather since the temperature does not drop below 40 degrees in Chile.

Kewaskum Explorers are now making preparations for a high-adventure trip to the mountains of Philmont Scout Ranch and Explorer Base in north eastern New Mexico.

The expedition, representing the Badger Council, Boy Scouts of America, will consist of 32 boys and seven leaders. Local adult leaders who will make the trip with the Kewaskum Scouts, are E. "Mike" Gnacinski, John Milewski, Bob Sparks, Harry Cundy, Ted Miller, Lloyd Teeselink, Richard Zarling of Kewaskum.

Leaving Kewaskum on June 18, the group will travel to Philmont by Wisconsin Coach Lines. Enroute to the 214-square mile ranch, the boys will visit Abilene and Dodge City, Kansas, and points along Route 66.

Arriving at the ranch, the expedition will meet their ranger who will lead and train them on the trails for the first three days of their 10-day wilderness trek.

On the Philmont trails the Scouts will participate in various programs offered in many mountain camps by more than 400 trained staff members. These programs include earth science, gold panning, rock climbing, archaeological study and digging, burro packing and horseback riding.

Arriving home again July 3, the boys will be counted among the 260,000 other Scouts who have met the rugged Philmont challenge. Each boy is proof that "America's Manpower begins with Boypower."

Fire Sirens to Sound Tornado Alert Tests Here

Civil Defense tornado alert tests will be conducted in Washington county areas it was announced this week by Marvin Martin, local CD director, and William W. Reed of Richfield, the county Civil Defense coordinator.

The fire siren in Kewaskum will be blown at 10:30 a. m. on the third Monday of the months of April (Apr. 21), May, June, July, August, September and October.

Washington county CD directors have agreed that the severe weather warning shall be as described in the Tornado Preparedness Planning Guide which is prepared by the United States Department of Commerce, Environmental Science Services Administration Weather Bureau.

The alert will consist of a steady blast of from 3½ to 5 minutes on the local fire siren.

Area resident are reminded that the siren will be sounded on the third Monday of each month from April through October at 10:30 a. m. Residents should keep in mind that this is not a fire alarm, but a "tornado test" alarm.

County Humane Society Poster Contest Announced

Rules for a county-wide poster contest for school children have been announced by the Washington County Humane Society. The contest has been designed to dramatize "Be Kind to Animals Week" May 4-10. The poster theme will be carried out as "Be Kind to All Living Things." The contest is open to all students in the K-8 grades in Washington county schools.

Three main categories have been set up for the young people who will enter the contest: K-2, 3-5, and 6-8 grades. Awards will be made for first, second and third place in each of the three divisions, 1st \$15.00, 2nd \$10.00, 3rd \$5.00. Certificates of merit will also be presented to the nine winners.

All posters submitted will include the theme of the contest on the poster itself. Any medium approved by the teacher may be used. The winning posters will be displayed at the Washington County Humane Society booth at the St. Frances Cabrini Home and Sport Show to be held in West Bend April 26 and 27. Posters are to be submitted on or before Monday, April 21. Judging will be done by an independent panel of trained art experts according to the following considerations: originality, sincerity, adherence to the theme, and proper use of the medium. Posters will be picked up at the schools and returned after the contest. Winning posters will be held for publicity purposes.

Lennartz Promoted in Vietnam

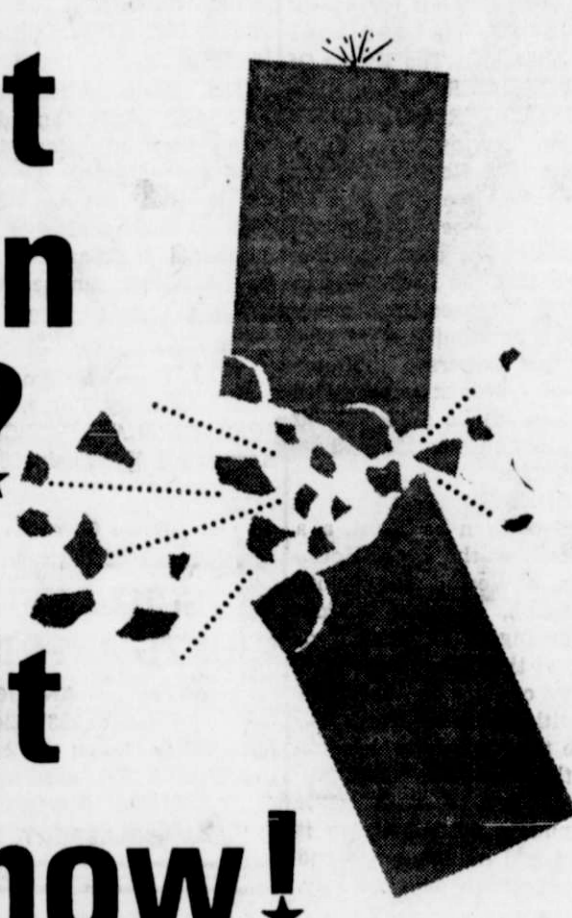
