The crash occurred at Prospect dr. and Ridge rd. about 1 1/2 miles south of Kewaskum, when the Heinecke car left the road and struck a tree. The driver was unfamiliar with the road and skidded off Prospect dr. on a curve while traveling south.

Two Kewaskum girls were injured in a mishap at 8:50 p. m. Thursday when a car driven by Joan E. Zehren, 17, which was southbound on Hwy. 45 left the road, struck a guard rail and went down a steep embankment just north of West Bend. The accident occurred as the driver attempted to pass another vehicle and get off on the shoulder and lost control. The report indicated that the right front tire on the car was blown out. Injured were Miss Zehren, who complained of neck pains and a passenger, Barbara Bade, 17, also of this village, whose injuries were not given.

Another young lady was injured in a two car crash on STH 23 at Oak rd. about two miles east of Kewaskum Sunday. The mishap occurred as a car driven by Dale K. Squier, 32, Kewaskum, attempted to turn left into a gravel pit and a car operated by Carl R. Firme, 23, Kewaskum, came around a curve and was unable to avoid contact with the other auto. The accident was attributed in part to the rain slick condition of the road. Injured was Firme's wife, Gelane, 23, who incurred cuts and bruises.

The accident happened during "open shooting" on the club traps. Although the cause of the mishap was not immediately determined, it is believed due to a flaw in the ammunition or his gun.

Dennis is a driver for Wisconsin Truck Contractors, Inc. of Kewaskum and just recently returned from a trucking project in Iowa where the trucks were employed several weeks hauling sand to prevent flooding.

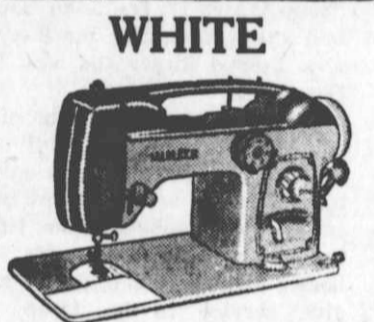

## Kewaskum, 5 Other Area High Schools Form New Conference

Six area high schools—Kewaskum, Campbellsport, Horicon, North Fond du Lac, Lomira and Brandon-Rosendale—met last Wednesday at Fond du Lac to form a new athletic conference.

The schools, representing three from the present Scenic Moraine conference, one from the present Northern Little Ten, and two from the Tri-County, agreed to go ahead with the conference in 1970-71.

Jess Laundrie, superintendent of schools at Horicon, was named temporary chairman. Other schools have been invited to join the six and must declare their intentions by May 20. Four Northern Little Ten schools—Mayville, Columbus, Ripon and Berlin—attended but Waupun did not attend. (The Southern Little Ten would welcome back Waupun and another school or two, it was indicated).

D. D. Mortimer, Columbus High school principal and president of the Northern Little Ten, disclosed that the five remaining schools will now study possibilities they have in joining other conferences. Laundrie said no limit as to the number of schools has been set for the new conference and it could include as many as 12. If this should happen, the conference would likely be split in two six-school divisions.

Numerous shifts in conference re-organization are anticipated with so many schools already involved in the forming of the new conference. Any school wishing to withdraw from the Northern Little Ten must make notification of its intention prior to June 1, it was learned.

The Scenic Moraine, losing Kewaskum, Campbellsport and North Fondy, would be down to five schools. At a previous Scenic Moraine meeting Hartland Arrowhead was admitted to the conference for 1969-70, replacing Random Lake.
