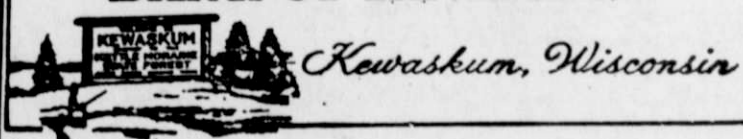

Rabies Vaccination Clinics to Be Held In Village, County

Veterinarians of Washington and Dodge counties will again conduct the rabies vaccination clinic for small animals in the two counties, May 13 and 14. The hours both days in Washington county are 7-9 p. m. at the old court house in West Bend, the Hartford town hall, and 7-8 p. m. at the veterinarian clinic at Kewaskum.

The veterinarians have indicated that this is a two-year vaccination, and there will be no clinic in 1970. This year's effort will protect those animals for two years.

The fee is \$2.00 per animal, payable at the time of vaccination. Tags certifying vaccination will be issued. Any person having any pet animal subject to rabies—and this is all warm blooded animals—should bring them to one of the locations listed above on either day.

With last year's high mouse population, and with many other rabies-sensitive animals such as skunks, possums, chipmunks, gophers—it is important that all domestic animals be vaccinated this year. Remember that a rabid animal could bite a child and pass the rabies organism to that child. This would mean that the child will have to have the series of rabies shots, or he will die from rabies.

To avoid the possibility of passing rabies from animal to animal, and from animal to human, this clinic is dedicated. Domestic ani-

mals from rural areas are of primary importance. Any profit realized from this project is given to scholarships to young men and women in the two-county area. There have been several awarded in years past.

Members of 4-H clubs will help the veterinarians conduct the clinic.
