## Memorial Day Parade, Services Here on Friday

The traditional Memorial Day parade and services in tribute to the nation's war dead will be held in Kewaskum next Friday, May 30, sponsored by Robert G. Romaine, Post 384 of the American Legion.

## Regal Ware Sales Manager, Former Associate Die

L. W. "RED" FLIEMAN

L. W. "Red" Flieman, owner and manager of the Premium Enterprises Company, Des Plaines, Ill., died unexpectedly at his home on May 15. He was associated for many years with the Installment and Premium Divisions of Regal Ware, Inc., a Kewaskum cookware manufacturer. He left there to join Ecko Products Company in Chicago, before forming his own sales agency in December of 1967.

Flieman entered the housewares trade in 1948 handling premium merchandising for the West Bend Company, West Bend. In 1946 he went to Zenith Radio Corp., Chicago, as supervisor of sales, and two years later returned to cookware when he joined

Regal. Prior to 1938 he was associated with Kramer-Krasselt Advertising Agency and the A & P Co., both in Milwaukee.

An outstanding dynamic, friendly and colorful individual, "Red" was familiar to housewares buyers from coast to coast. He was well known as a raconteur and his ready wit kept him in demand as an emcee and after dinner speaker.

Mr. Flieman was also active in numerous professional sales organizations and was a founder and past president of the National Premium Sales Executive Club. He was also a member of the Premium Advertising Association of America. During his long housewares career he received many honors and awards for his outstanding accomplishments in creative selling.

He was also a member of the Elks Club of Des Plaines, the West Bend Lodge 138 F & A.M., Wisconsin Scottish Rite Bodies, and the Tripoli Shrine, Milwaukee.

The 55 year old sales executive is survived by his wife, Polly, and daughter Jacqueline, both of Des Plaines.

### AL FISH

Al Fish, Eastern regional sales manager of Regal Ware, Inc., Kewaskum, passed away unexpectedly May 14 after a brief illness. He was 60 years old.

Mr. Fish, who headed Regal's New York sales office, had been associated with housewares for over 41 years. He began his career as an assistant housewares buyer for the American Dry Goods Co., New York City, in 1928. From there he went on to become housewares buyer for Gimbels, New York City and ultimately the merchandise manager of their Milwaukee, Wis. store.

Leaving Gimbels in 1943 to return his family to New York, Al Fish then became housewares buyer for that city's Interstate De-

partment Stores. Anxious to enter the selling field he went on his own as a manufacturer's representative in 1944 before joining Regal Ware, Inc. in 1946.

Al's success in sales was evidenced by his brilliant record at Regal Ware. His personal accomplishments won him numerous awards including being selected "Regal Man of the Year," the firm's top sales award, three times and achieving the "Regal 100 Club" eight times since this honor award was established in 1956.

Mr. Fish lived in Great Neck, Long Island, with his wife Adelaide. He is further survived by one son, three daughters and seven grandchildren.
