

These four words sum up the service rendered to the village and community by Chief of Police Roland Pledl, who will retire on Sunday, June 1, after serving as Kewaskum chief for more than 14 years, since March 1, 1955. Chief Pledl came to Kewaskum from Milwaukee where he was a member of that city's police for 25 years previously.

Chief Pledl is to be commended for his excellent and efficient work. He maintained law and order in the village, commanded respect, gained the confidence of the people, carried out the duties of his office to the best of his ability, and established a fine record. There were very few, if any, crimes committed in the village during his years as chief and a

minimum of burglaries, thefts, traffic offenses, disorders or other misdemeanors. Offenders learned that Kewaskum was out of bounds for them. He could be stern when the situation demanded but acted in a cooperative, reasonable manner. He was friendly, accommodating, respected, well known and liked, especially by the children who went out of their way to greet him with "Hi, Mr. Pledl."

Chief Pledl stated that he always enjoyed his work and life in this village. He will be missed in office although he and his wife Vivian expect to continue their residence in Kewaskum.

The village board is expected to name a new chief in the near future.

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Receives State Women's Clubs Conservation Award



A personal zeal toward conservation plus inspiration from her husband has led a Kewaskum area woman to an award for outstanding work in conservation from the Wisconsin Federation of Women's Clubs.

Mrs. Edgar Miske, who resides on a farm in the town of Wayne, was one of six Wisconsin women so honored at the Federation's annual convention in Milwaukee last week. She was present to accept the citation.

Her name was submitted by the Kewaskum Woman's club and the history of her achievements that led to the award was compiled by Mrs. Howard Zemlicka, conservation chairman of the sponsoring group.

Mrs. Miske's involvement in conservation extends beyond the twelve years she has been leader of the Wayne Crusaders 4-H club. Her interest was inspired, in part, by her husband's desire to promote conservation practices on his farm. He was one of the first farmers in Washington county to adopt a soil conservation plan and, since 1947, he has been a Soil Conservation Service cooperator.

Involved in conservation directly and indirectly since her marriage, the mother of four sons says "conservation is just a way

of life for our whole family." Each of her sons has been or is a member of 4-H and has an interest in conservation because of her enthusiasm.

Mrs. Miske has made her 4-H group aware of conservation and of its affiliate, beautification, through slides and films and through originally-composed material. Her annual tree-planting projects always involve all club members.

Each year her club plants trees and shrubs in new places where they can serve to beautify an area or help to prevent soil erosion. By planting in new areas, she feels she can interest and involve

an ever-widening circle of people. Mrs. Miske is now making plans for an entirely new conservation club project. A local church has purchased several acres of land which as a congregation it hopes to develop into a wildlife area. She has been asked to head up the project that will take a period of years to develop.

She has led her group in maintenance of a school planter, mailbox painting and anti-litter campaigns with the hope that the young persons will be motivated to continued beautification and conservation interests at adulthood.

Her 4-H'ers have gathered discarded Christmas trees to provide wildlife shelters.

The Miske farm contains a wildlife area which provides food and shelter for birds. The boys have always maintained bird feeders during the winter and they have built birdhouses to attract the songbird.

Most recently, the petite Mrs. Miske worked along with all members of her family in planting a large tree plantation on their farm which now contains over 3,000 trees. The plantation and the wildlife area serve as outdoor classrooms for her 4-H members.

She has served on the county executive board of 4-H club leaders and she has represented the county at district and state 4-H meetings. Her efforts have been recognized frequently on the state level. In 1967 and again in 1968 her club was awarded a three-day conservation tour in central Wisconsin for having done outstanding conservation work.

Her own enthusiasm has been her greatest asset.

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


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Indians Cop 2nd In S-M Track Meet



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King-Size Mushrooms Picked



Spring mushroom pickers will tell you this has been the best season in many, many years for this type of edible fungi. Veteran mushroom hunters have been finding them by the basketful. Ordinarily they are quite scarce, hard to find, and require a great deal of walking and searching. The type picked in the spring are morels, more commonly known as "sponges."

The writer is among those who have had good success this spring. The last time out we filled a small bushel basket or peach basket with mushrooms and the time before that we counted 136 of them in our bag. Last Sunday we "hit the jackpot" with some king-sized specimens. The largest one, shown in the center of the above photo (checked in at Rose Miller's checking station) measured 11 inches high, 12½ inches in circumference and weighed exactly a half pound. The two mushrooms

aside of it were 6 to 8 inches high, of which size we found 15 or 20. The rest were of a smaller size. The small mushrooms shown with the monsters in the photo are ordinary sized ones of about 3 inches, and show a comparison with the big ones.

What is the reason for the abundance of mushrooms this year? Who knows, but some old timers say it is because of the heavy snow cover during the winter, others because of the ice cover, but more likely it is believed the reason is because there are more and more dead elm trees. (Mushrooms are most frequently found around old elm trees and stumps). Usually when we have a cold spring like this year, mushrooms are scarce.

In case your luck hasn't been so good, we'll tell you where to find them. In the woods!
