WIETOR APPOINTED TO FILL UNEXPIRED TERM

Newly elected Carl Freehauf resigned as village of Kewaskum president for personal health reasons at a special meeting of the village board called at 5 p. m. on Monday.

It was reported by Village Commissioner William Martin that Freehauf resigned at the suggestion of his physician. He was elected president at this year's spring election on April 1, succeeding Wayland D. Tessar, who did not seek re-election. Prior to that, Freehauf had served as a village trustee for four years. He is plant manager of Fairmont Foods, a Kewaskum milk processing plant.

Cyril Wietor was appointed to fill Freehauf's unexpired two-year term by unanimous action of the board members. Wietor is a village trustee, having begun his seventh, two-year term after being re-elected in April. He is a shipping department supervisor at Regal Ware, Inc.

The office of trustee which Wietor held will be filled through an appointment by the village board.

**Two Hurt in Four Accidents Listed**

Marjorie M. Lauterbach, 29, of R. 2, Kewaskum, suffered head injuries and bruises and cuts on the right arm and hand at 5:45 a. m. Wednesday when her southbound car left the road on Hwy. 45 and rolled over several times on a curve about 2 of a mile south of Hwy. 143. The mishap occurred during a heavy rainfall which impaired her vision. The driver braked sharply and her car skidded and left the road on the east side.

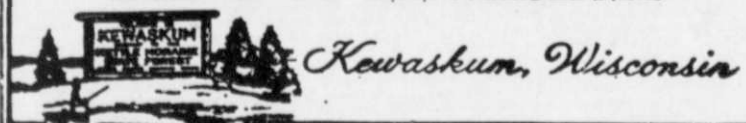
