## Annual Picnic, Parade Here on Sunday, July 13

EVENT TO CELEBRATE 50TH ANNIVERSARY OF LEGION

The annual Kewaskum picnic, which this year will celebrate the 50th anniversary of the American Legion, will be held in the village park on Sunday, July 13. The event will be held on Sunday only this year and plans have been completed to make the picnic another outstanding affair.

To start off the affair, an excellent parade has again been arranged which should prove to be the highlight of the event. The parade will feature at least eight bands, drum and bugle corps or drill teams and other musical organizations. Hundreds of persons will participate in the parade, which will get underway at 12:30 p. m. sharp. The parade will form on the high school parking lot and athletic field and adjacent streets, from where it will proceed to the park. All participants should be prepared to line up at 12 noon.

Featured musical organizations in the parade will include the Chordalians of Milwaukee, the Sheboyganettes, Germantown Junior Boycadette Band, Germantown Washington Cadette band, West Bend Cub Scout Pack 21 drum and bugle corps, the Accents of Sheboygan color guard, drill team and drums, West Bend VFW drill team, Kewaskum High school band and other musical groups.

Other parade highlights will include the usual beautiful floats, which will be judged this year under the theme of "Americanism" and "Patriotism" to go along with the Legion anniversary, as well as baton twirlers and drill teams, children's specialties, visiting firemen with equipment and American Legion posts, comic entries, ancient cars, smaller musical groups, riding horses, clubs, organizations, scouts, individuals and many others. Floats are especially invited to enter the parade. Substantial cash prizes will be awarded to the best judged floats and children's entries and all youngsters entered will also be given tickets good in trade in the park.

Immediately following the parade some bands and drum corps will perform in the park. There will also be a band concert later in the afternoon on the bandstand and other musical entertainment will be provided by Bob Thorn's orchestra and Syl. Volm and his Polka Dots throughout the afternoon and evening.

The popular water fights will again be held starting at 6:30 p. m. with several neighboring fire department teams battling it out for the prize money.

Also featured again this year will be a beer garden with tables and chairs for your comfort and rest. Beer maids will serve the beer in pitchers. Patrons are invited to visit the beer garden where there will be music for their entertainment and they can view the picnic grounds while relaxing with a pitcher of brew.

American flags and metal flags will be sold in the park by the local Robert G. Romaine Post No. 384 of the Legion for anyone interested in purchasing them.

## Honeck Sells Auto Salvage to Hefter

ACQUIRES HEFTER PROPERTY IN DEAL

Kewaskum Auto Salvage, Inc., located on CTH V north of Kewaskum, has been sold to John Hefter, operator of Hefter's Auto Salvage, by the owner, Kilian A. Honeck, who also owns and operates Honeck Chevrolet, Inc. in Kewaskum. In the transaction Honeck acquired the Hefter property on Hwy. 45 near the south village limits. The transaction became effective July 1, when Hefter took possession.

Honeck said the salvage yard at the former Hefter property will be discontinued. Plans are not completed as yet but it will be used for a future business development.

Hefter retained his inventory and acquired that of Kewaskum Auto Salvage, Inc. Kilian Honeck and Honeck Chevrolet, Inc. will have no interest in the Hefter salvage business. Hefter will be in the business of selling used parts and has a good inventory.

Honeck's reason for selling is to devote more time to Honeck Chevrolet, Inc. and Honeck Leasing. He had operated the salvage yard for the past 10 years. Victor Arnold, who managed the yard, will continue to be employed there. Yard hours will also remain the same, from 8 a. m. to 5:30 p. m. six days a week.

## Former Pastor At St. Michaels, Fr. Kastner Dies

The Rev. Raymond G. Kastner, 63, of Milwaukee, former pastor of St. Michael's parish, St. Michaels, passed away Friday, June 27. He retired in 1963 due to a heart condition, and had been making his home in Milwaukee with a sister.

Rev. Kastner was born Nov. 28, 1905 in Jefferson. He attended Holy Rosary Elementary school, Milwaukee, and prepared for the priesthood at St. Francis seminary, St. Francis. He was ordained May 30, 1931 in St. John's Cathedral.

Fr. Kastner served as assistant pastor at Holy Rosary Parish, Kenosha, June 15, 1931 to Dec. 6, 1934; St. Boniface, Milwaukee, Dec. 7, 1934 to June 30, 1935; chaplain at St. Mary's hospital, Milwaukee, July 1, 1935 to Oct. 30, 1941; assistant pastor at St. Kilian's, Hartford, Oct. 31, 1941 to Mar. 3, 1942; pastor of St. Michael's parish, St. Michaels, Mar. 4, 1942 to April 20, 1948; also served as pastor at Immaculate Conception church, Saukville, April 21, 1948. St. Peter's church, St. Peter, July 15, 1948, and then became chaplain at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, Nov. 2, 1948, retiring Sept. 1, 1963.

Survivors include two sisters, Mrs. Rosalie Hansen and Mrs. Fred (Phyllis) Oelhafen of Boulder Junction, Wis. and one brother, Arthur M.; nieces, nephews, and other relatives.

Visitation at the Brett Funeral home was after 4 p. m. Monday with vigil at 8 o'clock. Exportation was Tuesday at 9 o'clock from the funeral home to St. Rose of Lima church, 540 N. 31st st., Milwaukee. In state at the church from 9:30 to 10:30 a. m., with office of the dead at 10:30. Solemn Pontifical funeral Mass was at 11 a. m. Burial was in Holy Cross cemetery.

## Districts in Local Phone Exchange Get \$4,255 As Tax Share

Tax districts in General Telephone Company of Wisconsin's Kewaskum exchange recently received \$4,255.58 from the state treasurer's office as their share of state taxes paid by the utility.

The sum represents the exchange's portion of license fee taxes paid to the state by General Telephone on gross revenues earned there during 1968, according to Lowell H. Boehm, district commercial manager for the company. Boehm said that gross revenue or license fee taxes are paid annually by all telephone companies in Wisconsin in lieu of property taxes. General Telephone's overall gross revenue tax for 1968 totaled more than \$1,825,000, of which \$827,500 represented taxes for local and miscellaneous revenues, while \$997,900 was paid on toll (long distance) service revenues.

State law requires that 85 percent of the taxes paid to the state on local and miscellaneous revenues be returned to the taxing districts in which it was earned, Boehm explained. The rest of the taxes are retained by the state.

The \$4,255.58 returned to the taxing districts in General Telephone's Kewaskum exchange represents 85 percent of the taxes on local and miscellaneous revenues earned in the exchange during 1968.

## Driver License Exams Here Are Discontinued

A change has been made in the time and place at which driver license examinations and road tests for residents of the Kewaskum area will be given, according to Richard Solterman, district supervisor.

Starting June 30, the state regrouped its teams of driver license examiners, combining a number of smaller offices into larger ones. Located at the most central areas of population density, the 146 offices which result from merging and redistributing personnel from 216 offices will be able to provide better service to the public.

As a result of this change, effective July 1 driver license examinations were discontinued in Kewaskum at the municipal building. Up to the present time driver exams had been given here every second, fourth and fifth Friday of the month.

In the future anyone wishing to take a driver's test must report at the old West Bend library basement which will be open every Monday and Friday between the hours of 8:15 a. m. and 5 p. m. Road tests will be by appointment. Phone 334-7462.

Wherever possible, examining stations are being located in quarters which are easier to reach, provide more room, better parking and driving test facilities, Solterman said. Ideal quarters are very hard to find, he added.

"There are well over two and a quarter million licensed drivers in Wisconsin," Solterman reported. "This means that each examiner has some 2,000 drivers to serve, so we have to make the best possible use of each man's time."

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**Graduate of School Food Course at UW**

Mrs. Willard Gruhle, R. 1, Kewaskum, is among 44 school food service managers and cook managers who have just graduated from Short Course 111 of the School Food Service Management Development program jointly sponsored by University of Wisconsin Extension and the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction, Madison.

The school food service programs are considered a vital force in improving the health of children in every community in Wisconsin and the nation. The 44 managers who have now completed the program and graduated are responsible for providing nutritious lunches to more than 40,000 children at schools in communities throughout Wisconsin during the school year.

In three short courses, totaling more than 120 hours of class time, the graduated managers have studied nutrition, menu planning, personnel management, equipment use, sanitation, financial control, human relations, educational aspects of school food service, and many other areas related to the operation of school feeding programs.

More than 350 other school lunch managers have completed the first stage of the program, and 175 of these have also completed Short Course 11 and will reach graduation during the next school year.

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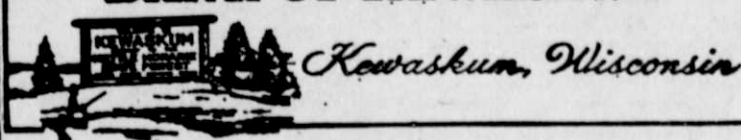
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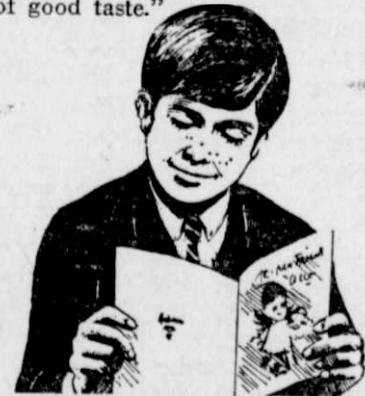
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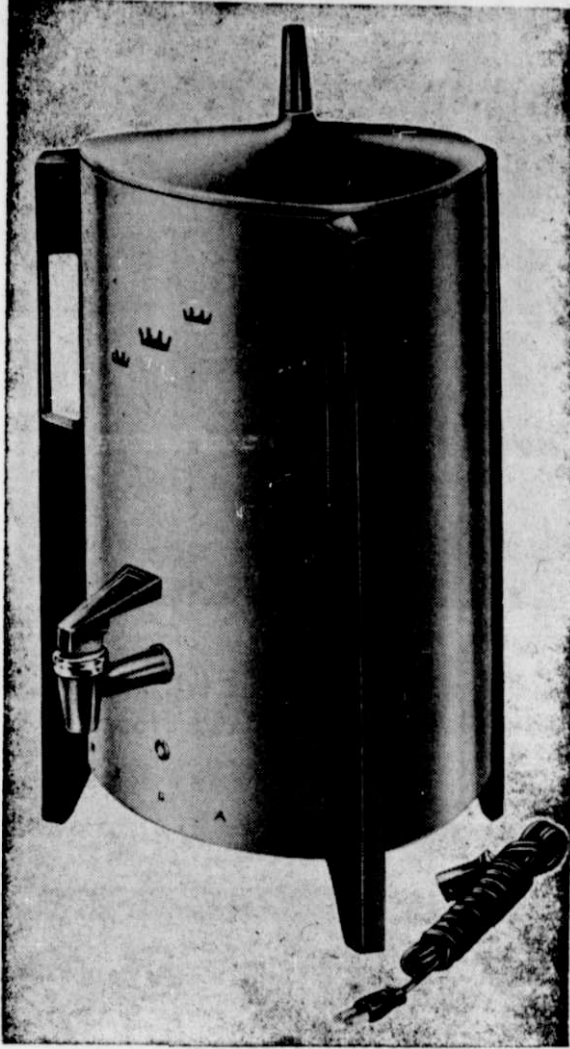
