Tax districts in General Telephone Company of Wisconsin's Phone 334-7462. Kewaskum exchange recently received \$4,255.58 from the state treasurer's office as their share of state taxes paid by the utility.

The sum represents the exchange's portion of license fee taxes paid to the state by General Telephone on gross revenues earned there during 1968, according to Lowell H. Boehm, district commercial manager for the company

Boehm said that gross revenue or license fee taxes are paid annually by all telephone companies in Wisconsin in lieu of property taxes. General Telephone's overal gross revenue tax for 1968 totaled more than \$1,825,000, of which \$827,500 represented taxes for lo cal and miscellaneous revenues while \$997,900 was paid on toll (long distance) service revenues.

State law requires that 85 percent of the taxes paid to the state on local and miscellaneous revenues be returned to the taxing districts in which it was earned Boehm explained. The rest of the taxes are retained by the state.

The \$4,255.58 returned to the taxing districts in General Telephone's Kewaskum exchange represents 85 percent of the taxes nues earned in the exchange during 1968.

> Starting June 30, the state regrouped its teams of driver license examiners, combining a number of smaller offices into larger ones. Located at the most central areas of population density, the 146 offices which result from merging and redistributing personnel from 216 offices will be able to provide better service to the public.

As a result of this change, effective July 1 driver license examinations were discontinued in Kewaskum at the municipal building. Up to the present time driver exams had been given here every second, fourth and fifth Friday of the month.

In the future anyone wishing to take a driver's test must report Phone Exchange Get at the old West Bend library basement which will be open every \$4,255 As Tax Share Monday and Friday between the hours of 8:15 a. m. and 5 p. m. Road tests will be by apponiment.

Wherever possible, examining stations are being located in quarters which are easier to reach, provide more room, better parking and driving test facilities, Solterman said. Ideal quarters are very hard to find, he added.

"There are well over two and a quarter million licensed drivers in Wisconsin," Soltermann reported. This means that each examiner has some -2,000 drivers to serve, so we have to make the best possible use of each man's time.'


