## All Set for Annual Picnic, Parade Here Sunday; Girls to Water Fight

**BIG PARADE TO START AT 12:30 P. M. SHARP**

Everything is in readiness for the annual Kewaskum picnic in the village park this Sunday, July 13, which this year marks the 50th anniversary of the American Legion. The big event, on Sunday only this year, and parade again will be outstanding affairs.

A first time and completely new last minute feature has been added to the picnic this year. A group of Kewaskum area girls has organized a water fighting team and they will take on the men's champion team in the water fights in which several neighboring fire departments will compete. The fight between the ladies and men will also be the best two out of three. This should be an interesting attraction and make the firemen fight all the harder to get at the girls.

To start off the affair, an excellent parade has again been arranged which should prove to be the highlight of the event. The parade will feature at least eight bands, drum and bugle corps or drill teams and other musical organizations. Hundreds of persons will participate in the parade, which will get underway at 12:30 p. m. sharp. The parade will form on the high school parking lot and athletic field and adjack streets, from where it will proceed to the park. All participants should be present to line up at 12 noon.

Featured musical organizations in the parade will include the Chordaliers of Milwaukee, the Sheboyganites, Germantown Junior Cadette band, Germantown Washington Cadette band, West Bend Cub Scout Pack 21 drum and bugle corps, the Accents of Sheboygan color guard, drill team and drums, West Bend VFW drill team, Kewaskum High school band and other musical groups.

Other parade highlights will include the usual beautiful floats, which will be judged this year under the theme of "Americanism" and "Patriotism" to go along with the Legion anniversary, as well as baton twirlers and drill teams, children's specialties, visiting firemen with equipment and American Legion posts, comic entries, ancient cars, smaller musical groups, riding horses, clubs, organizations, scouts, individuals and many others. Floats are especially invited to enter the parade. Substantial cash prizes will be awarded to the best judged floats and children's entries and all youngsters entered will also be given tickets good in trade in the park.

Immediately following the parade some bands and drum corps will perform in the park. There will also be a band concert later in the afternoon on the bandstand and other musical entertainment will be provided by Bob Thorn's orchestra and Syl. Volm and his Polka Dots throughout the afternoon and evening.

The popular water fights will be held starting at 6:30 p. m. with several neighboring fire department teams battling it out for the prize money.

Also featured again this year will be a beer garden with tables and chairs for your comfort and rest. Beer maids will serve the

beer in pitchers. Patrons are invited to visit the beer garden where there will be music for their entertainment and they can view the picnic grounds while relaxing with a pitcher of brew.

American flags and metal flag poles will be sold in the park by the local Robert G. Romaine Post No. 384 of the Legion for anyone interested in purchasing them. And don't forget to get your Legion 50th anniversary hat—which will fit any head.

Adding to the entertainment, there will be rides, concessions, refreshments and those famous Kewaskum brats and jumbo hamburgers. Stands in the park will operate continuously. Ninety valuable merchandise prizes will be given away in conjunction with the picnic. Everyone is invited to attend and have a good time at this big annual affair.

## Scenic Moraine Adds Mayville To Conference

**OTHER NEW SCHOOLS ARE HARTLAND, KETTLE MORAINÉ**

The Scenic Moraine conference announces the addition of Mayville High school to the conference beginning Sept. 1, 1970. In 1970 the conference members in addition to Mayville will then be Grafton, Hartland Arrowhead, Kewaskum, North Fond du Lac, Pewaukee, Slinger, Washington (Germantown) and Kettle Moraine.

Thus there will be three new schools in the conference namely Mayville, Hartland Arrowhead and Kettle Moraine, according to the present setup. Two of the present schools in the conference, namely Campbellsport and Random Lake, have dropped out. Random Lake will discontinue as a member of the conference with the start of the 1969-70 school year this fall and Campbellsport will be out with the start of the school year in 1970.

Hartland Arrowhead, which has a large enrollment, is a former member of the southern Little Ten conference. Mayville has been a member of the northern Little Ten conference.

The conference offers opportunities to all member schools to discuss educational innovations and experiences and a co-curricular program in football, cross country, drama, wrestling, basketball, forensics, golf, track, music, baseball and debate.

All are past conservation award winners. Each year, the Kewaskum Kiwanians help to promote agriculture and conservation by presenting conservation awards to farmers, who are doing an exceptionally good job in practicing conservation on their farms.

Contour strip cropping, sod waterways, diversion terraces, tree planting and wildlife plantings were some of the conservation practices observed.

I would like to say that Louis Opgenorth, who passed away recently, was the first farmer in Washington county to do contour strip cropping on his farm. It is a beautiful layout and I'm sure we all can agree that he left his land a bit better than it was.

The tour just happened to be during a period of hard and heavy rainfall. The men saw some ex-

## Four File for Local School Board Posts

**TO FILL 3 VACANCIES AT JULY 28 ELECTION**

Tuesday was the deadline for filing declarations of candidacy to fill three vacancies on the Board of Education of Kewaskum Community Schools Joint District No. 2. Each is a three-year term.

The terms of office for three members of the board will expire on July 28. These terms are those of John A. Jadro, Allen Tassar and James D. Reigle. The candidates who filed by Tuesday's deadline are Jadro of the town of Scott and Tassar of the village of Kewaskum, both incumbents; Mrs. Elwood Berg of the town of Kewaskum and Gerald Secor of the town of Farmington. A third incumbent, Reigle, is not seeking re-election.

Any resident elector of the Kewaskum Community schools district could become a candidate for the school board by signing a statement of candidacy with the clerk of the Board, Jadro, 20 days before the day of the election.

The election will be held from 1 to 8 p. m. on Monday, July 28, at the high school. Results will be announced at the annual electors meeting at 8 p. m. the same evening.

On the day of election, incidentally, the new supplemental classrooms which will be used for kindergarten at the Kewaskum and Wayne schools will be open for inspection by the general public. Rooms will be open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m.

The budget hearing and annual meeting of the school district at 8 p. m. July 28 will be in the multi-purpose room at the high school. Discussion will include recommendations for building expansions in the future.

cessive washing and subsequent silting problems on land that is not protected from erosion. Summer is the time of year when we get the short, heavy rains which do the most damage.

They saw areas of top soil deposited around corn plants, at the bottom of hills that were eroded. In some places, pools of water drowned out the corn. They observed the filling up of roadside ditches with silt and the muddy water of flooding streams and rivers.

Conservation practices will help keep soil, water and costly fertilizer on the land to benefit the farmer and the city person alike. It costs many times more dollars to clean out reservoirs, ditches and rivers than it does to keep the soil on the land.

The bus tour ended on the Hilbert Scheunemann farm, where the Kiwanians ate lunch and enjoyed viewing Hilbert's farm and fine dairy herd. They enjoyed a "playboy" box lunch provided by Tudy and Mrs. Scheunemann surprised them with milk, ice cream and fresh strawberries.

I'm quite sure, and Roy will agree, that the members of this fine club will be just a little bit more aware of the conservation picture in their community. I want to commend them for their interest in promoting conservation for a more stable agriculture.

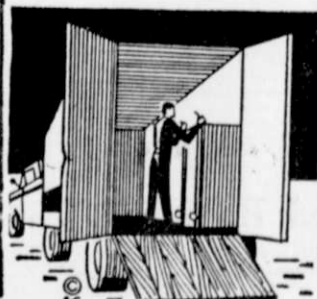

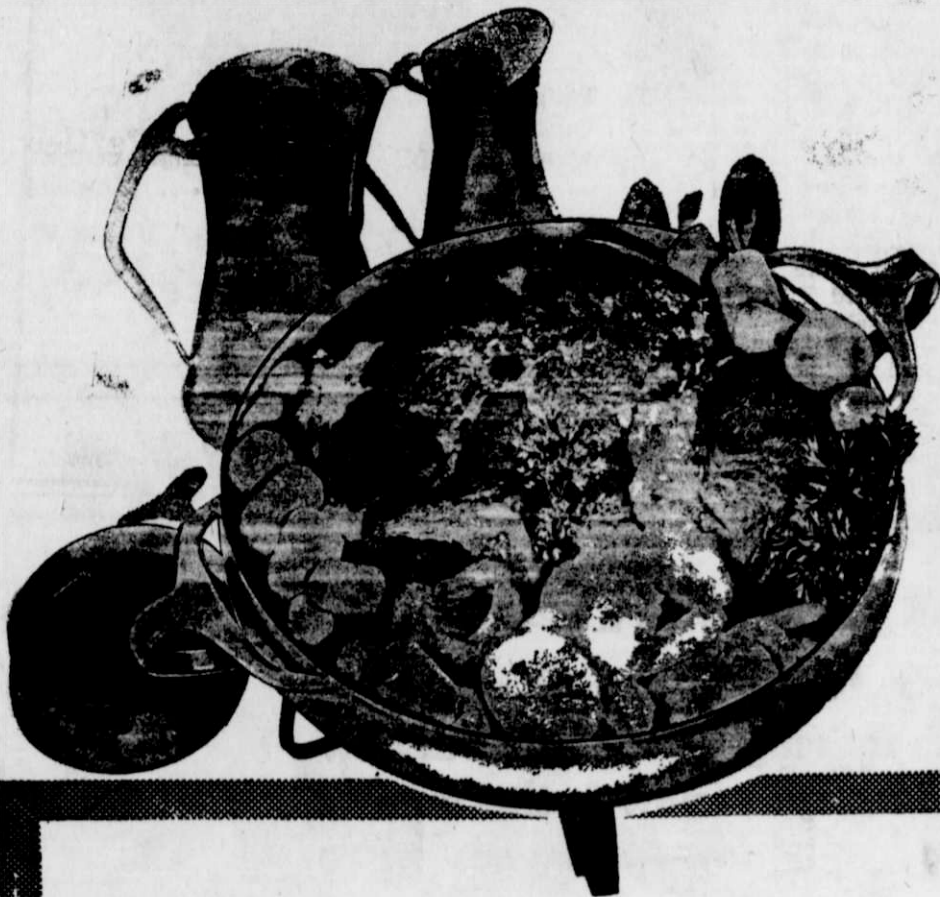
