## Four Candidates Vie for Three School Board Posts

### ANNUAL MEETING, BUDGET HEARING MONDAY EVENING

On Monday, July 28, from 1 to 8 p. m. at the Kewaskum Community High school cafeteria, an election will be held to determine the election of three members for three year terms on the Kewaskum Community Schools' school board. All qualified electors in the district are urged to cast their ballots.

The election will be followed by the budget hearing and annual school meeting of the district at 8 p. m.

The following information is presented for the information of the electors with the candidates presented in alphabetical order:

**MRS. JUNE E. BERG**—Mrs. Berg is a resident of the Town of Kewaskum, is the mother of six children, is a high school graduate and has attended college for two years. Of her candidacy Mrs. Berg says, "As the mother of a large family I am interested in their education. Through a good education system the community becomes a better place to live."

**JOHN A. JADRO**—Mr. Jadro is a resident of the Town of Scott. He operates Burckhardt Electric Inc. in the Village of Kewaskum. Mr. Jadro has served as the clerk of the Beechwood School Board for 4 years and served as a member of the Cooperative Educational Service Agency Board of Control. Mr. Jadro has served as clerk of the Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. School District No. 2 for the past three years, since re-organization took place in July, 1966. Of his candidacy Mr. Jadro says, "With costs continually rising we must find ways of economizing without sacrificing the quality of our children's education."

**GERALD SECOR**—Mr. Secor grew up on a farm in Iowa, attended a rural school, high school and Iowa State University, graduating in 1948 in electrical engineering after two years in the army. He is past president of the Farmington PTO and was clerk of the Farmington School District prior to K-12 reorganization. Mr. Secor has 4 daughters, pre-school, 8th grade, 10th grade and a college freshman and 2 sons, one in 4th grade and one in 7th grade. Of his candidacy he says, "I've taken an active interest in school affairs since moving to this community 7 years ago. My industrial training and concern with school matters would aid in making me an effective school board member. I'm anxious that our children and all children in the district receive the best possible preparation for the future through as good a school system as we can provide."

**ALLEN A. TESSAR**—Mr. Tessar, a resident of the Village of Kewaskum, is a high school graduate and has attended three years of college and night classes at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. He has been employed at Regal Ware, Inc. for twenty years and his present position is credit manager. Mr. Tessar is married and has three children, ages 17, 15 and 9. In addition to being a school board member for the Ke-

waskum Community Schools since 1966, Mr. Tessar has served in the past on the church council of Peace church, Kewaskum, and held membership with the American Legion, Kewaskum Little League and Kiwanis. He also served as a Boy Scout leader. Of his candidacy, Mr. Tessar says, "To give our children the best available education for the most reasonable expense."

## School Board Okays Budget Of \$1,553,266.02

A 1969-70 budget totaling \$1,553,266.02 which calls for an estimated tax levy of \$1,024,626.75 has been approved by the board of education of Kewaskum Community schools.

The proposed budget, up \$236,229 over last year, will be presented for approval of district electors at the annual meeting at the Kewaskum High school at 8 p. m. on Monday, July 28. The tax levy is \$56,396 higher.

The board, in figuring anticipated receipts that the budget lists at \$483,639.27, based its figures on a state aid guarantee of \$42,000 behind each student. However, should that figure change after the state legislature settles on a state aid formula, the tax levy would also change, according to Superintendent of Schools Marshall H. Boyd. The budget shows a 1969-70 mill rate of \$19.85 compared with \$20.67 last year. Boyd said the equalized value of the district increased by about \$5 million.

Of the proposed budget total, \$53,900 is allotted for administration, an increase of \$8,247 over last year; instruction \$880,314, up \$132,843; pupil transportation, \$167,775, an increase of \$42,075; operation of plant \$108,080, up \$8,030; maintenance of plant \$19,153, down \$4,587; fixed charges \$43,607, up \$8,357; debt service \$155,635, up \$17,502 which includes \$15,000 debt retirement for swimming pool; capital outlay \$109,300, up \$23,361; community services \$1,000, down \$100.

Two items of expense retained the 1968-69 figures. They are food services at \$5,000 and student body activities at \$9,000. Outgoing transfer accounts are listed at \$500. There was none in the previous budget.

The budget also shows a transfer from operational balance in the amount of \$45,000 toward payment of three relocatable classrooms.

Of particular interest this year at the annual meeting may be the recommendation for sites and future building expansion.

### SUPPLEMENTAL CLASSROOMS OPEN FOR PUBLIC INSPECTION

The three supplemental classrooms which will be used for kindergarten next year will be open for public inspection on Monday, July 28, from 8:00 a. m. to 7:00 p. m.

Daily and weekly newspapers throughout the state provide scholarships for many students.

The teenagers, in addition to studying the broad area of mass communications and the function of the press in democracy, publish a workshop newspaper.

## Local Exchange Student Writes From Bolivia

### ANNE EDWARDS TELLS OF TRIP, LIFE IN LA PAZ

Mr. and Mrs. Richard L. Edwards, 331 Forest ave., Kewaskum, received a letter from their daughter Anne, 17, who is spending the summer in La Paz, Bolivia, representing the United States as an American Field Service participant in the Americans Abroad program. Her letter follows:

July 1st  
What a switch! After my second call home I found that plans had changed again and instead of flying directly to La Paz we were going to spend one day and night in Lima, Peru.

In Lima I lived with a great family of 4 girls. The mother helped me with my Spanish and I tried practicing with my two youngest sisters. They gave me a beautiful silver cup for my birthday and that night one of the girls took me to see Lima at night. Two boys came with us. We toured the streets and then ate a Peruvian dinner in a Chinese restaurant and saw Peru's top female singer.

The next day we flew to La Paz, Bolivia. During the flight we saw Lake Titicaca - clear and beautiful and flew over the Andes. Then La Paz, with reporters everywhere and the 6 of us students trying to adjust to the altitude (12,000 ft.). I only had a few moments of dizziness but some of the others were quite sick. After checking our baggage—on to the families.

My whole family was smiling and had thousands of freckles—quite contrary to their pictures. Carimina, my sister, gave me some flowers and off we went to our house in a "trufi" taxi. We take them all the time — no car. That night we went to a "Pena" — hootenany and really had fun. Tried my first Bolivian cocktail — fruit juice and "pisco" — strong stuff.

My sisters, Maria and Margoth and I went home accompanied by Jorge Mercado, Maria's boy friend, Chalo, Margoth's boy friend, and another Jorge. Maria and I share a room and we had just gotten into bed when suddenly there was music below the window. Outside were 7 guys serenading me for my birthday. They sang 10 songs and then I invited them in for cake and wine — customary. The rest of the AFS students and friends also came and we danced and sang until 3 a. m. We learned the "Queca," native dance, and others. Had a fabulous time.

The food is great and different! There is fruit every meal and some so strange. My mother is Italian so we have some Italian specialties. The big meal is lunch with three courses. Their is also a tea time at 4 or 5 o'clock. Bread every meal and always both hands on the table. We have a maid Rosa but we have to make our own beds. They tell me that I can eat without worry as the altitude will cause me to lose weight - finally.

The kids are all great but "Oso," my little brother, talks a lot. Papa is an agriculture economist and is leaving next week for Lima for a conference about beginning the sale of rice from Bolivia. The weather is always

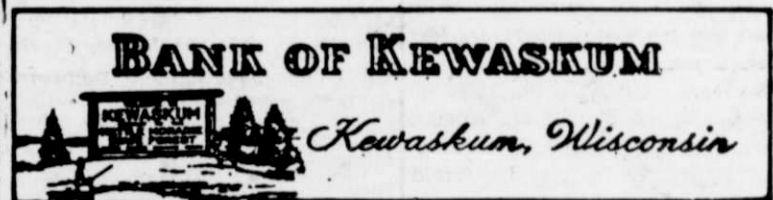

## County Democrats Have Booth at Fair

### ANNOUNCE ACTIVITIES AND POLICY STATEMENT

A renewed and re-invigorated Washington County Democratic Party is breaking tradition this week with its first non-election-year activities held at a county fair in many years. At the Washington County Fair in Slinger (July 24-27), local Democrats are undertaking a number of more "community-minded" activities at a booth in the large exhibitors' tent.

With the addition of a variety of new local people and the largest membership in the 6th Congressional district, the county Democratic unit, under the direction of Chairman Lee Eichstedt, hopes to focus more efforts on "community service." Citing a greater need than ever for all citizens to understand and truly control their government, the local party plans to bring more information to the people as well as being a rallying point for efforts toward government reform.

Highlighting activities at the fair is a "legislative resource service" to help overcome the loss of Washington county's representation in the state senate because of State Senator Frank Panzer's (R-Brownsville) unfortunate illness. This "legislative resource service" is designed to give Washington county residents a direct

voice in the affairs of state government by bringing prominent Democratic legislators to the people. Commitments to attend the fair have already been received from Senate Minority Leader Fred Risser (D-Madison), State Senator Martin J. Schreiber (D-Milwaukee) and Assembly Minority Leader Robert Huber (D-Milwaukee).

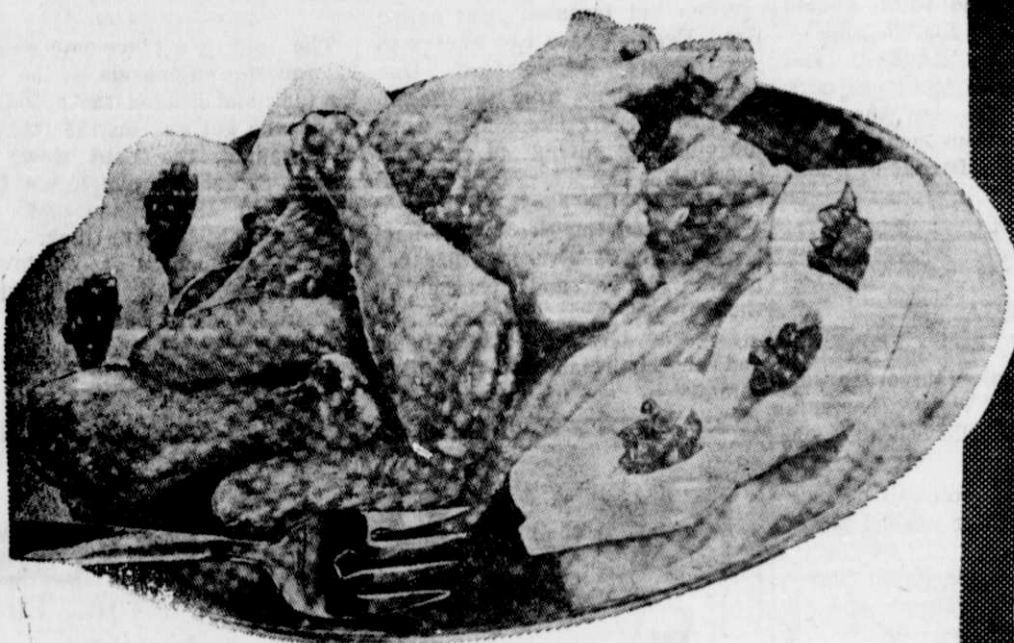

# Kewaskum Wins WIAA Regional Meet at West Bend, Advances to Sectional Meet at Valders

## Indians Oust West Bend Badgers 4-1, Random Lake 15-2

### BOB FELLEZ LIMITS WEST BEND TO 3 HITS

The Kewaskum Indians, runnersup in the Scenic Moraine conference, with a 7-3 record, reached new heights by winning the WIAA Regional tournament Saturday afternoon at Regner city park diamond in West Bend. After ousting West Bend, 4-1, in their opening game of the meet, the Indians went on to blast Random Lake in the championship finals, 15-2.

The victory enabled Coach Walt Bade's team to advance to the Sectional tournament being held at Valders (near Manitowoc) on Thursday and Friday evenings of this week. Kewaskum was scheduled to face Kiel at 5 p. m. Thursday in the opening game of the Sectional, with Valders playing Campbellsport, (which gained a berth in the Sectional on a protest after losing in the Regional), in the second contest at 8 p. m. The two winners will play for the Sectional title Friday at 8 p. m. Winner of the Sectional will be one of four finalists in the WIAA state finals to be played at West Bend July 30-31.

It took Kewaskum a day and a half to beat West Bend in the Regional. The reason it took so long was the rainfall Thursday night. After Random Lake had defeated Slinger, 8-6, in the first game Thursday, the Indians were leading West Bend, 3-1, in the last half of the fifth inning of the second game when the rains came.

Time out had been called after Bob Nehrbass of the Badgers had been beamed by the Indians Bob Fellenz to open the inning. The ball hit Nehrbass just under the helmet, just missing his temple. He was taken to the hospital and was reported OK and released. Meanwhile the game was called because of rain and resumed from this point at 10 a. m. Saturday. West Bend got another runner on base with one away but was unable to score. Again the Badgers failed to score in the 6th and 7th innings, while Kewaskum was adding one run, to bring the final score to 4-1.

Fellenz was the winning pitcher, going all the way and allowing the Badgers only three hits, two of them to Tom Mayer. Fellenz struck out nine and walked two. He also helped his own cause with two hits. Perry Koth likewise collected two hits for the Indians. Kewaskum garnered seven hits off Bob Weis, including a double by outfielder Tom Staehler. It was 1-1 after the first inning and Kewaskum's decisive two-run third frame featured consecutive singles by Ron Theusch, Koth and Dan

Marx.

In the championship game Saturday afternoon Kewaskum buried Random Lake, 15-2, doing most of the damage in the big 11-run fifth inning. Ram pitchers had trouble finding the strike zone in this frame, giving up five walks. The Indians collected 11 hits off of two Ram pitchers and ran Random Lake dizzy around the bases with their 11 runs in the fifth. Almost everybody got on base as the Indians batted almost twice around.

Jim Tessar swatted a triple and single for the winners, while Perry Koth, brother Randy Koth and Fellenz each collected two hits. Clark Eichstedt, a sophomore, who particularly excels in basketball, also pitched a fine three hitter against the Rams as Kewaskum's pitchers were very stingy in the meet. It was Clark's first victory for the Indians and he is sure to see much action next season. After Kewaskum had sewed up the victory, freshman Tom Theusch came in to pitch the last inning and also checked the Rams.

Past champions all have already been eliminated in the Regionals in the WIAA's fifth summer baseball tournament program which awaits determination this week in the Sectionals of the four teams which will play in the State meet at West Bend. Kewaskum faced Kiel Thursday and with a win would play in the finals tonight.

Sectional play is taking place at four sites this week among the winners of 16 Regional tournaments. This is the schedule:

At Bangor—Eleva-Strum vs. Independence and Bangor vs. Melrose-Mindoro. At Brookfield Central—Cedarburg vs. Darlington and Brookfield Central vs. Hamilton. At Grantsburg—Grantsburg vs. Hurley and Amery vs. Medford. At Valders—Kewaskum vs. Kiel (5 p. m.) and Campbellsport vs. Valders (8 p. m.).

Trempealeau won the championship last year but lost its opener in the Regional this year. New Holstein won the first title in 1965 but was upset this year by Kiel (Kewaskum's opponent). The 1966 winner, Brown Deer, lost in the Regional finals to Hamilton and the 1967 winner, Platteville, was a first round victim of Darlington. Not only last year's champion, Trempealeau, but the other State meet teams of a year ago have been eliminated, including runnerup Plymouth, Menomonee Falls and Arcadia.

There were 59 schools in Regional competition this year.

Schultz of the losers also did a commendable job but was nicked for 11 hits, while fanning nine and giving up six bases on balls.

Mark Heise was the batting hero of the game with three hits and also scored a run and batted in the winning run in the 13th inning. Klahn led off the 13th with a single and was sacrificed by Geidel. ## Big Mosquito Year?

### Heavy Rains And Floods Create Problems

Heavy rains and flooding conditions in many parts of the nation have created conditions which can lead to mosquito problems. Pools of standing water, backwater areas of rivers and streams, as well as drainage ditches, provide ideal mosquito-breeding areas. If uncontrolled, the mosquito population can soar, causing human discomfort and a possible disease problem.

Many communities have found that area-wide clean-up programs of weeds and standing water are helpful in providing some measure of control. Clean-up itself, however, is not enough. Application of mosquito control chemicals is a vital factor in any effective control program.

Millions of mosquito larvae scattered across hundreds of thousands of acres of wet land constitute a serious disease threat. While mosquito-free outdoor living is one of the benefits of an effective control program, more important is the welfare of humans—the fact that mosquitoes often carry deadly disease such as encephalitis. Systematic control programs serve to prevent outbreaks of encephalitis and other disease.

Effective mosquito control depends upon the selection of the right insecticide. There are three significant factors which mosquito control experts look for in their selection of insecticides. The chemical must be effective; it must be economical, and it should not persist in soil or water thereby creating a hazard to humans and wildlife.

District mosquito control experts, and others vitally concerned with the need for control, have found two insecticides which meet these requirements. Both Abate for the control of mosquito larvae and a premium grade of malathion called Cythion, for larvae and adult mosquito control, have been used effectively in such widely scattered areas as Texas, the Carolinas, the mid-West and the Gulf Coast States.



Abate is a well-tested but comparatively new product. It is an effective and selective larvicide with an extremely low hazard factor to all forms of wildlife. This insecticide is available in liquid or granular form. Its low rate of application and lack of persistence have placed it high on the recommended list. In fact it is accepted for use in mosquito control in fish and wildlife refuges where its low toxicity and lack of persistency are required features.

The second insecticide, Cythion, applied as a spray, is primarily an adulticide but effectively controls larvae, as well as adult mosquitoes. It has low toxicity to both humans and wildlife. In fact since it breaks down so rapidly, it is ideal for use in and around areas of high population concentrations where an immediate knock-down of adult mosquitoes is

desired. Of special importance to mosquito control officials is the total cost per person for a control program. While it is difficult to place a value on disease control prevention programs, mosquito control officials look for effective but economical control. In the Minneapolis-St. Paul district control has been achieved for 50 cents per person per year. On the West Coast, the Lane County, Oregon, control program was accomplished at a cost of only 37 cents per individual using these two insecticides.

An over-abundance of water has created a potential serious mosquito problem in most areas of the nation. To be on the safe side an intensive mosquito control program is a must in all areas where there has been excessive water this spring.
