179 Attend School District Meeting; Tax Rate Drop Accepted in Budget

Purchase of Parcels Of Land From Bilgo, Backhaus Approved

TESSAR, JADRO, SECOR ARE ELECTED TO BOARD

At the annual meeting of Kewaskum Community Schools Joint District No. 2 held Monday night, 179 electors of the district and all school board members were present. An equal number of electors attended the budget hearing which preceded the meeting in the high school multi-purpose room.

Electors approved a budget totaling \$868,991.34 for the 1969-70 school year. The budget calls for a tax rate of \$19.85 per \$1,000 equalized valuation compared with \$20.67 last year. However, the tax rate may have to be adjusted after the state legislature settles on a state aid formula, it was pointed out.

Richard L. Edwards, board chairman, was nominated to serve as chairman for the budget hearing, which he opened. The annual meeting was called to order by Edwards, but in the election of the temporary chairman, Norbert Dettman, an elector of the town of Farmington, won out over Edwards by a hand vote of 76 to 70.

Also by a hand vote of 153 to 5, electors approved a resolution authorizing the school board to purchase a parcel of land from August C. Bilgo and another parcel from Howard Backhaus for expansion purposes of the present high school site to the Milwaukee river north and east of the present school. About 35 acres of land are involved for an approximate total cost of \$45,200.

The purchase price of the land behind the school is \$2,100 per acre while that nearer the river will be purchased for \$800 per acre for an average cost per acre of \$1,291. The land has not yet been surveyed and final prices will depend upon exact acreage. It is felt in the proposed expansion of the present site, there can be a saving of from \$36,000 to \$54,000 in site development costs. The present facilities can be shared.

A committee composed of Charles Miller, Mrs. Alvin Panzer, Myron Perschbacher, Gerald Secor and Alfred Seefeldt has made a study for one year of the matter of obtaining a site. During that time, nearly a dozen sites were considered. Each site was visited and after advice from the Southeast Planning Commission, State Department of Public Instruction, highway department and an architectural firm, the committee's recommendation was that the expansion of the present site is the most logical. Included in their recommendation is that the expanded site be used to develop a future combination junior-senior high school (grades 7-12) or middle and secondary school (grades 6-12).

A resolution setting the annual salary of school board members at \$400 was also approved by electors. This is an increase of \$100 over last year. The board held 38

meetings plus teacher contract negotiation meetings last year.

In the election held on the day of the annual meeting to fill three school board posts, Allen Tessar of Kewaskum and John Jadro of the town of Scott were re-elected to the board and Gerald Secor of the town of Farmington was elected as a new member to succeed James D. Reigle, who was not a candidate for re-election. A total of 234 votes were cast with Tessar getting 195 votes, Jadro 181, Secor 146 and Mrs. Elwood Berg 129.

A complete summary of the minutes of the school meeting and budget hearing will be published in the next issue of the paper.

Attend Party for Wittman, Retiring Airport Manager

Mr. and Mrs. Hubert Wittman of here attended a dinner for the former's brother, S. J. Wittman, at the former Winnebago County Airport, Oshkosh, Saturday. A weekend retirement party was held Saturday and Sunday for Wittman, who served as manager of the airport for 38 years. The name of the airport was also renamed S. J. Wittman Airport in honor of his many years of service.

Wittman received a retirement party in the form of a gathering of various kinds of aircraft from as far away as California. The event attracted an estimated 20,000 spectators, including international guests. Wittman's flying friends from around the world, the Oshkosh Chamber of Commerce and citizens throughout the Fox River valley honored him with a two-day spectacular air show, receptions, cocktail parties, champagne breakfast and the big dinner Saturday night attended by more than 900 persons.

Wittman, 65, an internationally known racer, has been rated the nation's best midget pilot for the last 30 years by the National Race Pilots association. He won 10 top awards and broke several speed records in 1934 alone. The new airport manager, Michael Brock, said Sunday's ceremonies included 1,300 plane take-offs and landings, a record for the Oshkosh field, and a heavier pace than that of busy O'Hare International Airport in Chicago. Wittman led off the show in his Bonzo II, which he helped build in 1948 and which won Milwaukee air races last season. He has been flying since 1924 and his pilot's license is signed by Orville Wright. He was cited in 1966 by the Society of Experimental Test Pilots with an honorary membership for his contributions to aeronautics.

The annual business meeting was opened with the pledge of allegiance to the flag. Flag bearer was Army Sgt. Steward Holly, Plymouth, home on convalescent leave after being wounded in Vietnam in June, 1969.

Cyril Wieter, village president, was present to welcome the reunion and to extend greetings on behalf of the village. The Seefeldt reunion has met in the village park for the past 28 years. A congratulatory message from the president of the Wisconsin State Genealogical Society was read to the group. Messages of greeting were also read from family members not able to attend.

Regal Ware, Inc., Kewaskum, manufacturer of cookware and electrical appliances, announced that it has acquired controlling interest in the National Aluminum Manufacturing Company of Peoria, Ill., a producer of aluminum castings.

According to James D. Reigle, president of the twenty-four year old Wisconsin firm, the transaction will enable Regal Ware to enter new product and marketing areas.

National Aluminum has approximately 75 employees at its plant in Peoria and has been headed by its present management since 1939. It will continue to do business in Peoria under the National name. W. A. Mitchener, son of former President W. D. Mitchener, will continue as vice-president and general manager of the company. W. D. Mitchener will serve on the new board of directors and in a consulting capacity.

Local Bicyclist Is Hit by Car, 6 Hurt In Other Accidents

Forgue, 23, of Sheboygan, traveling west on STH 28 about five miles west of Kewaskum got off the blacktop on the right side, veered across the roadway into the ditch and then back across the road into the opposite ditch and struck an embankment at 6:32 a. m. Sunday. The driver was removed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, in the Kewaskum firemen's ambulance. She was charged with violating an instruction permit.

Five persons were hurt in two separate accidents on Hwy. 144 shortly before 10 p. m. Sunday. The first mishap occurred at about 9:50 p. m. and the second shortly after at the scene of the original crash when three cars piled up in stopping for the original accident.

Involved in the original mishap
