At the annual meeting of Kewaskum Community Schools Joint District No. 2 held Monday night, 179 electors of the district and all school board members were present. An equal number of electors attended the budget hearing which preceded the meeting in the high school multi-purpose room.

Electors approved a budget totaling \$868.991.34 for the 1969-70 school year. The budget calls for a tax rate of \$19.85 per \$1,000 equalized valuation compared with \$20.67 last year. However, the tax rate may have to be adjusted after the state legislature settles on a state aid formula, it was pointed of here attended a dinner for the out

Richard L. Edwards, board chairman, was nominated to serve as chairman for the budget hearing, which he opened. The annual held Saturday and Sunday for meeting was called to order by Edwards, but in the election of the temporary chairman, Norbert Dettman, an elector of the town of Farmington, won out over Edwards by a hand vote of 76 to 70. vice.

Also by a hand vote of 153 to 5, electors approved a resolution authorizing the school board to purchase a parcel of land from August C. Bilgo and another parcel from Howard Backhaus for expansion purposes of the present high school site to the Milwaukee from around the world, the Oshriver north and east of the present school. About 35 acres of land are involved for an approximate total cost of \$45,200.

CAKE WITH PARTY GLAMOUR

Lemon Meringue Poppy Seed Cake

1 package Swans Down Lemon **Flake Cake Mix** 3 tablespoons poppy seeds

**Rich Lemon Filling** Meringue Topping

Prepare cake mix as directed on package, adding poppy seeds before beating. Bake in a 13 x 9-inch pan which has been greased and floured or lined on bottom with wax paper. Cool. Meanwhile, make Rich Lemon Filling. Spread 1/2-inch border of Meringue Topping around edge of cooled cake. Fill center with lemon filling; then top with remaining meringue. Place under broiler until lightly browned. Serve at once. Makes 15 pervings.

Rich Lemon Filling. Combine 1 package (3-1/4 oz.) lemon pudding and pie filling, 2/3 cup sugar, and 1/2 cup water in a saucepan. Add 4 slightly beaten egg yolks; blend well. Add 2 cups water. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a full boll. Remove from heat; cool. Makes about 2-3/4 cups.

Meringue Topping. Beat 4 egg whites with 1/8 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar until foamy throughout. Add 1/3 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons at a time, beating thoroughly after each addition. Continue beating until mixture will form stiff shiny peaks.
