Charles Miller Elected Village Trustee by Board

NAMED AFTER 7 BALLOTS TO FILL UNEXPIRED TERM

At a meeting of village board members held Monday night, Charles Miller was elected to fill an unexpired term as a village trustee. Miller formerly held office as village president for more than 13 years, from April 1942, until November, 1955.

The seat on the village board is one vacated by Cyril Wieter, who was appointed village president after the resignation of Carl Freehauf, who was elected to office in the spring election. Miller's term will run until the spring election in 1971. Board members balloted seven times Monday night to break a tie vote between Miller and Gregor Nigh for the office.

Six persons made written applications for the trustee office, namely Wallace Cudnohoske, Earl DuBois, Vincent Groh, Miller, Nigh and Richard Zaring. Their names were placed in alphabetical order and numbered one through six.

President Wieter and the five trustees were instructed to vote for three candidates by number. The three receiving the fewest votes would be dropped.

On the first ballot, Nigh received five votes, Miller four, Cudnohoske and Zaring two each, and DuBois one. On the second ballot, on which they were instructed to vote for two, a three-way tie resulted between Groh, Miller and Nigh. On the third ballot to break the tie, Groh was eliminated, Miller had four votes and Nigh five. On the next six ballots, Miller and Nigh each got three votes and on the final ballot, Miller had five votes, Nigh one. On two occasions during the tie-breaking voting, the trustees called for a recess to hold a caucus in an adjoining room.

In other business at the meeting the board approved a traffic "yield" sign at the corner of Clinton st. and Roseland dr., temporarily withheld an application from Ferdinand Weiland, R. 3, Campbellsport, for a building permit for a home in Country View subdivision, approved purchase of \$500 in street decorations for use during the Christmas season, approved a sign at the village dump to inform the public of hours it is open, authorized Supt. of Public Works Armin Oppermann to attend a conference on sanitary landfill at Madison Aug. 13-14, and approved the installation of a street light on Stark st.

One scheduled item, "appointment of a new police officer," did not come up for discussion.

Krazy Daze Attracts Record Crowds



The annual Krazy Daze sidewalk sale and fun day in Kewaskum Tuesday was attended by record crowds, especially early in the morning and later on in the evening when the live music and merriment got under way. Hot, ideal weather helped make the event, which grows bigger every year, a great success.

Bargain hunters came throughout the day, many of them before the official opening at 9 a. m. A large proportion of the shoppers were from outlying areas and neighboring towns. In addition to the display racks and counters of sale items, there was plenty of carnival type atmosphere produced by the bratwurst and hamburger cookouts, corn on the cob, various other foods, such as beef and ham sandwiches, rosettes and baked goods, ice cream cones, game and refreshment stands. Besides the numerous business counters, organizations, churches, clubs and individuals also operated stands selling rummage items, balloons, "white elephant" items,

produce, etc.

Large crowds came back in the evening for the fun part of the festivities with live music furnished by two orchestras at two points. The merriment and dancing continued long after the street sale until the wee hours. Everyone seemed to enjoy themselves.

Anne Edwards, 17, who is spending the summer in La Paz, Bolivia, representing the United States as an American Field Service participant in the Americans Abroad program, sent more letters; to her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Richard L. Edwards, 331 Forest ave., Kewaskum. Her letters follow:

7-15-69

The Independence Day of La Paz is tomorrow. The whole city strung with lights — great festival. Big parade. — Remember El Prado? Well, its held every Sunday morning in the Plaza El Prado. All the youth and a few older people walk around the plaza meeting new people and seeing old friends. Afterwards Jorge, Maria's fiance, takes us to eat saltenas — excellent stuff. Something like turned over pastry but with a vegetable like filling.

There are 4 of us AFS students in La Paz and 2 in Cochobamba. The guys here are both from California and Marta from Georgia. Both kids in Cochobamba are from New York. Because Maria's university has vacation now I'm going to a Catholic girls high school with Margoth. I'm in "sexto" class—senior—I guess. Sister Maria sits with me and we really have a riot. She tries to learn English and me Spanish. Had to teach my first English class. The book is really good but

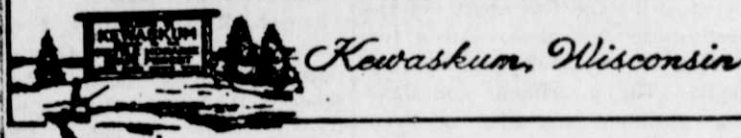

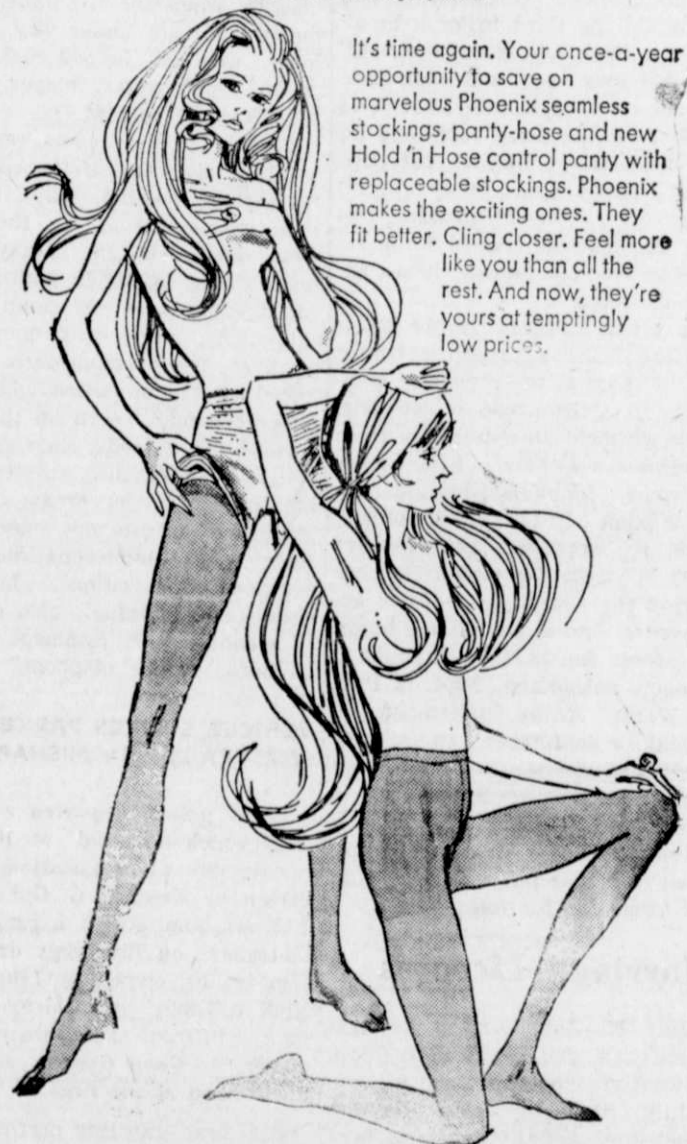

 some of the sentences are terrible. I'm learning a lot. Wish I could stay longer because my Spanish is really improving. Going to school here isn't a must so I stay home in the afternoon and usually some guys and girls come to talk, listen to records, talk some more and have the customary "tea time." Life is quite different here. When a party is set for 7 p. m. no one shows up until 8 or 9 p. m.

It's really cold here. But during the middle of the day it's hot—sunburn type. Went to a soccer game against Chile with Oso and my father. It was great but they sure get wild — the spectators I mean.

Down here they really eat the entire cow. The other night we had cow's stomach for supper. Tastes sort of like mushrooms. At least that's what I thought when I ate them. We have monkey meat, too.

The Americans I have met here are very false. Something should be done. The Bolivians don't like them.

was really cool because we sometimes hear about this happening but never quite believe it. Bolivia won, 3-1. The game against Peru is the final for the Al Mundial championship and is supposed to be very exciting.

The moon business was big stuff here but there isn't any TV so no one saw the men on the moon. They had a radio going in the Prado. It was more fun watching the people get excited than to listen to the flight itself.

Went mountain climbing the other day. Hit 12,000 ft. It was so beautiful I could see all of La Paz. After eating we were sitting around a bonfire when a man walked up yelling "ICE CREAM." I couldn't believe it. It took us nearly 2 hours of hard climbing to reach the spot and here was a guy heckling us to buy ice cream.

Met the Bolivian girl who was in Milwaukee last year and in Kewaskum for the AFS weekend. She saw Manzar in Washington, D.C. and was surprised to see me in Bolivia.

My arm is ready to drop off so will close.

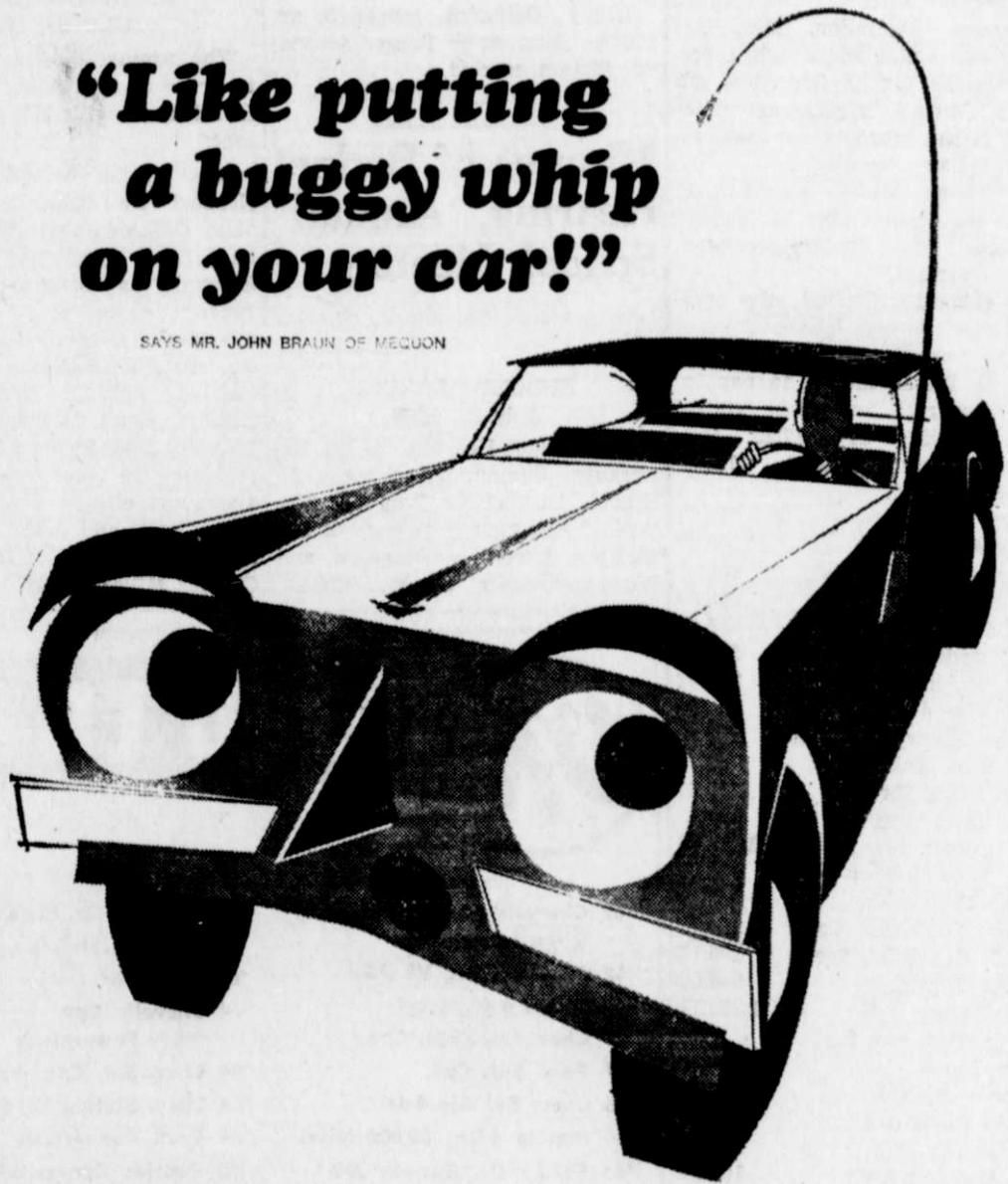
