high school as a senior during the 1969-70 school year. She will make her home with the Earl Buswell family at 1222 Meadow Lane. The Buswells have two daughters, Peggy and Beth, and a son, Terry. He is a high school teacher.

The following information was received by Mrs. L. N. Peterson, local AFS chapter president, in a letter from Miss Dawe:

Bristol is located in the south-eastern part of England. Bristol is much the same as other cities except we have the open spaces for leisure and are only nine miles from the seaside and two miles from the countryside. Being only a 70 mile radius, it is much smaller than the cities you know or others in England. Bristol is not so drab as some of the other cities, having many very large parks with boating lakes. There are many tennis courts and bowling greens. They also have the "Downs" which is acres of grassland on top of a gorge which is crossed by Clifton Suspension.

Like Wisconsin we have a river near where coarse-fishing and boating takes place.

Janthea will be 17 years old in October and has a twin brother, Ellis. She also has a twin brother and sister who are 12 years old. Clifford Dawe, her father, is an engineer by trade, building various types of machinery and maintaining them. Gwen Dawe, her mother, is a tailoress and apart from looking after the home does hold a part-time job from 9 to 4 with a firm manufacturing ladies' foundation garments.

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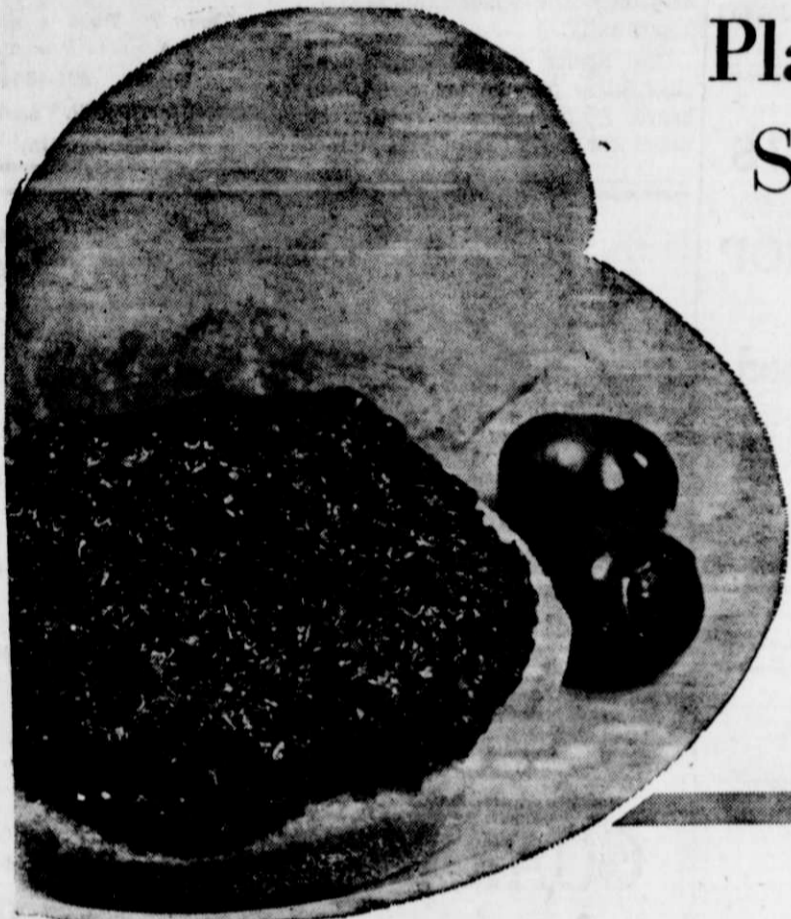

PROPOSAL ACCEPTED FOR SEAL COATING STREETS

Mr. Flynn was informed that the assessor has always taken the attitude that the application of siding is considered maintenance and not an improvement and therefore should not effect the assessed valuation.

The engineering contract of Stone and Robinson was tabled pending clarification of some of the provisions.

Mr. Otto Giese was engaged as the attendant at the village dump at a salary of \$2.00 per hour and said dump to be open to village residents only on Wednesdays from 1:00 p. m. to 5:00 p. m. and on Saturdays from 9:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m. effective upon publication of proper notice. Trustee Yoost reported that the semi-annual inspection of all village owned property has been completed and a copy of corrections to be made was given to all department heads.

Two proposals for the seal coating of existing blacktopped streets were received and tabulated as follows:

Scott Construction Co. — Lake Delton — 16c per sq. yd.
Reliance Construction Co. — Sheboygan — 35c per sq. yd.

Upon motion made, seconded and duly carried, the board accepted the proposal of Scott Construction Co. to seal coat the streets recommended by the Superintendent of Public Works.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in adjourned session in the Council Room at 8:00 p. m. to conduct a public hearing. President Wietor presiding. Trustees Herriges, Yoost and Kral present. Trustees Perschbacher and Behnke absent.

Purpose of the hearing was the proposed abandoning of certain alleys in the village and the abandoning of certain streets in the Bel-Rick subdivision.

Schlaefer was the chapter delegate to the National Red Cross convention at Atlanta, Georgia, May 11-14.

Elected to the vice chairmanship was Lawrence Chase, who served as chapter chairman in 1965-66, and in the past two years as disaster chairman.

Mrs. Egbert Muth and Edwin Junk, Jr., who are serving a second three year term on the board of directors, were re-elected as secretary and treasurer, respectively.

Speaker for the evening was Sherman Carr, Hartford, county Civil Defense severe weather communications officer, and emergency radio communications state officer.

He focused on the efforts of the Environmental Science Services Administration (ESSA) Weather Bur. to provide adequate warning of severe storms. He stressed the importance of Red Cross and other responsible agencies utilizing this information in disaster preparedness measures. Electrical storms are often taken too lightly, and lightning casualties are climbing each year. Caution and paying close attention to official weather bureau forecasts is a must for each individual.

Try Kabobs, Marinated And Grilled In Foil



Grill flavorful, tender shish-kabobs over the coals for an interesting change from the usual outdoor-cooked fare. They'll be moist and flavorful with all the delicious juices sealed in the foil. A succulent delight!

Marinated Lamb Kabobs (Serves 4)

- 1 lb. lean lamb from shoulder or leg

- 4 very small firm tomatoes

- Small clove of garlic
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice,
- 1/2 cup tomato puree
