Tech. Sgt. Charles Dreher Officially Declared Dead by U. S. Air Force

MEMORIAL SERVICES HELD FOR CREW MEMBER OF MISSING AIRCRAFT

Official word was received by Mr. and Mrs. Earl "Pat" Dreher, Kewaskum, this week from the Department of the Air Force, confirming the death of their son, T/Sgt. Charles Dreher, who lost his life in a reconnaissance plane flight June 5 over the Bering sea.

T/Sgt. Dreher was a crew member aboard a Strategic Air Command reconnaissance plane which disappeared June 5 over the Bering sea with 19 men aboard 33 minutes after taking off from Shemya Air Force Station at the tip of the Aleutian Island chain. No further word was ever received of the plane or its crew. Dreher was reported missing at the time.

The letter received by the Dreher family from the Department of the Air Force, Headquarters 55th Strategic Reconnaissance Wing (SAC), Offutt Air Force Base, Nebraska, confirming the death of their son reads as follows:

I regret that the status of your son, Technical Sergeant Charles Dreher, missing since 5 June 1969, has been changed from missing to deceased.

He was a crewmember aboard an RC-135 aircraft on a flight from Shemya Air Force Station, Alaska, to Eielson Air Force Base, Alaska. The route of flight consisted of 2½ hours over the Bering Sea, and 1 hour over the Alaskan land mass. The takeoff out of Shemya was made on schedule at 0700 hours for the 3½ hour flight to Eielson Air Force Base. All systems at the crew positions were functioning properly as evidenced by radio communications with the crew during the takeoff and climb. The pilot reported his position and altitude fifteen minutes after takeoff with all systems operating normally. Thirty minutes after takeoff the pilot informed the ground station that the aircraft was encountering vibration in flight and that the aircraft was under control. The last radio transmission heard from the aircraft was thirty-three minutes after takeoff when the pilot ordered the crew to don their oxygen masks. Thereafter, continuous attempts to contact the aircraft failed to yield a reply. As a result, rescue aircraft commenced an intensive search of the route and the area either side of the track. The search area completely covered the intended flight track and the entire Aleutian Island shoreline totalling 400,000 square miles around the last known position.

The search was officially conducted by the United States Coast Guard, Juneau, Alaska, the Air Rescue Service, Military Airlift Command, Elmendorf Air Force Base, and participating forces from the 6th Strategic Wing, Strategic Air Command, Eielson Air Force Base, Alaska, from 5 June to 14 June 1969. The search forces involved were 20 to 25 aircraft each day, three US Coast Guard cutters and numerous fish-

ing vessels. This force flew 300 individual aircraft sorties and 2,585 flying hours.

The probability of detection in all search areas was over 85% and as high as 99% in the most likely areas. An unofficial search still continues by all aircraft and ships in the area.

In spite of the massive search efforts and all the energies expended there have been no sightings of survivors and no evidence of wreckage or debris. Although there is no conclusive evidence of death, examination of all aspects of the circumstances surrounding the missing aircraft, reveals that the crew could not have survived.

Please accept my sincere sympathy. I am in hopes that you will be comforted by the realization that your son was completely dedicated to his work and his career. I am very proud to have had him as a member of my command.

Attending the services were Mrs. Earl Dreher, Sr. and son John of Kewaskum, Mrs. Bob Stenschke, Mr. and Mrs. Earl Dreher, Jr. and family of West Bend, Jules Dreher of Kenosha, Mr. and Mrs. Reuben Vetter and son Terry of Beechwood.

T/Sgt. Dreher was born Dec. 7, 1938 in Kewaskum and attended local schools. He married Charlene Vetter on June 20, 1959 at Immanuel Lutheran church in the town of Scott. He entered the Air Force in January, 1956, and had served in the Air Force for the past 13 years. His wife and three children, Charles II, Shelli Joe and Carrie, reside at 1401 Main, Bellevue, Nebr.

Besides his wife and three children, T/Sgt. Dreher is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Earl Dreher, Sr. of Kewaskum, his parents-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Reuben Vetter of Beechwood, five brothers, Earl, Jr. of West Bend, Jules of Kenosha, John, David and William at home, and one sister Sharon (Mrs. Robert Stenschke) of West Bend.

Dr. Ray Kluever Accepts Position At U. of Denver

Dr. Raymond C. Kluever, son of Mrs. Norma Kluever of Kewaskum and the late Clarence Kluever, has accepted the position of assistant professor in the Department of Special Education at the University of Denver in Denver, Colo. He will be moving to Denver from Appleton, Wis., and will assume his new duties with the start of the school year.

Dr. Kluever graduated from Kewaskum High school in 1948. He received his B. S. in Education from Wisconsin State College—Milwaukee (now UWM) in 1953. After serving in the U. S. Army from 1953 to 1955, he joined the staff of the Appleton Public Schools. Dr. Kluever received his M.S. in Educational Psychology from the University of Michigan in 1958 and his Ph. D. in Communicative Disorders from Northwestern University in 1968.

In recent years, Dr. Kluever has served as a psychologist in the Appleton Public School system, and was in charge of federally funded programs under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act Title I, Educationally Handicapped, and Title VI, Services for Handicapped Children.

In addition to teaching special education courses at Denver, he will also be coordinating the Learning Disabilities program.

Dr. Kluever, his wife, Marianne, and sons Donald and Kenneth, will be living at 181 W. Acoma Dr., Littleton, Colo.

ENROLLMENT REPRESENTS INCREASE OF 150 PUPILS

The Kewaskum Community Schools will open on Wednesday, Aug. 27, with the Junior and Senior High schools starting at 8:15 and the Elementary schools opening at 8:30. Buses will make a regular run to transport students to and from school on that day. The anticipated enrollment of 1,850 students represents an increase of 150 students from the past school year.

Enrollment in the high school is presently at 634 students, having 172 freshmen, 162 sophomores, 157 juniors, and 142 seniors. The anticipated enrollments for the elementary schools are as follows:

Beechwood 160 — grades 1-3.
Farmington 224 — grades kindergarten, 4-6, Special Education.
Kewaskum 710 — grades kindergarten - 8.
Wayne 130 — grades kindergarten - 5.

Because of the elementary population growth and to eliminate split classes, it has become necessary to transfer pupils in various parts of the district on the following basis:

Sixth graders from the Wayne area will attend school in Kewaskum. Kindergarten, 4th, 5th and 6th graders from Beechwood will attend school at Farmington and 1st, 2nd and 3rd graders from Farmington will attend school in Beechwood. The Beechwood and Farmington children are to get on the regular bus for their area at the usual time and be transported to their area school. Upon arriving at their area school, those that must transfer will board a special shuttle bus to take them to their building of attendance. The time periods of attendance have been adjusted by shortening the lunch and recess periods so that their school day should be approximately the same as in the past.

An information letter was sent to all high school students on our spring enrollment list during the first week in August. All new students who will be transferring to Kewaskum Community High school this fall are urged to register immediately at the high school office.

All seventh graders and high school freshmen will be reporting to their respective schools for an orientation on Tuesday, Aug. 26, at 1:00 p. m. They are expected to provide their own transportation to this meeting. Buses will take students home at 4:00 p. m. on that day. It is very important that all seventh graders and freshmen be present for orientation. The orientation is planned to acquaint them with the teachers, the school, the class schedule, and other class members. Deposits and fees will be collected, lockers and homerooms assigned, and textbooks will be distributed.

The school cafeterias will be in operation on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, Aug. 27, 28 and 29. Students will be able to purchase lunch tickets for this short week for \$1.00 on the first day of school. The normal weekly rate for the lunch program will be \$1.65 and the daily rate has been

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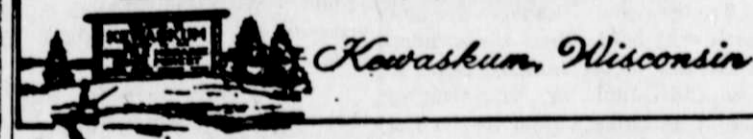

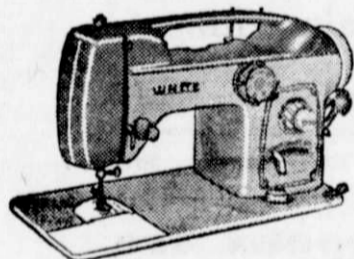
MISS AMANDA STANGE

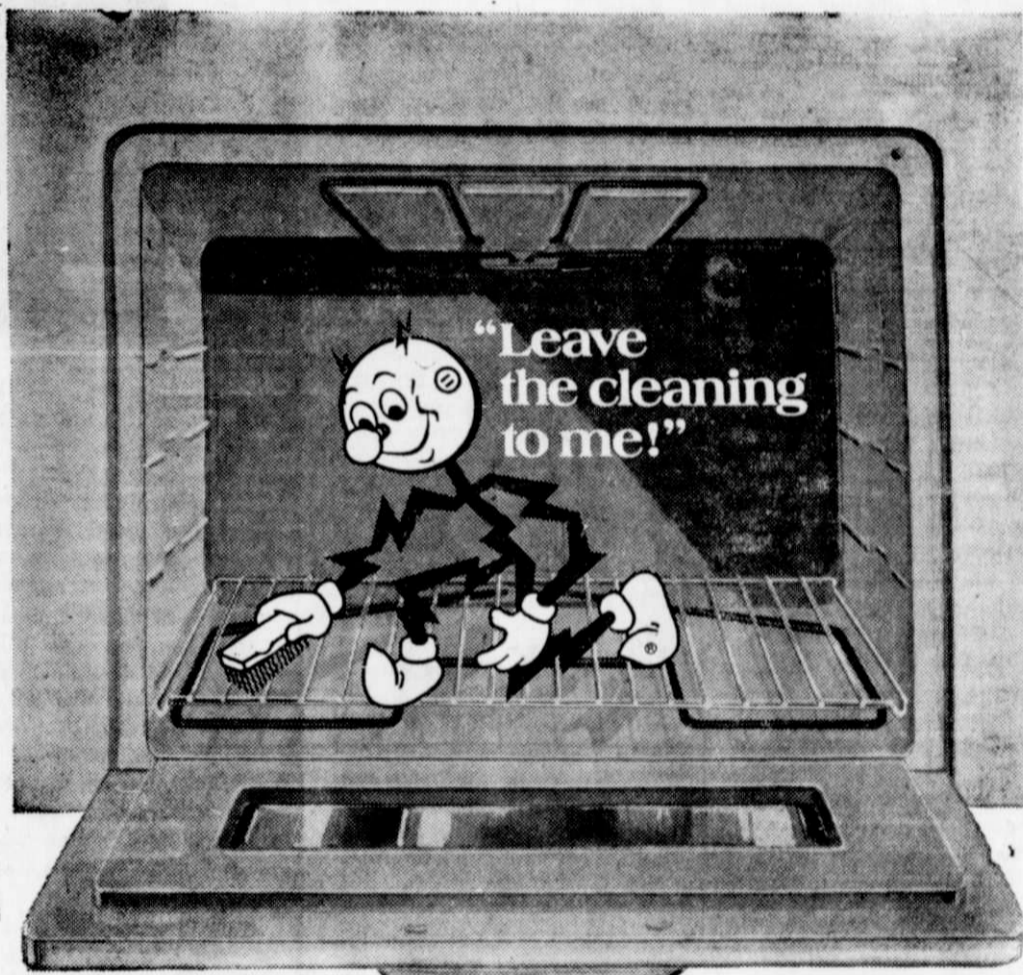

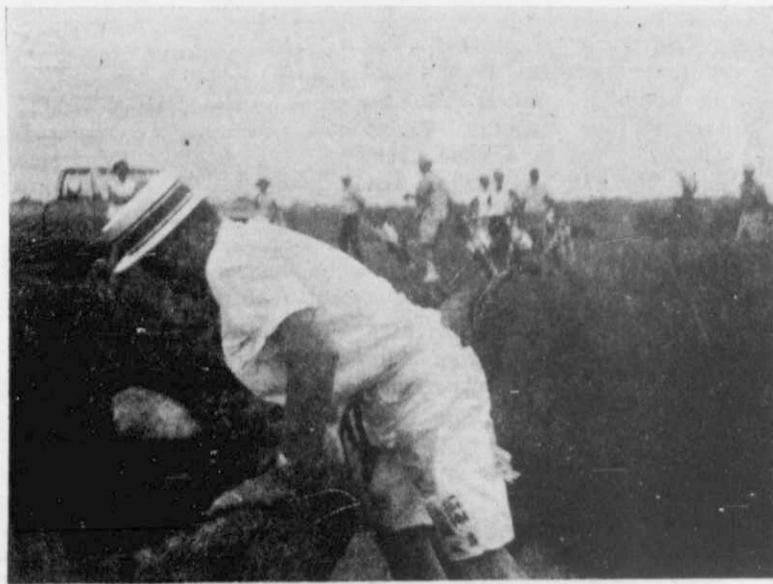

Our Labor Day social event is in the making. "Two Hits and a Miss" will provide music for the dance in the evening. Will know more next week.

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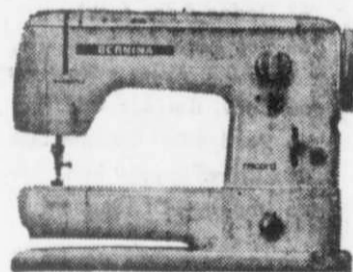
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
