Labor Day Parade, Celebration to Be Held at Kewaskum Park Sunday

Around 80 Units to Enter Parade; Sen. Proxmire to Attend

COUNTY CENTRAL LABOR COUNCIL SPONSORS EVENT

The Washington County Central Labor Council's annual Labor Day parade and celebration, scheduled this year for Kewaskum on Sunday, Aug. 31, is nearing completion. According to the committee chairmen reports, the event will be bigger and better than any of its predecessors with around eighty (80) units entering the parade.

Because of an agreement with Ozaukee County Trades and Labor Council, who will hold their event on Labor Day, Sept. 1, the Washington county parade and celebration will be held on Sunday, Aug. 31, at Kewaskum.

The parade is scheduled to begin promptly at 12:30 p. m. The parade chairman has requested all participating units to begin assembling no later than 11:15 a. m. to assure a prompt start near the high school parking lot and proceeding to Hwy. 45 then to Hwy. 28 and then to the village park.

The event will be continued immediately after the parade at the village park. Master of Ceremonies, Clifford Matchey, will introduce such guests as U. S. Senator Proxmire and others.

Following the introduction of guests there will be music by Arty Minz and The Countrymen, plus refreshments with prizes being given away. Hamburgers and brats will be sold by the Kewaskum firemen on the picnic grounds.

There will be free refreshments for children under twelve (12) who are accompanied by their parents. Parents and anyone over 12 must have the \$1.00 ticket.

Committee members urge area residents to celebrate a slow and safe Labor Day weekend this year by attending the event at Kewaskum on Sunday, Aug. 31.

To Hold Civil War Encampment This Weekend at Bar-N

ORIGINAL CONFEDERATE FLAG TO BE ON DISPLAY

The second Civil War memorial encampment to be held in the state of Wisconsin, sponsored by the Second Wisconsin Volunteer Infantry Association, Inc., will be held at the Bar-N Ranch near Mauthe lake this weekend, Aug. 29-Sept. 1.

The encampment set up will take place on Friday, Aug. 29, at 7 p. m., with official opening ceremonies being held at 12 o'clock noon on Saturday. A sham battle will be enacted on Saturday afternoon, and the evening will be devoted to trading, swapping and movies.

A field service will open the festivities on Sunday morning, Aug. 31. At 2 p. m. the sham battle of the event will be staged, followed by a late afternoon dinner and a military ball in the evening.

A live ammunition skirmish is tentatively scheduled for Monday morning, Sept. 1, and closing ceremonies and the issuance of medals will take place at 12 noon.

Among the prominent guests at the encampment will be Gen. Donald A. Ramsey, commander-in-chief of the Confederate High Command International, an organization dedicated to "keeping a glow the memory of the men in gray." He will bring with him a prized possession — an original Stars and Bars flag of the Confederacy.

The flag was taken with respect from the body of the bearer by Capt. Lewis Benjamin of the Rhode Island heavy artillery, who vowed to return it to the South after the Civil War. It was returned to the American Legion post of St. Petersburg, Fla., and later presented to General Ramsey in appreciation for his work in behalf of the Confederate High Command. It was carried in the Civil War Centennial celebration held at Gettysburg in 1963 by the general's late son, and its appearance at the Bar-N encampment will be the first time it has been seen in this part of the country.

Adequate camping facilities, including electricity, restaurant, bar and indoor and outdoor rest rooms are available at the Bar-N campsite.

Attack Fatal to Woman Wading In Crooked Lake

KEWASKUM RESCUE SQUAD IS CALLED

Sounding of the fire siren at 1:30 p. m. Sunday summoned the Kewaskum fire department rescue squad to Hoeft's Resort at Crooked lake, about 12 miles northeast of the village, where a drowning was reported. Firemen responded with the ambulance and equipment truck.

The victim was Mrs. Pauline Dricken, 63, nee Berres, of 1450 Fond du Lac ave., West Bend. A check by the Statesman on the coroner's report showed that Mrs. Dricken died of a fatal heart attack while wading in the lake, and not by drowning. She apparently suffered the attack while wading or immediately after submerging in the water.

There were numerous swimmers at the lake on the hot day but no one saw Mrs. Dricken go under. Another bather accidentally brushed her body floating near the bottom in about four feet of water while he was swimming out to the raft. He pulled Mrs. Dricken to the surface and carried her onto the beach.

Other swimmers at the beach administered mouth to mouth resuscitation and the Kewaskum rescue squad was called. When they arrived members gave her oxygen and tried other methods to revive her for a length of time. However, she did not respond and their efforts to revive her were unsuccessful. The Sheboygan county coroner pronounced her dead at the scene. She was removed in the ambulance to the Schmidt Funeral home in West Bend.

Mrs. Dricken was on an outing at the lake with her brother and sister-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Tony Berres, of West Bend.

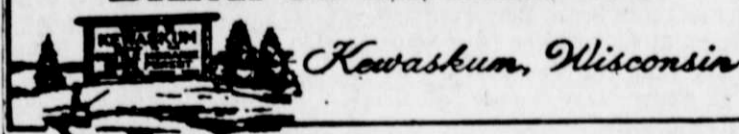

Final Letter Is Received From Exchange Student

ANNE EDWARDS WRITES PARENTS FROM BOLIVIA

Anne Edwards, 17, who spent the summer in La Paz, Bolivia, a representative of the United States as an American Field Service participant in the Americans Abroad program, wrote her final letter to her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Richard L. Edwards, Kewaskum, before returning home. Miss Edwards is expected to arrive home this Sunday, Aug. 31. Her letter follows:

I think this will be my last letter home as time is flying. Next week the 6 of us AFS students will be going to several cities for talks and tours. In the first, Cochabamba, there are many things of llama such as rugs and bedspreads. I think I'll buy something as the prices are supposed to be very reasonable. Have been buying a few silver things in La Paz. Hope to bring all this stuff home in two or three large cloth purses, with side shoulder straps—really great here. I doubt if you'll miss me at the airport as my cousin is also giving me a large stuffed llama to carry home.

Went to Tiahuanaco — Inca ruins with Jaime, Maria and Jorge. I was taking pictures when suddenly my stomach churned and I fainted. Jaime caught me or I'm sure I would have fallen into some rocks. We stayed there for about an hour and then continued on to other ruins in a bus filled with Indians. In the small town there was a festival and everyone was drunk and dancing up a storm. We returned in the same bus but this time everyone was drunk and we stopped in every little village to pick up more Indians. It was quite an experience. There was so much dust I could hardly breathe. We got home about 3 hours later and my parents were having a fit. My mother said I

fainted because I hadn't eaten and not because of the altitude.

My father's brother came for a party on Wednesday. When we came home from the show every one of the aunts and uncles were dancing and drinking. The custom here it to try to drink pisco and dance at the same time. Maria and I couldn't do it but the others made up for our lacking. They were here until early morning and at a late hour they started singing. I guess families are the same all over the world. That day we had a bar-b-q and had steak, sausages and cows' intestines. The latter almost killed me. They were the ugliest things in the world. Very rubbery.

Oso wants to write to Rick and Tom but he's afraid of his English so he's taking his good-natured time. Still haven't been able to get used to being late to everything. Sometimes people are so late they just don't come.

Maria and Jorge broke up the other day. Seems engagements don't mean as much as they do at home. The neighborhood is more familiar to me and I often take walks. The people stay pretty much to themselves and rarely say hello or anything.

I guess I'll stay in Miami one day before coming home. Heard that we're supposed to leave between Aug. 28 and Sept. 7. You should be hearing from AFS in New York soon. Will close now. See you soon.

ing where she found shelter was also blown off. She and her son are now making their temporary home with a brother in New Orleans, La. Mrs. Mariucci is a native of Mississippi.

EO-2 Dennis Rochwite, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Rochwite of the Boltonville area, called his parents and notified them that he was "O.K." Dennis is in the Seabees and is stationed at Gulfport, Miss. He and a friend lived in a trailer in the area. The trailer was moved off its foundation by the storm, but, surprisingly was not damaged, he said.

Students Plan Tour To Washington, D. C., New York Nov. 5-9

A group tour has been arranged to Washington, D. C. and New York for this fall. Any junior or senior student of Kewaskum Community High school who is in good standing in school will be eligible for the tour.

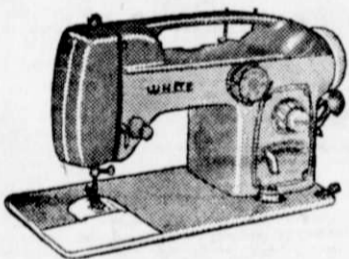

Charlotte Romaine and Gilbert Reindl.

A total of 44 registrants from Washington county reported for induction into the armed forces. The group included two young men from this village, Frederick Vorpahl and Donald Koerble.

Recent deaths included those of Mrs. John Klessig, 83, Kewaskum; George F. Brandt, 69, retired veterinarian and auctioneer and former marshall of Kewaskum; Mrs. Andrew Strobel, 82, town of Auburn; Rev. Joseph F. Beyer, 63 former pastor at St. Michaels.

Mrs. N. E. Hausmann moved to Palo Alto, Calif., where she has purchased a home and where her son-in-law and daughter reside. Her home was sold to the Henry Rosenheimers.

Recent weddings were those of Margaret Muenk and Ensign Harold Carlson, both former residents; Ruby Menger and Carl Hohlweck, both of the town of Wayne; Beulah Westerman, R. 3, Kewaskum, and Byron Beisbier, St. Kilian.

Service news: T/5 Sylvester Terlinden of Camp McCain, Miss. spent a 3-day pass with Pfc. Fredric Siegel at Camp Livingston, La. Both are members of the Kewaskum Gashouse Gang. Pfc. Henry Backhaus, stationed in Brazil, wrote that Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, wife of the President, visited camp and he was on the guard squadron for her. A letter was received from T. Cpl. Leo Wieter, who is in pre-invasion training in

England.

50 YEARS AGO - 1919

First Sgt. Adolph Meinecke, son of the Carl Meineckes, arrived home from Camp Lee, Va. on a furlough. Sgt. Meinecke enlisted in 1914 and soon was sent to the Mexican border. He crossed into Mexico with Pershing to capture Villa. When the war broke out with Germany he crossed the Atlantic with Pershing's first 10,000. Shortly after arriving in France he entered the front line trenches, took part in four battles on Hill 46, where he was gassed. In October, 1917, he was sent home on the Antilles, which ship was torpedoed and sunk. Meinecke jumped into the water and caught hold of a raft. He was in the water 4 1/2 hours when he was picked up by a patrol boat and taken back to Brest. While floating in the water he was hit in the leg by a timber which tore a large hole above his knee. Two months later he again left for home on the George Washington and this time he arrived safely. He was confined to a hospital at Newport News, Va. six months. He wears the wounded chevron, service stripe and star as one of the first 10,000. Meinecke endured hardships and much hard fighting when the war was raging in its worst stages. He said the Germans were poor in hand to hand combat, that Pershing's men fought to win, never to retreat, rather to get killed than be taken a prison-

er to make the enemy waste a bullet.

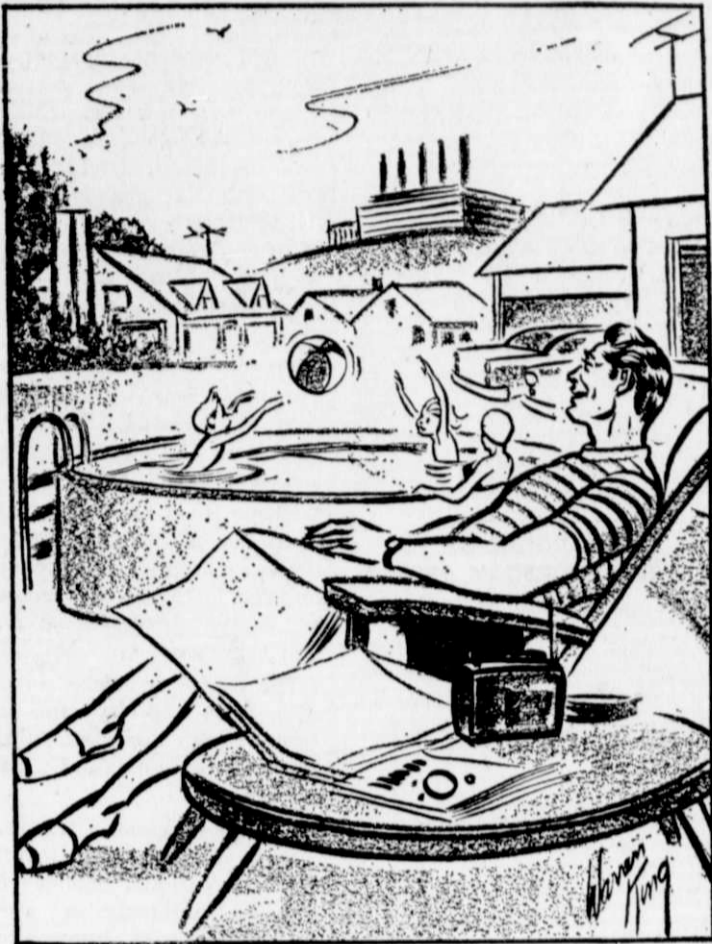

State Sen. Frank Panzer Passes On



Sen. Frank Panzer

State Senator Frank E. Panzer, 79, died Tuesday evening, Aug. 26, at Lakeview Lutheran hospital, Beaver Dam, following a lengthy illness.

Sen. Panzer, oldest member and former president pro tempore of the Senate, had served longer in the legislature than any living person. The senator was first elected to the state's upper house in 1934, and had served continuously in the office since that time. At one time or another, he had served on all of the major committees in the Senate.

Sen. Panzer's 13th senatorial district was made up of Jefferson and Washington counties and part of Dodge county.

A retired farmer of the Brownsville area, he was president pro tempore of the Senate from 1947 to 1965, and in the 1967 session was given the honorary post of president pro-tem emeritus. Before he was elected to the Senate he was a school teacher and telegraph operator. He was also a bank director. The Republican lawmaker had been absent from the legislature's current session because of illness.

Educated in Oakfield public schools, organizations Sen. Panzer belonged to include the Elks, Rotary, Masons, Eagles and Moose. His public career started at the

age of 30 when he became Ledgeview school district clerk. He was elected to the Dodge County Board of Supervisors in 1925 and became board chairman in 1941 after continuous membership. In 1931 he was voted a member of the State Assembly and served for four years. He then sought and won a Senate seat. His 41 years on county governing body are believed a record. He was presently serving his eighth term as State Senator.

Surviving are his widow, two daughters, Mrs. Carl Cotsakis of Fond du Lac and Mary at home; one son, Frank, Jr. at home; seven grandchildren, 10 great-grandchildren, and three brothers, Herman, August and Fred, all of rural Brownsville. One son, Gordon, three sisters and two brothers predeceased him.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Saturday at Immanuel Lutheran church, Waupun. Pastor Kenneth Kohl and Pastor Gary Burkum will officiate. Sen. Walter Hollander of Rosendale will present the eulogy at the church. Burial will be in Graceland cemetery, Mayville. Friends may call after 2 p. m. today (Friday) at the Koepsell Funeral home, Mayville, and at the church from 10 a. m. Saturday until the time of services.

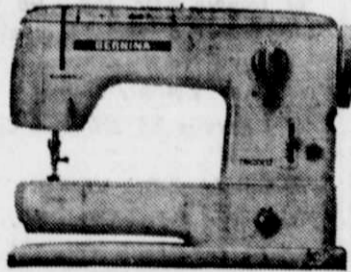

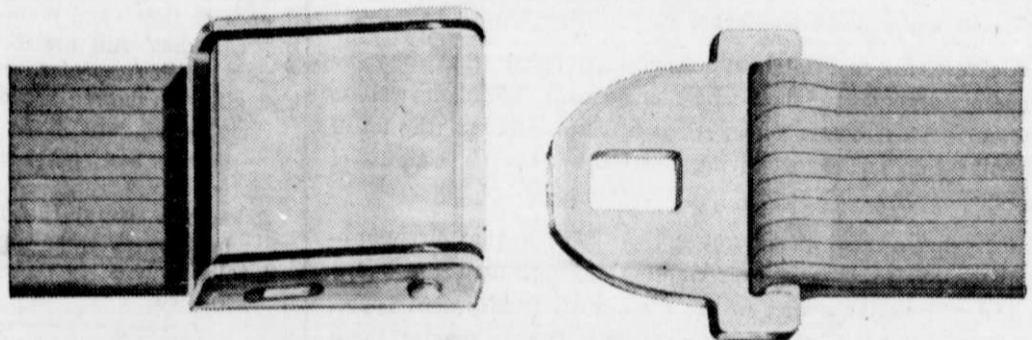
