Hunter Safety Course Offered To Area Students

Young people in the Kewaskum area who are interested in hunting and recreational shooting are invited to enroll in a Wisconsin Hunter Safety Course to be given at the elementary building beginning Wednesday, Sept. 24, at 7 p. m.

Warren Stenberg, a certified hunter safety instructor, will conduct the course. Assisting Stenberg will be Jim Hanson and Jan Rosenthal, also certified hunter safety instructors. All three have completed requirements for certification established by the National Rifle Association and the Wisconsin Conservation Department.

Students who enroll must be at least 12 years old by the date of the final lesson, scheduled for Oct. 22. There is no maximum age, although the course is designed primarily for young people up to 16 who have had little or no experience with firearms. There will be four two-hour classes, to be given Wednesday at 7 p. m. The fee of \$2.50 covers all materials except firearms.

Upon successful completion of the course, the students will receive arm patches and certificates. Under state law, they will be entitled to hunt and use firearms at age 14, unaccompanied by a parent or guardian as would otherwise be required up to age 16.

Classes will cover gun handling, firearms safety at home and in the field, care of firearms, marksmanship, and the responsibilities of hunters and shooters. There will be dry firing with actual firearms, and one class will include range practice with live ammunition.

TWO PERSONS HURT IN AREA MISHAPS

Kewaskum police reported three more accidents which took place in the village the past week, also that more mishaps have already occurred this year in the village than during the entire year in 1968.

Two more parked cars were struck in crashes. The first occurred at 9:30 p. m. Thursday on Parkview dr. near the intersection with Main st. Alice M. Bruesel, 16, 1451 Western ave., Kewaskum, was traveling south on the 1300 block of Parkview dr. and making a right turn onto Main st. when her auto struck the rear of an unattended parked car owned by Ronald L. Amerling, 22, 364 Main st., Kewaskum. The front right fender and bumper of the Bruesel vehicle and left rear fender and bumper of Amerling's car were damaged.

In an accident at 1:58 a. m. Friday in the 1200 block of Fond du Lac ave. about 90 feet north of Clinton st. an auto driven by David L. Schuppel, 20, R. 2, Kewaskum, backed into an unattended parked car owned by David F. Clark, 25, 1205 Fond du Lac ave. Annual Kiwanis Club Live Turkey Shoot on Sunday

TROUT FISHING, ARCHERY, TRAP SHOOTING OFFERED

The Kewaskum Kiwanis club will sponsor its 17th annual Live Turkey Shoot on Sunday, Sept. 21, at the Bar-N Dude Ranch, six miles northeast of Kewaskum on County Trunk GGG, the beautiful Kettle Moraine drive.

Patterned after the historic turkey shoots which were so popular in frontier days, this fascinatingly interesting annual event has become an outstanding attraction. Thousands of men, women and children from all over the state attend as participants and spectators.

The Turkey Shoot is handled as follows: Large live turkeys are protected behind an earthen bunker at the end of the rifle range with only their heads exposed to the marksman. For a fee of \$1.00 for three shots, (four shots for a dollar on advance sale tickets) the marksman attempts to hit the turkey's head from the firing line, using a .22 rifle. The turkey he hits is the turkey he gets for the family larder. Rifles and ammunition are furnished.

A live trout fishing contest is another attraction. It offers fine sport for the pro and amateur alike. The angler keeps all the fish he catches. An extra prize is offered for the largest fish.

Trap shooting contests are conducted throughout the day. Sportsmen desiring to enter these events may bring their own shotguns and ammunition. An archery target range and marksmanship contests have been added. Here's an opportunity for Robinhood admirers to test their skill. In addition, there are games for every member of the family to enjoy. Shelter, hot and cold food and beverages will be available.

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Moraine Area Youth Symphony Orchestra Formed

LOCAL WOMAN MEMBER OF ORGANIZING COMMITTEE

Plans and audition dates have been announced for a new Moraine Area Youth Symphony Orchestra sponsored by The University of Wisconsin—Washington County Campus (UWVC) in cooperation with junior and senior high school music departments.

The orchestra is open to talented musicians in string, woodwind, brass and percussion, from grades 7 through 12. Auditions are being held each Saturday in September, from 9 a. m. to noon in the UWVC Union theater. Remaining auditions are Sept. 20. Woodwind, brass and percussion auditions are Sept. 27.

Students must be recommended for audition by their school administrator, music director, parents and private teacher (if they have one). Rehearsals will be held each Saturday morning of the school year, starting Oct. 4.

Conducting the orchestra is Albert Asch, director of music at UWVC. Asch has organized the Moraine Area Symphony Orchestra for adults. He has performed as an oboist in professional orchestras and has conducted at the junior high, senior high, college and adult levels.

Plans for the orchestra have

been developed by an organizational committee made up of members of the Moraine Area Symphony. Members of the youth orchestra will draw their own constitution and elect a student executive committee to work with the board of directors and the conductor.

mishap occurred when the vehicle got off onto the right shoulder, then slid across the highway into the south ditch and struck a fence and tree stump and ended up in the swamp.

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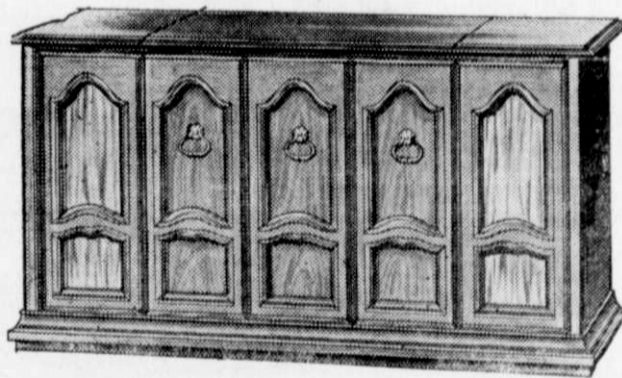
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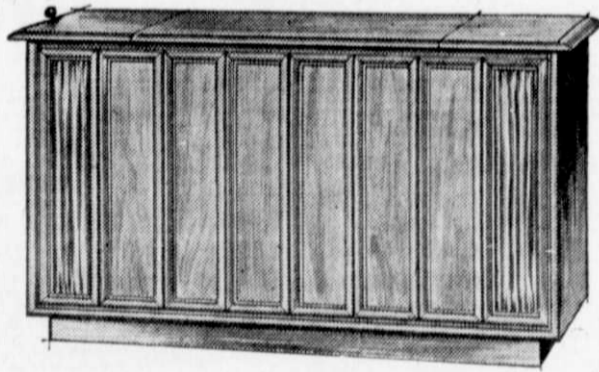
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25 YEARS AGO

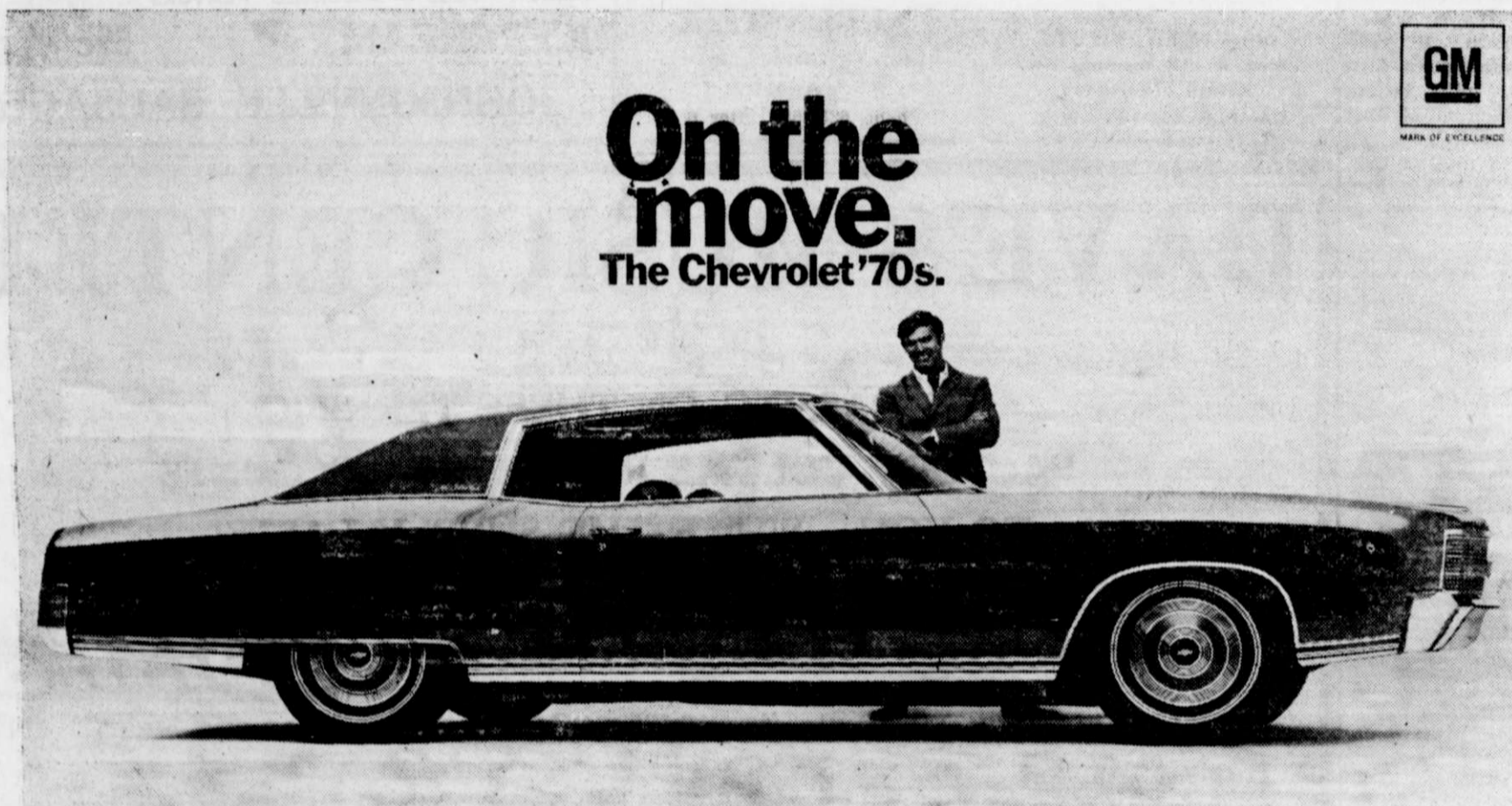

The appointment was announced by the state chairman, the Hon. Connor T. Hansen, justice of the Wisconsin Supreme Court. Klumb will be responsible for the over-all organization and execution of the Brotherhood program and finance campaign in Dodge, Fond du Lac and Washington counties.

Sponsored annually by the Wisconsin region of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, the program focuses on Brotherhood Week, which is scheduled for its 37th annual observance during the week of Feb. 22-March 1, 1970. However, the program also seeks to encourage a year-round community concern for justice and equal opportunity for all citizens.

Locally the program will be devoted to activities emphasizing the basic NCCJ concept that where there is understanding and respect, people of different social, racial and religious backgrounds can work harmoniously together on matters of civic concern without in any way comprising personal or religious convictions. The particular focus this year will be on social problems relating to racism, poverty, student activism, and community relations and the administration of justice.

Through committees to be named by Klumb, the National Conference will seek such programs in the schools, churches and community organizations of the three counties. The year-round educational program of NCCJ in this district will be sustained by a budget of \$2,400, to be obtained mainly by public appeal for voluntary contributions.

Indians Blank Pewaukee, 14-0, in Scenic Opener

THEUSCH SCORES TWO TD'S IN 1ST WIN OVER PIRATES

The Kewaskum Indians made history here Friday night in blanking highly regarded Pewaukee, 14-0, in their opening Scenic Moraine conference game. It was the first time since the Scenic conference was formed in 1960 that a Kewaskum team defeated Pewaukee in football. The win got the Indians off on the right foot in the conference race and stamped them as a serious title contender.

The game was more one-sided than the score indicates. Kewaskum might easily have doubled its margin of victory except for two costly fumbles in the first half. The Indians took the opening kickoff and marched right up the field to the one yard line. With first down and one it looked like a sure touchdown but then a fumble was recovered by Pewaukee. In the second quarter on another TD drive, Kewaskum fumbled again on a handoff on about the seven yard line. The Pirates recovered again and another touchdown drive was thwarted. The Indians fumbled on three other occasions.

The statistics also bear out the difference between the teams. The Indians made 15 first downs to 5 for Pewaukee. Kewaskum gained 289 yards rushing while holding the Pirates to 43 but in passing the Pirates gained 58 yards to the Indians' 22. In total yards gained Kewaskum far outdistanced their opponents, 311 to 101. Kewaskum completed 2 of 7 passes, while Pewaukee connected on only 5 out of 19.

The Indians' alert past defense has been a big factor in their two victories to date. They have now intercepted 10 passes in two games. Four were intercepted in the Horicon contest the week before and six were picked off against Pewaukee. Joe Backhaus, junior defensive back, has intercepted three, two of them against Pewaukee. Tony Butschlick also intercepted two passes and Lee Rammer and Jim LaMarche one each Friday. Kewaskum's defense caught as many passes as both offenses.

Back Ron Theusch, who blasted 22 times for 115 yards, scored both touchdowns on runs. Glen Weinreich scored a two point conversion. Theusch's two TD's gave him a tie for second in scoring in the conference. Weinreich gained 93 yards in 16 carries and quarterback Mike Doherty carried 5 times for 62 yards. The Indians scored 6 points in the 2nd quar-

ter and 8 in the third. Tonight (Friday) the Indians face their toughest test so far when they host rugged North Fondy, which along with Grafton was picked as a pre-season favorite for the title. The Orioles blasted Germantown last week, 26-7. North Fondy is led by end Chuck Cruz and linebacker Ron Hessel, both of whom were named to the all-conference team last season, and veteran quarterback Joe Dumbaskas, all of them stars back from last year. Game time is 7:30.
