## Turkey Shoot Biggest Ever; 15,000 Attend

6,000 SHOOTERS KILL 430 BIRDS; KIWANIS OFFICIALS RESIGN

The 17th annual Live Turkey Shoot sponsored by the Kewaskum Kiwanis club Sunday at the Bar-N Dude Ranch was by far the biggest ever held, according to James D. Reigle, chairman of the event. Sunny, mild weather helped attract many thousands of shooters, spectators and their families to the affair.

An estimated 15,000 spectators attended the event. Reigle estimated that about 6,000 persons stepped up to the firing line and took their chances at hitting a turkey. A total of 430 birds were killed on the firing line during the day-long shoot. In addition many frozen turkeys went out on the other events. Besides the main rifle range shoot, there was a pistol shoot, BB gun shoot, trout fishing, sausage shoot, archery range and trap shooting. There were also games for the entire family, hot and cold food and beverages.

Besides being the biggest ever held, this year's shoot was also the most controversially publicized. Due to a protest campaign lodged by a humane society, the shoot received widespread publicity and coverage in news items, editorials and letters to the editor in the daily newspaper as well as on news broadcasts and editorials over television stations. If anything this publicity probably helped in attracting spectators to the event, which was conducted despite a protest waged prior to the shoot. Because it was felt that a demonstration might take place, a sign was placed at the entrance to the Bar-N Ranch that read: "Private property. No picketing or demonstrations beyond this point." But there were absolutely no incidents at the shoot.

Because humane society groups opposed the shoot and letters of protest received, president and vice-president, the Rev. Dan Schowalter and John Battaglia, resigned last week. Marshall Boyd accepted the president's office to succeed Schowalter. Schowalter and Battaglia will not resign from the club however.

Some 4,000 advance tickets were sold for the event, which the club sponsors toward a swimming pool. Turkeys are bagged with 22-calibre rifles at 80 yards. After the bird is shot, it is killed immediately with the whole operation taking only a matter of seconds.

Opposition to the shoot because of so-called "inhumane treatment" was organized during the past year and has resulted in a bill presently before the legislature, which if passed, would outlaw the live turkey shoot. Primarily responsible for organizing opposition to the shoot is Mrs. Harry Hunt of Pewaukee, president of Defenders of Animals, Inc. Several humane society people were again reported in attendance at Sunday's shoot and failed to see anything wrong with the way the birds are handled.

About 3,000 persons signed petitions at the event against the passage of the bill that will elimin-

## 37 Kewaskum Area Students Enrolled at UWWC

ENROLLMENT AT UW COUNTY CAMPUS RISES TO 520 MARK

Unofficial registration figures, released at West Bend Thursday, show 520 students enrolled for the fall semester at the University of Wisconsin, Washington County Campus (UWWC), an increase of about 30 per cent over last fall's enrollment of 403.

An additional 27 students are enrolled in the University of Wisconsin's first off-campus resident graduate program, an experimental sequence leading to a master's degree in school administration. The program is being conducted in cooperation with UW-Milwaukee.

Among the 520 UWWC registrants are 37 students from Kewaskum, including 19 new, 14 continuing or re-entry and four transfers. Eighteen of the students attend full-time.

Students come from 38 communities, most of them in the Kettle Moraine area, bounded by Fond du Lac, Milwaukee, Port Washington and Beaver Dam. About 56 per cent of the full-time students come from beyond West Bend. The total student body is equally divided between West Bend and other communities (260). UWWC students are graduates of 112 different high schools, including 17 in Milwaukee. Fifty housewives are enrolled.

The Washington County Campus, now starting its second year of operation, is one of seven center system campuses included in the 15-school system of the University of Wisconsin. Students

must meet the same admission requirements at all UW campuses. The same classes are offered throughout the system. UWWC students may complete their first two years of college at West Bend and then transfer their credits anywhere in the country.

Dear Editor,

Several years ago my husband was hospitalized. We had run through every means of support. I was in such desperate straits that I was out of food, and fuel. I had received a final 24 hour disconnection notice on my lights and no gas to seek help. I had not been able to find out for over a week how my husband was in the hospital as I had no way to get there.

My living room furniture had already been repossessed. Then and only then was I able to get A.F.D.C. or aid to families with dependent children. While it was a very meager existence, it was after all an existence. I said many a thankful prayer as I was able to supply fuel, lights and food for my children. Many times I thanked God that I lived in America where poor, aged, and helpless were cared for through an understanding and great government.

"Now" 5 years later my husband is back to work full time. We are buying our home and we feel we have managed to weather the worst of the storm. Then the bomb fell.

For several months I have worked as a member and also on a voluntary basis with the "Washington County Welfare League." I could, I felt, sympathize with both sides of the fence as a former welfare recipient and also as a present taxpayer.

Today I stand and look at my

fellowman and my once hallowed government with disgust. Where have compassion, dignity, and above all love for our fellowman vanished to?

When we as a people can take the food from helpless children's mouths, deny our poor medical aid, cut dependent mother's income so low, that they cannot survive unless they place their children in foster homes and go to work, deprive our aged of proper medical care and, above all, respect as the senior citizens of our nation, cut school children off the rolls, causing them to have to drop out of school and go to work.

The list is almost without number. Can we as citizens vote for these bills, and then with a clean conscience, walk our streets proudly and really feel we are superior beings? "No" we should find the darkest cellar and skulk as rats in the gutters. We should pray above all else, that a merciful God will forgive transgressions. But let us not stop here. Let us rise up as an example of our once shining American and put these intolerable bills where they belong, in the "trash cans."

## Kaiser for Senate Campaign in County Headed by Seefeldt

## Kewaskum Harriers Place 2nd, 3rd in Quadrangular Meets

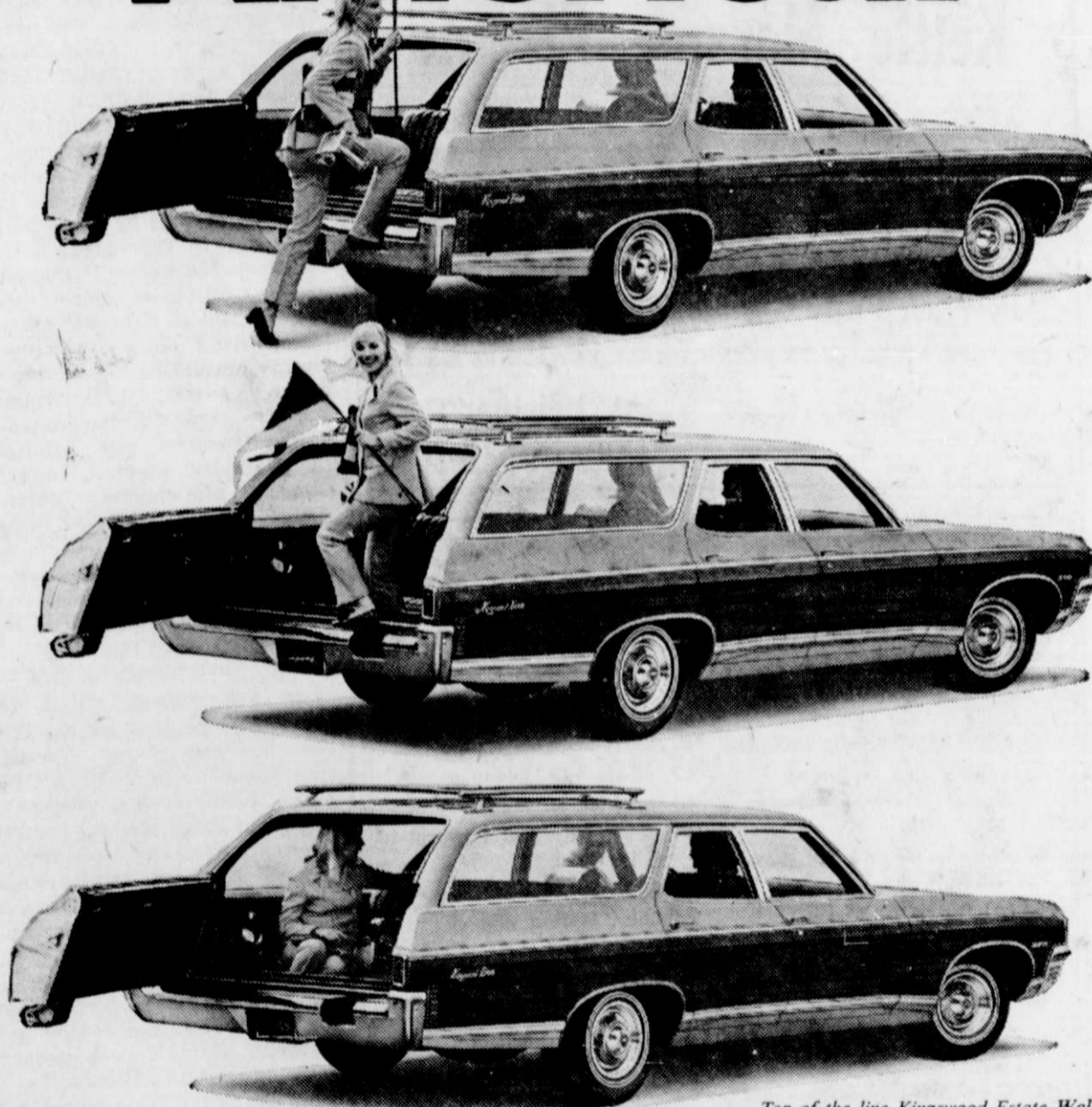
