Plan School District Meeting to Discuss Future of Swim Pool Project

Bids Reveal Cost Would Be \$90,000 Above Estimate

ELECTORS TO BE POLLED AT SESSION ON OCT. 20

The school board of the Kewaskum Community schools, at a special meeting on Monday, Oct. 6, decided to hold an informational meeting for the electors of the school district to discuss the future of the community swimming pool project planned to be constructed at the high school. The meeting will be held at the high school at 8:00 p. m. on Oct. 20.

The school board had expected that the total cost of the project would be about \$300,000.00. Because this estimate was over the original estimate the school board took 20 alternate bids on separate items in order to hold down the cost. Bids taken on Oct. 1, 1969, revealed that the total cost would be \$390,000.00 and that with alternates the cost could only be brought down to \$350,000.00. At Monday's meeting the board was told that the architects were redesigning and further cutting costs but that the redesigned pool was apt to have higher maintenance costs, as well as being a less desirable structure.

The board felt that the electors of the district should understand the total situation and be polled, as to their desires regarding the revised project. The meeting will be held in the multi-purpose room at the high school and it is hoped that electors will attend the meeting to learn the facts concerning the pool and to have their questions answered.

Capuchin Father Fellenz Goes to Mexico to Study

PREPARES FOR FUTURE WORK AT MISSION IN NICARAGUA

Capuchin Father Ralph Fellenz left for Cuernavaca, Mexico, for language and cultural studies on Oct. 1. This is in preparation for his future work in the Mission Vicariate of Bluefields in Eastern Nicaragua.

During the four months that Father Fellenz will study Spanish at Cuernavaca, he will live with a Mexican family. "I am really happy about this opportunity of living with a Mexican family for these four months," he explained. "It will help me in my language studies and, even more important, it will give me an introduction into Latin American family life and culture."

When he finishes his language studies at Cuernavaca in January Father Fellenz will go to Mexico City. He will work there in a 15,000 family parish staffed by the Spanish Capuchins. "This is an extremely large parish," he explained. "There are over 15,000 families and they range from the very wealthy to the poorest of the poor. This will give me valuable experience in Latin American parish life in all of its phases. It will also give me the opportunity to become more familiar with Latin American religious customs."

"In May, I will go to Nicaragua," he went on. "I will go first to Managua and hope to arrange to work with a native Nicaraguan priest there for a few months before going to our Mission Vicariate in Bluefields. Once again, my reason is to become as familiar as possible with local customs and with the local idioms of speech. I know it is impossible for me to completely subvert my American culture but I want to become as Latinized as possible."

Father Fellenz said that he did not think of himself as a missionary priest going to work in a foreign country. "I think of my future work in Nicaragua as an extension of my priesthood rather than as missionary work," he said. "I have been ordained a priest to serve God's people and it just so happens that the people he has chosen for me to serve are in Nicaragua."

Father Fellenz is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Leo M. Fellenz of R. 1, Kewaskum. He attended St. Michael's school near Kewaskum and St. Francis seminary in Milwaukee. He joined the Capuchin Order in 1961 and was ordained a priest on September 13, 1968.

Keene, McKenna Win Nomination To State Senate

ONLY 163 VOTES CAST IN VILLAGE

At Tuesday's Special Primary Election, David A. Keene, 24 year old University of Wisconsin law student, and Dale T. McKenna, 32, Jefferson attorney, won nomination as the Republican and Democratic candidates, respectively, for the 13th district state senate seat. They will oppose each other for election at the Nov. 4 run-off.

Keene of Fort Atkinson, polled a total of 3,350 votes in the three-county area of the district, which includes Washington and Jefferson counties and the eastern half of Dodge county. He received enough votes in his home county, Jefferson, to win the election. His nearest competitor was Mrs. Esther Doughty Luckhardt, Horicon assemblywoman, with 2,411. Galen Brunner had 1,492, John P. Kaiser 1,387, Carl V. Kolata 1,098, and Herman H. Laabs 915.

On the Democratic ticket, McKenna carried all three county areas, getting a total of 1,913 votes. He was followed by Warren Turner with 844, Robert R. Beardsley 652, David J. Fries 363 and Frank H. Oemig 247.

In Washington county Keene did not fare so well, running fifth but his tremendous strength in his home county assured his nomination. Results in the county were: Brunner 973, Luckhardt 607, Laabs 584, Kaiser 537, Keene 509 and Colata 82. County results on the Democratic ticket were: McKenna 429, Beardsley 334, Turner 323, Fries 92 and Oemig 17.

The vote in the village of Kewaskum was extremely light, with only 163 ballots being cast. On the GOP ticket Kaiser received the most votes with 50, while McKenna polled a high of 31 on the Democratic ticket. Results: Republican—Kaiser 50, Keene 24, Luckhardt 13, Laabs 6, Kolata and Brunner, each 3. Democratic—McKenna 31, Turner 16, Beardsley 8, Fries 4, Oemig 2.

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Kewaskum High school's cross country team placed third with 97 points among a seven school meet at the Camelot Country club golf course, Thursday, Sept. 25. Lomira managed the run-off. Al Simonis of Ripon won the 2.1 mile race with a time of 11:09. Mayville, the school which won with 35 points, had four runners in the top ten. Ripon was second with 55 points, Lomira with 106 was fourth, fifth Waupun 109, 6th Campbellsport 141, and 7th North

Fondy 165.

Steve Backhaus and Larry Zehren, who ran very well, had times of 11:29 and 11:31 and placed fourth and fifth respectively. John Backhaus was 20th, Gordon Darmody 30th, Steve Bremser 38th, Charles Battaglia 43rd, and Bob Gruber 44th.

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County Purchasing Committee Meets

HRON, BOYD KEWASKUM MEMBERS OF COMMITTEE

At a meeting in the courthouse at West Bend last Wednesday night the Washington County Co-operative Purchasing committee predicted that the savings its work has produced will continue to grow as more local units of government become aware of its potential, according to Chairman Howard Luebke, business manager of the Hartford High school.

Luebke said that the municipal and school purchasing officers of the general areas of Germantown, Hartford, Kewaskum and West Bend have agreed to enter a mutual contract for buying paper towels and toilet paper in order to get lower unit costs.

"The big hurdle was getting so many persons to agree on the quality of paper they would accept," Luebke said.

Luebke said his school has saved \$1,300 this year, at 11.4 cents per ream of paper, because Hartford and West Bend successfully worked out a joint bid on paper so that two truckloads instead of one could be purchased.

The committee was organized initially under the sponsorship of the Hartford Public Affairs coun-

cil and includes among its advisers purchasing agents of Washington county industries and the Public Expenditure Survey of Wisconsin.

The committee said that an examination of the potential in group purchases showed that one governmental unit was paying more than

2½ times as much for a gallon of antifreeze as Washington county was.

It was reported that Hartford schools have purchased photo bulbs under a contract negotiated by the state at savings of over 30 per cent.

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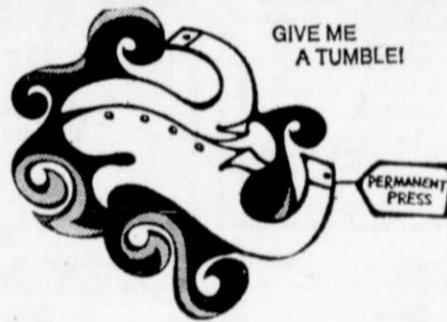

Kewaskum Holds Unbeaten Grafton To 6-6 Tie There

HOST CAMPBELLSPORT AT HOME COMING GAME FRIDAY

In one of their better games of the season, an inspired Kewaskum team held previously unbeaten, conference leading Grafton to a 6-6 tie there Friday afternoon, knocking the Blackhawks out of a first place tie.

Grafton was lucky to escape with a tie. The Indians held the scoreless and maintained a 6-0 lead until the last quarter when the Blackhawks scored on a desperation pass. With but 10 minutes left to play Quarterback Fred Timm hit Dan Wollner in the end zone on a fourth and eight situation for a 33-yard touchdown pass which tied the score. Defensive guard Dave Schaub of the Indians broke through and had Timm by the jersey and almost nailed him

for a big loss but Timm managed to get the pass off which Wollner grabbed in the end zone. Russ Gavin then poured through to dump Timm on the conversion attempt to preserve Kewaskum's tie. Grafton got another break on the touchdown play. There was some commotion about the Blackhawks' center being too far down field on the pass, but unfortunately none of the officials detected it, otherwise the score would have remained 6-0, Kewaskum.

The big Indians defensive unit played an outstanding game. They broke through to throw the Warhawks for losses on numerous occasions, checked their running game quite well, broke up passes and intercepted them. They held Grafton and got the ball for the offensive unit but the sputtering offense gave it up too often on fumbles, pass interceptions or failures to make first downs. Too bad some members of the strong defensive unit can't play both ways, on offense and defense.

Randy Koth recovered a fumble

on Grafton's 30 to set up Kewaskum's score in the first quarter. A couple of first downs later, quarterback Doherty ran it in from the eight yard line. The run for conversion attempt failed. The next three quarters were defensive duels as neither team scored until Grafton finally broke the ice with 10 minutes left.

Linebacker Leo Gundrum was a standout on defense for Kewaskum, making five unassisted tackles and helping on 13 for a total of 18. Gavin took part in 14 tackles. Koth also shared in the glory. Besides his fumble recovery which set up the Indian TD, he helped keep Grafton at bay with two pass interceptions. He also came close to intercepting one or two other passes but the ball hit him in a bad place—in the hands.
