Kewaskum Defeats Milwaukee West in TV Quiz Show



Kewaskum Community high school decisively defeated Milwaukee's West Division high school, 350-230, in a first round match of WITI-TV6's quiz program, "Who Knows?". The match was televised Sunday, Oct. 19, from 5-5:30 p. m. on TV6, Milwaukee. Many Kewaskum area residents enjoyed watching the television show (even though it meant switching over from the Packer game).

By winning Kewaskum high school advances to the quarter finals and on Nov. 23 will meet John Marshall high school. On

Oct. 12 John Marshall eliminated St. Mary's academy.

"Who Knows?" is presented every Sunday at 5 p. m. on TV6. Since the series premiered in April of 1967 more than sixty high schools in Milwaukee and south-

eastern Wisconsin have competed on "Who Knows?" and have won more than \$7,000 in prize money. This season "Who Knows?" is sponsored by the Wisconsin Electric Power Company. The library of the winning school receives \$50 and the loser \$25.

The moderator of "Who Knows?" is TV6's Tony Karr, who also presents the weather on "TV6 News at Ten" on Saturday nights. Dr. Roger Parr of Marquette university prepares the questions and serves as authoritarian for "Who Knows?".

Electors Still Favor Original Plan for Pool

TAKE ADVISORY VOTE AT MEETING MONDAY

At a special informational meeting held Monday night, electors of the Kewaskum Community Schools district were given the facts and figures for a redesigned swimming pool building. After the discussion an advisory ballot vote was taken.

As a result of the vote 65 persons favored the original plan, expected to cost about \$390,000, as announced recently. Another 39 persons went for the alternate plan estimated to cost between \$300,000 and \$325,000. And 25 voted "no," meaning forget it and having no pool at all. In other words 64 persons opposed the original plan of the cost-increasing project, one less than those who favored it.

Plans for the pool were initiated about two years ago at which time a cost estimate of \$250,000 was made and cost limits were set. Bids finally opened on Oct. 1 and revealed that the cost will exceed the budget by about \$100,000. Superintendent of Schools Marshall Boyd then indicated the board was reluctant to proceed on its own, with the pool project until electors had a chance to express their desires costwise.

The original plan was a 100 per cent masonry building with all mechanical equipment housed in tunnels beneath the pool deck. In the redesigned plan, the upper two-thirds of the structure will be of steel, with insulated steel wall panels. Pool equipment will be housed in an extension of the building.

The new proposal will not revise the size of the pool or deck. Representatives of the Schutte-Moehon architectural firm said the exact savings have not been determined, but that they were willing to re-do the plans and determine costs at the firm's expense.

The board finally accepted the offer of the architectural firm to present to the board in writing on Nov. 3 the revised bidders' costs of the alternate plan. Supt. Boyd, in the meantime, will view a pool housed in a steel building similar to the one proposed in the alternate plan now in use at Whitefish Bay.

Members are urged to bring completed contest forms to the meeting. To reach the meeting site take the road leading to the west of the university center parking lot.

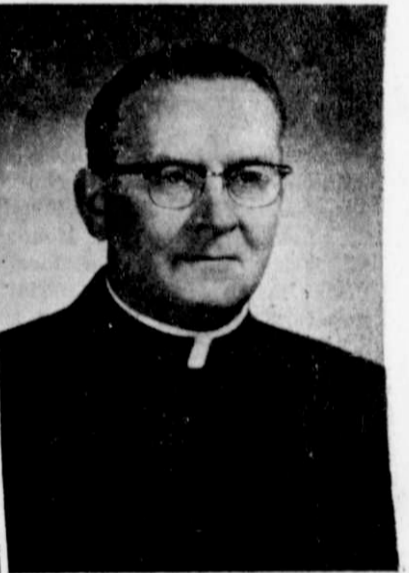

Rev. W. Morgan Will Celebrate 25th Anniversary

ST. MATTHIAS PASTOR TO BE HONORED HERE SUNDAY

The Rev. Walter N. Morgan, chaplain at St. Joseph's convent, Campbellsport, and pastor of the St. Matthias parish in the town of Auburn, will celebrate the silver anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood on Sunday, Oct. 26.

A concelebrated Solemn High Mass will be read at 11 a. m. at St. Matthias church, with the Rev. Elroy Pesch, O.F.M. Cap., and the Rev. Carl Fehring, O.F.M. Cap.,

as concelebrants. Both priests are stationed at St. Lawrence seminary. Father Fehring has assisted in the parish for the last three years.

A dinner for invited guests and parishioners will be served at Holy Trinity church hall in Kewaskum at one o'clock. A reception is also scheduled from 2:30 until 4:30 p. m. in the local church parlors and friends are invited to attend this "open house."

Father Morgan is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Morgan, who resided in the town of Byron (Fond du Lac county) until the death of Mr. Morgan. Fr. Morgan attended Harrison elementary school district 5, and then went to St. Lawrence college in Mount Calvary from 1933 to 1939 for high school and college. He prepared for the priesthood at St. Francis Major seminary in Milwaukee and was ordained by Archbishop Moses G. Kiley on Oct. 24, 1944. He read his first mass at St. John's parish in Byron, his home parish, on Nov. 1 of that year. He is the only person in the history of the parish to have entered the priesthood.

After his ordination, Father Morgan was assigned as assistant at St. Clement's parish in Sheboygan, where he remained from 1944 to 1946. He was then transferred to St. Agnes parish, Milwaukee, where he served from 1946 to 1948. The Presentation parish in North Fond du Lac was served by Father Morgan for one year, after which he became an assistant at St. Mary's parish in Menomonee Falls in 1949. He remained there for 12½ years until 1961. He assumed his duties as chaplain at St. Joseph's convent in Campbellsport and as pastor of St. Matthias parish in September of 1961. Father Morgan is also chaplain of the Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus in Fond du Lac.

McKenna Advocates School Aid Hike To Lower Taxes

WOULD SAVE TAXPAYERS IN KEWASKUM DISTRICT \$68,025

Dale T. McKenna, a candidate in the Nov. 4 special election to succeed the late Senator Panzer, declared today that he advocates a substantial increase in state school aids as a means of providing tax relief to the local property taxpayer.

McKenna stated that he would seek an increase in the guaranteed valuation behind each student from \$42,500 to \$46,000 for the 1970-71 school year. He said this would provide \$68,025 in property tax relief for taxpayers in the Kewaskum school district.

McKenna cited figures provided by the State Department of Public Instruction for the 1970-71 school year. These show that the Kewaskum school district would

receive \$444,254 under the present formula compared to \$512,279 under the legislation proposed by McKenna.

McKenna said his plan would also result in a 1.27 reduction in the mill rate paid by taxpayers in the Kewaskum school district. The estimated mill rate for the 1970-71 school year would be 16.72 mills if the school aids formula is not changed.

McKenna served as an area coordinator for Senator Gaylord Nelson in his 1968 campaign for re-election and is now Nelson's local representative in Jefferson county. He is also a former sergeant at arms for Wisconsin State Assembly.

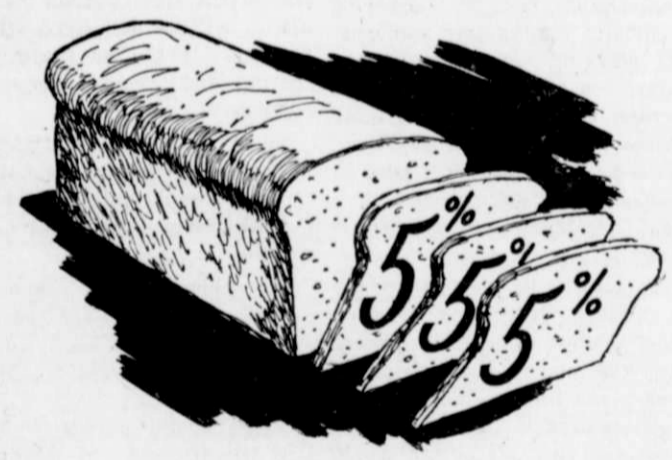

SWIMMING POOL

Oct. 21, 1969
Last night an information meeting was held at the Kewaskum Community High School in regard to the swimming pool project. Considering the School District is large, only approximately 130 people were in attendance. This was supposed to be an information meeting only, however, a vote was taken at this meeting. The vote was 65 for the original design of the pool, which the bid cost obtained by the board was \$390,000, 39 votes for the alternate plan for the pool and 25 votes for no pool. On this vote the board was to make the decision as to which plan would be used. The vote is really 65 for the original pool and 64 votes against the original design. If the board decides to go for the original plan, is this a fair vote? Is this the feeling of all the people in the district? Nothing was said that a vote would be taken.

The Kewaskum Kiwanis Club dangled \$75,000 toward this pool project. Who is the Kewaskum Kiwanis? It is my understanding it is made up of businessmen from the village of Kewaskum and work for projects in the village. What has this club got to do with the entire school district? The people out of the village are expected to help pay the balance of the pool in more school tax.

Two years ago the electors voted to give the board the authority to borrow \$155,000, not to exceed this amount, for the pool enclosure. Now we could have another \$100,000 to borrow. How will this be done? Does the board have the authority to borrow this money or will it be brought to a vote of all the people? Are we going to let this go through?

According to a study taken by the school, there are tentative plans to build added classrooms at Farmington, Wayne and Kewaskum within the next few years. Are we the people going to take these added taxes after the pool project? I thought we want an education for our children. It seems that the opposite is true. Schools are built around the sports and extra-curricular activities. Is this where we want our tax money to go?

Let's each and every tax payer in the School District get out

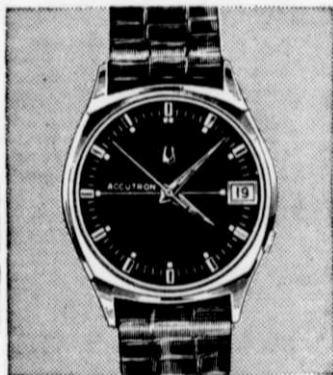

Lay, Sr., 84, of Kewaskum; Isadore "Ike" Keller, 57, of Kewaskum; Ervin Faber, Jr., 13, of the town of Wayne, who died of infantile paralysis; Mrs. William Otten, 22, nee Bernice Roden, of the town of Kewaskum, whose husband is serving in the armed forces overseas; Mrs. Henry Schaub, 69, town of Wayne.

Five village boys were hailed into Atty. L. W. Bartel's office where each was fined \$3.00 to pay for the damage they had done to the garden of Mr. and Mrs. Al Runte. The youths stole all of the choice ripe watermelons and cantaloupe and damaged the vines. Having more melons than they could eat, they smashed the remainder against obstacles in the village park.

Over 513,000 People Visit Northern Unit K-M State Forest

Over 513,000 people visited the Northern Unit Kettle Moraine through September, 1969, according to Dennis Konkol, forest manager.

The recreation year commenced early in April with campers arriving in conjunction with warm spring weather. Public use continued high through May, but dropped off considerably in June, mainly due to wet-rainy weekends. A total of 8.2 inches of rain was recorded at Mauthe Lake headquarters during the month. Attendance picked up again in July, and August was a record month. Sunny weather in September attracted many campers, particularly on weekends.

For the first time, a naturalist program designed to inform and interpret geology, natural features, wildlife, and history, as it pertains to the forest was instituted. Nature hikes were conducted daily and evening programs were provided on weekends. This program was well received by all concerned with an attendance of over 6,000 through September. During the late fall and winter the naturalist services extend to schools and adult organizations in the vicinity. Please contact Forest Headquarters, Box 426, Campbellsport, to schedule a date for these programs.

New park projects include the construction of a new beach area, service road, parking lots, bathhouse and sanitary facility in the Long Lake recreation area. This development is located just north of the existing beach and picnic area. It is planned to have work completed and the area open to the public after July 1, 1970.

The fall season offers an excellent opportunity for high quality picnicking and camping. The weather can be very pleasant—cool early in the morning and warm during the day, and the irritation of insects such as mosquitoes and deer flies are at a minimum. Campers from the Green Bay area often camp at Mauthe Lake at this time of year, especially when the Packers are playing at home. Milwaukee TV reception is good.

Other fall activities include hiking, fishing, sight-seeing, and hunting. The 26,500 acre forest is open to hunting in season. Brochures and hiking trail maps are available at forest headquarters.

Winter recreational activities include skiing, tobogganing, snow shoeing, ice fishing and snowmobiling. Some hardy enthusiasts even camp at this time of year. The camp areas are open until snows block the entrance roads, and fees are not collected after Nov. 1. The forest is open to snowmobiles, including the hiking and bridge trails, unless posted to the contrary.

So, when Labor Day is past don't overlook the many outdoor recreational opportunities available in the Kettle Moraine.

Indians Run Wild In Overpowering Slinger, 34 to 0

ROLL UP 395 YARDS WHILE HOLDING OWLS TO MINUS 4

The Slinger Owls, who until two weeks ago had a 4-0 record and held down first place in the Scenic Moraine conference, were no match for Kewaskum there Friday afternoon and the jumbo Indians ran right over them in a 34-0 rout, which gained undisputed third place for Kewaskum.

This year's schedule favored Slinger and the Owls defeated all of the second division teams in their first four games. They were the most offensive minded team in the conference until running into the power and being shut out by North Fondy, 20-0, and Kewaskum, 34-0, in the last two games. And they still have the unbeaten conference leader, Grafton, to face this Saturday. Not only did the Indians whitewash the Owls, but at the same time blanked J. Hauser, who had been the leading scorer in the loop and has now dropped to third.

The Owls simply couldn't get anything going and could not move the ball against the stalwart Kewaskum defensive unit, which has got to be the best in the conference. Slinger was held in its own territory most of the game and had to give up the ball or had it taken away by the Indians. The Owls had the ball for only 10 plays during the entire second half and were held to just one first down as the defense pushed them back for a minus four yards.

The big Indian defensive unit has held the opposition to a mere 12 points in the last four games. They shut out Germantown, allowed Grafton and Campbellsport only six points each and also blanked Slinger. They also shut out Pewaukee, 14-0, in an earlier game. The only team that could score against them was North Fondy (21 points) but these resulted mainly from offensive fumbles.

While checking Slinger with a minus four yards, Kewaskum rolled up an amazing 395 yards on the ground as three backs rushed for more than 100 yards each. Added to this the Indians gained 17 yards passing, although they weren't forced to pass. Ron Theusch was the big runner with 152 yards in 21 carries, followed by quarterback Mike Doherty (an Irish Indian) with 133 yards in 14 runs and Glen Weinreich with 108 yards in 12 carries. Kewaskum averaged better than 100 yards per quarter overall, while the Owls were taking a pounding.

Slinger was held right from the opening kickoff and was forced to punt after three plays. Kewaskum took over on its own 18 and after seven plays had its first touchdown with Theusch going the last 46 on a run. Weinreich ran over for the extra points. The Indians kicked the off and again forced the Owls to punt. Doherty tried right end, which minutes earlier yielded Theusch's score, and wound up on a long trip as he raced 67 yards for another TD. This time Theusch ran over the extra points to make it 16-0 early in the first quarter. With minutes to go in the half, Randy Koth intercepted a Larry Gundrum pass and romped 34 yards, from where Theusch went in from the two, bringing the count to 22-0 at halftime.

The second half opened with Doherty running up the middle on the first play from scrimmage all the way into the end zone, only to have his long "sneak" called back because of an infraction. Kewas-

kum lost one extra touchdown here. But no matter, Weinreich, Theusch and Doherty continued to make huge gains on the ground and again Theusch scored on a one-yard plunge. Kewaskum led then, 28-0. The last TD was set up when Jim LaMarche intercepted a Slinger pass. The Indians took over on the Owl 44. After one play, Weinreich blasted into the line and didn't slow down until 43 yards later in the end zone. The third quarter ended 34-0 and allowed Kewaskum to toy around some in the final period. Though Slinger was the final to stop their running game, they experimented with passes and Clark Eichstedt even attempted a field goal for the fun of it.

LaMarche had a good afternoon defensively, intercepting a pass, recovering a fumble and knocking down another pass. Steve Stern also played one of his best games, blocking a punt and participating in six tackles, including three solos. Russ Gavin, always a bear-cat on defense, was in on 13 tackles. He also blocked a punt and dropped the quarterback for one loss of 10 yards. Huge Lloyd Laatsch was also credited with his best game of the season at defensive tackle. He pressured the Owl quarterback all afternoon.

Theusch scored 20 of the 34 points on three TD's and a run for two extra points. He is now second in conference scoring with 48 points, Weinreich is 4th with 40 points, and Doherty tied for 7th.

The running by Hauser, Slinger's ace scorer, was nil in this contest. His best was catching two passes for nine yards. The Owl quarterback, Gundrum, was forced to run the wrong way as the Indian defense nailed him for a minus 18 yards, and back Monroe ended up as the best runner with a net of 10 yards, proving the strength of Kewaskum's inspired defensive unit on this day.

The Kewaskum JV's lost to Slinger, 18-12, Tuesday night and wound up the season with an 0-6 record. The KHS freshmen defeated Slinger, 22-8, to wind up with a fine 5-1 record.

The Indian varsity plays its final game tonight (Friday) at Hartland Arrowhead at 7:30 p. m. Hartland is in fifth place with a 3-3 record and Kewaskum hopes to bow out in a blaze of glory. Eighteen seniors will be playing their last game for KHS.
