## Ogi, Reigle Granted Permit to Enlarge Waterway, Construct Pond

PROJECT ADJACENT TO KEWASKUM CREEK

Dr. Charles Ogi and James D. Reigle, both of R. 2, Box 413, Kewaskum have been granted a permit by the Department of Natural Resources to enlarge a waterway and construct a pond adjacent to Kewaskum Creek in the town of Kewaskum, Washington county.

Ogi and Reigle filed an application with the department on June 17, 1969, for a permit under section 30.19, Statutes, to enlarge the waterway adjacent to Kewaskum Creek.

### FINDINGS OF FACT

1. Dr. Charles Ogi and James D. Reigle filed an application with the department on June 17, 1969, for a permit to enlarge a waterway adjacent to Kewaskum Creek in Washington county. On July 10, 1969, a copy of the application and notice thereof, containing a statement that unless written objection was filed with the department within 30 days after mailing of the notice, the department might take action to grant the application without public hearing, was mailed to the Division of Fish, Game and Enforcement, to the Division of Health, to the clerks of Washington county and the Town of Kewaskum, which are the county and town wherein the proposed project is located, and to five persons who own real property located adjacent to Kewaskum Creek. No objection to the application was filed within 30 days.

2. Dr. Charles Ogi and James D. Reigle own the southeast quarter of the southwest quarter of section 9, township 12 north, range 19 east.

3. The above-described real property abuts Kewaskum Creek, which is navigable in fact.

4. The applicants propose to excavate a pond approximately 480 feet long, 250 feet wide and 11 feet deep with 3:1 side slopes.

5. The purpose of the proposed project is to provide water for fish, wildlife and private swimming purposes.

6. An investigation by the department determined that a public hearing was not required provided the spoil is placed away from the pond to avoid any flood plain obstructions and seeded following construction to control erosion.

7. The proposed project, under the circumstances that now exist, will not injure public rights or interest, if any subsequent development is done in a manner that will protect Kewaskum Creek from pollution and will conform to the standards for shoreland and flood plain development contained in Chapters RD 15 and RD 16 of the Wisconsin Administrative Code. The project, under the circumstances that now exist, will not injure fish and game habitat and will not materially injure the rights of other riparian owners on Kewaskum Creek. The project will conform to the requirement of laws for the platting of land and for sanitation upon compliance with the applicable conditions of the permit relating thereto as herein-after specified.

8. The following conditions attached to the permit issued here-

## Vote Tuesday To Elect New State Senator

Next Tuesday, Nov. 4, is the date when voters in the 13th State Senatorial District will go to the polls to elect a successor to the late Sen. Frank Panzer.

Voting in the village will be at the fire station in the municipal building and the polls will be open from 9 a. m. to 8 p. m. Balloting for the town of Kewaskum will take place at the Labor Center in Kewaskum.

Despite urgings from party workers and the candidates themselves, a light vote is anticipated as is usually the case for special or "off year" elections.

Three candidates are in the running for the vacant senate seat. Those seeking elections are: David A. Keene, Republican; Dale T. McKenna, Democrat, and Robert R. Beardsley, Independent.

All three candidates live in Jefferson county. Keene is a law student at the University of Wisconsin and resides in Fort Atkinson; McKenna is a practicing attorney and lives in Jefferson; and Beardsley is a Lake Mills area farmer.

Electors throughout Washington and Jefferson counties and the eastern portion of Dodge county comprise the 13th District.

## UNICEF Trick or Treaters Out Here

## Dedication of UW County Campus Planned for Nov. 8

University, state, and West Bend area leaders will share in formal dedication ceremonies of The University of Wisconsin, Washington County Campus at 2 p. m., Saturday, Nov. 8.

Wisconsin Lt. Governor Jack B. Olson will deliver the main address.

Representing The University of Wisconsin will be UW President Fred H. Harrington and Chancellor L. H. Adolfsen of the UW Center System.

in are reasonably necessary to protect the public health, safety, welfare, rights and interest, and to protect private rights and property:

(a) the waterway to be constructed shall be a public waterway; however, access to the pond must be gained in a lawful manner;

(b) the permit shall be exercised in such manner as not to result in pollution of Kewaskum Creek;

(c) the applicants, their heirs, successors, or assigns shall comply with any applicable requirement of laws for the platting of land and for sanitation and any applicable requirements of local zoning ordinances or the standards for the development of shorelands and flood plains in Chapters RD 15 and RD 16 of the Wisconsin Administrative Code;

(d) the permit shall expire on October 1, 1971, if the proposed enlargement is not completed before such date;

(e) a copy of the permit shall be kept at the project site and available at all times during construction;

(f) the department shall be notified at the time of the completion of the project;

(g) the applicants shall waive any objection to the free and unlimited inspection of the premises, site, or facility at any time by any employe of the department for the purpose of investigating the construction, operation, and maintenance of the project; and

(h) spoil piles shall be of minimum height to prevent possible flood plain obstruction and seeded after construction to control erosion.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

1. The proposed project as described in the foregoing findings of fact herein constitutes an enlargement of Kewaskum Creek as provided in section 30.19(1), Statutes.

2. The department has jurisdiction under section 30.19, Statutes, to issue a permit for enlargement of a waterway as proposed by the applicants, subject to the conditions stated in the findings of fact, which will be incorporated in the permit.

PERMIT

AND HEREBY THERE DOES ISSUE AND IS GRANTED to the applicants, Dr. Charles Ogi and James D. Reigle, R. 2, Box 413, Kewaskum, a permit under section 30.19, Statutes, to enlarge Kewaskum Creek as herein applied for, subject to the conditions stated in Finding of Fact No. 8.

This permit shall not be deemed to authorize or include any work or development other than specifically authorized herein. Acceptance of this permit shall be deemed acceptance of the said conditions.

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### SECONDARY THOUGHTS

By the Staff of Kewaskum Community High School

#### "THE LEARNINGS IN THE DOING"

Those of us teaching science in high school today are fortunate enough to be involved in one of the greatest revolutions in American education. This revolution involves the re-evaluation and restructuring of science course throughout the curriculum, from kindergarten through high school. Most of us are aware of the results of this revolution; new courses, new objectives, new materials, and new approaches.

Some of the courses for which great promise was held have not produced in the measure which was anticipated. In other cases, school systems have been reluctant to change from the traditional approach to science in their own systems and adopt an entirely new curriculum.

As a result of this, some of us

teaching science are in the rather unusual position of being able to see the promised land in science teaching but, at the same time, running the risk of never entering ourselves.

The laboratory should be a real discovery place in the science class. It must be more than a place where students "prove" something or where they verify facts about which they have already read. They must develop basic laboratory techniques. One doesn't work very successfully in the laboratory without developing some very important abilities. The laboratory is a place to discover old facts. You probably remember that it is easier to understand facts when you have observed them first-hand. The laboratory is a place to develop your ability to observe and analyze. It should also become important to you to try to understand why certain things are happening as they are; that is, to draw conclusions based on your observations.

We learn by doing. We remember much more from what we do than from what we see or what we hear. Laboratory work will help

you to learn how to do things from the practical viewpoint. We must learn to analyze the problem that is posed, to plan work to solve the problem, to be neat and accurate in our work on the problem, to follow through to completion in an orderly and effective manner, and to draw significant conclusions.

But, before we do any of these; could I suggest that we roll up our sleeves and get ready to go to work—cause—"The Learnings in the Doing."

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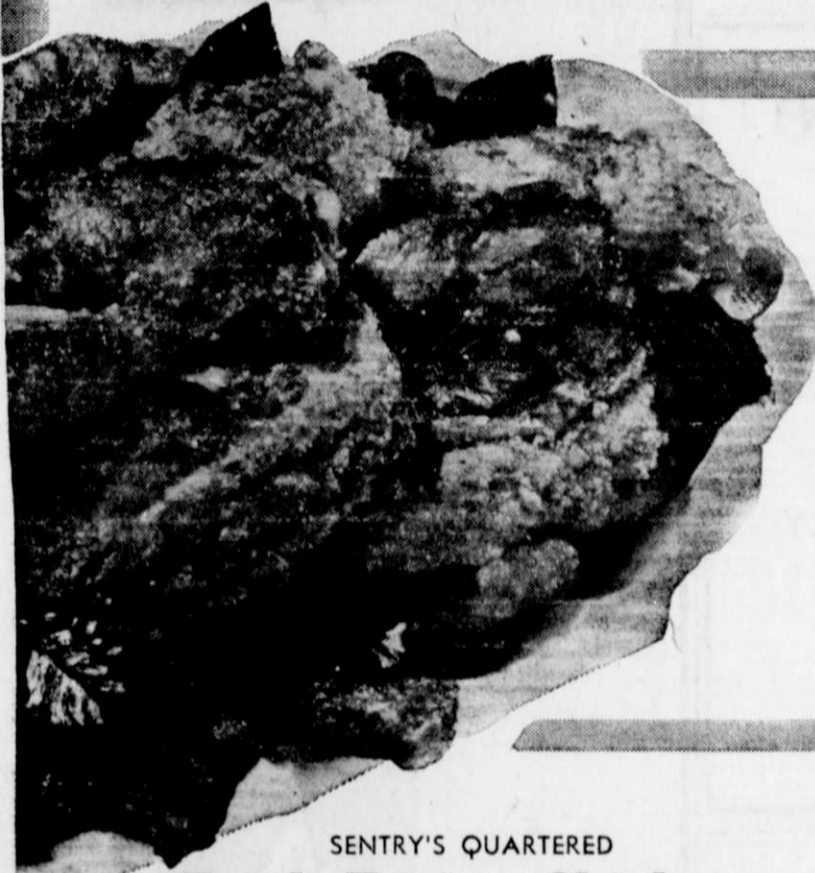

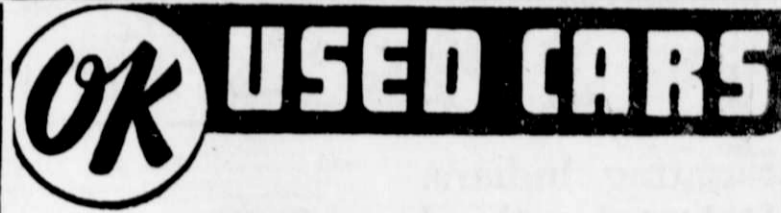

## Fighting Indians Defeat Hartland, 27-12, Cop Third

**WIND UP SEASON WITH 5-1-1 RECORD**

The fighting Kewaskum Indians closed out their finest season in the Scenic Moraine conference by romping over Hartland Arrowhead there Friday night, 27-12. Kewaskum wound up in third place with five wins, one loss and one tie.

And if you think they aren't fighting Indians you should have been at Hartland, where they went on the warpath. The going was rough and the officials let Hartland get away with giving Kewaskum the business in the first half. Holding a one-sided 20-0 lead at the intermission, the Indians decided to give Arrowhead the same treatment in the second half. They came out mad and as a result several fights broke out. Tempers continued to flare up until finally in the last quarter a near free-for-all brawl ensued. Football was becoming secondary as the players continued to go at each other. Numerous unnecessary roughness and unsportsmanlike conduct penalties were called, especially in the final period, and a number of players were ejected from the game. Kewaskum was penalized 101 yards and Hartland 70. And we are told they were still going at it after leaving the dressing rooms.

It isn't often a team finishes only third with a fine 5-1-1 record but it happened this season. Grafton, in winning its fourth straight Scenic title, had only a 6-6 tie with Kewaskum to blemish its record of 6-0-1. Second place North Fondy lost one game to wind up with 6-1-0, with Kewaskum right on their heels with 5-1-1.

Against Arrowhead the Indians broke the ice in the first quarter with a 50-yard touchdown run by quarterback Mike Doherty. Ron Theusch made it 8-0 by running over the extra points. In the second quarter Theusch capped an Indian drive with a 10-yard scoring run. The extra point try failed and it was 14-0. In the same period Theusch scored again on a one-yard plunge, the try for extra point missed again, and the half ended 20-0. At the half Kewaskum had gained 270 yards to a mere 70 by Arrowhead.

Hartland started the second half with a 65-yard drive and Struble went over from the three. Arrow-

head then scored another TD on a big break. Bob Krahn fumbled the kickoff return on the Kewaskum 29. Hartland recovered and scored again minutes later on Mike Halpen's four-yard run. Kewaskum stopped the extra point tries and the Indians' lead was cut to 20-12. However, in the same quarter Kewaskum had the ball for one big offensive play, a 56-yard TD run by Doherty. Larry Bunkelman kicked the extra point to make it 27-12. There was no scoring in the extra-curricular final period.

Doherty had an excellent night, racing for an amazing 185 yards in only 13 carries. Theusch added 81 yards and Glen Weinreich 70. Clark Eichstedt did a good job filling in at quarterback for a few minutes when Doherty was injured. He engineered a drive deep into Arrowhead territory which was halted when Doherty came back in. Theusch also played a bang-up game on defense, helping on more than 10 tackles and knocking down two passes.

The following statistics show Kewaskum had far the better of it over Hartland: first downs—K 16, H 14; yards rushing—K 351, H 262; yards passing—K 38, H 19; total yards—K 389, H 262; passes—K 4-7, H 2-17; passes intercepted—K 2, H 0; fumbles lost—K 1, H 1; penalties—K 101, H 70.

In compiling its 5-1-1 record, Kewaskum's offensive unit scored a total of 157 points, while the stout defense held the opponents to a mere 50 points in 7 games, an average of only about 7 points per game. Three of the victories were shutouts, 14-0 over Pewaukee, 28-0 over Germantown, and 34-0 over Slinger. In two other contests the Indians held their opponents to 6 points (Grafton and Campbellsport). The only team that scored against the Indians was North Fondy with 21 points in handing Kewaskum its only defeat. This was the Indians' only bad game in which they gave the Orioles the game on numerous fumbles. Besides their great conference record, Kewaskum also beat Horicon, 18-8, in a pre-season

This speaks
