MIRACLE HAPPENS—DEMOCRAT WINS IN VILLAGE, COUNTY

Democrat McKenna Wins State Senate Seat in District Race

TAKES ALL 3 COUNTIES FROM OPPONENT KEENE

In an upset which might be compared to Wisconsin defeating Ohio State in football this Saturday, Atty. Dale T. McKenna, 32-year-old Jefferson attorney and Democrat candidate for the 13th district State Senate seat in the legislature, defeated his Republican opponent, David A. Keene, 24-year-old University of Wisconsin law student from Fort Atkinson, in Tuesday's election.

The vote in the three county area comprising the district was 12,174 for McKenna and 11,176 for Keene. McKenna carried every county in the district, winning in Washington county, 4,220 to 3,997; Dodge county, 2,655 to 2,213, and Jefferson county, 5,299 to 4,966. Jefferson county is the residence of both candidates.

Robert R. Beardsley, Lake Mills area farmer, who ran third in the Democratic primary election Oct. 7, finished a poor third as an independent candidate in Tuesday's Special Election, tallying only 631 votes. He received 135 votes in Washington county, 234 in Dodge and 262 in Jefferson.

A total of 331 ballots were cast in the village of Kewaskum and it came as an unexpected surprise that McKenna also won out over his opponent here. He received 181 votes, to 140 for Keene and 10 for Beardsley.

The amazing part of McKenna's victory was that he defeated Keene in the village of Kewaskum and Washington county, always Republican strongholds, in which voters normally vote for the party rather than the candidate. In fact McKenna's victory marked the first time that a Democrat was elected to the State Senate in the district since 1931.

McKenna carried 18 of the county's 30 precincts. He carried all of Hartford's four wards, five of West Bend's seven wards, and two of the villages, Kewaskum and Slinger. McKenna also had the edge in the townships, carrying seven of the 13. He won in Addison, Barton, Erin, Hartford, Kewaskum, Trenton and Wayne.

SCHOOLS CLOSED FOR TEACHERS CONVENTION

The Kewaskum Community schools closed on Thursday and Friday of this week for the convention of the Wisconsin Education association in Milwaukee. More than 25,000 educators were expected to attend the convention. WEA President Jerome Strupp, Fond du Lac, a former Kewaskum resident, is presiding over the activities.

Holy Trinity Parochial school also closed because there is no bus service on these days.

Expectant Mother Hurt, Loses Baby In Car Accident

THREE OTHER MISHAPS REPORTED DURING WEEK

Mrs. William (Shirley) Wuebben, 22, of R. 2, Kewaskum, who was reported eight and a half months pregnant, was seriously injured and suffered the loss of the child she was carrying in an auto accident on Hwy. 28 about six miles west of Kewaskum at 11:45 a. m. Tuesday. Wuebben is a teacher in the Kewaskum school system.

Mrs. Wuebben was reported in critical condition at St. Joseph's on Wednesday.

Also hurt in the crash were Mrs. Wuebben's mother, Mrs. Calvin (Ruth) B. Bintzler, 46, of R. 2, Theresa, a passenger in the car driven by Mrs. Wuebben, and a county highway worker, Melvin L. Krueger, 53, of West Bend.

Mrs. Bintzler sustained a shoulder injury and bumps and bruises. Krueger suffered chest injuries, bruises and abrasions.

The county sheriff's department reported that the Wuebben car was traveling west on Hwy. 28 and came over the crest of a hill where a highway truck was parked in the road with its flasher working while the driver, Krueger, was engaged in highway maintenance.

Mrs. Wuebben braked her vehicle and skidded broadside, striking Krueger with the left front. The vehicle then careened off the road and struck a tree with the left side. Krueger was thrown into a field south of the fence line by the impact.

County coroner Robert Boltz said an autopsy was performed on the baby, which was dead on delivery at the West Bend hospital, to determine the cause of death. He said the autopsy was not available.

Adult Recreation Program to Begin At School Nov. 12

The Kewaskum Community schools will again sponsor an adult recreation program beginning Nov. 12 for all residents of the Kewaskum school district which includes Beechwood, Farmington and Wayne at the Kewaskum Elementary school gymnasium. Since it is a "fun" program, adults should not hesitate to take part because of no previous experience.

The program will be free of charge and will be open to any and only adult residents of the Kewaskum school district, 18 years of age or older, who are no longer attending high school. High school students and/or other children will not be allowed. This is an "adult" program for the district. Adults will have an opportunity to get some recreational physical exercise through basketball, volleyball, etc. The program depends on those who participate.

Beginning on Nov. 12 and 13, Wednesdays from 8:00 - 10:00 p. m. will be for men and 8:00 - 10:00 p. m. on Thursdays for women. There will be no program operating during vacation periods or on days when the school is closed due to custodial work schedule conflicts. Locker room and shower-room facilities will be available. Participants will be responsible for their own towel, soap, etc.

It is hoped that the adults of the district will avail themselves of the program during the winter months ahead when other recreational activities are curtailed.

Court Upholds Dombrowski Life Term in Slaying

The state supreme court last Friday upheld the first degree murder conviction of Chester J. Dombrowski, former Chicago policeman. Dombrowski was sentenced to life imprisonment by Circuit Judge Jerald E. Murphy of Fond du Lac on Aug. 1, 1968, after he was found guilty by a jury in the slaying of Herbert L. McKinney, 27, also of Chicago.

McKinney's body, beaten and shot, was found on a dump on farm property owned by Dombrowski and a brother about two miles north of Kewaskum near the Fond du Lac-Washington county line on Sept. 12, 1967.

Justice Horace W. Wilkie, in a unanimous decision, said: "Even though the evidence that led to his conviction was circumstantial, we have seldom seen a stronger collection of such evidence assembled and presented by the prosecution."

The body of the slain man was found after Dombrowski was picked up earlier by county authorities after his car crashed at a bridge on Hwy. 45 north of Kewaskum near the Washington-Fond du Lac county line and an investigation resulted.

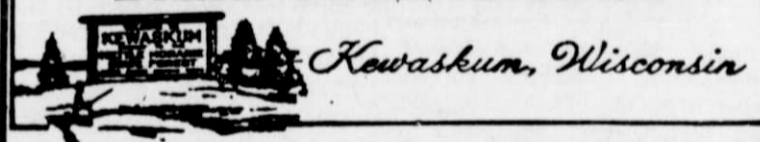

Indians Place 5 On All-Scenic Football Squad

KEWASKUM, NORTH FONDY DOMINATE ALL-CONFERENCE

North Fondy and Kewaskum dominated the Scenic Moraine all-conference football squad selected by coaches Tuesday night. The Orioles placed eight on the first team all-conference offensive and defensive units and Kewaskum placed five on the squad.

It was a smashing climax of post-season honors for the Indians, who had their best season ever recorded by a Kewaskum football team in the Scenic conference. The Indians wound up in third place with a 5-1-1 record and were 6-1-1 overall. They were right on the heels of Grafton's champions (6-0-1) and second place North Fondy, 6-1-0.

Kewaskum's five representatives on the all-conference squad were tackle Larry Bunkelman, quarterback Mike Doherty and running back Ron Theusch (who also won the Scenic scoring championship) on the offensive unit and tackle Leon Schultz (a repeater on the squad from last year) and defensive back Joe Backhaus on the defensive unit.

Coming as a surprise was the fact that Grafton's champs placed only two men on the first team. And Grafton is the team that beat North Fondy this season, 8-0. In giving the Orioles eight places on the squad, it might be the coaches felt it was a going away present for North Fondy in their last season in the conference. It was odd, too, that the only school which failed to place a man on the squad was Slinger. The Owls were fourth in the standings and won their first four games.

Offensive Tom Breitzman of Campbellsport and linebacker Ron Hessel of North Fondy were the only unanimous choices. Hessel made both the offensive and defensive teams.

Kewaskum furnished half the backfield on the squad in Doherty and Theusch. The Indians almost had three backs on the all-conference selections. Back Glen Weinreich received honorable mention and was barely nosed out by Hartland's Glen Struble.

On the first balloting Struble, Don Wollner of Grafton and Weinreich were tied for first string. Another vote gave it to Struble, probably because Kewaskum already had two backs named to the first team. Weinreich was the leading rusher in the conference with 676 yards in 95 carries. His 7.3 average per carry was second in the conference only to Doherty of the Indians.

Kewaskum also had five men receiving honorable mention on the defensive squad, namely end Tony Butschlick, tackle Lloyd Laatsch, guard Russ Gavin, linebacker Leo Gundrum and back Randy Koth. All told the Indians placed 11 men on the all-conference and honorable mention picks to top all schools in the conference. Gundrum missed the first team by one vote and Koth lost in a run-off.

Placements on the all-conference team were: North Fondy 8, Kewaskum 5, Germantown 3, Hartland 2, Grafton 2, Campbellsport 1, Pewaukee 1, Slinger 0.

Repeaters from last year on the all-conference squad are end Chuck Cruz, North Fondy, center Ron Hessel, North Fondy, on offense and tackle Leon Schultz, Kewaskum, linebackers Hessel and Bruce Bertling of Grafton on defense.

Some of the facts on Kewas-

kum's all-conference and honorable mention selections follow:

Tackle Larry Bunkelman was a fine blocker in his first year as a starter. He is a 2-year letter winner.

Quarterback Mike Doherty scored 48 points on 6 touchdowns (42 points in the conference). He gained 659 yards rushing in 73 carries for an average of 8.5 yards per carry, highest average in the conference. He had touchdown runs of 65, 56 and 50 yards.

Back Ron Theusch, co-captain, showed a great deal of desire and is a fine leader and strong runner. He won the Scenic scoring title with 62 points, carrying 112 times for 517 yards. Ron filled in at linebacker and defensive halfback when regulars were injured and did an excellent job. His best game was against Slinger in which he gained 152 yards and scored 20 points, also havin a TD run of 46 yards.

Tackle Leon Schultz, co-captain, made 46 tackles for the year. He was a real hard hitter and held the defense together. He had 3 fumble recoveries during the season.

Defensive back Joe Backhaus made 15 solo tackles, had 12 assists and made five interceptions. He was the surest tackler on the team and had excellent speed.

Coach Joe Harlow felt that Butschlick, Gavin and Weinreich all deserved to be on the first team. Tony was a fantastic blocker and most of Kewaskum's yards were made behind blocks by him and Bunkelman. On defense he had 3 interceptions and 4 fumble recoveries, batted down 2 passes and was in on 40 tackles. He was a real team player and did a great job for the team on defense. Gavin who started as varsity defensive guard for 3 years, made 86 tackles, 17 of them solos, and dropped 3 quarterbacks for losses. No one gained yards over Russ' position. Weinreich was the leading rusher in the league with 676 yards in 7 conference games and a total of 783 yards in 8 games, just a shade under 100 yards per game, which is excellent for a high school player. He averaged 7 yards per carry, including a 200-yard rushing game against Germantown.

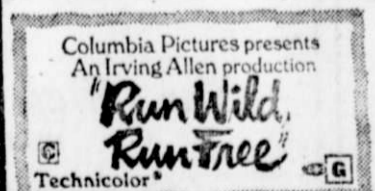

Plan Dedication Program Nov. 8-9 at UW County Campus

EVENT TO FEATURE OPEN HOUSES, DEMONSTRATIONS

Open houses and demonstrations of campus activities will be featured at the Nov. 8 and 9 dedication program of the University of Wisconsin, Washington County Campus, West Bend.

The year-old \$1.75 million campus will be open to the public from 1 to 5 p. m. each day. Highlights of the weekend will be a dedication service at 2 p. m., Nov. 8, and concert by pianist Gunnar Johansen of Madison at 2 p. m., Nov. 9.

Among the featured speakers at the dedication will be Wisconsin Lt. Gov. Jack B. Olson and UW President Fred H. Harrington. Pianist Johansen, one of America's top musicians, has been the UW artist-in-residence since 1939.

Construction began on the three-building UWWC complex in 1967. The campus opened in September, 1968. This fall 520 students are enrolled under the direction of 37 faculty members. The curriculum includes 63 courses in 21 areas of study. UWWC is part of UW's seven-campus, freshman-sophomore, center system.

Visitors at dedication activities can find the school located on an 87-acre wooded plateau west of West Bend on University drive off of Highway 33.

The buildings contain 58,000 square feet of space, centered around a lecture hall, theatre, four laboratories, an art studio and four classrooms.

The administration building provides 28,000 square feet on two levels. Offices for faculty, administration and student affairs are located here along with a lecture hall; laboratories for chemistry, biology, physics and chemistry; an art room; and two general classrooms.

The library's 13,000 square feet house 18,800 books, 250 magazines and periodicals and two classrooms. It is built around a librarians core with conference rooms. Emphasis is on individual student carrels rather than a large reading room. There are listening units enabling students to hear re-

ords and tapes as a part of individual study and research.

The student union is a one-story building with a partial basement. It houses the 298-seat theatre, lounge, art gallery, eating area, music practice rooms, book store, recreation room and student government office. Maintenance and storage areas are also included.

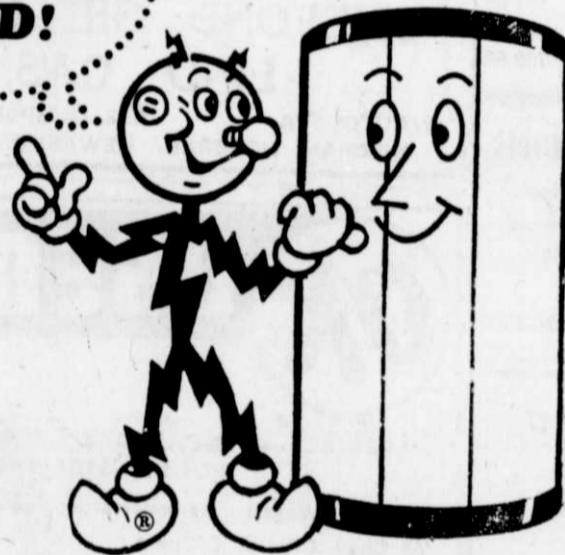
