Kewaskum on TV Quiz Show Sunday

MILWAUKEE MARSHALL IS QUARTER-FINAL OPPONENT

Kewaskum High school will make its second appearance on the television quiz show "Who Knows?" which will be aired from 5-5:30 p. m. Sunday, Nov. 23, on WITI-TV 6, Milwaukee. Kewaskum will oppose Milwaukee John Marshall in a quarter-final match.

Kewaskum reached the quarter-finals by decisively defeating Milwaukee West Division High school in their first round match Sunday, Oct. 19, 350 to 230. Marshall eliminated St. Mary's academy.

Representing Kewaskum High school will be Stephen Brenner, team captain, Lee Rammer and Carol Nigh, with James LaMarche as alternate. All are seniors except Brenner, a junior.

Moderator of the quiz show is TV-6's Tony Karr, who also presents the weather on "TV-6 News at Ten" Saturday nights. Dr. Roger Parr of Marquette university prepares the questions and serves as authoritarian for "Who Knows?"

The show is presented every Sunday at 5:00 and outstanding students from more than 60 high schools in Milwaukee and southeastern Wisconsin have competed and won more than \$7,000 in prize money. The library of the winning school receives \$50 and the loser \$25.

The popular program is designed around a series of rounds in which panel members are given an opportunity to answer questions dealing with current events, sports, music, art, literature, science and mathematics.

Delta Kappa Gamma Meets in Kewaskum

The November meeting of Delta Kappa Gamma was held at the home of Mrs. Kenneth Erickson of Kewaskum, on Tuesday evening, Nov. 11. Delta Kappa Gamma, which is an honorary society for women teachers, has selected for its yearly subject "The Critical Analysis of Values," with emphasis on an in-depth study of Far Eastern culture and its influence on Western values.

The program for the evening was given by Mr. and Mrs. Donald Smith of West Bend, who have lived a number of years in Malaya. Their program, which included pictures and slides, was based on religious reflections of Asian values. The four outstanding religions of Asia were presented and discussed. Those present learned how difficult it was to see where religious values begin and cultural values end, because they intertwine. It also became apparent that because for so many generations these Asian people have been uneducated, they tend to respond more to symbolism than to ideas. The symbolism of the four religions, Buddhism, Hinduism, Islam, and Animism was discussed, and graphically illustrated. Both of the speakers included anecdotes and personal experiences of their life in Malaya which brought warmth and color to their subject.

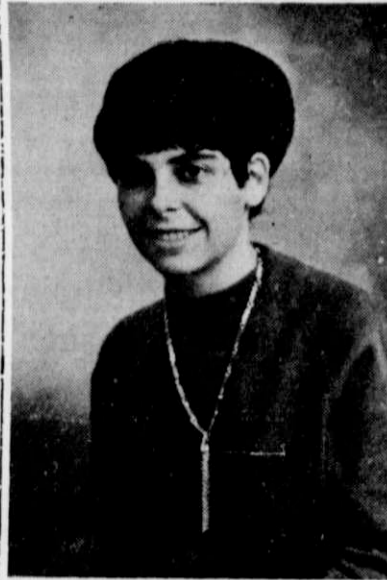
CUB PACK 44 REMINDER

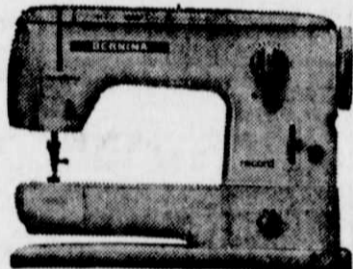

Dear Bill:

Greed is the dominant trait in most human beings; in some it is so vicious that they stop at nothing . . .

We had an example of this at the pool meeting. It was to be only informative, so the attendance was in favor of the proponents. They pack their meetings so when a favorable opportunity exists they bring the matter to a vote. This treachery makes the proposition a moral issue.

Communities as a rule are controlled by certain persons or some group. Currently it appears to be Kiwanis, an exclusive club as it accepted only certain persons when they organized. These exponents of altruism at times

contravene the very purpose for which they exist. Their members are in general well to do. They use their affluence to influence certain elements. They dangle a fair sized purse before the voters to induce them to furnish what turns out to be most of the cash. They may even stoop to misinform.

Folks are cognizant of the worldwide turmoil . . . We are in an era of prosperity with a constantly increasing inflation, which in turn produces hardship for many. The professionalists with their outrageous fees and the excessive profits by business gouge some of us to the point where we cannot afford adequate food to maintain health, and enjoy the usual necessities.

How many Kiwanis members have ever been poor? How many have ever felt a gnawing hunger or had to shiver for lack of sufficient bedding or raiment? Those who are callous; those who are inhumane; those who are selfish or greedy are not Christians, no matter what they think or believe.

Those who are concerned with only local matters are narrow-minded. They are heedless of the suffering of man or beast. They turn a deaf ear to the pleadings

of the destitute, and the man-made cruelty.

The imprudent who have not learned from past history, lack the hind-sight necessary for sound fore-sight. They don't realize that which goes up eventually must come down. In 1929 everything seemed rosy in the future, but they were jolted out of their dreams in a matter of hours. This can happen again and just as suddenly.

The cost of maintaining the pool will be a small fortune. If this project is put through without any chance for the opponents to cast their votes it will be a disgrace. An advertised election for a certain date to give all an opportunity to vote is a decent gesture.
