## Kiwanis Club Honors Conservation Farmers



Leland Schaub, town of Wayne, Washington county, and Karl Schultz, Auburn township, Fond du Lac county, were honored as conservation farmers of the year by the Kewaskum Kiwanis club on Monday, Nov. 17, at the Hon-E-Kor Country club.

Each year the Kewaskum Kiwanis sponsors awards and a recognition dinner for the two farmers in the area that are doing an exceptionally good job in conservation and farming.

John Battaglia, Kiwanis president, presented the awards. Marshall Boyd and Myron Perschbacher were in charge of the program.

Karl Schultz is the owner and operator of a 200 acre dairy and hog farm. He has climbed the agricultural ladder from a hired man to farm ownership and has managed his 32 cow herd to a butterfat average of over 600 lbs. In addition, he fattens 150 hogs per year which he buys as feeders.

Contour farming on the slopes and 10,000 ft. of tile drainage in the level and wet peat soil are vital soil and water conservation measures on the Schultz farm. Thirty-five additional acres of contour strip cropping was applied this fall to complete his upland practices.

Leland Schaub, also a dairy farmer, became a co-operator with the Washington County Soil and Water Conservation District in April of 1969.

Since then, Lee has developed a conservation farm plan and began implementing his plan immediately by removing a huge stone fence and running 35 acres of contour strips across where the fence had been.

In July, he constructed three sod waterways consisting of over 3,200 total feet. Over 6,000 feet of drainage tile is being installed along side of the waterways to dry them up early in spring for ease of crossing. An additional 15,000 feet is being installed in various other wet areas.

To complete his conservation work, Lee is planning to construct

## Bacteria in Milwaukee River Water Shed, Reuss Pollution Report Shows

NEARBY LAKES, POND ARE FOUND CONTAMINATED BY DANGEROUS BACTERIA

A report on Milwaukee River pollution prepared for Rep. Henry S. Reuss of Milwaukee by Limnetics, Inc., 6132 West Fond du Lac ave., a Milwaukee water pollution firm, discloses that:

1. 561.5 tons of phosphate, 41.6 tons of nitrate and 2,500 tons of silt are discharged into Lake Michigan each year from the Milwaukee River.

2. Over 170,000 coliform bacteria per 100 ml. of water were found in the Milwaukee River during the summer of 1969.

3. A survey in September, 1969 of 16 sites in the Milwaukee River watershed showed that six sites—Milwaukee Yacht club (Milwaukee county), Juneau Park pond (Milwaukee county), Milwaukee River at Clybourn st. (Milwaukee county), New Fane pond (Fond du Lac county), Auburn Lake (Fond du Lac county) and Lake Seven (Sheboygan county) were contaminated by Pseudomonas Aeruginosa bacteria which can cause ear infection, brain damage and death.

Reuss had asked Limnetics, Inc. to prepare the report in order to supplement work being done by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission and the Milwaukee Sewerage Commission. Two additional reports — on the effects of Milwaukee's combined sewerage system, and lake eutrophication in southeastern Wisconsin — are expected shortly.

"As the public realizes the outrage we — all of us — are committing on the Milwaukee River, it will insist that government figure out the cost of cleaning it up," Reuss said. "I'm confident that the public will then tell its officials — federal, state and local — to get on with the job."

Other locations, of 16 sites tested, which showed no evidence of Pseudomonas Aeruginosa at the time of testing in September, are as follows: Long Lake, Kettle Mo-

## Welfare League Post Resigned By Mrs. Shepherd

HAD FILED SUIT AGAINST D.A., JUVENILE OFFICER

A controversial Kewaskum mother of five children, Mrs. Thomas (Marlene) Shepherd, of 120 Prospect ave., has resigned her positions in the Washington County Welfare League "under some pressure" from the league itself. Mrs. Shepherd, who was once on welfare, has been working to improve the lot of welfare recipients.

Mrs. Shepherd mailed her resignation as secretary and public relations director of the county league to President Diane Neitzel last week after league officers came to her house following the recent announcement of her suit against Washington County Dist. Atty. Robert Kauffman and Juvenile Officer Hugh Carpenter. Both were involved in county court action against Mrs. Shepherd for taking her children out of school two days to attend the welfare march to Madison. The suit in U. S. District Court will test the state law requiring parents to keep their children in school. She is also asking any damages "deemed necessary."

Mrs. Shepherd said she had no intention, however, of stopping her work in welfare. She first hit the news pages in late September when she was arrested at the Capitol with Father Groppi of Milwaukee. Action against her and others involved in the disturbance during the legislative session was to come to court the past week. Mrs. Shepherd also said that she and her husband bought a house and have no intention of leaving Kewaskum.

Since her return from Madison Mrs. Shepherd said she has been both ridiculed and praised. The ridicule and hostility outweighed the praise after the March. She received critical letters and even threatening phone calls.

"Who Knows?" is presented every Sunday at 5 p. m. on TV6. Since the series premiered in April of 1967 more than sixty high schools in Milwaukee and southeastern Wisconsin have competed on "Who Knows?" and have won more than \$7,000 in prize money. This season "Who Knows?" is sponsored by the Wisconsin Electric Power Company. The library of the winning school receives \$50 and the loser \$25.

The moderator of "Who Knows?" is TV6's Tony Karr, who also presents the weather on "TV6 News at Ten" on Saturday nights. Dr. Roger Parr of Marquette university prepares the questions and serves as arbitrator for "Who Knows?".

WILL BE PRESENTED AT PUBLIC HEARING DEC. 1

A proposed budget in excess of \$3/4 million for the village of Kewaskum for 1970 will be presented in the council room of the municipal building at a public hearing at 8 p. m. on Monday, Dec. 1.

A proposed budget totaling \$750,669.74 calling for a tax rate of \$39.16 per \$1,000 assessed valuation will be presented at the hearing. The figures were released by Village Commissioner William Martin.

The tax levy and consequently the tax rate are subject to change, he said, because he has not yet received the amount of state tax credit due the village. Last year's tax credit of \$1.53 per \$1,000 assessed valuation was used to arrive at the budget figures, Martin said. An increase over the \$1.53 could lower the tax rate; a decrease could raise the tax rate.

The proposed budget reflects an increase in the tax rate over 1969 of \$1.39 per \$1,000 assessed valuation. The total budget is \$54,301,477 higher than the previous one.

Estimated increases are noted in general government \$42,650 (up \$4,379); protection of property and person \$39,720 (up \$7,160); health,

## Petitions Seek Referendum on Swimming Pool

Petitions requesting a referendum on the proposal of the Kewaskum school district to borrow \$75,000 in additional funds for the purpose of permanent improvement of lands, specifically the construction of an enclosure attached to the existing high school building to house a swimming pool as donated by the Kewaskum Kiwanis Foundation, and related facilities, at Kewaskum Community high school are being circulated in the school district.

The petitions require the signatures of 500 electors of the district and must be filed within 15 days of the board's notice of intent to borrow \$75,000 for the project which was published on Nov. 14 in the Statesman. The petitions will be filed with Jack Jadro, district clerk.

Richard Theusch said Wednesday that the solicitation for signatures on the petitions has been very successful.

The swimming pool project will cost an estimated \$310,000 to \$316,000 and the additional funds are required for the project.

Mrs. Richard Theusch said petitions are available at Heggies Oil Co. and Homer's Barber Shop in Kewaskum and at Petri's store and Barney Strobel's tavern in Wayne.

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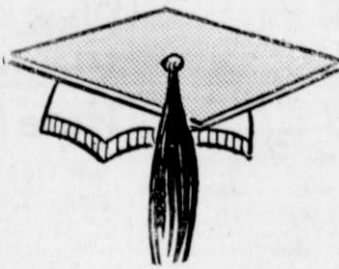
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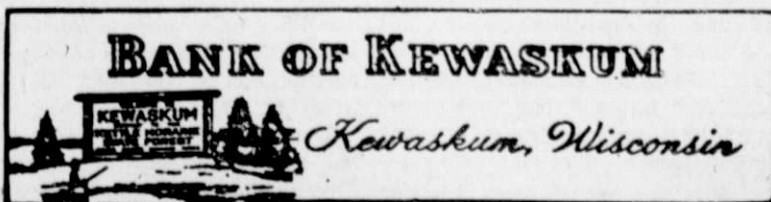

1,100 feet of sod waterway next spring and 25 acres of contour strip cropping next fall.

As was pointed out in a farm-city film presented by Roy Esser, Kewaskum high school vocational agriculture teacher, it takes many things to be a good farmer such as mechanical and marketing ability, to mention a few. But Don Kurer, county soil conservationist, believes persistence and determination is high on the list. These two men are persistent in getting the job done because they believe in the results.

rairie lake, Mauthe lake, and Campbellsport pond in Fond du Lac county; Silver lake, Little Cedar lake, and Big Cedar lake in Washington county; Crooked lake in Sheboygan county; Bradford Beach, and McKinley Beach in Milwaukee county.

Dr. Rodney Harmsworth, a vice-president of the Limnetics firm, said that the eutrophication of lakes in southeastern Wisconsin is getting worse. He described eutrophication—excessive fertilization

that results in destructive weed and algae growth—as a subtle process that generally goes unnoticed until suddenly there is a large bloom of algae.

The main thrust behind Reuss' public statements on the watershed is a drive to cut down on the amount of phosphates in household washing products. He will hold hearing in Washington, D. C. next month to determine "what, if anything, the detergent industry is doing to stop polluting our lakes."

According to the report, the organism is commonly found in the organism intestinal tract and considered to be a non-pathogen in the intestine. Although not commonly considered a sewage bacterium, the report states, the organism has been found in sewage and tends to thrive in polluted waters.

cited the importance of Sen. McKenna's election to Democrats in the State Senate. "This one vote makes it impossible for the majority party to ignore the rules of the Senate as they have been doing," Risser declared. A two-thirds vote is required to suspend the rules. With McKenna's victory the Republican majority no longer has a two-thirds vote.

Sen. McKenna, in thanking the dinner guests, praised many of his supporters who "gave of themselves above and beyond the call of duty in an uncommon measure." McKenna called on all persons to join with him in his fight for tax reform and tax justice. "We have served notice to the entire state of Wisconsin that the family man and the family farmer can no longer be the fall guys for increased taxes in this state," Sen. McKenna declared. A broad based tax program including the wealthy corporate profits and special interest groups must become law for tax justice he concluded.

welfare and sanitation \$32,575 (up \$11,041); education and recreation \$37,750 (up \$11,361); education and recreation \$11,900 (up \$2,205); outlay expenditures \$44,000 (up \$30,034); county taxes on property \$95,000 (up \$8,008); school districts \$356,627 (up \$3,807). Indebtedness is estimated at \$27,078 (down \$8,101).

Martin the 1969 figures are based on actual expenditures to date with estimates on what is needed for the remainder of the year.

He also said that in view of the fact that a complete appropriation for a needed municipal garage would have resulted in a substantial increase in the tax rate, only \$10,000 was appropriated in the 1970 budget and that the cost of the building would be spread out to reach the full amount.

Also, he said, included in the budget is an appropriation for \$15,000 for a garbage truck and a pick-up truck; also, the village is setting aside \$5,000 per year over a three-year period in anticipation of a new fire truck with the hope that the volunteer fire department will match that amount.

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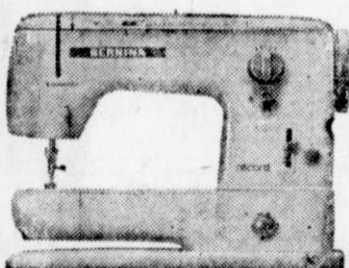

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### Minutes of Village Board Meeting

Regular Meeting  
November 3, 1969

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session at 8:00 p. m. in the Council Room of the Municipal Building with President Wietor presiding and all board members present.

The minutes of the previous meeting (October 6th) were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Perschbacher, seconded by Trustee Kral and duly carried.

### SECONDARY THOUGHTS

By the Staff of Kewaskum Community High School

#### THE SPECIALIZED READING PROGRAM IN THE HIGH SCHOOL

Because reading is such a vital skill for the high school student and the citizen of tomorrow, facilities are provided in the Kewaskum High school for reading improvement. The program is utilized mainly by ninth grade students because they are usually receptive to the promise of such improvement. During the 1968-69 school year, seventy-five students participated in the specialized reading program. Of those, twenty-nine were freshmen, twenty-five were sophomores, and twenty-one were juniors. This year sixty-one students of the ninth and tenth grades are presently enrolled.

The reading laboratory is very well equipped with a variety of materials. The most-used material is the Controlled Reader. Such a machine allows the reader to work at his own reading level and speed on a purely individual basis. The words of a story appear on a screen at a set rate, and this trains the reader's eyes to go in a certain pattern at a logical speed for him. The words are shown in a continuous fashion, which thus trains the student to concentrate more fully than reading in a book requires. To the student in ninth grade who reads at a fourth grade level, this may be one of the few opportunities he has all year to read material he is capable of digesting!

Part of reading improvement is also learning to listen carefully. For this reason, records and tape recordings are also available. These include such things as motivation through sound and practice in listening only once to the spoken directions. The Listen and Read Series, which is part of the Educational Developmental Laboratories research on reading, does have workbooks to coincide with the spoken lesson. The emphasis, however, is on the skill of listening.

Homogeneous grouping is done in the English sections whenever possible. The sections composed of students who have reading difficulties have texts that are geared more to their level and interests. Efforts are made to keep the class size about twenty students, which facilitates more individual help for each student. Opportunities are also provided for programmed learning. This individualized improvement can be in the form of vocabulary development; reading improvement, both of comprehension and speed; word analysis; the social studies, science, and reference areas; and the like. A Scholastic Magazine is also available to give the students a look at contemporary affairs that should be of interest to them.

Not only do the above-mentioned students have specialized help during their regular English class periods, but they also are in the reading lab two or three times per week during their study hall time. This added time reinforces the skills considered during class periods. Using these two work times to greatest advantage, students have been able to increase their reading speed from 125 words per minute to a more acceptable and average speed of 300 to 350 words per minute. Comprehension has also improved with the speed at such times.

The reading lab facilities are available for use by any high school student. A college-bound youth would be wise to avail himself of speed reading tactics if he felt his own ability limited in this area. The Kewaskum electorate has provided for many excellent facilities in the specialized reading department of the high school. It is a wise student who recognizes his own limitations in reading and then does all he can with the available materials to correct such limitations.

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## See Record Deer Kill in County

**TOTAL OF 234 REGISTERED UP TO WEDNESDAY MORNING**

Another record deer kill appeared in prospect in Washington county during the five day "any deer" shotgun season which opened Saturday and continued through Wednesday. Over the weekend alone a total of 155 deer were taken with 95 tallied on Saturday and 71 more on Sunday. Up to Wednesday morning a total of 234 deer were registered in the county.

Area hunters were reporting good results. Successful hunters included many from Kewaskum and numerous deer were seen on cars or "hanging up" in the village over the weekend. Reports from hunters who returned from the north woods mostly were that the hunting was spotty and not too well.

A total of 566 deer were killed in Fond du Lac and Dodge counties the first two days of the season over the weekend. Quite a few of successful Kewaskum hunters bagged their deer in Fond du Lac and Sheboygan counties.

A non-hunter was the most successful hunter. He was Al Voigt, R. 1, Kewaskum, an excavating and grading contractor, who got TWO deer the "easy way" when trucks he drove on Badger rd. west of Hwy. 45 struck and killed deer. The first mishap occurred about 5 p. m. Sunday, Nov. 16, when a deer ran out in front of his dump truck. The second one happened about 8:25 a. m. Saturday, Nov. 22, the opening day of the season, when a pickup truck Al was driving in the same area where he is working, also struck a deer. In both instances the deer were killed without damage to the trucks, it was reported.

### County Offices to Have Agricultural Census Information

Information about the 1969 Census of Agriculture is expected to be available in all county ASCS offices by Dec. 1, according to Keith Kreul, chairman.

Chairman Kreul said in late November the Bureau of Census in Washington will send to all county ASCS offices an information packet containing a reference handbook, an introductory letter and a sample questionnaire. Information in the packet will help county office employees answer questions from farmers about the 1969 agricultural census.

The chairman said farmers will receive the 1969 agricultural census questionnaire by mail on or about Jan. 1, 1970. The questionnaire should be filled out and mailed back to the Census Bureau not later than Feb. 15.

Chairman Kreul said farmer cooperation in this census is very important because decisions that will lead to improved farm programs must be based on reliable facts and those facts can only be obtained through a nationwide census of all farms and ranches.

He said ASCS is one of the key agencies in the U. S. Department of Agriculture through which information on the 1969 Census of Agriculture will be handled.
