Fire Department Elects Officers

At the December meeting of the Kewaskum fire department held last Thursday night at the municipal building, officers were elected for the coming year.

Ollie Staehler, Jr. was elected as the new assistant fire chief, succeeding William Martin, who held the office for a number of years. Richard Boden was elected captain to succeed Staehler, who formerly held that position. Other officers re-elected were Eddie Miller, lieutenant; George Koerble, secretary, and Donald Seil, treasurer. Don Ehrent was elected first aid lieutenant.

Fire Chief Armin Oppermann is not elected by the department but is appointed by the village board and holds over in office.

The firemen also are making plans for their annual stag party early in January, their annual banquet including wives and lady friends later in January, the Badger Firemen's association annual bowling tournament at Brown Deer in late January and early February, and the Badger association's spring banquet in April at the Belgium Community Center.

Elect Seefeldt As Corporation Counsel of County

POST IS FIRST IN HISTORY OF COUNTY

Atty. Aldwin Seefeldt of West Bend, a native and former resident of Kewaskum, will serve Washington county in its newly created post of county corporation counsel, the first in the history of the county. County supervisors resorted to secret ballots Tuesday to fill the counsel post and one other appointive office, chief deputy sheriff, to fill the va-

cancy which will occur on Jan. 1, 1970, when the present chief deputy, Alvin Schmidt, retires. Allen D. Becker, present chief investigator for the sheriff's department, was elected chief deputy sheriff.

Seefeldt, present assistant district attorney, was appointed by a majority vote of the supervisors. He won over Atty. Luke Kauth, West Bend, and also begins his new duties on Jan. 1. The salary of the corporation counsel, which was set at the annual budget session in October-November, is \$16,500 per year.

The county board approved the establishment of the position of corporation counsel last month, after attorneys and judges came before the board and expressed the need for such an office. The duties will generally be limited to civil matters. Seefeldt will give legal advice to all county departments and officials. He will handle bond issues, tax liens and foreclosures and will represent the county in matters involving workmen's compensation. He will also handle zoning and sanitary ordinance legal matters and represent the county in wage negotiations.

Seefeldt will be under the jurisdiction of the county personnel committee. One of the restrictions is that the person serving as county corporation counsel not be engaged in private law practice. The term of office will continue "at the pleasure of the county board" and may be terminated at any time by a majority vote of the board.

The board vote was Seefeldt 19 and Kauth 7. A third candidate, Henry Renard, withdrew prior to Tuesday's board session.

A resolution was approved by the board for the rental of space in the former county home building for an office for the state driver license examiners at \$100 per month rental fee.

ELECTORS URGED TO VOTE; POLLS OPEN 7 A. M. - 8 P. M.

OK New Wage Schedule for Village Employees

INCREASES WILL GO INTO EFFECT JAN. 1

Following a meeting with the workers, members of the village board approved a new wage and salary schedule for village employees. The schedule will go into effect Jan. 1.

Approved were increases of \$60 per month for the superintendent of public works, the village commissioner and the sewage plant operator. The chief of police was granted a \$65 per month increase and a \$35 a month increase was approved for the full-time patrolman.

For full-time general labor, the hourly rate was increased from \$2.93 to \$3.20. Daily pay for the two adult crossing guards was also raised from \$5 to \$6. The hourly rate for part-time patrolmen raised from \$2.75 to \$3. The rate for part-time office help in the village commissioner's office was upped from \$1.70 to \$1.80 per hour.

Part-time general labor, which includes students hired for the summer, will be paid \$2 instead of \$1.75 per hour. Summer recreation personnel that includes swimming instructor, life guards and playground helpers will continue at the rate of \$1.75 per hour.

Death of Marvin Schaefer, Former Public Official

Marvin J. "Shorty" Schaefer, 68, of 1438 Bilgo lane, Kewaskum, who was well known in the area, passed away on Saturday, Dec. 6, at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, following an illness of nine months.

He was born on Feb. 18, 1901, in the town of Kewaskum, a son of the late August and Mary Kocher Schaefer, and resided in this area all his life. His marriage to the former Marcella Casper took place on June 5, 1937, at Holy Trinity rectory in Kewaskum.

Mr. Schaefer formerly was a plumber for many years and at the time of his retirement was an employee of the village of Kewaskum. He was a former member of the Kewaskum village board, a former deputy sheriff of Washington county, former member of the Kewaskum fire department and presently an honorary member of that organization.

Survivors include his widow, six children, Richard at home; Mary (Mrs. Tory Russell) of R. 2, Kewaskum, Ann (Mrs. Joseph Enright) of R. 1, Kewaskum, Jean (Mrs. Bruce Spurlick) of Lawton, Okla., Mark and Steven at home; three sons-in-law; five grandchildren, Susan, Jane, James and Tara Russell and Douglas Enright; three sisters, Esther (Mrs. Henry Petermann) of rural Campbellsport, Lorinda (Mrs. J. The school board of Kewaskum Community schools at a special meeting on Monday, Dec. 1, instructed the clerk of the board to call for a referendum election on the proposed swimming pool project. The board set Tuesday, Dec. 16, as the date for the referendum to be held at Kewaskum Community high school in the multi-purpose room.

The election was called upon receipt by the board of a petition with 731 signatures of persons opposing the proposal attached. The polls will be open from 7 a. m. to 8 p. m. to give all electors an opportunity to cast their vote.

The referendum will be on the additional amount of money needed to proceed with the planned swimming pool project at the high school.

Voters will decide whether or not the board shall borrow \$75,000.00. Funds totaling \$250,000 are available for this project at this time. Voters will decide whether an additional amount shall be borrowed on this project.

A "yes" vote would allow the district to proceed with the project according to present architectural plans. A "no" vote would mean that the district could not proceed according to present architectural plans.

Absentee ballots are available from the district clerk, John A. Jadro, from Dec. 9 to Dec. 15, at Burekhardt Electric, Inc. on Main st. in Kewaskum. Written requests for absentee ballots must be received by 5 p. m. on Friday, Dec. 12. In person applications may be made until 5 p. m. on Monday, Dec. 15.

Official notice of the election was published in the Kewaskum Statesman on Dec. 6 and is again published in Dec. 12 issue today.

The swimming pool project has been an issue of much controversy in the school district, especially during recent weeks. Tuesday is the day to settle the issue. Whether for or against the pool, electors are urged to turn out and cast their ballots to indicate their preference.

After all the years of planning and hard work by countless dedicated individuals, the fate of the Kewaskum Community Pool Project will be decided on the results of the referendum to borrow an additional \$75,000.00 necessary to complete the project.

Members of the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club firmly believe that defeat of the referendum would be an irreparable loss to all residents, particularly the children, in all parts of Joint School District No. 2. That is why members of the Club believe that, as a public service, this message is necessary. Its purpose is to state facts where it is believed that conjecture or misunderstanding may exist.

WHO BENEFITS MOST FROM A COMMUNITY SWIMMING POOL?

Obviously, all the school children in School District No. 2. The experience in other communities, however, is that pools are enjoyed by residents throughout the districts and after school and weekend programs are necessary. It should be emphasized that this is a School District, not a Village of Kewaskum, swimming pool.

IS A SWIMMING POOL NECESSARY?

Opponents like to harp on this question. The answer is that it is no more necessary than a track, football field, a tennis court, or even a gymnasium. The point is that a pool offers benefits to more people than most facilities and, more important, provides the well-rounded physical educational program that is essential to a progressive community.

WHY NOT POSTPONE BUILDING THE POOL?

The postponement would undoubtedly be indefinite. Due to the efforts of members of the School Board, building expenses were cut to the bone and the contractors agreed, in spite of rising material and labor costs, to build the new pool on a fixed cost basis. It is estimated that presently building costs are increasing at approximately 1% per month. At this rate, in ten years the cost of the pool would be double the present cost.

WHAT HAPPENS IF THE REFERENDUM IS DEFEATED?

- * The children and adults in all parts of the school district would be deprived of the many benefits of a pool (discussed time and again) being enjoyed in many districts the size of School District No. 2.
- * The \$75,000 raised specifically for the swimming pool by the Kiwanis Club would probably be lost.
- * Approximately \$15,000 in architects fees would be lost.
- * Both short and long range building plans to provide students in the district with the best possible facilities at the lowest possible cost would receive a set-back.
- * Funds, space and services already available for use in connection with the pool would be directed, where possible, to other purposes.

WHO WORKED TO MAKE THE SWIMMING POOL POSSIBLE?

A conservative estimate would be that some 2,000 men, women and children throughout all parts of the School District worked to obtain or donated to the Pool fund. Contributions were received from the following:

- 29 Businesses located throughout the District
- 5 Community Organizations
- 200 Families and individuals made direct contributions
- The entire student body at Kewaskum High School helped to raise funds.
- Hundreds of adults worked at fund raising projects.

WHAT WILL THE ADDITIONAL \$75,000 COST THE TAXPAYERS?

A resident with a property valued at \$20,000.00 would have to pay an average of \$2.80 per year. The cost per family will be about \$29.60 over a period of 10 years. In 1971 the amount would be \$4.00 and in 1980 (the last payment) the amount would be \$2.00.

The Kewaskum Kiwanis Club has supported educational and recreational projects throughout the year and will continue to do so. It supports the Kewaskum Community Pool Project and urges all residents of School District No. 2 to vote "YES" to the Referendum on Tuesday, December 16, 1969.

Indians Upset Grafton '5' in Opener, 75-60

After establishing a 2-1 record against strong competition in pre-season action, the Kewaskum Indians opened Scenic Moraine conference play at Grafton Friday and upset the Blackhawks, perennial title contenders, by a convincing 75-60 score. Grafton was the No. 2 team in the conference last year.

The going will be a lot tougher tonight (Friday) when the Indians entertain Hartland Arrowhead in their first home contest. Little was known about the strength of Arrowhead, a new school in the conference this year, until last Friday when they upset defending champion Slinger, 64-61. And Slinger, with several veterans back, was picked to repeat as title winner this season. The Owls had won three straight non-conference games before bumping into Hartland.

Kewaskum erased an early 14-6 Grafton lead and over-hauled the Blackhawks at the end of the first quarter, 20-17. The Indians outpointed Grafton from then on in every other quarter and increased their advantage as the game progressed. The halftime score was 40-35 in Kewaskum's favor. The winners bested Grafton by 11 points in the second half.

Randy Koth, who led all scorers with 20 points, and Dick Bartelt, who garnered 18, supplied some fine outside shooting for Kewaskum. Tony Butschlick and Steve Stern chipped in 14 and 12 points respectively. Grafton's victory hopes received a jolt in the first half when its leading scorer and rebounder, Steve Strenger, an all-conference second team pick last season, was shackled with four fouls. He scored 11 points the first half but got only four the remainder of the way. Strenger still led his team in scoring with 14 points, while Siewers and De Leeuw each collected 12.

The Indians have a hard path ahead of them. The schedule calls for them to face the three toughest teams in their first three contests. After disposing of Grafton in the first one last week and squaring off with Hartland tonight, they meet Slinger here Tuesday.

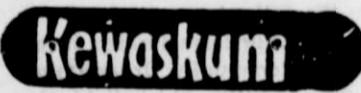
25 YEARS AGO

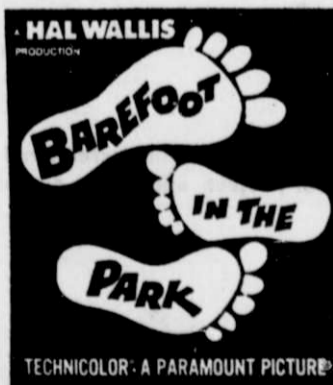

ORDINANCE NUMBER 69-4
TRAFFIC ORDINANCE

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That Section 3.01 of the Village Code of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, be amended as follows:

ADD:

346.595 (Motor Driven Cycles)
347.245 (1), (3), (4), and (5)
(Identification Emblem on Certain Slow Moving Vehicles)

CHANGE:

342.35 to 218.20
342.38 (2) to 218.23 (2)
342.40 to 218.30
342.43 (2) to 218.33 (2)

Section 2. That Section 3.09 of the Village Code of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, be amended to read as follows:

3.09 Reference to Statutes.

The term, "Wisconsin Statutes", wherever used in this ordinance shall mean the most recent Wisconsin Statutes, as amended, created or as otherwise affected by the enactments of the legislature then in session.

Section 3. That the above Sections shall take effect and be in force on Jan. 1, 1970.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 69-5
DOG AND CAT ORDINANCE

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That Section 9.01 of the Village Code of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, is repealed and re-created as follows:

DOG AND CAT ORDINANCE

9.01 (1) Dog and Cat Licenses.

(a) The provisions of Chapter 175 of the Wisconsin Statutes shall apply to the issuance of dog licenses in the Village of Kewaskum.

(b) Every owner of a cat five (5) months or older shall annually, or within thirty (30) days from the date such cat becomes 5 months of age, pay his cat license tax and obtain a license therefor at the office of the Village Commissioner. Such annual cat license shall be \$1.00 for each male cat and spayed female cat and \$2.00 for each female cat, or one-half of these amounts if such cat becomes 5 months of age after July 1st of the license year. The license year shall commence on January 1st and end on the following December 31st.

9.01 (2) Dogs and Cats Not To Run At Large.

(a) It shall be unlawful for the owner or keeper of any dog or cat licensed or unlicensed, to permit the same to run at large in the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin. A dog or cat shall be deemed to be at large unless under the control of a person by means of a chain, rope or cord of sufficient strength to control the actions of such dog or cat or such personal presence and attention as will reasonably control the conduct of said dog or cat. Any police officer within the Village of Kewaskum shall seize, impound or restrain any dog or cat running at large.

(b) Any police officer who has acted pursuant to (a) above shall notify the owner personally or through the mail, if such owner be known to the officer or can be ascertained with reasonable effort. Such officer shall carefully read the "lost and found" column of the local newspapers having general circulation in the

community to determine whether or not a dog or cat is therein advertised which answers the description of any such impounded dog or cat, and shall promptly communicate with the advertiser thereof if such be found. If such owner be unknown or cannot be ascertained, then the officer shall post written notice in three (3) public places in the Village, giving a description of the dog or cat, stating where it is impounded and the conditions for its release within forty-eight (48) hours, Sundays excepted, after such officer shall have taken said dog or cat into his possession. If after seven (7) days the owner does not claim such cat or dog such officer or any party designated by the Chief of Police of the Village of Kewaskum shall dispose of or arrange for the disposal of the dog or cat in a proper and humane manner. Every officer who has received a dog or cat under this subsection shall keep a record of such dog or cat describing the dog or cat with reasonable certainty of identification and listing the name and address of the party to whom the dog or cat was delivered or the manner in which the dog or cat was otherwise disposed of. In addition, any person to whom the dog or cat is delivered must sign a statement to that effect giving his name, address and the date of delivery or receipt of such dog or cat.

9.01 (3) Conditions of Release.

Section (2) (b) above provides that the officer giving notice shall give conditions for the release of said impounded dog or cat. The conditions of release for a licensed dog or cat shall be the reimbursement to the Village Commissioner for any expenditures the Village has incurred by impounding the dog or cat. The conditions for the release of an unlicensed dog or cat are the purchase of a license plus the reimbursement to the Village Commissioner for the expenditures incurred by the Village in impounding said dog or cat.

9.01 (4) Penalties.

Instead of the seizing and impounding of the dog or cat, the Village of Kewaskum may prosecute the owner or keeper of any dog or cat running at large as set forth in (2) above, and any such person upon conviction thereof shall forfeit not less than five (\$5.00) Dollars nor more than one hundred (\$100.00) Dollars together with the costs of prosecution. Except that if said dog or cat is an unlicensed dog or cat, then the forfeiture shall be not less than ten (\$10.00) Dollars plus the cost of the license.

9.01 (5) Bail and Forfeiture of Bail.

Any person upon being notified by a police official of the Village of Kewaskum of his violation or alleged violation of any sections of this ordinance may post a bond of twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars for the first offense or fifty (\$50.00) Dollars for the second or subsequent offenses, except as hereinafter provided, plus the cost of a license if it is an unlicensed dog or cat. Such bonds and forfeiture may be paid only to the Village Commissioner.

Section 2. That the following Sections of 9.01 of the Village Code of the Village of Kewaskum are re-numbered as follows:

9:01 3 is re-numbered: 9.01 (6) Vicious Dogs.

9.01 4 is re-numbered: 9.01 (7) Confinement of Dogs Making Noises.

9.01 5 is re-numbered: 9.01 (8) Village President May Order Dogs Confined.

Section 3. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force on Jan. 1, 1970.

ORDINANCE

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That Section 9.29 of the Village Code of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, be created as follows:

VEHICLE JUNK YARD
ORDINANCE

9.29 (1) Vehicle Junk Yards Forbidden.

No person shall keep or maintain junked vehicles on his property within the corporate limits of the Village of Kewaskum if such junked vehicles are within the view of the general public.

9.29 (2) Junked Vehicle Defined.

Any vehicle which is unlicensed and which is not in an operating condition or which is generally worn out and discarded shall be a junked vehicle within the meaning of this section.

9.29 (3) Police Removal Provided.

If a person has been found to have violated this section, he may be requested to remove such offending vehicles. If the person fails to remove the offending vehicles within a reasonable time, the Village Police may have the vehicles removed at the expense of the owner of such vehicles.

9.29 (4) Penalty.

Whoever is found to have violated this section shall be required to forfeit not more than fifty (\$50.00) Dollars nor less than ten (\$10.00) Dollars plus any costs incurred in enforcing this section. If such person fails to forfeit the monies, he may be committed to the county jail until such forfeiture is paid; but not to exceed thirty (30) days.

Section 2. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force on Jan. 1, 1970.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 69-7
ABANDONED VEHICLE
ORDINANCE

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That Section 14.24 of the Village Code of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, be created as follows:

ABANDONED VEHICLE
ORDINANCE

14.24 (1) Abandoned Vehicle Defined.

Any vehicle, whether licensed or unlicensed, which has remained on any street, highway or road in the Village of Kewaskum for more than seven (7) days without the written permission of the Chief of Police or his authorized agent shall be an abandoned vehicle within the meaning of this section.

14.24 (2) Notice.

The Police Department of the Village of Kewaskum shall make reasonable efforts to locate the owner of any abandoned vehicle. If such an owner can be found,

he shall be required to immediately remove such vehicle or be subjected to a possible penalty in addition to having the Police Department remove the vehicle.

14.24 (3) Removal and Storage.

It shall be the duty of the Police Department to direct removal of any abandoned vehicle. Such vehicle shall be removed to an area for storage. The vehicle shall remain in storage for a period not to exceed thirty days. At the end of thirty days, the Village Police may direct the removal and sale of the vehicle. Any costs received in the sale of the vehicle shall be used to offset the costs incurred in storage of the vehicle. The storage rate shall be one (\$1.00) Dollars per day. Upon the removal and sale of the vehicle the Police Department shall keep a record which will set forth the name of the party removing the vehicle, the price paid for the vehicle, the costs for the storage of the vehicle, and reasonable identification of the vehicle.

14.24 (4) Penalty.

Any person found to have violated the provisions of this section shall be required to forfeit to the Village of Kewaskum an amount not to exceed fifty (\$50.00) Dollars nor less than ten (\$10.00) Dollars plus any costs of storage and any costs incurred in enforcing this section. If such person fails to forfeit the sum, he may be committed to the county jail until such forfeiture is paid; but not to exceed thirty (30) days.

Section 2. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force on Jan. 1, 1970.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 69-8
DANCE LICENSE AND
PERMIT ORDINANCE

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That Section 11.11 DANCE PERMIT of the Village Code of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, is repealed and re-created as follows:

DANCE LICENSE AND
PERMIT ORDINANCE

11.11 (1) License Required.

No person, firm or corporation shall conduct or manage for gain within the corporate limits of the Village of Kewaskum any dance hall or pavilion without first obtaining a license therefor.

11.11 (2) Application.

Every application for a license required by this section shall be made upon a blank furnished by the Village Commissioner and verified and shall contain the name, place of residence, age and occupation of the applicant, the purpose for which a license is desired and the place where he proposes to carry on or conduct such dance hall or pavilion within the corporate limits of the Village of Kewaskum. The Village Commissioner shall issue a license to the applicant upon his compliance with all the provisions of the Village Code and upon payment of the proper fees.

11.11 (3) Fees.

A fee for any dance hall or pavilion license shall be the sum of five (\$5.00) Dollars per year, said license to commence on the 1st day of January of each year and continue to the 31st day of December of that year. A license for a portion of the year may be obtained after the 1st of

January but such license shall be at the same rate as the annual license fee and will continue from the date of issuance until the 31st day of December of that year.

11.11 (4) Dance Permit Required.

It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation subject to the requirements of (1) above to conduct or hold any dance within the corporate limits of the Village of Kewaskum without first obtaining from the Village Commissioner a dance permit.

11.11 (5) Application for Dance Permit.

Every application for a dance permit required by this section shall be made upon a blank furnished by the Village Commissioner and shall be made at least five (5) days before said dance shall be held. The application shall contain the name and address of the person, association, or corporation making said application, the nature of the entertainment, the date and place thereof, the time during which the dance shall be conducted and the fee that shall be charged for admission to the same. The Village Commissioner shall issue a dance permit to the applicant upon the compliance with all the provisions of the Village Code of the Village of Kewaskum and upon payment of the proper fees.

11.11 (6) Fees.

Fees for dance permits shall be eighteen (\$18.00) Dollars.

11.11 (7) Dance Supervisor.

The Chief of Police of the Village of Kewaskum is hereby vested with the duty to inspect all dance halls for which licenses are required in accordance with this ordinance. The Chief of Police shall appoint a dance supervisor for each dance for which a dance permit shall be issued hereunder. It shall be the duty of said dance supervisor to inspect any dance hall in which a dance is to be held and to supervise the dance for which a dance permit has been issued. The fee charged in the foregoing Subsection (6) shall be used to defray the costs of administering this ordinance.

11.11 (8) Penalty.

Any person found guilty of a violation of the above sections shall be required to forfeit to the Village of Kewaskum not less than twenty five (\$25.00) Dollars nor more than one hundred (\$100.00) Dollars. In default of payment such person shall be imprisoned in the county jail until such forfeiture is paid; but said imprisonment is not to exceed thirty (30) days.

Section 2. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force on Jan. 1 1970.

- (a) On the even numbered side of the street or highway on those dates which bear an even calendar date at 11:00 P. M.
- (b) On the odd numbered side of the street or highway on those dates which bear an odd calendar date at 11:00 P. M.

9.30 (2) Exceptions.

Section (1) shall not apply to vehicles parked for a period of up to 20 minutes for the actual loading or unloading of passengers or property.

9.30 (3) Penalty.

Any person found to have violated Section (1) shall be required to pay a forfeiture of not less than Five and No/100 Dollars (\$5.00) nor more than Twenty Five and No/100 Dollars (\$25.00); in default of payment of such forfeiture said person shall be incarcerated in the County Jail for a period not to exceed Ten (10) days.

Section 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect on Jan. 1, 1970.
