Swimming Pool Proposal Defeated by 2-to-1 Margin

Tally Shows 882 Against, 467 For

VOTER TURN-OUT OF 1,349 LARGEST EVER

A referendum that would have authorized borrowing an additional \$75,000 needed to finance a school district swimming pool was defeated by nearly a two-to-one margin by electors of the Kewaskum Community Schools district in a special election Tuesday.

Taxpayers swarmed to the polls in the largest voter turn-out ever for a school referendum in the district. A total of 1,349 votes were cast during the polling hours of 7 a. m. and 8 p. m. and 882 voted against the proposal and 467 in favor.

In rejecting an additional \$75,000 bond for the \$325,000 project, voters refused to be swayed by the offer of the Kewaskum Kiwanis club of \$75,000 in non-tax money toward the construction of the pool. The pool project dates back to 1968 when at the annual school meeting the Kiwanis club offered to donate a \$75,000 pool and district electors approved borrowing up to \$155,000 to provide an enclosure and related facilities.

In the neighborhood of 900 votes in a school district referendum would be about normal, it was reported, as compared to the 1,349 ballots cast Tuesday. The voting was heavy all day and it was noted by poll workers and officials that the turn-out by voters from rural areas and by elderly persons was particularly strong and defeated it. Opposition to the pool project was the high price tag and additional taxes it would require.

The key opponent to the project was Richard Theusch of the town of Wayne. He led the petitioning campaign which drew 731 signatures and therefore required the school district to call a referendum. Theusch said he was certainly happy that people turned out to vote and expressed their opinion to the school board. He commented that he wouldn't be surprised if the pool project came up in a different form at some time in the future.

In the first year, the pool would have cost the taxpayer with a \$20,000 market value property approximately \$10.80 on his tax bill.

After the pools closed at 8 p. m. and the counting of ballots began, it immediately became apparent by the stacks of "yes" and "no" ballots that the proposal was going to be defeated by a sizable margin. It took only 35 minutes to count the ballots.

A school official remarked that it was doubtful if it will come up again in the same form for some time. An official of the school district said he didn't know what the Kiwanis club would do with its \$75,000 at this point and without the Kiwanis support it would look like a hopeless case. A representative of the Kiwanis club stated that he was very disappointed

for those who worked so hard for the pool fund and for the students who have been looking forward to using the pool while they are still in school. He said he does not know at this time what direction the club will follow.

A number of electors in the district felt that the pool was a luxury and that the first consideration in the district should go to needed, additional classrooms in three of the schools as outlined in projected plans for alleviating over-crowded conditions.

The long range plan for the school district includes construction of another high school facility in the early 1970's, and school officials pointed out before election day that the physical education program required another

teaching station, regardless of what happened in the referendum.

The only direct monetary loss to the district as a result of the vote is the money spent for architect's fees, about \$15,000, and funds spent in the present building in anticipation of the pool construction. Those costs would not be a complete loss if the project ever came up in an altered form.

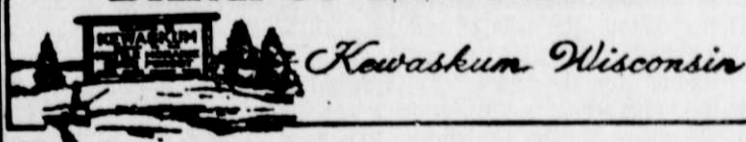

Indians Win Over Hartland, Slinger, Take Scenic Lead

The Kewaskum Indians won two big ones the past week, defeating two of the topnotch teams, and took over the undisputed lead in the Scenic conference with a 3-0 record to remain the only undefeated team in the league. Last Friday here Kewaskum handily downed Hartland Arrowhead, which had previously beaten Slinger, and was picked as a strong contender, 87-74. Then on Tuesday the Indians won over defending champion Slinger, which was selected as the favorite to repeat this year, 57-53.

Friday's win came over a strong Arrowhead team with the Indians playing their best basketball of the season to beat a Hartland team that looked good in defeat. Kewaskum had a very high shooting percentage. They just couldn't miss and popped them in from all over the floor. The Indians were hot and they had to be because Hartland was also hitting regularly. Both teams shot exceptionally well.

Clark Eichstedt led the Indians with 29 points while Dick Bartelt flipped in 18. Eichstedt, Bartelt and Steve Stern controlled the boards and Kewaskum's rebounding proved to be the margin of victory. Tony Butschlick was deadly in the first half with 13 points while Randy Koth came through with 14 in the second half. All of Kewaskum's starters shot well and four of them scored 15 or more points.

Rod Barbara drove in for 5 lay-ups against the Indians' zone defense and was also hitting from the outside as he wound up with 18 points. Leading scorer was Steve Pfeiffer with 30 points.

Kewaskum built up a 28-21 lead at the quarter but by halftime Hartland, which is a new school in the conference this year, cut the margin to 43-40. The Indians won the game with a big third period burning the nets for 30 points to Arrowhead's 14 and taking a big 19-point lead, 73-54. The losers narrowed the final margin to 13 points in the final period.

In defeating Slinger Tuesday, 57-53, the Indians looked ragged at times, didn't have near the fitness they had against Hartland, and had to regain their cool to cke out a victory as the result of a late Slinger surge.

Kewaskum broke Slinger's press in the opening quarter to take a commanding 17-5 lead and it looked like a runaway. The Indians still were well ahead, 35-25 at halftime. But Kewaskum couldn't play its usual deliberate type of ball in the second half against Slinger's continuous hounding, pressing defense which is all over you like a swarm of bees. The Owls fell behind by 13 points in the third period but stormed back to tie it up at 52-52 in the final quarter, but Butschlick's four points in the last two minutes brought the victory. The Owls pumped in 20 points in the last 8 minutes while letting the Indians in a state of frustration.

Coach Walt Bade commented: "We did lose our composure in this ragged game and Slinger forced us to play its kind of ball. He added that the Indians were far from the smooth team that won handily over Hartland. "On Friday we shot 58 per cent from the field but against Slinger, their harassment brought us down to 33 per cent. We didn't play particularly well."

Bartelt led the winners, who hit only 21 of 61 shots, with 16 points

while Butschlick added 12 and Koth 10. Larry Gundrum paced Slinger with 18. The Indians got a boost on the boards from Steve Stern, who pulled down 14 rebounds.

Tonight (Friday) Kewaskum plays at Campbellsport in the last game until after the holidays. The Bells are 2-1.
