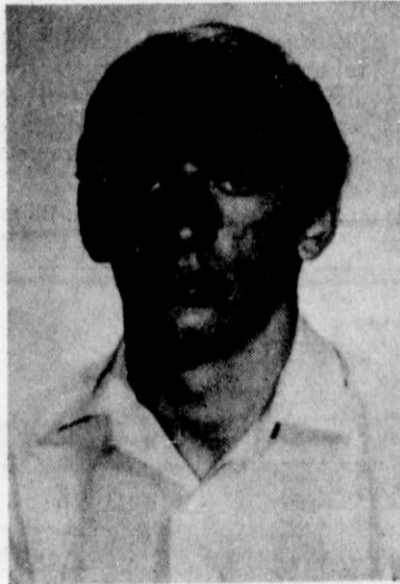

Local Student Nominated to U. S. Military Academy at West Point

LEE RAMMER, TWO OTHER COUNTY YOUTHS SELECTED



Three Washington county students are among the 26 youths nominated from the Sixth District for entrance into the U. S. service academies, according to an announcement this week from Congressman William A. Steiger.

A principal nominee for the U. S. Military Academy at West Point is Lee Rammer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Rammer, R. 1, Kewaskum, a senior at Kewaskum Community high school.

James Brust, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Brust, Slinger, has been selected as an alternate to West Point, and Daniel Schellinger, son of Mrs. Joan Schellinger, West Bend, as an alternate to the U. S. Air Force Academy at Colorado Springs, Colo.

The nominees were selected by members of the Sixth District Commission on Congressional Appointments at a commission meeting earlier this month in Ripon. The commission chose 16 students as principal nominees for vacancies at each of the four major academies. The remaining 10 students serve as alternates in the academies competition.

Members of Steiger's commission are: Bernard S. Adams, Ripon; Maurice G. Bobholz, West Bend; Mrs. Terrence DeBlock, Mequon; Frank M. Kennedy, Cedarburg; Harry H. Kind, Menasha; John C. Miller, Berlin; Mrs. Carlton O. Rogge, Fond du Lac; Donald J. Steinfert, Oshkosh; Wilfrid Turba, Elkhart Lake; Gaylord Unbehaun, Brillion; Tim Werner, Oostburg; Bernard C. Ziegler, West Bend.

Nominees selected included two principal nominees and three alternates to West Point, four principal nominees and three alternates to the U. S. Naval Academy at Annapolis, Md., three principal nominees and four alternates to the U. S. Air Force Academy, and seven nominations to the U. S. Merchant Marine Academy at Kings Point, N. Y.

The other principal nominee, along with Rammer, to West Point is Pvt. Harold S. Hedberg, Jr., Ft. Leonardwood, Mo., graduate of Menasha high school.

Norbert C. Studelska, Jr. of Grafton high school is one of the three alternates selected to West Point. Jeffrey C. Wachs of Washington high school, Germantown, is one of the four principal nominees to Annapolis and Patrick

LEE EICHSTEDT IS RE-ELECTED CHAIRMAN

Senator Dale McKenna, Democrat, 13th Senate District, conducted the annual election of Washington County Democratic Party officers on Sunday, Dec. 14.

Lee Eichstedt, West Bend, formerly of Kewaskum, was re-elected chairman to his second term. Vice-Chairman Ken Nyhouse was also re-elected for 1970. Mrs. Diane Feiten, R. 1, Kewaskum, will serve another term as recording secretary. The corresponding secretary will be Mrs. Hope Cross of West Bend and the treasurer for the new year will be Allen Kohl of West Bend. Sergeant-at-arms will again be Walter Gau, also of West Bend. The two members-at-large positions found John Propson and Merlin Oeder, both of West Bend, elected.

Eichstedt commented that he felt that 1969 was a very good year for Washington county Democrats. "The election of Dale McKenna was certainly the highlight of the year."

Unbeaten Indians Roll Over Bells For 4th Straight

The undefeated Kewaskum Indians won easily over the Bells at Campbellsport Friday to run their streak to four straight and maintain a full game lead in the Scenic conference. The score was 79-52 and definitely tagged the Indians as a strong title contender.

Signs posted throughout the gym and the enthusiasm of the Campbellsport crowd and players (at the start) indicated the Bells were definitely upset minded but it was no match. The Bells stayed in contention in the first quarter, trailing 15-10, but the Indians broke the game wide open in the second period, outscoring Campbellsport, 28-9, to take a commanding 43-19 advantage at the intermission. Kewaskum coasted the rest of the way and Coach Walt Bade was able to give his subs some experience in the final period.

What appeared to be a serious blow was received by the Indians right after the start of the game before any points were scored when starter Tony Butschlick was helped off the floor with a turned or sprained ankle. Tony, who was out for the rest of the game, usually scores in double figures and pulls in the rebounds when his mates, Steve Stern and Dick Bartelt, miss. But Butschlick wasn't needed and his substitute, Jim Tassar, did a fine job of filling in as well as scoring 14 points.

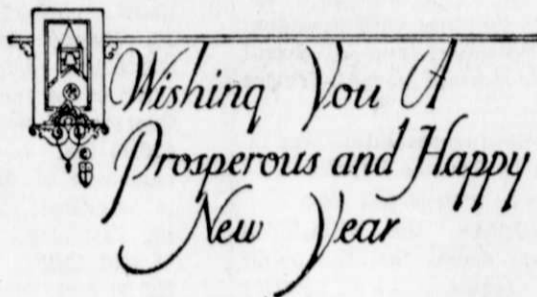
The much taller Indians, all of whom go over 6 feet except Randy Koth who isn't small at 5 feet, 11 inches, completely dominated the boards by grabbing two-thirds of the rebounds and controlling nearly all of the jump balls. All the other Indians are tall warriors with Bartelt and Clark Eichstedt going 6 ft. 2½ inches, Tassar 6 ft., 2 inches, and Steve Stern and Butschlick, 6 ft., 1 inch. With their height advantage, Kewaskum was able to very successfully utilize the long pass to rush down the floor for wide-open

Three Young Men Injured in Crash

Three young men were hurt in an auto accident at 1:10 a. m. Monday when a vehicle driven by William D. Kollman, 22, of Kenosha left Hwy. 45 at CTH V in the town of Kewaskum. The following resolution was introduced by Trustee Behnke:

RESOLUTION NO. 69-9

WHEREAS, the Village of Kewaskum deems that the public interest requires the vacation of Part of Plat of BEL-RIC ACRES, a Subdivision of part of the N.W. 1/4 of the N.E. 1/4 of Section 16, Town 12 North, Range 19 East, Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin:

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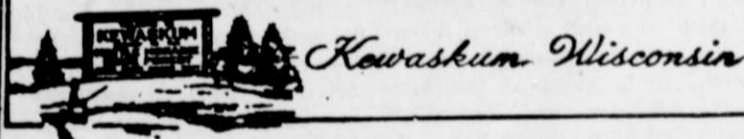
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Minutes of School Board Meeting

The board met in regular session at 8:00 p. m. in the board room at the high school on Monday, October 27, 1969, with all members present. Also in attendance were Mrs. Ruth Held, Mrs. June Berg, Mrs. Ed Connors, Mr. Richard Zarling and Mr. Howard Zemlicka.

Minutes for the October 1st, October 6th, October 16th and October 20th, 1969, meetings were approved on a motion by Mrs. Anne Panzer, seconded by Mr. Harry Oelhafen. Unanimously carried.

Motion by Mr. Allen Tessar, seconded by Mrs. Zona Miske to approve salary adjustments and summer school credit payments per printed lists, plus the addition of Paul Schoenberger. Unanimously carried.

Mr. Howard Zemlicka reported changes that had taken place in the industrial arts curriculum over the past 10 years. After reviewing the progress in this area, Mr. Zemlicka outlined possible changes for the future development of the program.

Mr. Ed Connors reported on the present high school curriculum and its strengths and weaknesses and the curriculum studies underway at the high school. The changed study hall concept of operation to begin during the second quarter was also explained.

Mr. Richard Zarling reported on the use of department heads to co-ordinate K-12 programs. The elementary art, music, and physical education programs were also explained.

Motion by Mrs. Allen Tessar, seconded by Mrs. Anne Panzer, to approve the attendance of Mr. Roy Esser at the National Convention of the Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association to be held in December in Boston, Mass.; unanimously carried. Mr. Esser is presently Vice-President of the Area 10 agriculture teachers association.

The board discussed the pool building project and the visit of Mr. Edwards and Mr. Boyd to Whitefish Bay's pool building which is housed in a structural steel building. No action was taken.

OBSERVATIONS OF TEEN-AGE DRIVERS

By Earl A. Buswell

Driver education is aimed at improving four major areas. They are:

1. To promote the safe, efficient, and rewarding use of the automobile. (Over thirty studies and the attitude of some insurance companies indicate that high school-trained drivers have significantly fewer accidents than untrained drivers).

2. To try to build personal responsibility for traffic conditions and improvements. (Mature attitudes are stressed).

3. To encourage better traffic citizenship. (Problems such as parking, congestion, engineering and law-enforcement are considered).

4. To encourage pride in performance and behavior. (High standards are important as our traffic and numbers of drivers increases).

With these criteria in mind, the driver education classes at our local high school attempted on their own to determine the areas that needed the greatest amount of improvement to come up to modern standards. The study was done by having each student record every act by motorist that was not in keeping with safe and sane practices. This was done for a period of seven days. (Please note this is not an attempt to be critical. Our only motive was to compile the list, study it in classes, and set in motion the various educational steps necessary to up-grade our whole school program). That list given in order from most often observed to least often observed follows:

Improper signals - is courteous at best, dangerous at most

Exceeding posted speed limits - number one highway killer

Rolling stops - bad at stop signs, worse at traffic lights

Did not use seat belts - constant use could save 5,500 lives per year

Made improper turns - don't make waves for other drivers

Fails to use mirrors - suicide on expressways

Inattentive driving - considered a factor in every fatal crash

Driving with one hand - unimportant until an emergency arises

Illegal parking - could be lack of ability to parallel park

Lights burned out - to be seen is as vital as to be able to see

Following too close - reaction distance at 60 mph is 66 feet

Hill and curve passing - real murder or attempted murder

You may have noticed some bad habits known to be problems on a national scale are missing. That is to the credit of local drivers and students would do well to emulate their patterns. If, however, any of the unsafe practices are a part of any reader's driving habits, we hope you will join your young friends, neighbors, or relatives in substantially reducing this list as soon as possible.

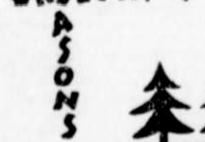
