Board OK's Plans for Sewage Treatment Plant Addition, New Municipal Garage

ESTIMATE COST OF PROJECTS AT \$190,000, \$75,000 RESPECTIVELY

Members of the village board Monday night gave the go ahead to plans that will expand the village sewage treatment plant at an estimated cost of \$190,000 and to building plans for a municipal garage expected to be built for about \$75,000.

Plans were presented and cost estimates were made by James Elder of Stone and Robinson, consulting engineers of Brookfield.

The board voted last October to proceed with the two projects and called for the plans. Elder said that expansion of the sewage treatment plant will double the present capacity. After expansion, the facility will be capable of handling 1 million gallons of raw waste or 3,000 pounds of biochemical oxygen demand (B.O.D.) per day.

Elder said the financing could be abated by 30 per cent federal aid and 25 per cent state aid. "By March 1, I can have the plans ready to submit for state approval," Elder told the board.

The garage will be built of steel in the area of the sewage plant. Included in the 80 by 140-foot structure will be a 30 by 80-foot shop and office area.

The board agreed on the plans and Elder was instructed to draw up specifications and to call for bids to be opened March 2.

A \$10,000 appropriation was included for the garage in the 1970 budget. The balance will be borrowed over a five-year period.

It was also noted that the final tabulation of 1969 figures will show a surplus in the general fund. Board members voted to establish a contingency fund and to transfer into it the surplus from the general fund. Village Commissioner William Martin said the actual amount will have been determined by the February board meeting.

Approval was given to an ordinance to go into effect Feb. 15 that states that every dog or cat, five months or older, must be vaccinated against rabies every three years by a licensed veterinarian.

Coyote, fox, raccoon or skunks kept as pets, regardless of age, must be vaccinated every year. The ordinance follows one approved in December that requires that cat owners will need to obtain a license for such animals, five months or older.

Before a license is issued, pet owners must present a tag showing the animal has been vaccinated.

On recommendation of Police Chief Donald Hlavaty, board members voted to reduce the minimum from \$5 to \$1 for the first violation of an ordinance that regulates overnight parking of cars between Nov. 1 and April 1. Parking will be allowed on odd numbered sides of the streets on odd numbered days and on even numbered sides on even numbered days.

Hlavaty said the penalty might cause financial hardship to senior citizens who might not remember

Window Broken, \$1,500 in Rings Stolen at Bier's

A tray full of 29 wedding, engagement and other rings valued at more than \$1,500 was stolen from a show window at Bier's Jewelry Store at 129 Main St. in Kewaskum sometime early Monday morning. Kewaskum police are continuing an investigation into the theft.

Police Chief Donald Hlavaty reported that the tray full of rings was on display in the jewelry store window. The thief or thieves apparently picked up a brick in the area and threw it through the window, reached in and took the tray of rings, and then fled. A showcase in the store was also broken when the brick was hurled through the window. The brick, which put a hole about 10 inches in diameter in the display window, which is about five feet high and six feet wide, was found inside the store.

The theft was discovered by Leroy Bier, owner and operator of the store, when he came to work about 8 a. m. Monday. Chief Hlavaty said the theft apparently occurred between 1:15 and 8:00 a. m. Monday. A police officer was on duty until 1 a. m.

Bier placed the actual wholesale cash value of the 29 rings, included in the display, some of which were diamonds, at \$1,559.85. He valued the rings at \$3,200.

The thieves, in their apparent hurry, overlooked other expensive jewelry in the window display, including valuable watches, costume jewelry, pendants, men's diamond tie-tack and cuff link sets, and other items. One ring which apparently was dropped by the thieves in their haste, was found outside the store the next morning and another was discovered near the railroad crossing about one-half block east of the store.

Anyone who might have seen persons in the area at the approximate time of the theft is urged to contact Kewaskum Police.

School Board to Exercise Options On Land for School Site Expansion

Backhaus Named Chief Investigator By Sheriff's Dept.

David W. Backhaus of 319 First st., Kewaskum, a 16-year veteran, and Donald G. Mertens, also a veteran member of the Washington County Sheriff's Department, received promotions by action of the sheriff's committee of the county board Tuesday. The appointments are retroactive to Jan. 1, 1970.

Sgt. Backhaus, traffic patrol officer who joined the department on March 1, 1953, has been promoted to chief investigator in the department to succeed Allen D. Becker, who earlier was named chief deputy sheriff to succeed Alvin Schmidt, who retired Dec. 31. Backhaus was named sergeant in January of 1966.

Mertens, who joined the department on April 1, 1959, has been promoted to the rank of sergeant, filling the vacancy created by the promotion of Backhaus.

Backhaus, a native of Kewaskum, attended elementary school in the village and graduated from Kewaskum High School. He also attended Milwaukee State Teachers College (now UW-M). Dave is married and he and his wife Virginia, and their four children, three boys and a girl, live in Kewaskum. Dave saw service in the Armed Forces as a member of the U. S. Navy. He has attended many special law enforcement and special police training and FBI schools.

Mertens, of West Bend, is also a lifelong resident of the area. He attended West Bend elementary and high schools. He served as a study hall supervisor at West Bend High School from 1963 to 1968 and has more recently been attending the Milwaukee Technical School. He has participated as an instructor in in-training service programs in law enforcement in Washington, Ozaukee and Fond du Lac counties and attended other specialized law enforcement and FBI schools. He served in the Marine Corps and he and his wife Frances, and their five children, two boys and three girls, live at 1019 Poplar St. in West Bend.

ANNE PANZER RESIGNS AS MEMBER OF SCHOOL BOARD; SUCCEEDED BY JUNE BERG

The board of education Monday night, Dec. 29, moved to exercise options on a total of 31.83 acres of land at a total cost of \$41,974 for future expansion of the present high school site.

Included in the purchase is 12.70 acres at \$2,100 per acre from August C. Bilgo for a total of \$26,670 and 19.13 acres from Howard and Jeannette Backhaus at \$800 per acre for a total of \$15,304.

The district has held the options since the July 1969 annual meeting, when electors authorized purchase of additional land.

Projected plans are to erect a school building to house a minimum of 300 students on the present high school site. The newly acquired area will be used for athletic fields.

The acreage lies north and east of the school to the Milwaukee River.

In other action, Mrs. Elwood (June) Berg of R. 2, Kewaskum, was appointed to membership on the school board, following the resignation of Mrs. Eugene Panzer.

In her letter of resignation dated Nov. 28, Mrs. Panzer said, "Due to other commitments and for other personal reasons, I feel I no longer have the time to devote."

Mrs. Panzer expressed her thanks for having had the opportunity to have been a member of the board.

Mrs. Berg was sworn in and seated immediately.

Board President Richard L. Edwards said the members had previously discussed the matter and they felt Mrs. Berg was the logical person to appoint, in view of the fact that she was an unsuccessful candidate in 1967 and 1969.

The unexpired term that Mrs. Berg will fill runs until the day of the 1970 annual meeting.

At the invitation of the school board, the principal of the Wayne, Beechwood and Farmington Elementary Schools were present to give comments on the operation of each school.

Board members accepted the resignation of Mrs. Jeffrey MacArthur as second and third grade teacher at the Wayne School, and as a replacement ratified a contract for Mrs. Donna Johanson of Campbellsport to complete the school year.

Board member Mrs. Edgar Miske will be the delegate to the meeting of the Wisconsin Association of School Boards meeting in Milwaukee Jan. 21, 22 and 23.

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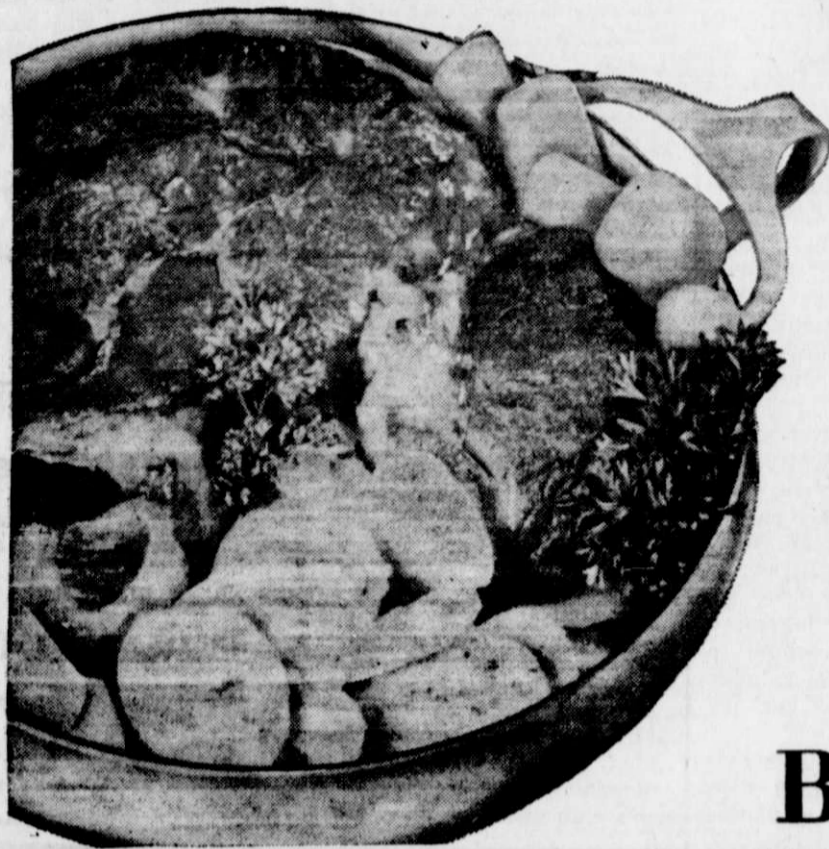

Revenue Dept. to Aid Taxpayers in Preparing Returns

Secretary of Revenue James R. Morgan reminds taxpayers that the Department of Revenue will provide assistance in preparing tax returns and will answer questions about income tax and the new 4% general sales tax law.

The new sales tax law, which became effective Sept. 1, 1969, provides for a 4% sales tax on all tangible personal property sold at retail, unless specifically exempt. Since the 4% sales tax is levied on the gross receipts of the retailer, all retailers selling taxable property are required to have a Wisconsin Seller's Permit. Retailers who are not registered with the department must file an application for a Seller's Permit.

The Wisconsin Department of Revenue offices located within the Milwaukee (southeast) district will be open for special taxpayer assistance between the hours of 7:45 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. Mondays through Fridays at Milwaukee, Racine and Waukesha beginning Jan. 5, and ending April 15, 1970.

The West Bend office at 519 Hickory st., and those at Elkhorn and Kenosha, will be open Mon-

days only. The telephone number at West Bend is 334-2416.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 70-1

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That Section 9.28 of the Village Code of the Village of Kewaskum be and is hereby created as follows:

9.28 (1) Rabies Vaccination Required.

(a) It shall be the duty of every owner of any dog or cat five (5) months of age or older to have such pet vaccinated against rabies every three (3) years by a licensed veterinarian.

(b) It shall be the duty of every owner of any coyote, fox, raccoon or skunk to have such mammalian pet, regardless of its age, vaccinated against rabies each year by a licensed veterinarian.

(c) The term, "owner", as used in this ordinance, shall mean any person keeping, harboring, or having charge or control of, or permitting any of the animals described in this ordinance to habitually be or remain on, or be lodged or fed within such person's house, yard or premises.

9.28 (2) Duty of Veterinarian, Certificate, Tag.

(a) Each veterinarian shall inoculate the mammalian pets described herein with appropriate rabies vaccine, and shall, at the time of such inoculation, complete a certificate of rabies vaccination which shall include the

owner's name and address, description of pet, date of vaccination, and manufacturer's name and serial number of the vaccine administered, and shall present such certificate to the owner of such pet, forward a copy of such certificate to the Village Commissioner, and retain a copy of such certificate.

(b) Each veterinarian shall, at the time of such inoculation present a tag of durable material to the owner of such pet; such tags shall be numbered serially, contain the year of issuance and shall be attached to the collar of such pet as evidence of rabies vaccination.

(c) The owners of the dogs and cats must present the veterinarian's rabies certificate and tag required herein to the Village Commissioner before such official shall issue an annual dog or cat license as required by the Village of Kewaskum.

(d) It shall be unlawful to own, keep or harbor any pet described herein which does not carry the rabies vaccination tag required by Subsection (b) hereof.

9.28 (3) Notification of Animal Bite.

Any person having knowledge that a pet regulated herein has bitten any person shall within twenty-four (24) hours notify the Kewaskum Police Department or the Village Health Officer, giving if possible, the name and address of the owner and circumstances which the bite occurred.

9.28 (4) Impoundment, Quarantine.

(a) Any mammalian pet described herein determined to be a fierce or vicious animal may be seized and impounded under the supervision of a licensed veterinarian for a period of not less than fourteen (14) days.

(b) Any mammalian pet described herein found not wearing a valid vaccination tag shall be impounded under the supervision of a licensed veterinarian for a period of not less than three (3) days, and may be re-

claimed by the owner thereof upon compliance of the rabies vaccination requirement of this ordinance.

(c) Any mammalian pet described herein suspected of being afflicted with rabies which has bitten any person, causing an abrasion of the skin of such person, shall be seized and impounded under the supervision of a licensed veterinarian for a period of not less than fourteen (14) days. If, upon examination by such veterinarian, the animal has no signs of rabies at the end of such impoundment, it may be released to the owner or in the case of a stray, it shall be disposed of according to law. If such animal has not been vaccinated as required herein, it must be inoculated, as required herein, prior to release to its owners.

(d) Any mammalian pet described herein not vaccinated as required herein, and which are known to have been bitten by a rabid animal shall be seized, and upon consent of the owner of such pet, immediately destroyed. If the owner does not consent to the disposal of the affected pet, such animal shall be impounded in strict isolation and quarantined in suitable impoundment facilities under the supervision of a licensed veterinarian for a minimum of six (6) months. If such animal had been vaccinated as required herein it shall be revaccinated immediately and impounded for a period of thirty (30) days following such revaccination. If the owner of a pet described herein which is known to have been bitten by a rabid animal refuses to comply with the regulations herein, such animal shall be immediately destroyed.

(e) The owner of an impounded animal shall bear and be responsible for the payment of all impoundment fees, all expenses incurred during such impoundment and all medical expenses incurred to any person by reason of injuries sustained by a fierce or vicious animal described herein or by a suspected

or known rabid animal described herein.

(f) Nothing contained in this ordinance shall in any way be construed to be contrary to or effect the operation of Section 95.21 of the Wisconsin Statutes.

9.28 (5) Enforcement Authority.

The Kewaskum Health Officer is granted the authority to enforce this ordinance, and the police department shall assist the health officer in the seizure, confinement and impounding of animals when such assistance is requested. The Kewaskum Health Officer may promulgate and adopt rules and regulations deemed necessary to cope with an outbreak of rabies in the Village of Kewaskum.

9.28 (6) Records Required by Kennels, Pet Shops, etc.

It shall be unlawful for any person operating a kennel or pet shop or other persons selling the mammalian pets described herein, within the Village of Kewaskum, to sell or place such animals without first preparing accurate and complete records of such sale. Such records are deemed necessary in tracing the location and movement of animals suspected of rabies exposure.

9.28 (7) Penalties.

Any person violating any pro-

vision of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, forfeit a fine of not less than five (\$5.00) Dollars nor more than one hundred (\$100.00) Dollars and the court costs taxed in such matter, and in default or payment of the forfeiture and costs shall be imprisoned in the County Jail until such fine and costs are paid but not exceeding ten (10) days.

Section 2. That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect on January 15, 1970.

Indians Defeat Lomira, N. Fondy, Run Streak to 8

The Kewaskum Indians defeated leaders in the Scenic Moraine conference, won two more games the past week to extend their winning streak to eight in a row, five in and three outside of the conference. The Indians easily rolled over Lomira, 82-55, in a tune-up period after the holiday layoff here Saturday night, and then ran into unexpected trouble in shading winless North Fondy there Tuesday, 64-60, in Scenic action.

Fortunately Kewaskum was up against a weak team and could afford it in the game against Lomira because their play was ragged and erratic. That the holiday layoff had cooled them off showed. Still Lomira provided no problem as they outscored the Lions in every period and led 38-23 at half-time and 63-43 at the third quarter's termination. The final margin was by 27 points.

Coach Walt Bade substituted freely as his Indians romped over the Lions. Tony Butschlick, a starter who usually scores in double figures, injured in the Campbellsport game, did not suit up for Lomira.

Junior Clark Eichstedt scored 19 points for the winners and Randy Koth chipped in with 16. Dick Bartelt and Jim Tessar also scored in double figures. Westphal and Erickson were tops for the Lions with 12 and 10 points respectively. The Indians made good on 18 free throws compared to Lomira's 9.

Kewaskum needed free throws to win the game at North Fondy Tuesday as the surprising Orioles, tied for last place and winless in 5 games, outscored them from the field 29-22, and gave them a tough battle. The Indians were expected to win by a wider margin. Kewaskum outscored North Fondy on the free throw line, 20-2, and this won the game. The Indians made 20 of 24 free throws for a torrid 84 per cent, while the Orioles failed on 14 of 16 (14 per cent).

Eichstedt again shouldered the scoring load for the winners with 26 points and helped his team to a commanding 36-19 edge on the boards. Steve Stern, always a bear-cat on the boards, followed with 14. The bulk of Fondy's scoring was wrapped up in the efforts of Chuck Cruz and Dave Boelter, who hit 19 and 18 points respectively. The win enabled the Indians to stay one game ahead of Grafton and Hartland.

Kewaskum fell behind at the quarter, 20-17, but made up for it with a hot second period in which they outscored their opponent, 17-7, to possess a 34-27 advantage at the intermission. The Orioles narrowed the gap to 49-45 in the third stanza and the scoring was even in the final period.

Tonight (Friday) Kewaskum entertains Washington High of Germantown, also winless to date and tied with N. Fondy for the cellar.

KEWASKUM RESIDENT IS SERVING ON COMMITTEE

Robert P. Wepner, Ripon, was appointed acting manager of East Central Breeders effective Jan. 1, 1970.

Marvin Hayes, Campbellsport, president of the board, reports this will temporarily fill the vacancy created when General Manager Alton Block resigned to accept the position of general manager of Tri-State Breeders Cooperative, Baraboo, Wis.

Wepner has worked for the cooperative since 1951 and has served as assistant manager since November, 1965.

East Central Breeders Cooperative, a farmer-owned organization, is the oldest "direct member" breeding cooperative in Wisconsin, being established in July, 1941.

Today the over 5,000 members own their modern labs, barns and offices at Waupun, Wis. and 28 registered bulls and 14 boars. A total of 16 plus proven sires provided. Over 90,000 cows and sows are inseminated annually in ten east central Wisconsin counties.

In addition, frozen semen is shipped to all parts of the United States, Canada, and some foreign countries.

Bulls for this AI cooperative are purchased by a sire committee who travel to all parts of the United States and Canada for this purpose. Some of these bulls have become internationally famous. Pabst Sir Comet Oliver, Elmer Brook Aristocrat and Glenafton Clarion, to name a few.

Currently serving on this committee are Clarence Boyke, Fond du Lac; Richard Budde, Beaver Dam, and Gilbert Stoffel, Kewaskum. Other members of the board of directors are John Bradley, Pickett; Herbert Meyer, Berlin; Bernard Setz, Columbus, and Marvin Hayes, Campbellsport.

to take their cars off the street.

Fines for violations of the overnight parking ordinance will range from \$1 to \$25. The amount of the fine increases proportionately with the number of violations per person.

The board voted to participate in the federally funded Neighborhood Youth Corps Program designed to give employment to non-matriculated Kewaskum High School students 16 years of age or older of families who qualify as low-income or welfare.

The hiring agency is reimbursed at \$1.30 per hour per student. In keeping with a regulation that all village employees live within the village, it was concurred that only local youths be considered.

The program is not on-the-job training. Students may work ten hours per week during the school year or thirty-six hours during a summer at such jobs as janitor, lifeguard, swimming instructor, etc.

William Geidel appeared to say he is in the process of buying the Edwin Frohmann residence and was granted the right to move the home from its present location at

1418 Fond du Lac Ave. to a lot on Roseland Drive behind the Lee Honeck Garage.

Donald Mlodzik, who resides on South Fond du Lac Ave., requested a house number for his home and coin-operated laundry. The area was annexed to the village a number of years ago. The board authorized establishing numbers for the annexed area from the Mlodzik residence south to the Bonne Belle Motel.

Board members approved the purchase of a snow blower attachment for the lawn mower, so as to be able to quickly remove snow from such areas as the sidewalk on the Main Street bridge. It was noted that several complaints regarding deep snow on the bridge had been received.

Insurance agent Eugene Bohn appeared to review some phases of insurance on municipal property. After his recommendation that the board consider floater insurance on mobile equipment, Supt. of Public Works Armin Oppermann was instructed to furnish the schedule of equipment that should be insured.

Floater insurance covers the equipment wherever it is being used.

the Robert G. Romaine Post, presented an American flag for the council room to replace a faded one now in use. Village President Cyril Wietor gratefully accepted.

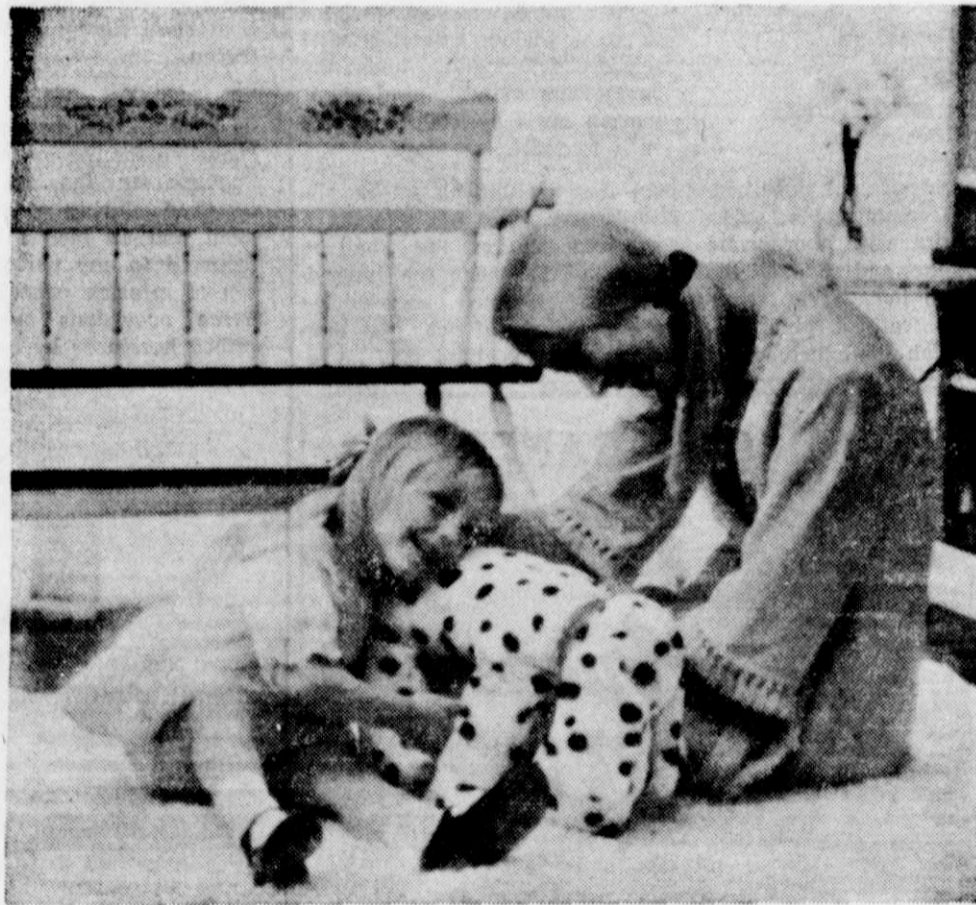
